These members represent and serve the various age group educational programs currently active in the church.

Finance and Property Committee - This committee shall be responsible for the management of the financial and property affairs of the church corporation. Chairman: Ruling Elder Charles Hemphill. Chairman, Sub-Committee on Property, Ruling Elder D. Robert Tietjen. Members: Ruling Elders James Clark and John E. Carroll, Jr.

Stewardship and Mission Committee - This committee shall be responsible for interpreting the mission of the United Presbyterian Church in the USA, the Synod of the Chesapeake, the Presbytery of Washington City, and the Potomac United Presbyterian Church to the members of the local church. It shall seek to engage the local church in mission and to develop within the members of the local church those faithful stewardship practices that make mission possible. Chairman: Ruling Elder Robert Acker. Members: Ruling Elders F. G. Harting and Robert Garcia, Ralph Hall, Bill Johnston, Randy Dunnavant, Jim Spivey, Andy Breidenbach, Bob Springborn, Wayne Meinke, Bill Kerrigan, and Chuck Pratt.

Congregational Life Countitee - This committee shall be responsible for the "gathered life" of the congregation in worship and fellowship. Chairman: Ruling Elder R. Neil Benedict. Members: Ruling Elders William Harrison and Tony Ferrara, Rudy Savage, Jim Perrin, and Lou Smith.

Planning Committee - This committee shall be composed of the four chairmen of the Standing Committees of Session. The Moderator of Session shall serve as chairman. The committee shall be responsible for long-range program planning for the church in its educational, liturgical, and service functions.

Committee Rules - The following five rules were adopted by the Session to facilitate the work of its committees.

- 1. The Standing Committees of Session shall meet at least four times annually.
- 2. The Standing Committees of Session shall report in writing to the Session at least four times annually.
- 3. It is recommended that each committee of Session will have at least eight members.
- 4. It is understood that any communicant member of the congregation may be appointed to the Standing Committees of Session but that the Chairman shall always be an active ruling elder.
- 5. Standing Committees of Session shall not be required to receive Session approval to spend within their annual budget allotments except when advised to do so by the Finance and Property Committee and required by the Session.

SYNOD EXECUTIVE TO PREACH HERE FEBRUARY 23

The Reverend William R. Phillippe, Executive of the Synod of the Chesapeake will be guest minister at the Potomac United Presbyterian Church on Sunday, February 23. Mr. Phillippe is the chief administrative officer of the synod which includes the presbyteries of Washington City, Baltimore, and New Castle. He and his staff have their offices at Hillen Avenue in Towson, Maryland. Prior to accepting the call to this position, Mr. Phillippe was Director of Continuing Education at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary.

LENTEN COLLOQUIES

The Lay Education Planning Group and Mr. Blice have planned what they believe will be a fresh and exciting opportunity for Lenten study and fellowship in the Potomac United Presbyterian Church. On each of the five Sunday mornings of March, Mr. Blice will develop his sermon from the United Presbyterian Confession of 1967 and those Biblical texts related to the Confession.

At 8:00 p.m. on each Sunday evening a Lenten Colloquy will be held in the Fellowship Room for the purpose of discussing the sermon of the morning. The moderator of the colloquies will be a member of the Lay Education: Planning Group or someone appointed by the group. Mr. Blice will be present as a resource person and theological observer.

The purpose of the colloquies will be to provide those in attendance the opportunity to respond as they wish to this contemporary statement of belief and/or the sermonic interpretation of its several themes. The Confession of '67, although now officially approved by the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., has been and continues to be the source of theological controversy and debate. The colloquies will provide one setting to keep constructive debate alive and, hopefully, to clear away areas where there has been misunderstanding.

SPECIAL OFFERING TO BE RECEIVED MAY 25th

The Fund For Freedom was established a number of years ago by the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church USA to provide financial resources for the General Assembly's Council on Church and Race. Fund For Freedom money is used by the Council to meet emergencies and crises as well as special needs of persons and groups.

Some years ago the Church of the Master in New York City - with an initial grant from the Freedom Fund - began working with boys who virtually lived on the streets. They were out of school because of prison records, out of their homes because public housing regulations bar whole families if ex-prisioners are living with them. Street academies grew. They are tailored to the needs and levels of such youths. The number of students per teacher is low; the level of warmth and understanding is high. Boys' reading ability, for example, rises dramatically in as little as six weeks. A recent Carnegie Foundation report documents the program's effectiveness in giving them a door back into useful life.

Fund for Freedom aids important scholarship programs; the Student Opportunity Scholarships and the Urban Ghetto Scholarship Fund (TUGS) for youngsters without great records but with great promise, youths who can utilize professional and technical education to make a contribution to their world. TUG includes aggressive recruiting, help in applying to appropriate schools, assistance on occupational choices and continuing evaluation of all aspects of the program.

Special offering envelopes for the Fund For Freedom will be available in the pew racks on May 25 for use by all who worship that day.

From Ed White

Dear Friends,

Last Last summer a total of $3\frac{1}{2}$ million dollars funded 5600 Neighborhood Youth Corps workers for the summer in Washington, D. C.

This summer only 1.9 million has been made available which will fund summer jobs for only half as many young people.

The bad implications of this kind of cutback in employment for young people in the District are obvious. At the May meeting of the D. C. Presbytery Church and Society Task Force young people both black and white from our churches urged the committee to act.

We urge everyone to write to

- 1. Senator Joseph Tydings
- 2. Senator William Proxmire (Chmn of the Senate District Appropriations)
- 3. Rep. William Natcher (Chmn of House District Appropriations Committee)

Urge them to find sufficient funds to at least restore the Neighborhood Youth Corps to the level of last summer.

World Wide Communion Sunday - October 5, 1969

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be celebrated at both services of worship on Sunday, October 5th. On this day the Potomac United Presbyterian Church will join with other Protestant churches around the world in partaking of this simple meal of bread and wine.

In the World-Wide Communion Service, first held in 1936, Christians of many nations are jointly nourished and made one in Christ. The service itself is an historical expression of continuous sharing within the global Christian community. Christians partake one with the other in suffering, in consolation, and in expecting the Kingdom.

Services of worship at the Potomac United Presbyterian Church beginning October 5 will be held at 9:15 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. New members will be received at the 11:00 a.m. service

All members of the congregation are encouraged to be present at worship on World Wide Communion Sunday. To partake of the sacrament on this occasion is to express one's obedience to Jesus Christ as he works even today in the world wide fellowship of those who bear his name.

Effective Sunday, October 5 - A New Sunday Morning Schedule

As previously announced in Sunday bulletins and special mailings, the Potomac United Presbyterian Church will follow a new schedule of Sunday morning worship and study beginning Sunday, October 5th.

At 9:15 a.m. a Family Worship Service will be held in the sanctuary. This service, although but one-half hour in length, will be a complete service of worship. It will include all the elements of the service for the Lord's Day except choral anthems and responses. The presence of younger children in the worship service will always be considered in the ordering of this service. From time to time families will be asked to assist in the planning of the service and in its leadership.

At 11:00 a.m. a second worship service will be offered. This service will be one hour in length. The second section of the church school will be in session concurrently with the 11:00 a.m. worship service. The lay education study series will not be offered at 11:00 a.m.

The coffee hour will continue to be held following the 11:00 a.m. worship service.

Families of Congregation Divided Into Parishes

Every elder will invite to his home the members of his parish in order to discuss with them the mission of the Potomac United Presbyterian Church as it is planned for 1970. Further information about these parish meetings will be announced in early October.

And I think of my future colleagues in our Presbyterian seminaries, the students in our Presbyterian colleges, and the countless numbers of children, youth, and adults who are served by Presbyterian hospitals, clinics, mobile ministries, neighborhood houses, and summer camps across the United States and around the world.

Why do we do these things? What is it that we are attempting to express through the church's mission? We are engaged in mission simply because we believe that God loves us and that he loves this world and all its people. "We love, because he first loved us" says the author of First John. This is the key to the church's mission. Love.

Soon each of us will be making our pledge to our church for 1970. Our pledges are one expression of our love for the church and our commitment to its mission of loving the world. The nature of our mission in 1970 will be determined by the nature of pledging in November 1969.

Having lived almost three years in Europe (and married in France), he has taught French at St. Paul's School, Concord, N.H., studied briefly in Italy for a singing career, and been the executive director of the International Student Center of New Haven.

Raised in New England Congregationalism, and exposed often in childhood to free-swinging Southern Presbyterian hymn singing, he entered into the Anglican musical tradition when he attended Virginia Theological Seminary in Alexandria, from which he graduated in 1962. Since then he has served in churches in Virginia and Washington, D. C., and has been the Associate Episcopal Chaplain at the University of Maryland.

Combining a life's training in singing, literature and theology, he is making his career the introduction of new songs to churches, schools and colleges across the country. In worship services, concerts, workshops, conferences and rallies, William Flanders has sung to and with people of all ages, conservatives and liberals alike. He sings out of his own life's experience. His songs are rooted in the Biblical tradition, yet speak in secular language, their melodies drawing on the American folk-song heritage.

Frequently touring - from coast to coast and recently into Canada - William Flanders has sung on campuses as diverse as Stanford, Stephens, Kendall and Maryland. Seminaries where he has appeared include Union (NYC) and Virginia. Forthcoming concerts will be at Exeter and Groton schools. His ecumenical ministry moves between churches in a dozen denominations.

WHAT'S THE GOOD BOOK GOOD FOR? - Lay Education Series

The Reverend Omar R. Buchwalter, Ph.D. will be the lecturer and discussion leader at the Lay Education Hour on Sunday, November 30, and again on December 7. The themes chosen for these two Sundays are "How Shall We Regard The Bible?" and "Biblical Authority Today."

Dr. Buchwalter received his B.D. degree from Union Theological Seminary, New York City and his Ph.D. degree from Columbia University. His doctoral dissertation was entitled, "The Nature and Significance of the Humanity of Jesus in the New Testament." From 1953 to 1957 Dr. Buchwalter served as Assistant Professor of Religion and then Acting Bean of the College of Theology at Silliman University in Dumagnete City, the Philippines. In 1959 he became pastor of the Warner Memorial Presbyterian Church, Kensington, Maryland. Having had over the years of his professional ministry a deep interest in the church and social problems, Dr. Buchwalter, in 1968, became a member of the Technical Staff at Research Analysis Corporation where he is now Chairman of the Juvenile Delinquency Research Program.

On Sunday, November 23, a panel of three laymen will be featured at the Lay Education Hour. Mr. Robert Fredlund, Mr. Anthony Ferrara, and Mr. Grover McCain will speak on the following themes respectively.

"Modern Translations of the Scripture"

"How The Bible Helps Me"

"Difficulties of a Layman With The Bible"

Mr. Robert Beer, a member of the Lay Education Planning Group will serve as moderator.

Ninety-one adults and young people were present at the first session of this current series on November 16 when the film, "Our Bible - How It Came To Us," was shown.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING - December 7

The Session is calling a special meeting of the congregation to be held following the second worship service on Sunday, December 7. The purpose of the meeting is twofold.

First, to add a new article (No. 19) to the By-Laws which will read as follows: "When the congregation meets to elect members to serve on the representative Nominating Committee it shall elect three, and only three such members."

Comment. The Constitution of the United Presbyterian Church in the USA does not place any limitations upon the number of members of this committee other than that those members elected by the congregation shall constitute a majority of the membership. Inasmuch as the Session can name two of its members and only

two, the three elected by the congregation would satisfy the constitutional requirement. The Session, recognizing that the Potomac United Presbyterian Church has in the past always limited representation on the committee to three members from the congregation-at-large, now proposes that this be the stated policy of the church.

Second, to elect (three) members from the congregation-at-large to serve on the 1970 representative Nominating Committee.

Comment. The 1969 Committee was composed of Ruling Elders Anthony Ferrara, Chairman, D. Robert Tietjen and Mrs. William Murphy, Mr. James Richards and Mr. James Spivey from the congregation-at-large.

The Session has named Ruling Elders James Clark and John E. Carroll, Jr. as its members on the 1970 committee. Mr. Clark will be chairman.

NOVEMBER 14 - A DELIGHTFUL EVENING AT THE CHURCH

The Family Night Dinner - William Flanders In Concert held at the church on Friday evening, November 14, and sponsored by the Congregational Life Committee of Session was truly a delightful event. One hundred twenty-two adults, youth and children were present for the covered-dish dinner served in the Fellowship Room. The table decorations and name tags followed an autumn theme. Members of the Dinner Committee, Mrs. Henry Wakeland, Chairman, prepared the tables and served the dinner.

Following dinner William Flanders In Concert was presented in the sanctuary where one hundred thirty-five members and friends of the congregation were present. Mr. Flanders sang a number of his own compositions and led the congregation in singing several others. His first appearance at the Potomac United Presbyterian Church has already won him a large following.

Members of the church who were unable to purchase Mr. Flanders' record albums on November 14 may order them through the church office.

ADVENT 1969 - CHANCEL ADVENT WREATH

On November 30, 1969, the First Sunday of Advent, the Potomac United Presbyterian Congregation will celebrate The Sacrament Of The Lord's Supper at both morning worship services.

The Advent Season of the liturgical year is four Sundays in length, the first Sunday in Advent being the fourth Sunday before Christmas. The color for Advent is purple signifying penitence mingled with hope. During the season of Advent Christians around the world focus their attention in personal and corporate worship upon the meaning of Emmanuel, "God with us." Advent is then a time of preparation, a time of personal examination before the Christ of Christmas.

The Potomac United Presbyterian Church, beginning this Advent season, will follow the long-standing tradition of many Christian churches of placing an Advent Wreath in the chancel. The large wreath will lie flat on a pedestal on the left side of the chancel. Four purple candles will be placed in the wreath, one candle for each of the four Advent Sundays. On Christmas Eve a large white candle will be placed in the center of the wreath. The candles will be lighted on the Sundays of Advent by members of the Confirmation Study Group.

Mrs. D. Robert Tietjen will make the Advent Wreath.

The Advent wreath is of Scandinavian origin and is now a much beloved tradition in many churches in the United States.

FAMILY ADVENT WORSHIP

Families of the church are encouraged to create their own Advent wreaths and to give them a central place in family worship during the Advent Season. The wreath can be made very inexpensively. Many of the major department stores and some flower and gift shops carry the basic frames and candle holders for such wreaths so that all that need be added are the pine branches and purple candles. A sample wreath created by Mrs. Jack Dart will be displayed on the table in the narthex on Sunday, November 23.

During the week of November 23 all families of the church will receive through the mail a small pamphlet containing suggested family worship services for each of the four Sundays of Advent and for Christmas Day. Many Christian families who have followed this tradition in the past have found that Sunday evening following dinner is a most appropriate time to hold their family Advent worship service.

ORDER POINSETTIAS FOR CHRISTMAS SERVICES NOW!

Poinsettias purchased by church members and friends will again be placed in the chancel for Christmas Sunday and Christmas Eve worship this year. The poinsettia plants are \$5.00 each and must be ordered by December 1.

Mrs. Barbara Pratt will take orders following the 9:15 a.m. worship service on November 23 and 30. Mrs. Shirley Tietjen will take orders following the 11:00 a.m. worship service on these two Sundays.

The plants may be taken home following the ll:00 p.m. Candlelight Service on Christmas Eve.

COMMUNITY THANKSGIVING SERVICE

The Potomac United Presbyterian Church will be host church for the Potomac Community Thanksgiving Service to be held at 9:30 a.m. on Thanksgiving Day. The Rev. DeWitt Dickey, pastor of the Potomac Methodist Church, will preach. He will be assisted in the service by the Reverend Edward Sims of St. Francis Episcopal Church and the Reverend Richard W. Blice, Jr. The offering will be given to Potomac FISH.

TOYS FOR TOBYTOWN

The Senior High Youth Fellowship is collecting toys for Tobytown. The toys may be brought to the church on any Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday and Sunday mornings before December 7. The toys should be repairable. All toys will be accepted; baby dolls, games, trucks, sports equipment, books, etc. The toys will be repaired and repainted, if necessary, by the Senior Highs on Sunday, December 7, and then turned over to Tobytown Associates who will sell them to Tobytown residents at very, very low prices.

Tobytown Associates is a non-profit corporation of Potomac and Tobytown residents whose purpose is to assist residents of this small community in solving their own problems.

Last year the proceeds from the sale of these toys, repaired by the Senior Highs of the church, were used to build a bus shelter for Tobytown school children at the corner of River Road and Esworthy Road. A number of Potomac Presbyterian Senior Highs assisted in the building of the shelter.

Festival Of Christmas Music - On Sunday evening, December 14, at 7:00 p.m., the traditional Festival of Christmas Music will be held in the sanctuary. This event is planned to provide the congregation an opportunity to sing all the old and familiar carols of Christmas. The festival is then a service of praise, a time in which Christians can express their joy and their hope in the Christ of Christmas.

The church choir under the direction of Miss Judith Peters has prepared a number of special anthems for this event among which are "The Little Drummer Boy" and "Do You Hear What I Hear?"

Following the festival the congregation is invited to the Fellowship Room where punch and Christmas cookies will be provided by the Dinner Committee of the Women's Association, Mrs. Henry Wakeland, Chairman.

Inasmuch as the festival is an event for the whole family, a nursery care group will not be provided.

Two Christmas Eve Services - Two Christmas Eve Candlelight Services will be provided this year.

7:30 p.m. - This early service, new this year, is scheduled at an hour when it will be possible for families with young children to attend as families. It will differ from the later service in only two respects: the choir will not participate and small candles will not be distributed to the worshippers. However, the sanctuary will be illumined by candlelight and a member of the choir will participate in the service as soloist.

ll:00 p.m. - The second Christmas Eve Service. This second service of worship will conclude with the lighting of the individual candles held by all worshippers. Members of the eighth grade Confirmation Study Group will participate in this service in the lighting of the sanctuary and individual candles.

Special Christmas Offerings -

Ministries To Children World-Wide. - Children in the church school received coin candle boxes for this offering during the church school sessions on December 7. Parents are encouraged to discuss the significance of this offering with their children and to emphasize the fact that Christmas is the season of giving because of the supreme gift of God in Christ. Many families will want to pray for the children of the world during their family Advent worship services.

These coin candle boxes are to be returned to the church on Sunday morning, December 21. The church school classes will gather for worship that morning in their respective sections at 9:45 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. in the Fellowship Room. The coin candle boxes will be received during these worship services which will be led by Mr. David Smith, Church School Superintendent.

Enclosed with this newsletter are offering envelopes for Ministries To Children World-Wide. These are for use by adults, senior high and junior high youth. These envelopes should be returned on Christmas Eve and will be received during the offertory at both candlelight services.

An explanation of this special offering is found on the back of the enclosed envelope. The Session of the Potomac United Presbyterian Church hopes that every family of the church will respond generously to this appeal.

An Offering Of Socks And Mittens - Again this year families of the church are being given the opportunity to provide socks and mittens to the children served by the Buckhorn Children's Center in Buckhorn, Kentucky. The center, an agency of the Board of National Missions, serves an Appalachian region where its ministry is offered primarily to disadvantaged children. Located in the mountains of eastern Kentucky, Buckhorn seeks to provide services for children who are emotionally hurt, physically below par, mentally slow, and socially deficient. In addition to foster home placement, Buckhorn provides a Day Care Center for 30 children from the neighboring "hollows."

The offering of socks and mittens will be received at the 7:30 p.m. worship service on Christmas Eve. It is requested that they be wrapped in white tissue paper and marked for boy or girl accordingly. Children attending this service will have the opportunity to bring their "White Gift" to the Communion Table where Mr. Blice will greet them.

Christmas At The Church For Children and Youth -

Senior High Youth - On Sunday, December 7, and Wednesday evening, December 10, the senior highs of the church held a Toys For Tobytown Workshop wherein they repaired, repainted, and cleaned the hundreds of toys and games that were donated by church member families. The senior highs wish to thank all those who gave toys. The quantity of toys received was much larger than in 1968.

The toy sale will be held under the direction of Tobytown Associates, a citizen's group comprised of Potomac and Tobytown residents. The proceeds of the sale will be used for improvements in Tobytown.

The junior highs will be returned directly to their homes at the conclusion of their visit to the Presbyterian Home.

Mr. Blice will accompany the young people on this visit and will introduce the young people to the residents of the home.

Where In The World Is The United Presbyterian Church? -

The Lay Education Planning Group, in deciding to offer this particular series, is hopeful of being able to bring to the Potomac United Presbyterian Church several key Presbytery and Synod leaders who will be asked to describe the mission of the church as it is being fulfilled by these two judicatories. Increased Participation In Worship And Study -

Since the first Sunday of October when the 9:15 a.m. worship service and the Lay Education Program were first offered the combined attendance at both worship services showed a marked increase over the previous months when only one worship service was offered at 10:30 a.m. Average attendance at the 9:15 service has been 73. Average attendance at the 11:00 service has been 112, making the average for both services 185 persons. An average of 50-55 senior high youth and adults have participated regularly in the Lay Education Program.

Special Committee Named To Study Drug Abuse Program -
