

#### DR. NORMAN TROTT AT LAY EDUCATION HOUR ON JANUARY 24



# SPECIAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING - FEBRUARY 28

At the call of the Session a special Congregational meeting will be held at the close of the second worship service on Sunday, February 28. The purpose of the meeting is two-fold.

First, the Session will present the 1971 Program Budget for reception by the Congregation. Usually made at the January Annual Meeting, the budget presentation was postponed this year to allow time for a second stewardship appeal. Many Church member families responded to this appeal, and the Session will now propose a 1971 budget totaling \$55,000. The details of the budget will be published and distributed at the February 28th meeting.

Second, the Session will propose an amendment to the Church bylaws requiring that a special Congregational meeting be held in October, no later than the third Monday of the month, for the purpose of electing the required number of ruling elders to be ordained and/or installed on the first Sunday of the succeeding January. At this October meeting the Interpretation and Stewardship Committee of Session will be required to make a preliminary report to the Congregation of the Stewardship Committment Program and budget goals for the next calendar year.

The proposed amendment to the by-laws will improve the existing program of the Church in two ways. Elders elected in October will be invited to meet with the Session as elders-elect without vote. In so doing they will have the opportunity to learn first hand of the Session activities and plans and thus eliminate the need for the extensive briefing now required when an elder may be elected one week in January and take office the next. It will also allow for a thorough Church officer training program to be conducted between October and January. The ordination vows taken by a ruling elder have deep Biblical, theological and ecclesiastical significance. Three months between election and ordination and/or installation will provide sufficient time to study and reflect on the meaning of these vows.

With the announcement of the Stewardship Committment Program and preliminary budget goals for the next calendar year in October (before the actual pledging by Church members) time for interpretation, discussion and debate will be provided. The Congregation will have the opportunity to know as well as can be known in October what the financial responsibilities are that must be assumed for the next fiscal year.

# CHURCH ORGANIZATION FOR 1971

At the February Session meeting Michael P. Bentzen was named Clerk of Session, and Church organization was restructured under the following three standing committees:

Church Education Committee: Andrew W. Breidenbach, Chairman, with  $\overline{R}$ . Neil Benedict, Robert J. McMahon and Mrs. Lewis V. Smith (Alice).

Congregational Life Committee: D. Robert Tietjen, Chairman, with Michael Bentzen, Anthony B. Ferrara, Charles E. Hemphill and Compton S. Jones.

Interpretation and Stewardship Committee: Lawrence Killion, Chairman, with William E. Harrison and William C. Lowrey.

The Session voted to dissolve the Finance and Property Committee and to meet as a Board of Trustees at least twice yearly to perform the roll previously filled by this committee. When meeting as the Board of Trustees, Bill Harrison will serve as President, and Neil Benedict will serve as Secretary.

Other appointments made at the Session meeting include: Michael Bentzen and Larry Killion as Lay Delegates to the Council of Churches; Michael Bentzen and Bill Lowrey as elders on the Nominating Committee, with Michael Bentzen serving as Chairman.

# SEVENTH & EIGHTH GRADERS SPEND A SATURDAY IN STUDY

What is the meaning of Chapters 1-11 in the Book of Genesis? Who wrote these chapters? When? Why? Are there similiar stories in other Near Eastern literature? What significance do the stories of Adam and Eve, Cain and Abel, Noah and The Flood and the Tower of Babel have for Christians today?

The seventh and eighth graders of the Potomac United Presbyterian Church spent Saturday, February 6, from 9:00 to 4:00 in search of answers to these and other questions about the early Genesis stories. The study was led by Mrs. William E. Hoge (Marilyn) Mr. Rudolph P. Savage and Mr. Blice. Twenty-five students participated. Lunch was provided and prepared by Mrs. Winthrop Follansbee (Carolyn) and Mrs. Samuel Willcoxon (Kathy).

Continuing their study of Old Testament Literature begun in September, these students will next embark on a study of Abraham at the regular Thursday afternoon sessions from 4:30 to 7:30 p.m.

As a member of the task force Lynne will join with a number of other teenagers, laymen and ministers from across the Synod in providing support and guidance to the presbyteries and local churches in youth ministry and in the Synod's summer camping program.

Lynne is an active participant in the youth program at the Potomac United Presbyterian Church and is a member of the Sanctuary Choir.

# POTOMAC YOUTH MINISTRY PLANS FORMULATED

"How can we best serve the needs of the youth in the Potomac area?" This is the prime question being discussed during initial meetings of the Potomac Youth Ministry Committee. Members of St. Francis Episcopal, Potomac United Methodist and Potomac United Presbyterian churches are planning and working together in a cooperative venture to define the aims and objectives of a youth ministry for Potomac area high schoolers.

The Definition Committee, chaired by Miss Sarah Jane Hawken, St. Francis, has drafted an initial set of objectives. Leon Miller, United Methodist, is directing efforts of the Finance Committee toward development of an initial budget recommendation for consideration at the next general meeting. An investigation of possible facilities for recreational and office use is being pursued by Mrs. Harry C. Lawson (Peg), United Presbyterian. Contacts with other youth programs in the area are being sought in order to benefit from their experience.

"Things are still very much in the formulative stages," states Robert J. McMahon, United Presbyterian, General Chairman of PYM, "but we are actively proceeding to give the program definition so as to acquire the means to move ahead. We welcome comments or questions from members of the participating churches and other interested residents of the community."

# KARL BARTH'S DEFINITION OF MISSION

MISSION ... means "sending," a sending out into the nations for the purpose of testifying to the Gospel, that represents the root of existence and at the same time also the root of the whole task of the people of Christ. In the "Mission" the Church breaks out, sets out on its road and takes the step which is necessary to it in the very depths of its being, the step beyond its own self and also beyond its own environment ...out into the humanity which is entrapped in so many false, willful and powerless beliefs, and bound to so many false gods (false, because they simply reflect mankind's own glory and misery) of both older and new invention and authority — that world of men who are still strangers to the Word of God... The call which constitutes the community is precisely the command to carry this message to the world of men, to the nations...

# THE 1971 ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING

This year Potomac United Presbyterian Church will again be participating in the One Great Hour of Sharing, the traditional Lenten offering made by churches across the nation. A special "Hour of Sharing" edition of Steeple to People will be distributed in early March pointing up the significance of local churches cooperating in this effort to aid families and communities around the world who have emergency or disaster needs.

On Sunday, February 21, coin boxes and interpretative materials will be distributed to all students in the Sunday Church School. Teachers will call attention to this expression of the Church's ministry during the several Sundays of Lent. Seventeners will receive their coin boxes on Thursday, February 26, and senior highs at their regular meeting on Sunday evening, February 28.

Adult members of the Congregation will receive special offering envelopes during Lent. Coin boxes are to be returned to the Church on Palm Sunday, April 4. Adults who have not made their offering before Palm Sunday will be requested to do so at either of the worship services that day.

# WINTER RETREAT FOR NINTH-TWELFTH GRADERS

The annual high school winter retreat will be held Friday through Sunday, March 5-7. As in previous years, ninth graders have been invited to participate. The group will stay at the lodge at Deer Valley Camp, Mt. Davis, Pennsylvania. The program will include study, discussion and worship - plus ski and swimming recreation at nearby Seven Springs.

# DR. BUCHWALTER TO LEAD LAY EDUCATION STUDY OF GALATIANS

Beginning Sunday, February 28, the Lay Education Program will undertake a Lenten study of Galatians led by Dr. Omar Buchwalter. Dr. Buchwalter, a man of many talents, is well known to Potomac United Presbyterian Church, having previously worked with the

group in its study of the Bible. Dr. Buchwalter received his B.D. degree from Union Theological Seminary, New York City, and his Ph.D. degree from Columbia University. His doctoral dissertation was entitled, "The Nature and Significance of the Humanity of Jesus in the New Testament."


From 1953 to 1957 Dr. Buchwalter served as Assistant Professor of Religion and then Acting Dean of the College of Theology at Silliman University in Dumagnete City, the Philippines. In 1959 he became pastor of the Warner Memorial Presbyterian Church, Kensington, Maryland. Having had over the years of his professional ministry a deep interest in the church and social problems, Dr. Buchwalter, in 1968, became a member of the Technical Staff at Research Analysis Corporation where he is now Chairman of the Juvenile Deliquency Research Program.

The study of Galatians should be an exciting undertaking for the Lenten season. In this letter written by Paul to the churches of Galatia the Apostle defends his gospel of salvation by faith rather than by works of the law. It is one of the most significant of early Christian documents, not only because of the light it throws upon Paul and the primitive churches, but also because of the influence it has exerted in subsequent history. Although a short letter, it has always ranked with the much longer Roman and Corinthian epistles in importance. A polemical document itself, it has figured prominently in every struggle of the church to maintain freedom of the Spirit against legalism of any kind.

The series will run From February 28 through Palm Sunday with the group meeting at 9:30 a.m. each Sunday in the Fellowship Room. All adults and senior high youth are invited.

# THE 1971 ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING

This special Lenten offering in which local Presbyterian Churches across the nation have faithfully participated for many years has added significance in 1971. The concept of the One Great Hour of Sharing has been expanded beyond World Relief and Emergency Service to include Self-Development of People. United Presbyterians in the United States gave \$2,300,000 to the Hour of Sharing in 1969. The goal established by the General Assembly for 1971 is \$10,000,000.

What is the meaning of the self-development of people? An old Chinese proverb says, "Give a man a fish, and you feed him today. Teach him to fish, and you feed him tomorrow." Help him to build a fishery, and many more can work and eat. This might well be what the self-development of people is about. Presbyterian leader John Coventry Smith says, "Development means economic development, but it is much more than that. It is justice - it is human dignity - it is self-determination - it is material, social, political and spiritual freedom. It is the liberation of a person to be the kind of human being God intended him to be."

# ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING

This special Lenten sacrificial offering will be received in the Church School and at both worship services on Palm Sunday, April 4, 1971.

How will the One Great Hour funds be used? As in the past, monies will be used to aid families and communities around the world who have suffered most from natural disasters and the ravages of war: victims of earthquakes in Peru; victims of the tidal wave in East Pakistan; homeless villagers in South Vietnam; Cuban refugees in Miami, Florida.

But, with the additional funds received for the self-development of people, United Presbyterians will be able to do more than ever before.

In central Vietnam, in Village Sixteen, Vietnam Christian Service will be able to provide the bamboo and roofing materials necessary to build a school and supply a teacher so that the present idle children can be educated and awakened.

In Greenville, Mississippi, the Delta Ministry will be able to provide for further economic self-development among impoverished black Mississippians. Already the Delta Ministry has helped bring into existence a concrete brick factory in Mound Bayou; self-help housing for dispossessed sharecroppers in Freedom Village; a ceremics manufacturing project; a furniture crafts co-op in Edwards; and a 40-acre vegetable farming co-op in Sunflower County. These self-help projects have created new hope and the dignity that comes only as a man is freed from dependence and able to provide for himself.

Self-Development monies will also be distributed locally. Washington City Presbytery has established a Committee on the Self-Development of People which has been charged with identifying and proposing to the National Committee, for validation and inclusion in the Fund for Self-Development of People, the most promising programs and projects in the Washington area. This committee will also distribute funds for approved programs and projects in this area.

At Potomac United Presbyterian Church coin boxes and interpretative materials were distributed to all students in the Sunday Church School. Teachers are calling attention to this expression of the Church's ministry during the Sundays of Lent. Seventeners and Senior Highs received their coin boxes at their meetings in late February. Adult members of the congregation have received special offering envelopes.

Traditionally the Potomac Church has been most generous in its offering to the One Great Hour of Sharing. The Interpretation and Stewardship Committee of Session is confident that our Church's response will be even greater in 1971 than in past years.

# CHURCH DINNER PLANNED BY CONGREGATIONAL LIFE COMMITTEE

# SEXUALITY AND HUMAN COMMUNITY REPORT

In December, 1970, the Session requested the Church Education Committee to develop a plan for study of the 182nd General Assembly Study Report entitled Sexuality and the Human Community. Between this December meeting and the March meeting of Session a sub-committee of the Church Education Committee comprised of Michael Bentzen, Mrs. Robert Garrison (Cheris) and Mr. and Mrs. William Hoge (Marilyn) studied the report, and recommended to the Session that:

- (1) "We commend the report to the Session for thorough reading. We found it well written and provocative. As a sub-committee we were unable to reach agreement on many points, but we found the discussion helpful in developing a clearer understanding of our individual beliefs with respect to the subject. We further found the Scriptural references helpful in understanding the theological background, or lack thereof, for widely held beliefs."
- "Recommend that the Session authorize the Church Education Committee to prepare study opportunities of the report and its subject matter for our Church."
  - "Find no further action necessary or desirable." (3)

The conclusions and recommendations of the committee were received by the Session at its March 8 meeting. Subsequent to this action by the Session the Church Education Committee wishes to announce that copies of the report are available for those individual members of the congregation who wish to study it privately. The copies can be purchased in the Church Office for 75 & each. If the committee receives sufficient evidence of interest for group study, opportunities will be provided to study the report and its subject matter.

The Church's teaching ministry offers a joyful and rewarding challenge, a chance for every Christian to sharpen his own beliefs and understandings and an opportunity to share his faith with others. All teachers begin as novices, but the Church is ready to support each teacher with orientation, in-service training and continuing encouragement of strong team effort.


Bob has served on the Board of Metropolitan Mission of Washington City Presbytery for several years and from this work takes much valuable experience to the Synod level.

# MINUTE FOR MISSION: RURAL MINISTRY IN MAINE

When Americans think of Maine, they usually picture a rocky coastline, sailboats and lobsters - a nice place to go on summer vacation.
But for the people who live there year round, especially poor residents
of small, rural communities, Maine often presents another face. Last
winter more than 12 feet of snow fell - isolating people, shutting them
up indoors, preventing outdoor work. These harsh conditions intensify
the mental and physical health needs of families cut off from normal
social life. To minister to these critical human needs, an ecumenical
rural ministry in southwestern Maine has employed the Reverend Duane
Bazil as pastoral counselor and visitor, working through a telephone
crisis network, prayer groups and a housing program. He also trains
ministers and community leaders in the field of mental health and is
developing a comprehensive mental health plan for an area of 12 townships. National Missions helps support Duane Bazil's specialized
ministry in rural Maine in cooperation with the Mission at the Eastward.
