The congregation will convene for its Annual Meeting in the sanctuary at 8:00 p.m. on Monday, January 21. As is customary and/or required at this meeting, the following items of business will be docketed:

§the election of three members of the congregation to the 1974

Representative Nominating Committee

Sand, because of a vacancy on the Session, the election of one ruling elder to fill an unexpired term of two years

The 1973 Representative Nominating Committee will make the following nominations:

For Ruling Elder - Camille Kendall (Mrs. Clifford)

For Church Auditors - William Skinner, Robert McMahon

For Church Treasurer - Patti Bissell (Mrs. Howard)

Nominations for each of the above may be made from the floor, providing the persons nominated have agreed in advance of the meeting to serve if elected.

In addition to these regular items of congregational business the Session will propose the following amendment to the Church Bylaws:

12. There is to be no less than three (3) elders. The number of elders shall be determined by the congregation at the Special Congregational Meeting held in the month of October for the purpose of electing ruling elders. The term of elder shall be for three (3) consecutive years. One-third of the elders shall be elected in any year. In the event the number of elders shall be increased, the terms of such elders shall be so established as to permit election of one-third of all elders in each year. Commencing with elders elected after September, 1974, no elder shall serve on the Session for more than one (1) term of three (3) consecutive years. Elders elected prior to September, 1974, shall be eligible for election to two (2) consecutive terms,

either full or partial, not to exceed in the aggregate six (6) consecutive years. Any elder ineligible for re-election pursuant to the foregoing shall be again eligible for election after one (1) year from the date on which he or she became ineligible for re-election.

At present the Church Bylaws permit the congregation to elect ruling elders for two consecutive three-year terms or an aggregate of six years. After six years, one year must elapse before a ruling elder may be elected again to the Session.

Finally, and new for the congregation this Annual Meeting, three of the Standing Committees of Session will ask the congregation for its feed-back, support and additional recommendations to the committees' Goals and Objectives for 1974. The Church Education Committee, Congregational Life Committee and Trustees Committee developed their goals and objectives for 1974 at their meetings in October and November. They are included in this issue of Steeple To People for your study and comment at the Annual Meeting. (See pages 4, 5 and 6)





CHANGE IN CHURCH SCHOOL SCHEDULE FOR PALM SUNDAY AND EASTER

On Palm Sunday, April 7, there will be no church school or lay education at the 9:40 hour. The Palm Sunday breakfast and celebration will replace the 9:00 a.m. worship service and the classes usually scheduled for 9:40. During the 11:00 a.m. service there will be church school for grades kindergarten through second grades only.

There will be no church school on Easter Sunday. Instead there will be two identical worship services at 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. for the entire family.

CHURCH AND COMMUNITY COMMITTEE

Recognizing that there is a need among many of our members to involve themselves in local mission, the Session has created the Church and Community Committee to look into areas of social action. The committee has met formally twice this year and has attempted to establish some working goals for itself. The first is to identify those areas in the community where there is a genuine need not being met by other social service agencies and, secondly, to define a limited number of project areas upon which we can concentrate as a church.

The committee constantly receives appeals for help from already established agencies and our only recourse is to pass them on to the congregation via the bulletin board (located in the hall outside the Fellowship Room) or by announcement in the church bulletin. Look for the announcements, and if you feel you can answer any of these appeals, please contact a member of the committee - Ralph Hall, Noel Kroncke, Bob MacMahon, Margaret McIntyre, Nancy Monroe, Nancy Edwards, Tom

Meakem or Joan Chase - just so that we have some idea of what our members are doing individually.

We are looking forward, too, to the last Sunday in April and the first three Sundays in May when the Lay Education Planning Committee has asked us to provide speakers for a series on social issues. Plans are being made with the Montgomery County Commission on Aging, the Montgomery County Community Ministry, the organization called For Love Of Children (FLOC) and a group dedicated to trying to solve the problems of child abuse. Plan to join with us on those Sunday mornings.

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING MAKES A DIFFERENCE.

ONE...because we are one in Christ; GREAT...because He expects much of those who believe; HOUR...because we and Protestants everywhere are participating together; OF SHARING...because we have money, and we love our brothers and sisters who have less.

Each year we participate in the One Great Hour of Sharing to provide the means for United Presbyterians to support the work of the Church in the world. Dollars given in this annual program are used for World Relief, Emergency Service and Self-Development of People.

World Relief: The Child Abandonment Program, pioneered by Vietnam Christian Service, is the only one of its kind in Vietnam.

Emergency Service: At Wounded Knee over 300 persons were forced to leave as a result of the occupation by the American Indian Movement. The National Council of Churches, through Church World Service and the South Dakota Association of Christian Churches, was able to provide assistance.

Self-Development: Black farmers in Alabama were assisted in building homes as part of a housing project. In Salem, New Jersey, a day care center was established for working mothers and to care for retarded children.

In 1973 Potomac United Presbyterians gave \$945.62 to the One Great Hour of Sharing. Funds distributed from the 1972 receipts permitted us to assist with the various floods caused by hurricane Agnes in the Unite States - \$651,368 in Pennsylvania, for example; we gave \$730,591 for Bangladesh relief and \$331,246 to support ministries to U. S. Military personnel. These funds also supported Synod and Presbytery projects here at home in the amount of \$34,370.

Our session has set a goal of \$1,500 for this year's One Great Hour of Sharing. Review your 1973 contribution and consider how you can make a difference in the lives of others. Gifts will be received on Palm Sunday.

SESSION VOTES TO JOIN COMMUNITY MINISTRY: PROGRAM PLANNED FOR MAY 12

The Community Ministry of Montgomery County is an organization of Roman Catholic and Protestant Churches, the Council of Churches of Greater Washington and Church Women United. It is dedicated "...to involving congregations and church people in the public affairs of Montgomery County so that the community in which we live and minister might reflect some of the convictions and truths of our religious traditions."

Organizationally, the Community Ministry is headed by a Community Minister (the Reverend Lincoln Dring), a Council (three commissioners from each member church) and task forces composed of commissioners and volunteers who research issues and take action when such action is needed. Among the issues with which MCCM has been involved are: support of fair employment practices legislation; support of tax and rent relief for the elderly; providing visits and Bible study in nursing homes; studying the problem of child abuse with recommendations for churches; recommending ways to improve the sense of community in the county.

SHIRLEY COLL NAMED ASSOCIATE IN CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

At its meeting on April 8th the Session appointed Shirley Coll to become the Associate in Christian Education of the Potomac United Presbyterian Church effective June 1. Associate in Christian Education is a title the session of a local church may confer upon a man or woman who has completed at least one year of seminary training and who is working in the field of Christian education at the parish level.

Shirley will complete her first year of study at Wesley Theological Seminary in June where she is pursuing the Master's Degree in Religious Education. Earlier this year she was taken under care of the National Capital Union Presbytery as a candidate for the office of Commissioned Church Worker. She has served the Potomac United Presbyterian Church as its Church School Superintendent since June, 1971.

As Associate in Christian Education Shirley will take on additional responsibilities in the planning of the church's ministry of education from the pre-school through the adult levels, provide for teacher training and support, and serve as a consultant to the Church School faculty in curriculum development and interpretation.

Shirley's successor as Church School Superintendent will be announced by the Session later this spring.

Established by the Montgomery County Council in 1967, the commission has as its purpose "to identify and promote better understanding of the problems of the aging and to plan and promote and, where it is found necessary, conduct activities to contribute to their well-being." The commission is composed of some 20 members, with an interest or specialty in housing, health, transportation, employment, income, nutrition, activities and services as they affect this segment of the population. Jean has been a member of the commission since 1970, serving as Employment Chairman. For nine years she has worked as a volunteer for Over 60 Counseling and Employment Service of the Montgomery County Federation of Woman's Clubs, Inc., two of these as chairman of its Board of Governors.
- May 5. Donald W. Delaney, N.D., Associate Director for Fatient Care and Educational Coordination of Children's Hospital, will discuss the topic of child abuse. Dr. Delaney is a professor in the Department of Child Health and Development, George Washington University School of Medicine, and a Fellow in the American Academy of Pediatrics. In addition, he is a member of the Children's Hospital Child Abuse Team. He is the author of an article entitled "The Physically Abused Child," which appeared in the World Medical Journal, and a frequent lecturer on the subject of the battered child. Child abuse is a fast-growing cancer in our society, and Potomac United is fortunate to have an expert in this field to discuss the ressons and results of the problem.

SANCTUARY CHOIR TO PRESENT CANTATAS JUNE 16

On Sunday, June 16, at the 11:00 a.m. worship service, the Sanctuary Choir will sing two sacred concertos (or cantatas) entitled, "Holy Is The Lord, " and "Lord, Thou Knowest All Our Being" by Andreas Hammer-schmidt. Andreas Hammerschmidt (1612-1675) was primarily a composer of sacred music and has been credited as the "most popular church composer of his time in Germany." He served most of his life as organist at St. Peter's Church in Freiberg and at St. John's Church in Zittau.

During the age of early Baroque music, it was the custom for Lutheran church musicians to compose a cycle of cantatas to coincide with the liturgical year and other festive occasions. The two cantatas to be sun g by the Sanctuary Choir were extracted from Hammerschmidt's liturgical cycle, "Musicalische Gesprache uber die Evangelia," which was published in 1655-56. Generally, texts for these compositions were taken from the appropriate Gospel for the day.

The cantata, "Holy Is The Lord," is designated for use on Trinity Sunday but may be used on other suitable occasions. The traditional Sanctus (Isaiah 6:3), which is the optional antiphon for Trinity and the Doxology from Luther's chorale text of Psalm 67 serve as the text for this cantata.

"Lord, Thou Knowest All Our Being," is intended to be sung on Pentecost. Only the first verse for the Gospel of the day is used (John 14:23), but it is combined with another closely related verse (John 21: 17) and two psalm verses (Psalm 143:10, 19:12). The two verses from John are sung in dialogue style and suggest a conversation between Christ (the bass voice) and His disciples (the four upper voices). The instruments and voices then unite in a concluding Doxology and Alleluia.

Most of Hammerschmidt's compositions conform to the popular concertato style (contrasting sections) of this musical era, a technique with strong Italian influence. However, Hammerschmidt retains the distinct German character in his music. Historically, Hammerschmidt's cantatas are caught between the development of the motit and the cantata, and his works serve as "one of the significant building stones in the history of the Gospel cantata."

The performance of these cantatas will mark the final Sunday for the Sanctuary Choir before summer vacation begins. The following choir members will participate in this service of worship:



The first half of the year includes a study of the great events of the Passover, the exodus, and the giving of the law in all of which Moses is a central figure. 5th and 6th grade - The overall objective of the Christian Faith and Action design for grades 5-6 is to help the pupils in a two-year course of study achieve a broad understanding of Biblical history. This year the course of study focuses on the Old Testament and consists of a chronological survey of the major events of Old Testament history with a special emphasis upon its linkage with the New Testament. 

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LAY EDUCATION

All members of the church are invited to participate in the Lay Education program each Sunday morning, 9:45 to 10:45 in the Fellowship Room. Programs scheduled for the next two months include:

October 27 - "Paul and Women's Lib" Discussion, led by Robin Scroggs, Professor of New Testament at Chicago Theological Seminary (not in person, but on tapes!). Paul thought better of women than you might have imagined.

November 3 - "1974 General Assembly" Larry Levdahl, one of the three Commissioners from this Presbytery who attended the 1974 General Assembly, will lead the discussion. December - Advent. There will be no Lay Education in December; these Sundays, the Sundays of Advent, will be celebrated as family occasions at the usual hour of Lay Education. NEWS FROM SESSION

The Session is concerned about keeping the congregation fully informed about the various actions involved in the termination of our pastoral relationship with the Rev. Richard Blice, in maintaining the ongoing programs and ministry of our church and in obtaining a new pastor for our church. A brief summary of such actions follows:

- (1) At a Session meeting on September 16, 1974, the Session voted at the request of Richard Blice to hold a congregational meeting on September 29 for the purpose of acting on his request to terminate our pastoral relationship so that he could accept a call to another church.
- (2) At a Session meeting on September 23, moderated by the Rev. Edward White of Presbytery and attended by Jim Ficklen of Presbytery, the procedures to be followed when a pastor resigns were discussed in detail. The interim pastoral needs of our church were defined as including preaching, pastoral calling and teaching the Seventens and the Confirmation Class. The Session is responsible for filling these needs.
- (3) At a congregation meeting on September 29 the congregation voted with deepest regret to join with the Rev. Richard Blice in requesting the National Capital Union Presbytery to dissolve our pastoral relationship.
- (4) At a special meeting of the Session with the Rev. Edward White on October 3, 1974, the Rev. Richard Hutcheson was determined to be a very well qualified minister and was engaged as a guest minister for the church for a number of worship services starting October 27. The needs and means for reconciling and strengthening the membership of our church were discussed at length at this meeting.
- (5) At a Session meeting on October 14 the Session voted to approve the appointment of the Rev. Gale Dunham as teacher for the Seventens and Confirmation Class.
- (6) At the conclusion of the worship service on October 20 the Rev. Richard Blice declared our pulpit officially vacant.
- (7) At an annual congregation meeting on October 21 four ruling elders were elected, one for a second term (see page 5), and a presentation was made by the Stewardship Committee concerning our church's program for next year and the challenge it poses for all members of our congregation.
- (8) Future actions will include the naming by Presbytery of an interim Moderator for the Session (see page 1); selection of an interim pastor by the Session; definition of our church's mission, goals and objectives by the Session with the help of the congregation; holding of a separate congregation meeting to elect a pulpit nominating committee; selection of a candidate pastor by this committee, using the Session's goals and objectives for our church as a guideline; and finally a sermon to be preached by this candidate to the congregation, followed by a congregational meeting to decide whether to ask Presbytery to permit a pastoral relationship to be established.

The Session is most eager to work with the congregation so that this interim period without a permanent pastor can actually be a time

of honest evaluation and of spiritual renewal and dedication to the strengthening of our church's ministry. Please do not hesitate to contact any Session member about any question you may have or any help you may need:

Bill came to the Potomac area two years ago from Princeton, New Jersey. He is currently church school superintendent and a member of the Christian Education Committee and has been a participant on the



CHURCH AND COMMUNITY NOTES

At its monthly meeting on November 7 the Community Ministry of Montgomery County (of which our church became a member last May) devoted most of its discussion to the problem of world hunger. There was great concern expressed because of frustration in trying to bring food to those There are people in developing countries who are actually starving. programs for sending food abroad - but not enough - and somehow the food never seems to reach its destination. How does the Community Ministry, as a local church organization, register its concern and help effect a reasonable policy? Is exerting pressure on Congressmen and Senators the answer? Should the churches sponsor and send missionary technical advisors abroad? Is the answer in insisting that more money be spent on research in adapting our own grain and food seeds to foreign climates? The discussion raised more questions than it answered, and a group of four was appointed to learn the alternatives open to us so that Community Ministry could become a gadfly in promoting those alternatives which seemed most reasonable.

The questions which Community Ministry tackles are not always of such global or philosophical magnitude. It is flushed at its success in this last election in helping to defeat the proposed charter amendment to bring all bond issues in the county to referendum. Community Ministry studied the issue extensively, drafted a position paper (which was posted on our church bulletin board all last month), sponsored a debate on the issue so that all sides could be heard, voted to oppose the amendment and then went to work to defeat it.

The key word in Community Ministry is "issue." It is not a political organization but supports the idea that Christians must work for fairness for all mankind - aged, children, black and white - from local, national and international government. Task forces on child abuse, the aged, criminal justice and youth have been formed and are working. If you would be interested in joining with friends from neighbor churches in the county on the resolution of some of these problems, please contact any member of the Church and Community Committee - Joan Chase, Ralph Hall, Noel Kroncke, Margaret McIntyre or Nancy Edwards. Better still, watch the debate in action and then decide to join a task force. It's not quite like Congress - the discussion is too earnest - but at 8:00 p.m. on the first Thursday of every month, the Council of Community Ministry convenes at Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church and welcomes observers and visitors.

CHURCH SCHOOL HAPPENINGS

Kindergarten. The Kindergarten had an interesting fall learning about God's work as Creator and how He created a world of law and order. The class planted bulbs and collected leaves and other engaged in other activities relating to God's work as Creator. We will soon celebrate the birth of Jesus and continue to learn about Christ not only as a boy but as a man.

lst and 2nd grade. The first-and second-grade class began the fall term with a simple introductory unit on the Bible. The following four units will be stories from the Old Testament. The first of these was on the life of Abraham and has just been completed. A few of the special activities have included making Bible book markers, headdresses representative of the times, and an outdoor picnic with food similar to that eaten during that period. An open house for the parents was held on November 10. Mrs. Ann Hazard has given generously of her time in providing music for the class. The children have enjoyed learning a number of songs under her direction.

3rd and 4th grade. After receiving their Bibles, the 3rd graders learned how to use them with the help of their 4th-grade "buddies." The class then began their study of modern and ancient Egypt in preparation for the story of Moses. At present the children are "struggling" with Moses as he leads his people out of bondage. Included in the studies have been Hieroglyphics, map and workbook exercises, Slave Day and a tape-recorded play of Moses as a baby and young man.

5th and 6th grade. The fifth- and sixth-grade class started the year with an introduction to the principal ingredients of Biblical history. The concept of covenant was presented leading up to a fairly detailed discussion of the Exodus events, the role of Moses and the meaning of the Ten Commandments. The class was fortunate in having the services of several guest teachers, including Flo Johnston, Dave Smith, the Rev. Luther Tucker, and, giving a vivid explanation of the passover supper, Mrs. Ginger Silvers. Carolyn Meakem will teach the final session of this unit.

SEVENTENS. The Seventens program is strongly underway with about 35 to 40 attending each Thursday afternoon. Rev. Gale Dunham has joined our staff and is assisting with the teaching of the seventh and eighth grades. Our year of study centers on the Old Testament for this group and on questions of personal identity for 9th graders. We welcome all junior high youth to the program.

SENIOR HIGHS. For the past two months the Senior Highs have been discussing the controversial topic of amnesty in their meetings. They have had several speakers come in and discuss the subject with them, ranging from a man who is involved in getting total amnesty for draft evaders to a man from Prosecutor Jaworski's staff who discussed the pardon of Richard Nixon (which is another form of amnesty). Jackie DeLatt has been leading all of the meetings on amnesty and is responsible for getting the speakers. The Senior Highs have benefited from each meeting and seemed interested in what each speaker had to say. The discussions have helped them considerably in understanding the topic of amnesty and all of the things connected with the subject.



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GREETLIGS FROM DR. RICHARD G. HUTCHESON, JR.

Advent is a happy time to begin a pastoral relationship - even an interim one. Not only is it the beginning of the Christian year; it is a season of such beauty and such joyful celebration in the church that things almost have to get off to a good start! I want to express my appreciation to the congregation for the warmth of your welcome and for the gracious way you have assisted me in getting started.

I invite your comments and suggestions, and I anticipate a relationship of mutual upbuilding as we look forward and plan for the church's future. 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ON CLOOSING A NEW PASTOR

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CONTRACT DISCUSSION GROUP TO MEET JAMBARY O

In order to conclude its discussion of Confusion and Hope; Clergy, Laity and the Church in Transition, the Contract Group will meet at the home of Bob Fredlund, 12313 Espalier Place, on Wednesday, January 8, at 8:00 p.m. The book is a response to three contemporary crises in American Christianity: those involving the clergy, the laity and the parish. Stripped of their historical authority by the prevalent and anti-authoritarian cynicism which characterizes much of American society today, clergy are experiencing a crisis of identity, role and function. Simultaneously, laity within the churches are increasingly perplexed about what it means to be a Christian in an ever-more formless culture. And as the more traditional functions of the parish are fulfilled by secular institutions and associations, the parish has been tossed into a quandary over its purpose.
