#### ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING REVEALS CHURCH MEMBERSHIP INCREASE

The 1976 annual congregational meeting was held at the church at 8:00 p.m. on January 19. Dessert and coffee were served before the meeting with Marion Hutchison acting as hostess.

Thirty-one members were present together with the Rev. James Macdonnel as Moderator and the Rev. David Uhl, our Pastor-Elect. It was reported that church membership increased from 327 to 349 during the year, with two baptisms and two weddings.

#### YOUR ANNUAL STATEMENT ENCLOSED

During 1975 there were 99 pledges (including youth) made by the congregation. An analysis of the actual giving versus pledges indicates that 62% of all pledges were met (within \$50), 12% were exceeded by more than \$50, and 26% were short by more than \$50.



### WORSHIP IN THE SPIRIT OF '76 ON MARCH 28

In celebration of America's Bicentennial Year, the Congregational Life Committee has researched and developed a worship service in the spirit of '76 to be held at the regular 11:00 hour on March 28, 1976. Dr. Uhl's sermon will be a portion of John witherspoon's "The Dominion of Providence over the Passions of Men" delivered on May 17, 1776, in Philadelphia as a fast day sermon. Witherspoon served as president of the College of new Jersey (now Princeton) and was the only

minister to sign the Declaration of Independence.

The Lord's Supper will be served that Sunday. Near the end of the service, in connection with the Bicentennial, an American flag and a Christian flag will be presented to the church. The Fellowship Hour at noon will feature home-baked breads and hot spiced cider.

It is the committee's hope that many of you will participate with

us on that very special morning.



#### A LENTEN SUGGESTION FROM DR. UHL

Lent is traditionally the time in the life of the church when we reflect on the culmination of the ministry of our Lord - his death and resurrection. It has been a period of denial and penitence for the Christian church. Indeed, the sacrifice of our Lord ought to be an example for us to live our lives in a similar kind of sacrifice.

In years past, people often gave up something for Lent. This practice was intended to show our obedience to Christ and our own self-denial patterned after his example. Often the practice has become a mockery of what was intended because we give up things which aren't important to us anyway. So, I have a suggestion for each of us this Lenten season - instead of giving up something let us try to give a little extra. This could be in our families, our employment, our church - wherever we are during this Lenten season.

The spirit of Christ is the spirit of giving, not merely denial. Let each of us, therefore, give the best we have - OURSELVES - to our Lord and each other this year. -Dr. David L. Uhl







OUR APPRECIATION, OUR THANKS, AND OUR EXPECTATIONS
-A Report from the Stewardship and Finance Committee

The Stewardship and Finance Committee is pleased to report a very healthy on-going campaign. Our thanks to all those who have pledged and indicated their support. We are most appreciative of this commitment. To date we have received 89 adult pledges and 15 youth pledges for a grand total of  $\phi58,773$ . Clearly this is a much needed improvement over prior years. However, we still have a substantial way to go in order to achieve the \$80,100 pledging goal set for next year's budget. As of now, we can pretty well anticipate, from the pledges still outstanding from those whom we are reasonably certain will continue and increase their commitment, to achieve a total of approximately \$\phi68,500\$, Jeaving us with a short fall of \$\phi12,000\$. This short fall we will need to overcome in several ways.

Certainly, we will be adding new members. Hopefully, current members will find it possible in some cases to give more than originally planned. And lastly, we might anticipate special gifts or other sources

of funding.

Considering where we are to date, we believe we should move ahead

with our budget commitments as planned.

As for '76, our current giving has dramatically reduced our previously estimated deficit from approximately \$\pi 23,000\$ to what now looks to be around \$\pi 6000\$ or \$\pi 7000\$. This is still a great deal of money and we suggest those who can, implement their new 1977 increased pledging now. It will be a tremendous help.

As a final note, those who have tax concerns or other means and reasons for giving at Christmas, we ask you to remember your church.
