REPORT ON THE ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

The annual Congregational Meeting was held at the church after the 11:00 worship service on January 15. The Session reports told of a gain in membership in 1977 from 379 to 428, of an active and expanding Christian Education program, of a sharp increase in mission giving to \$8500, and of a nearly balanced budget in 1977 with a small deficit in the General Fund. The budget for 1978 with an estimated \$100,000 in General Fund receipts is projected to make up this carryover deficit.

Bill Brill was elected to serve one year as the Church Treasurer and Patti Bissell and Bob McMahon to serve one year as Church Auditors. Pat King, Bill Hutchison and Dan Malone were elected from the congregation to serve on the 1978 Representative Nominating Committee. (Elders Jon Hawley, Chairman, and Ann Hazard were later appointed from the Session to serve on this committee).

In a very significant action, the congregation voted to establish a Board of Deacons with twelve members to serve three years each and to be responsible for calling on old and new members and for the twelve church parish groups. The Nominating Committee is preparing to select nominees for the Board of Deacons for presentation at a future Congregational Meeting for the election of the Deacons.

In summary, 1977 was a great year for PPC and 1978 will be an even greater one through the support and dedication of all of us.

HERE'S RACHEL HARWELL'S MUCH-SOUGHT-AFTER DANISH PUFF RECIPE (served at the December 10 church decorating "party")

Base: 1 cup sifted flour, ½ cup soft butter or margarine, 2 T cold water. Cut the butter into the flour as for pie crust. Sprinkle with cold water and mix with a fork. With floured fingers press this

dough into a 15"x 5" rectangle on a cookie sheet.

Puff batter: ½ cup butter or margarine, 1 cup water, 1 t almond extract, 1 cup sifter flour, 3 eggs. Bring water and butter to a boil in a medium saucepan. Add all and extract. Remove from heat. Stir in flour immediately (all at one time). Add eggs one at a time beating well after each addition. Beat until smooth; then spread batter over the dough. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven for 60 minutes.

Frosting: 1 t almond extract, 1 cup sifted 10x sugar, 3 T soft butter or margarine, cream (as needed). Mix sugar and butter until moderately blended. Add small amounts of cream until medium thick texture (spreadable with a spatula). Beat with wooden spoon or wire whip until smooth. Spread over baked puff immediately after removing it from the oven.

Optional: Toast ½ cup almond slivers on a baking sheet in a 350 degree oven until golden in color. Sprinkle over puff after frosting

while the frosting is still warm and soft. Enjoy!

CREPES. Use crepe pan, NOT electric crepe maker: 1½c whole milk, 3 eggs + 2 egg yolks, 1c sifted cake flour, 3/4 t salt, 2T melted butter (clarified 45 min. on stove top is better). In blender, put milk, eggs, flour, salt & butter. 3-5 sec. high speed. Stir. Then 2 sec. high speed. Refrigerate mixture at least 2 hrs. Return to blender 1-2 sec. high speed. Season crepe pan with butter; pan must be very hot. Using 4c batter per crepe, pour into pan & back out again. Immediately begin loosening crepe with spatula. Cooking takes only a few seconds. Turn out onto plate. Makes about 30. Crepes freeze well; stack with waxed paper between & wrap in foil. Can be made day ahead & kept in frig for next day's use.

CHEESE SAUCE. 3T butter, 3T cake flour, 1½c hot milk, ½c grated swiss

cheese, ½t salt. Put flour, ½c milk, butter, salt in blender. 2 sec. on high speed; add remaining milk; 5 sec. on high speed. Heat on medium in saucepan until thickens, 3-5 min., stirring constantly. Kemove from heat & add cheese. (Adding 2T whipping cream or 1 egg yolk gives sauce a glaze). Cover sauce with Saran; makes 2 cups.

SPINACH FILLING. 1T shallots, 2T butter, 1 pkg. frozen chopped spinach. Cook spinach & drain well. Put butter & shallots in pan; cook to soften. Add salt. Stir. Add spinach. Cook until moisture evaporates, 2-5 min. Add 1c cheese sauce. Stir. Remove from heat.

CHEESE/MUSHROOM FILLING. Ic ricotta cheese, less yolk, at salt, it shallots, 2T butter, a sliced fresh mushrooms. Put cheese in bowl, add egg & salt-mix. In skillet, melt butter & cook shallots to soften-add mushrooms & cook until soft. Add this to cheese mixture.

CREPE CASSEROLE. In round baking dish, greased with butter, put l

crepe on bottom. Add thin layer mushroom/cheese filling & spread. Add another crepe. Add 4-5T spinach filling. Add another crepe. Alternate



APRIL 16 CONGREGATIONAL MEETING SCHEDULED TO ELECT DEACONS

Celia Sullivan will be looking for your white elephants after you spring clean the basement, garage, attic and all those closets. Bring them to the church June 8 or the weekend before.


We need aluminum pie pans for our world famous strawberry pies. Please save yours and bring them to the church anytime. They may be left in the office marked "Festival".


CHRISTIAN FAMILY WEEK

CHOIR CANTATA TO BE PRESENTED JUNE 11

On Sunday, June 11, the Sanctuary Choir will present the cantata "Aperite Mihi Portas Justiae" by Dietrich Buxtehude ("Open To Me The Gates of Justice") at the 11:00 worship service. Buxtehude was organist at the St. Marienkirche in Lubeck, Germany, from 1688 to 1707, and was famed for his Abendmusik series. These were evening services at which special organ and choral music was featured. Buxtehude's many cantatas vary greatly in the vocal and instrumental forces used; the one our choir will sing is an excellent example of music written by a great composer for a choir of limited size. The original score calls for a chorus of altos, tenors and basses; we are using a modern edition which raises the pitch to make the work singable by sopranos, altos and baritones.



HAND BELL CHOIR FORMING AT PPC

Those of you who have read Dorothy Sayers' The Nine Tailors are familiar with English change-ringing, in which tower bells are rung according to various mathematical combinations. This ancient art has been practiced since the days of Gothic cathedrals, and since that time ringers have combatted the problem of how to practice without disturbing the neighbors by using handbells. The first handbell choir in this country was formed in Boston in the twenties, and in the last twenty years, several thousand choirs have been formed. It is my happy job to tell you that PPC's starter set of 25 Malmark handbells is on its way, purchased with funds given in memory of members and friends of the church, and now what we need is people to ring them! A choir will consist of about eight ringers, and having been a ringer myself, I can guarantee you that you will be in for a real musical treat and a learning experience. Who can join? 
VACATION TIME

HOUSE OF WORSHIP

Call it what you will ... a church, a chapel, a temple. a hall, a shrine.
Call it none of these or all of these.
Call it what you will, but remember this.

Its name does not make it a house of worship.

Priestly robes do not make it a house of worship.

A choir does not make it a house of worship. Prayers do not make it a house of worship.

Fear does not make it a house of worship.

Tradition does not make it a house of worship.

Only YOU can make it a house of worship ... You -- and I.

The other places we go during our lives, the other things that we do, are visited and done because we seek friendship, or excitement, or fun, or profit or change.

A house of worship is where we go to seek ourselves and God.

It is a place where we may seek peace if we are too disturbed ... or perhaps to be disturbed if we are too complacent.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: SHARED APPROACHES - A NEW CURRICULUM CONCEPT

Beginning in September, a new and challenging curriculum will be in use for the first time. Christian Faith in Action curriculum will no longer be in publication, therefore a CE:SA Study Committee was formed over a year ago to begin the task of evaluating four Approaches: Knowing the Word, Interpreting the Word, Living the Word, Doing the Word.

Areas concentrated on in reviewing each of the four choices were:

1) Theology: use of the Bible, content areas (other than Bible),
relationships to life circumstances

- 2) Education: emphasis on facts, feelings and attitudes, major teaching/learning methods used
- 3) Appearance and Format: attractive and unattractive features (to teachers), attractive and unattractive features tive features (to students)
- 4) Leadership: kinds of training and support required, time and organization for teacher preparation of lessons

The CE:SA Study Committee concluded Living the Word and Interpreting the Word as those approaches which would best challenge the congregation's learning ability while serving as a means for sharing the gospel. Living the Word is an Approach for a congregation that sees education as the task for the whole congregation. It aims to relate the Christian heritage to pertinent life concerns.

Interpreting the Word is an Approach for a diverse congregation in terms of: 1) Those who identify themselves as the people of God and

wish to trace their Biblical heritage as that people, 2) Those who seek to discover the authority of the Scriptures in their lives and in the life of the Christian community, 3) Those desiring a disciplined critical study of the Bible and its structure.

The Committee presented recommendations for adopting those Approaches to the Session last April. A unanimous approval carried, directing the implementation of all phases of the two Approaches be-

ginning Sunday, September 10, 1978.

The projected Approaches and their related age/grade categories

which will be used starting that Sunday are as follows:

Pre-kindergarten (ages 3-4), ninth grade through adult - Living the Word

K through 8th grade - Interpreting the Word

September, then, becomes the threshold of a teaching and learning venture for all members of the congregation. Let's be caught up in this challenging experience and involve ourselves to the fullest as we seek to broaden and enrich our educational horizons.



The Lord's Supper will be observed on Sanday, October 1, world wide Communion Sunday. Lay Education will be in that morning at 9:40.

The Session has authorized the calling of a Congregational meeting for Sunday, October 1 after worship to elect one member to serve on the 1978 Nominating Committee. A second Congregational Meeting has been authorized for Sunday, October 22 after worship for the Election of Elders.

In May of 1978, the Montgomery County Board of Education adopted a reso lution deploring a series of racial incidents in the county schools and calling on church and community groups to work with them to the end that (1) A positive learning environment does, in fact, exist at each school and in each classroom, free of verbal, physical and psychological abuse and (2) All relationships will be based on respect for each individual.

In response to the resolution, the Montgomery County Community Ministry drafted a paper for consideration by member churches. In that paper the churches of Community Ministry were asked to affirm that "we are a people with a story of good news for the world and a vision of what life can be ... This gives rise to our vision of a community where the dividing walls of cultural and racial arrogance have been torn down, where all cultures and races are treated with equal dignity and mutual respect".

Community Ministry also asked the governing bodies of local congregations to affirm the following action items:

- 1) Make clear by action of the official board and public notice that there are no racial, cultural, or economic barriers to church membership;
- 2) Seek ways and means to relate to congregations of different racial, cultural or economic make-up: pulpit exchanges, joint worship, picnics, vacation church school, ministerial associations, sports leagues, etc.;
- 3) Sponsor interracial, cross-cultural exchanges among youth groups and adult groups;
- 4) Seek a multi-racial staff and membership for every congregation;
- 5) Use the education program of the church to affirm all cultural and racial heritages and contributions;

- 6) Check church library materials to assure just treatment of minorities;
- 7) Speak out firmly against injustice you perceive in your community;
- 8) Support your local schools and school personnel in your congregation. The church has a special responsibility and opportunity to celebrate and encourage those good efforts people in the congregation and the community are making for racial justice and understanding:
- 9) Continually examine ourselves, church membership, school staff, BOE candidates regarding attitudes toward racial justice and equality.

On Monday, September 18, the Session, on a recommendation from its Church and Community/Mission Interpretation Committee, adopted the actions and instructed that the policy be placed in <u>Steeple to People</u>. Let us pray that indivually as Christians and collectively as churches we assume our role in this matter.

The 7-10's program has gotten off to a great start with lots of familiar smiling faces along with some happy new ones. Each of us is excited about the prospects for the new year so we hope that all seventh, eighth, and ninth graders will join us. Friends are welcome, too. There is fellowship and fun for everyone!

Retreat for 7-10's will be held October 6-8 at Camp Glenkirk. Registration blanks are in the narthex and Mrs. Cathey's office. Forms must be turned in by October 1. All youth planning to attend must be present at the October 5 meeting (or check with Mrs. Cathey if unable to attend). Cost for the weekend is \$26.00.

Super Senior Sunday was a roaring success! What a ball game it was! Every player on each team may have their options picked up by the Bad News Bears! 

Here is Rachel Harwell's recipe for the hot crab spread you enjoyed so much at Septemberfest: 6 oz. crab, 8 oz. cream cheese, 1 T milk, 2 t Worcestershire, 2 t green onion, chopped. Let cream cheese reach room temperature. Add milk and worcestershire sauce and blend until smooth.

Fold in chopped onion. Stir crab into cream cheese mixture and turn into a small oven-proof pottery dish (about the size of a soup bowl) that has been sprayed with Pam or buttered. Bake at 350 for 15-20 minutes. Then turn oven up to broil and brown lightly. Serve with Triscuits or coarsely textured crackers.


