The sanctuary was totally lighted by candles as ours was on Christmas Eve. The choir sang an appropriate cantata, the minister delivered a meditation and we celebrated communion. Then the minister walked from the chancel to the front of the church where a sealed box sat on a table. He removed the seals, reached into the box and began taking envelopes from it. On each of the envelopes was a name which he called out. The person whose name was called came forward and took the envelope and then another name was called and another until the box was empty.

In the envelope was a sheet of paper on which the previous New Year's Eve we had written some things we would like to work on that year. Some of these were personal, some dealt with our faith and some with our families. Each year as I opened my envelope I was amazed to see what I had promised that previous year - some I had kept and some had been forgotten.

They were, however, reminders of promises I had made to God and myself and they caused me to think about what those meant. A few minutes later as I wrote my promises to be placed in an envelope and sealed until the next New Year's Eve, I did so with much more insight and thought.

I wonder if there are some promises each of us need to make to God and ourselves for this coming year?





3 c. chopped onions

2 x 9 pastry shell



All are parts of the ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING recipients in the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. Since Potomac Presbyterian Church is a Union Presbytery belonging to UPCUSA and PCUS, our \$\pi^2,000\$ goal receipts will be divided according to the presbytery practice between the two churches.

WRERS received nearly  $\varphi 2$  million in 1977 from OGHS. with special disaster relief of  $\varphi 315,000$ , our church gave  $\varphi 2.3$  million support to victims of earthquake, tornado, flood, drought, civil strife, famine

and blizzards across the world and the US.

SDP received slightly over  $\varphi 2$  million in 1977.  $\varphi 840,000$  came back to presbytery and synod projects;  $\varphi 443,000$  went to projects funded by our USA National Committee and  $\varphi 302,000$  went to projects funded overseas; the remainder was used in a variety of administrative and support expenses.

HP received  $\phi$ 1.9 million from OGHS, plus another  $\phi$ 0.5 million from Year-Round Giving. In the USA,  $\phi$ 225,000 went for direct food relief,  $\phi$ 457,000 was spent on development assistance and  $\phi$ 461,000 was spent on leadership training, agribusiness responsibility, food policy issues and conferences. Overseas we spent  $\phi$ 400,000 for direct food

relief and ol for development assistance.



# SPECIAL SUNDAY - APRIL 29 - THE REVEREND DR. DAVID STEEL TO PREACH

This coming Sunday the membership and friends of Potomac Presbyterian Church will have the unique privilege of hearing the Reverend Dr. David Steel. Dr. Steel is one of Scotland's preeminent preachers.

Before his retirement, Dr. Steel served St. Michael's, Linlithgow seventeen miles from Edinburgh. St. Michael's, Scotland's largest and most beautiful medieval church, was dedicated in 1242 and completed in 1540. It has a membership of 1400. Dr. Steel served St. Michael's for eighteen years. Before that he was in charge of the mission work in East Africa for eight years. During that time, he built the great St. Andrew's Church, Nairobi, Kenya.

In 1974/75 Dr. Steel was the Moderator of the Church of scotland and has been awarded honorary doctoral degrees from the Universities

of Aberdeen and Dundee.

Dr. Steel has been visiting America for the last twenty-five years as a preacher and lecturer and most recently has just completed a term as guest professor at Columbia Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Georgia.

It is my hope that each of you will be present to experience this extraordinary opportunity.

The Thorntons have now become accustomed to using their garage as a way station for furniture destined for newly arriving refugee

BEST OF ALL, through the efforts of George Boddiger, Hung and his 19-year-old brother Xuan have started work for the Richard Donohoe Construction Company - well paying jobs with a great future. Hopefully, their performance there will lead to more job openings for other refugees. Both of them are also going to school four nights a week - three hours per session! Things have happened fast for our intrepid Boat People! We are proud of them - and thankful for the outpouring of clothing, furniture and support that is the foundation of this Godgiven opportunity. What comes next? Well, more jobs are needed. The Thorntons are a link to a large number of refugees who are ready, willing and eager to go to work. One man has owned a grocery store - another has auto mechanic skills and wants to pursue that line of work-another is a carpenter. Any ideas???

Our Mission Interpretation Committee has decided to mark mothers Day-May 13th - in a special way. They are inviting interested members of the congregation to participate in a "shower" for Diep's new baby. A table will be set up in the Fellowship Hall that day to receive wrapped gifts during the social hour following the worship service. A zero to 24-month age span is suggested.

Your Session has authorized participation by our church in the Major Mission Fund, a joint project of the United Presbyterian Church and the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. to provide much needed support for the mission efforts of the church. This drive is to raise  $\phi 60^{\circ}$ million over a three-year period for urgently needed mission support in five principal areas:

Our ministries through congregations

Our ministries through evangelism

Our ministries through education

Our ministries with people of special need

Our ministries with people who serve

Rising costs, demands on resources, andinflation everywhere in the world have caused the need for this extra effort to sustain and expand mission in our presbytery, in our synods, in our country, and throughout the world. Thirty percent of the proposed expenditures will go to programs in our local presbytery, five percent each to our synods, and thirty percent each to our general assemblies.

During the months of May and June, 1979, explanations of the major Mission Fund program will be given at PPC through the Sunday Minute for Missions, and in Steeple to People.

Your participation in this program can be a way of showing your special mission concern with recognition for all of the many areas wherehelp is needed.



## THE NESTLE INFANT FORMULA ISSUE

At its meeting of May 21, 1979, the Session voted to inform the congregation of the action of our Presbytery concerning the Nestle

infant formula controversy.

At the stated meeting on May 15, 1979, the National Capital Union Presbytery voted to endorse the boycott of the Nestle Company. was done after presentations by Elder Patricia Young, former Moderator of the Synod of the Trinity, favoring the boycott and Mr. David E. Guerrant, Division of Corporate Responsibility of the Nestle Company, presenting the company position. These presentations were followed by a period of questions and answers and extended debate. At the conclusion of the process the Presbytery voted overwhelmingly to endorse the boycott.

The Session wishes you to have the material given at Presbytery for your information. Other materials representing both sides of this issue will be available at the church office. Should you have additional questions, Dr. James Harwell and Dr. Uhl, our delegates to

that meeting, will be glad to answer them.

The following is the material presented at Presbytery:

BACKGROUND ON THE NESTLE BOYCOTT. In the late sixties, with the decline in birth-rates among developed nations, the baby food industry turned to the Third World. With heavy mass media campaigns, promotional gifts to health officials and doctors, free samples for all maternity wards; they introduced powdered formula and bottle feeding

into these underdeveloped countries.

And now from Haiti to Venezuela, from Nigeria to the Philippines, a new disease has appeared: "bottle death." This is a problem which is directly related to the use of infant formula in developing nations. The mothers are often illiterate and cannot read the instructions; the water is contaminated, the family budget too poor to buy enough for-Thus, the baby is fed a diluted solution of river water and formula in an unsterilized bottle. The companies like Nestle claim that it is not their fault if the mothers misuse the product. All they do is sell it.

But it is the way they sell it that we find objectionable. employees dressed in nurses uniforms, they sell it from door to door, over the media airwaves, and even through "health baby" contests (the winner gets a free supply). Companies like Abbott and Bristol Meyers have ceased mass media promotion in response to protests - but Nestle

has not.

Many concerned groups are now calling on Nestle, the largest seller of infant formula in the Third World, to change its policies. Groups like the National Council of Churches, the Presbyterian Church U.S., and the International Pediatrics Association are calling for Nestle to: 1) stop the direct promotion of these products to consumers, 2) stop the use of "milk nurse" sales personnel, and 3) stop the giving of free samples in maternity wards.

Nestle is a Swiss-based company beyond the reach of most U.S. stock-holders. Thus we are asking people to boycott Nestle products until

they change their present sales tactics in the Third world.

This is the Year of the Child. Won't you show your concern for these children, and for the King who said his Kingdom was for those, "who become like little children" - boycott Nestle. Write Nestle. -The NCUP Hunger Committee

RESOLUTION. WHEREAS responsible medical research has demonstrated that illness, brain damage, malnutrition, and death among infants have resulted from the use of infant formula in areas of the world that lack pure water, adequate refrigeration, and the means for the sterilization of bottles; and

WHEREAS some US manufacturers of infant formula have modified their promotion and marketing practices in the developing nations as a result of shareholder actions and other expressions of concern by religious and other groups; and

WHEREAS Nestle, an international corporation based in Switzerland, controls over half of the world's infant formula market but is immune from shareholder action by concerned groups in this country because its stock is not available in this country; and

WHEREAS direct appeals to Nestle to change its sales promotion of infant formula in developing nations have, for the most part, been futile; and

WHEREAS numerous religious and other groups are participating in a boycott against Nestle, its products, its subsidiaries and their products and services, as a means of protesting the corporation's attempts

to shift mothers in the developing world from breast-feeding to the use of the corporation's infant formula; and

THEREFORE, National Capital Union Presbytery endorses the boycott of Westle Products as a means of expressing concern for the health of infants everywhere. We call on the Mestle Company to cease promoting its infant formula in areas where poverty, illiteracy, and lack of sanitation make its use damaging to infants; and that this resolution be forwarded to the 191st General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America for its consideration.

# REPORT FROM PRESBYTERY ON THE NUCLEAR POWER ENERGY SITUATION

At its march 20, 1979 meeting (prior to the Three mile Island incident), Mational Capital Union Presbytery discussed the question of nuclear power. The issue was presented by experts both pro and con. After a resolution in opposition to the development of nuclear power was defeated, the following resolution was adopted:

Now, therefore, the National Capital Union Presbytery resolves that:

- (1) The oderator appoint a task force, from the members of the constitutent churches of the Presbytery, to study the energy issue in depth, and to report back to Presbytery in one year its findings and recommendations. The task force shall consist of laity and ministers concerned with the moral and ethical factors together with concerned engineers and scientists knowledgeable of the technical factors.
- (2) All member churches initiate conservation practices in their own areas.
  - (3) The states of Maryland, Virginia, and the District of Columbia be called on to:
    - (a) Support and encourage efforts to develop and expand rational mass transit systems as a means to disciplined use of energy.
    - (b) support and enforce the 55 mph speed limit for all vehicles in all jurisdictions as a means to the conservation of both energy and human life.
    - (c) Support and share in efforts to solve the political issues which have delayed development of coherent and equitable energy policies and programs.
- Item (2) is an area in which each of us can be involved. If you were present Sunday, may 27, you heard an announcement by Elder Bill Skinner offering a booklet available to the families in the church to help up be conservation conscious in our own homes. If you did not pick one up that Sunday, they are on the table in the narthex.





## FROM THE DESK OF DR. UHL . .

Over the years I have been asked to be a part of many different organizations. Among these were the Lions, Rotary, Mental Health Association, Council on Alcoholism, United Fund, Chamber of Commerce, and YMCA Board of Directors. In each of these cases the organization had its purpose clearly spelled out so that its members, prospective members, and the public could know what it was all about.

There is nothing unusual or startling about this list except that the church is not on it. Perhaps that is because everyone knows what the purpose of a church is, or at least we should! what would you say

is the purpose of Potomac Presbyterian Church?
