

CONGREGATION SETS NEW RECORDS FOR STEWARDSHIP

You should take justifiable pride in the financial support you and others in this congregation are giving your church in 1979 and 1980. As a consequence of its unprecedented giving in the latter part of December 1979, the congregation increased its pledged cash contributions by almost 7%, raising them from some \$104,000 to \$111,000. This increased income, coupled with decreases in 1979 spending, generated a surplus of \$16,000 which carried over from 1979 into 1980. These carry-over funds enabled the Session to award cost-of-living salary increases for 1980 to Dr. Uhl and his staff, and to increase funds for the operation and maintenance of church properties throughout 1980.

The Stewardship Campaign for 1980, sparked by the enthusiastic leadership of Bill Albright and Jim Allen, also set a new record. A total of \$107,000 was pledged, up more than 2% over the amount originally pledged for 1979. Some 52% of the families making these pledges

increased them, boosting average giving to more than \$950.

Despite this outstanding response, the \$107,000, when added to an estimated loose offering of \$6,100, falls \$14,535 short of providing the fiscal resources needed to satisfy church needs for this year. Thanks to the carry-over of \$16,000, this deficit was easily met, and the 1980 Budget was set by the Session at \$127,635.

Congratulate yourself and other giving members of this church! All of you are now the proud members of the \$2,450 Club! That's the new number of dollars your church will need in cash each week to meet

its needs throughout the year.






The Christian year is marked by two significant events: the birth and death of Jesus. The first of these events is celebrated in the season we know as Advent, and its meaning is obvious to even the most casual churchgoer.

With regard to the second season, we are not so fortunate. To be sure, we can understand the end of Lent with Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter; but the first forty days which begin with Ash Wednesday leave us confused.

We can grasp the suffering of Good Friday, the joy of Resurrection, Easter bonnets, and the Easter Bunny; but the days preceding are like garbled words in a conversation which escapes us.

Lent has traditionally been a time of giving up things, and perhaps that theme was well-intended; but for most of us, the reasons why are not clear. In some ways, it is ludicrous to believe that we can find the spirit of Lent by denying ourselves chocolate, TV, second helpings, or even tobacco and coffee. Yet because Lent is one of the two major seasons of the church year, we feel the obligation at least to struggle with it.

So year after year we contort ourselves into this awkward Lenten posture, hoping that by doing so, we will fulfill our obligation. Yet somehow we never quite pull it off and are relieved when Easter arrives, and our make-believe penitence can turn to joy.

Most of the lectionary lessons which relate to the beginning of Lent involve the beginning of the public ministry of Jesus. It is interesting that the theme of these texts is not suffering, but awareness—an awareness of who he was and what he was to do.

Perhaps in that vein, we can find an additional theme for this Lent of 1980. Perhaps instead of our contrived efforts at giving something up, we can concentrate more on an awareness of who we are, what our live are all about, and what difference they make.

By doing so, it just may be that we will learn more about this season than we ever did by giving up something of little significance. If so, we will be on the way to discovering the genuine spirit of Lent.


can have been purchased for the Christian Education Department.





because it speaks of the promise of life given to us by God.





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

We have since had the organ retuned by a different technician who confirmed the diagnosis that the organ can be expected to perform and be repairable for about 15 years.


We owe a special thanks to Joyce Jenkins for her time and efforts in working with these technicians and aiding with the project.

HIRE A YOUNG PERSON THIS SUMMER

Would you like to help train a young person for the world of work? Would you like to have some extra help with your work this summer?

The YES program of the D. C. Department of Employment Services is developing jobs for Washington, D.C. youths this summer. YES is charged with providing realistic work environments to D.C. youths where they will acquire some basic work skills and develop their awareness of career options and the world of work.

Participating youths are D.C. residents 14 to 21 years old, or older if they are enrolled in school. The program runs from June 30 to August 22.

Employers in the private business and non-profit sectors as well as in the Federal and District Governments are encouraged to hire YES participants. Limited assistance is available to subsidize the youths' salaries and to provide supervision for the youths. Private businesses generally cover all of the costs involved. Employers need pay only the minimum wage of \$3.16 per hour. Jobs located in the suburbs are acceptable as long as they are accessible by public transportation from the District.

FALL SUNDAY SCHOOL STUDY

"Interpreting the Word" is the curriculum approach we will be using this fall. It has been design. ed to provide special opportunities to help Christians become at home with the Bible in their ability to understand it and its implications for their lives. Skills are to be learned not for their own sake, but for the sake of developing an informed, obedient church.

Study units for children are based on Bible stories which have been presented to provide maximum interest, as well as being relevant to the age levels. For older youth and adults, the units are designed to combine Bible study with issues

of everyday living.

The study units are as follows:

Kindergarten/Grade 1 In God's Promise will introduse the Bible as a source of stories of God.

Grades 2/3 God Calls will present stories of the wilderness wanderings and entering the promised land. (from Exedus and Joshua)

Grades 4/5 God's Word to God's People is based on Acts and Old Testament selections about entering the promised land.

Grade 6 There will be several mini-courses about the Exile, Peter, and Hannah.

Grades 7,8,9 The Supporting Cast is a study of lesser known Bible personalities who were a part of the cloud of witnesses in the history of the Christian faith.

Senior Highs Who's In Charge? will deal with the paradox of power in a Christian context in realistic ways.
