





GIVE THE GIFT OF LIFE

Petemac Presbyterian Church is embarking en a very exciting community service project by sponsoring an American Red Cross Blood Donor Program. Our Bloodmobile will be at St. Francis Episcopal Church en Tuesday, April 7, from 1:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. We will be joining with the congregations

frem St. Francis Episcepal Church, Potomac United Methodist Church and Our Lady of Mercy Cathelic Church in this effort.

What is the Red Cress Bleed Donor Pregram?

The Red Cress cellects, precesses, and distributes over 5 million units of blood annually. Blood is administered to patients at no cost. The patient may be a child with leukemia, a person severely injured in an accident, the one who lost blood during illness or surgery, the person needing gamma globulin to combat infectious disease, or so meone who needs platelets for bleeding programs.

Each day in our region, patients need about 800 units of blood to recover and live. Only about 600 units are supplied by blood donor programs. For the other 200 units, we must ask other regions of our country to assist us to meet our daily needs. Incredibly, the difference is often met by blood sent from foreign countries. If volunteer blood is not available, it must be bought at an extremely high cost.

In becoming a participating group in the Blood Donor Program, we have told the Red Cross that they can expect our four churches to contribute a total of 200 units of blood on April 7. Potomac Presbyterian Church's quota is 25 units.

What are the benefits of Potomac Presbyterian's Participation?

As a participating group, we will be doing more than assuring that the blood needs of all our staff and our parish families will be met. (Any time one of our church family needs blood, it will be provided at no cost. Friends and families of individual donors are likewise eligible to receive free blood.) The benefits can be far reaching:

- 1. We will be helping to alleviate suffering and death.
- 2. We will be contributing to our need and responsibility for eutreach.
- We will be becoming more involved in the surrounding community and the community will be becoming more involved in us.
- 4. We will be helping the Red Cross meet their goal of 10% co-verage for this region's blood needs.
- 5. We will be growing in the fellowship and joy of this unique way of giving, thus spiritually strengthening us individually and as a Christian community.

How can I become a denor?

First read the Doner Screening Criteria Sheet to see if you meet the medical requirements. On the bulletin beard outside the church office is a schedule broken down in 15-minute arrival segments. Sign for the time of your choice. Pick up an instruction sheet in the church office. You will be called and reminded a week prior to April 7.

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How can I help if I can't give blood?

Volunteers are needed on April 7 to help with registering donors, taking temperatures, labeling blood, and working in the canteen. Sign up on the bulletin board in the church if you are able to work during a $2\frac{1}{2}$ -hour shift.

Give the GIFT OF LIFE

Eighty percent of us between the ages of 17 and 66 meet the physical requirements for donating blood, yet less than 4% are donors. It is hoped that we all become enthusiastic, informed supporters in word and/or deed of this act of stewardship. It is a unique way of caring about other human beings. Giving can be literally "a gift of life."


We have a wealth of talent right here in Potomac Presbyterian Church, and we are just about to discover all the natural resources that people keep so well hidden.



one of the control of STAMPS NEEDED FOR FUND-KAISING PROJECT

The Women of the Church are participating in the Washington Association of Churches Stamp Project. Proceeds from sales of stamps will be sent to Church World Service to provide high protein foods for needy families and orphanges. In 1978, \$11,191 was sent, and \$6,000 through September 1979.

Do not try to tear or peel stamps from envelopes; stamps should be cut from paper, leaving a 4" margin of paper around each stamp. All stamps should be in good condition, whole, and untorn.

Ten special categories of stamps are sought:

1. Large commemorative stamps (the largest part of income from stamps comes from this type)

2. Foreign - large and middle sized urgently needed

3. Air-mail stamps - large and middle sized

- 4. Precancelled stamps all sizes and denominations, including Christmas
- 5. Special Delivery and Postage Due 30¢ and over

6. \$1.00 Airlift stamps

7. Special stamps - United Nations stamps, Duck hunting licenses, First day of issue envelopes (include whole envelope)

8. Uncancelled postage - on and off paper

9. 16¢ and over small regular stamps - high denomination, small regular stamps in great demand.

10. Christmas stamps - all issues 1962-1980



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



If you have ever travelled on a subway, you know that dark tunnels connect the various stations. If you are looking out of a subway train's window, you can see nothing after the train leaves one platform until it arrives at the next station. At the next station signs tell you where you are. This proves to be a relatively rapid form of transportation, but has the disadvantage that you cannot see what you are passing on your trip. As a tourist in a foreign city, you could miss many interesting sights that you would have seen had you used surface transport.

Unfortunately, this concept can be linked through a simple metaphor to the way we live our lives. We ride from station to station on our way to our destinations, blind to the world around us. Signs tell us when we have arrived at the next station of growth. We so desire to rush to the next, better level that we choose this rapid medium at the price of awareness. Perhaps the time has come for us to consider a new form of travel through life. Perhaps we should slow down and enjoy the macrocosm of beauty around us. To enjoy this, though, we should redefine beauty.

If all things are made by God, then God is in all things, and all should contain His glory. All things have the The question is, which ones potential of being beautiful. are considered beautiful? It has been concluded that no formula defines this, so we have to fall back on the well known line that "beauty is in the eye of the beholder". This truth is not hard to conceive. The sight of waves crashing on a beach can seem beautiful to a person who enjoys seaside scenery, yet can be unappealing to another person who finds only man made things beautiful. Beauty is what we interpret it to be. The wonderful thing about the "eye of the beholder" concept is that it implies that if we open ourselves up further to the world, and seek to accept new things as beautiful, the world will seem more beautiful to us. If the eye of the beholder opens to new beauty, more will be beautiful.

How then do we open our eyes to new beauty? The best way is to look for it in nature and, more importantly, in our fellow man.

Gilbert Chesterton said that "The world will never starve for want of natural wonders." We do not have to look far to find beauty in nature. Such experience of natural beauty is, of course, easiest when we are near picturesque scenes of things like mountains, sunsets, or seashores. But beauty can be found anywhere if we look with a more alert and open eye.

Have you ever stopped to look at the prismatic colors that dewdrops cast, or the branching vein patterns in a green leaf, or the interlocking circles of little waves formed when it rains on a pond or lake? Potentially beautiful things surround us -- but we must open our eyes to them.


At the same time we should try to realize more spiritual beauty in our fellow man. Unfortunately, as with nature, we tend only to appreciate the "picturesque" people, or those who we know to have good qualities. It is too easy to notice only the bad points of people; but everyone has good in them if we look for it. As with nature, we should open our eyes wider to the beauty of our fellow man, and the world will seem more beautiful as well.

The proposal therefore is, starting today, to become more open to the beauty around us in the form of nature and our fellow man. I consider this weekend a station for all of us here. It is one of those points in life where we realize where we are. More important, it is a chance to leave the darkness of the subway. The problem is that it is too easy to stay on and continue through the city in a hyperspace life. It is too easy to remain blind to most of the beauty around us. But, hopefully, some of you who are still awake will understand and leave the subway.

Why not drive yourself through life, or at least leave the driving to the artistic bus? Best of all, why not walk? The slower you travel the more you will see. The time has come for us to leave the subway.

The following story is told by the author, Herbert Tarr:

The conductor called, "All visitors off the train!" "Oh, David..." She hugged him realizing that she smelled of fruits and vegetables and a mother's love. "Take care of him." These last words were addressed not to David's uncle or the conductor, but to God. She spoke to Him freely and often, for the Lord, to her way of thinking, was a person to whom loved ones were safely entrusted, as well as her senior partner in the business of living, always accessible and invariably amenable to petitions of love.

David looked at his aunt and uncle -- she, with hands chapped and hard from selling fruits and vegetables outdoors in all kinds of weather, the face ruddy and round and invariably smiling, the heavy body more accustomed to half a dozen sweaters at one time than a single coat, the hair the color of moonlight now; he, with his slight wiry body strong and bent from lifting too many fruit and vegetable crates for too many years -- the childless couple who had taken the orphaned David into their home, rearing him since age seven, yet refusing to be called "mama" and "papa" for fear that he would forget his real parents.

David grabbed their rough peddlars' hands in his smooth student ones. "How can I ever begin to repay you two for what you've done for me?" His uncle spoke gently: "David, there's a saying: 'The love of the parents goes to their children, but the love of these children goes to their children.' " "That's not so!" David protested. "I'll always be trying to..." His aunt interrupted, "David, what your uncle means is that a parent's love isn't to be paid back; it can only be passed on."

How often this story rings true in our lives. We try so hard to pay people back for what they have done for us, but no matter what we do, it's never enough and quite impossible.

At this season of Advent, we are mindful of what God has done for each of us in the gift of His son. Perhaps we feel the need to pay God back for His love. The story of Advent, however, is that God's love was never intended to be paid back, but passed on.

Thus, the greatest gift any of us can give this year is the sharing of God's love -- may each of us pass it on.
