# the Role of Love and Sex in the Christian Faith



On the week-end of February 5-7, at Potomac Presbyterian Church, Potomac Presbyterian and Saint Mark Presbyterian Churches will join in sponsoring a sexuality seminar for our 7th, 8th, and 9th graders entitled "The Role of Love and Sex in the Christian Faith". It will be led by the Reverend Rob Brudette, a certified sex educator and the United Campus Ministry Chaplain at the University of Maryland. The curriculum for this intensive weekend seminar was developed by the United Methodist Church and is endorsed by the NCUP and the Baltimore Conference of the United Methodist Church.

The seminar is designed to affirm the value of sex education within a Christian setting. It will help each young person understand what it means to be created by God as male or female, and to realize that one's sexuality is a positive expression of his or her personality. Equally important is the intention of facilitating open and meaningful communication between parents and youth about human sexuality and responsible Christian decision making.



# A THOUGHT FOR LENT: THE SOUND OF CLOSING DOORS

Because our clocks are round, because the hands circle about and constantly return to their starting point, we acquire the illusion that everything repeats itself in life, that we can always make a fresh start. What I have not done today by six o'clock, I will get done tomorrow by six o'clock. In other words, the hand on my clock will make its circle tomorrow just as it did today.

Life is really like a long corridor with many doors. Year after year we open a new one. But on the other side there is no latch, no knob. We cannot go back and begin anew as does the hand of the clock. And one day -- we know not when or where -- the corridor will come to an end, irrevocably. The ancient hourglasses with their running sands are more honest in this respect.

But the sounds of closing doors behind need not lead us to despair. Nor should they lead us to adopt the philosophy of "eat, drink and be merry" for tomorrow we die, as if by anesthetizing reality we can escape it.

Our mortality, our finitude, ceases to be a source of anxiety when we know we are safe in the hands of the Lord of all time, when we are at peace with our God. ALL that lies behind me, all the wrong I have done can no longer separate me from Him. God sets it all straight. What lies ahead of me I learn to accept from His hand.

Ultimately we discover that nothing can happen to us, nothing can touch us which will separate us from God's love, no matter how difficult or terrifying. Thus, when we come to open that last door, even there we are not alone. For the God who has walked with us through Jesus Christ awaits us. We shall have come home, and then it will all become clear.



This season of the church year has its own unique vocabulary. We talk of Ash Wednesday, Lent, Holy Week, Palm Sunday, Good Friday, and Easter. Most of these are familiar to us, and their meaning not difficult to comprehend.

Yet, there is one day during this season which leaves us baffled. It is Maundy Thursday. We know it is the day before Good Friday, and that each year we have a service on that evening; but somehow we never quite realize its significance.

The word "Maundy" comes from the Latin word for command and is taken from Jesus' statement to His disciples on that evening long ago: "A new commandment I give unto you - that you love one another." These words followed Jesus' dramatic example of humility and service in washing the feet of the disciples.

Each year at our Maundy Thursday service, we attempt to create that moment, as well as the events which lead up to Jesus' death on the cross. It is a powerful service which builds to a climax in the death of our Lord, symbolized by the sanctuary immersed in total darkness.

This year on April 8, we will once again recreate those moments. The candlelight service of Holy Communion will begin at 8:00 p.m. It will dramatically recall the Last Supper, the arrest and trial of Jesus, and finally, His suffering and death on the cross. Without Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, there would be no joy on Easter morning. Therefore, in preparation for the glorious celebration we anticipate on Easter Sunday, let me urge each of you to be present.



The WOC have voted to send \$125 to join Gaithersburg HELP, an organization of about 200 volunteers which provides immediate temporary service for people in the Gaithersburg area in time of crisis. It fills the gap between onset of crisis and a response by public agencies. In 1981, more than 2000 families were assisted in some way. An average of 27 rides a month were given for medical appointments, a three-day supply of during the school year, 104 items of furniture were given to clients, and several individual families were provided with emergency shelter or with kerosene for their heaters. In addition, volunteers made hundreds of calls, inquiries and referrals to Montgomery County Social Services and other agencies on behalf of clients who needed more assistance than HELP could provide or who had difficulty coping with the system.

\$150 toward the total proposed national amount of \$500,000 will be sent to the National 1982 WOC Birthday Celebration offering. The 1982 offering will be divided equally between two family ministry projects: Edmarc Hospice for children in Suffolk, Virginia and the Pembroke Area 'Presbyterian Ministry in Pembroke, North Carolina.





# POTOMAC PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH FILES COMPLAINT AGAINST PRESBYTERY DECISION

PPC's two Elder Delegates to Presbytery, Joyce Jenkins and Walter Maxwell, have filed a complaint against an action of Presbytery at its June 15, 1982 meeting which permits a new church development to be begun in Montgomery County with the initial probe site being Wootton High School. The decision to file the complaint received the unanimous support of the Session of PPC.

The Session first became aware of the intent to begin a new church in the Route 28 / Shady Grove area in April when it learned that an area minister had offered his resignation and stated his desire to start a new church in the previously mentioned area.

This decision produced an immediate objection on the part of other area churches (Rockville, Geneva, St. Mark, Darmestown, and Potomac), and led to a meeting of the New Church Development Committee of Presbytery, ministers, and lay people from churches in the area and the minister whose intent it was to begin the church. At that meeting the New Church Development Committee said it could not comment on the location of the intended new church since it had not received a proposal from the group wishing to form the new church. It also indicated that the area churches affected would be consulted prior to any final decision.

At its May 6, 1982 meeting, the New Church Development Committee voted to allow the new church to be placed in the Gaithersburg/Germantown area west of I-270. Although the committee did not consult with the area churches before making its final decision, the suggested location for the new church seemed acceptable to most of the other affected congregations.

On June 3, however, another fact came to light: the proposed new church had made an agreement with the Montgomery County Public Schools to begin meeting in Wootton High School. This act places the proposed new church back in the very area to which the other churches, including Potomac, had objected. It is also a location outside of the designated area decided upon by the New Church Development Committee in its May 6 action.

# Complaint Against Presbytery Decision continued ...

Prior to the Presbytery meeting, assurances were given to our minister that the matter was settled and that the new church would not be permitted to meet in Wootton High School. However, at the June 15, 1982 meeting of Presbytery, the New Church Development Committee presented its motion for the funding of a new church development to be located in Montgomery County (no other specific limiting area was indicated), and requested \$135,000 from Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly over the next five years to fund it.

The Presbytery, after defeating an amendment which would have limited the new church to the area west of I-270 (Gaithersburg/Germantown), voted to accept the Motion of the New Church Development Committee.

PPC's Elder Delegates registered their negative votes with the Stated Clerk immediately following the decision by Presbytery. The following Monday the Elder Delegates indiacated to our Session their desire to complain against the action of Presbytery. The Session voted unanimously in favor of that decision, and steps have been initiated within the legal channels of the United Presbyterian Church to appeal the action.

The Session requested that this decision be transmitted to the congregation for their information. We will keep you informed as to the progress of this action.

# COLLINSWOOD BIRTHDAY PARTIES

On the third Wednesday of every month, September through June, four women from Potomac Presbyterian Church take cakes to Collinswood Nursing Home in Rockville, to help residents celebrate the birthdays that fall in that month. Our women arrive at 2:45 P.M. and are there for approximately one hour. They cut the cakes, pour the beverage provided by the home, assist in serving, and chat with the residents.

The forty to fifty people who are able to participate look forward very eagerly to this event, and many arrive in the cafeteria forty-five minutes early! We who do this feel we are expending very little time and effort, but the Collinswood residents and volunteer staff think it is a tremendous contribution.

# from the Session, CONCERNING THE LONG-RANGE PLANNING REPORT

At its regular meeting on May 17 and a special meeting on June 7, the Session considered matters addressed by the Long Range Planning Committee, drawing upon the committee's report and the congregation's views as gathered during the parish group gatherings this past winter. Addressing both immediate needs and those expected to arise during the next several years, the Session unanimously agreed to the following motions:

- In light of the increasing extent to which we expect our present building to restrict church operations, the Session (a) approves the expenditure of up to \$2500 in 1982 funds for contracted, professional assistance in assessing our current and future facility needs; (b) expresses an intent to include an appropriate level of funds in the 1983 budget to continue to receive such professional consultative services; and (c) instructs the Moderator to appoint a special Facilities Committee to oversee long range facilities development and to work with consultants.
- That the Property Committee be asked to develop for Session consideration no later than at its October 1982 meeting specific recommendations for improving the kitchen through replacing, repairing, or augmenting its major appliances.
- That we rent a classroom at Potomac Elementary School for the months of September, October, and November 1982 if, after examination, the space proves satisfactory for church school use.

In accordance with the above actions, a special Facilities Committee has been appointed by the Moderator. The members of the committee are: Bill King, chairman, Kitty Albright, Jon Hawley, Jane Olson, Ed Tennent, and Bob Tietjen.

"I have recently returned from a trip to Mexico, where I visited the Presbyterian Seminary in Mexico City and the Church of the Divine Redeemer in Toluca to complete plans for the NCUP Youth Work Camp which will take place in Mexico on July 12-31. Ten young people and two advisers will be going on the trip.

In addition, I presented to the church in Toluca a plaque from National Capital Union Presbytery on the occasion of their 100th anniversary. I am very happy to have represented the Presbytery in this joyful way.

While I was there, I was presented with some needs by individuals whom I have known in the church, and I would like to share one of these conserns with you and ask if your church would be willing to try to help.





So, please don't act surprised, and help us by making sure that your pledge is presented to our church on or before November 7.



### SESSION NOTES

A new look should soon be evident at PPC following actions taken at the October 18th Session Meeting. Approval was voted for the purchase of a new, commercial size stove and refrigerator for the kitchen, and 80 new chairs for Fellowship Hall. Plans are also underway for the installation of a hand rail and partition for the stairway from the narthex to the second floor. A portable aluminum ramp has been ordered to facilitate access to the church for anyone using a wheel chair.

Session also voted to accept and implement the following staffing recommendations:

- 1. To replace the Director of Christian Education approximately 30 hours per week and, subject to the availability of funds in the 1983 budget;
- 2. To add an Associate Pastor approximately 25 hours per week, with responsibilities for developing the mission outreach of the congregation (in conjunction with the Church & Community/Mission Interpretation Committee), assume responsibility for visiting inactive members, assist with pastoral care, and assist in planning and leadership of worship, preaching at least once every fifth week.
- 3. To increase secretarial support as may be required to fill the needs of the staff.



The property committee and the WOC would like to make sure that you are aware of three major improvements which have been, or will shortly be, made in our church facilities.

Our Fellowship Hall has been repainted, and new draperies have been made for all windows and doors. To complete the redecoration of Fellowship Hall, we have purchased seventy new, upholstered, metal, stacking chairs to replace our aging wooden, folding chairs.

Early in December, we will complete a much needed renovation of our church kitchen. This project was recommended by our long-range planning committee and includes the installation of a new ten-burner, two-oven electric range and a 23 cubic foot refrigerator. The WOC have contributed \$2000 toward the cost of this work and are also paying for the construction of two new cabinets for the storage of kitchen equipment.

We have contracted for the installation of a new railing in the stairwell from the narthex to the second floor. Several of our members have experiended near falls in this stairwell, and the new railing is needed to guarantee safe use of this stairway.
