The WOMEN OF THE CHURCH have committed themselves to a local community project, and the MISSION INTERPRETATION COMMITTEE hopes to expand the program. For those of you who don't know "WHAT IS GAITHERS BURG HELP" about, the following is a brief description

"GAITHERS BURG HELP" was founded in October 1968 by a group of concerned clergy and lay citizens to fill a growing need in our rapidly expanding area. It was decided to use the name "HELP" rather than "FISH" in order not to exclude any non-Christian denominations from participation. The purpose of the group is to SERVE PEOPLE IN NEED of basics such as food, clothing, furniture, shelter, and transportation to doctors, hospitals, etc.

"HELP"does not compete with agencies in our communities, county, or state, but rather works in cooperation with all of them.

There are 26 churches and synagogues in the area who support "HELP"; administrative costs are obtained by dues from member congregations and contributions from churches, groups, and individuals. Financial statements are submitted each year, and a copy of them is available from your Mission Interpretation Committee members.

"HELP" served 82 families during July of last year, exactly double for July of the previous year, and they continue to grow.

A four bedroom house is available for those who are homeless, but as expected, they cannot possibly assist all those in need of shelter and are looking for any contributions to solve this crisis situation.

If you have any questions about this project, feel free to ask Jane Olson, Joan Robisch, or Jon Hawley. Jane is President of the WOC, Joan is Local Mission Chairman for the WOC and the Mission Interpretation Committee, and Jon is Chairman of all other mission projects of the Mission Interpretation Committee.

## from the pastor ...

The Lenten season in the church year has its own unique vocabulary. We speak of Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter. These represent for us the church's remembrance of the last days of our Lord's life. We are told that Lent is preparation: a period of time in which we contemplate not only the supreme sacrifice of Jesus, but also catch a true image of ourselves.

This personal image is defined for us in terms of penitence and contrition; and even though they are the passwords of Lent, too often they are little more than that. Seldom do we understand or existentially esperience the theological significance of this season.

One way this does come home to us, unfortunately, is in our own struggle with suffering. The church does not do well with the issue of suffering. Either we ignore it as long as we can, or when forced to deal with it, do so through an intricate, albeit inadequate, theological dialogue.

Therefore, I have decided to consider the issue of suffering as a theme for preaching during this Lenten season. Here are the sermon titles and scriptures for the next three Sundays:

February 27 - GOD'S IN HIS HEAVEN?

Job 1:6-11; Romans 5:1-5, 8:31-39

March 6 - WHERE IS MAN?

Luke 13:1-3; John 9:1-3

March 13 - IS GOD FAIR?

Job 1:1-12, 42:1-6

These sermons have been constructed to confront the problem of suffering in a practical way. It is my hope that they will help each of us in our own personal pilgrimages, not only through this Lenten season, but in those moments when life tumbles in.

After opening with liturgical works by Hassler and Pachelbel, the Chorale will perform motets by Brahms, Faure, and Healey Willan. The "Wedding Cantata" of Daniel Pinkham will conclude the first half of the program. The second half will consist of American hymn tunes, folk songs, and spirituals.


LAY EDUCATION: Beginning next Sunday, May 1st, Chaplain Tracy Maness, will present the first of a two-part series on Holistic Approaches to Health Care. Chaplain Maness, a United Methodist Minister, is presently serving on active duty as a Chaplain in the Army assigned to Walter Reed Medical Center. The Wellness Center at Walter Reed is a multi-disciplined approach to health care that encourages each individual to take responsibility for his or her own health in cooperation with the personal physician.

Principal foci of the Wellness Clinic are to add the spiritual issues to the level of wellness, to teach persons to deal with stress through relaxation response elicitation, and to deal with intro- and inter-personal issues of health.

The program will be in two sessions and will seek to add practical applications of holistic principles such as relaxation, eliciting the body's healing response and pain control in maintaining personal health. It could be considered as an alternative approach to currently popular drug therapy for treatment of stress management.

The class meets in the Fellowship Room at 10:00 A.M. You are urged to come early for coffee/tea so that participants can fully utilize the time scheduled.

Your Associate Pastor Search Committee is pleased to announce the conclusion of its search. We enthusiastically recommend for your approval and call Mrs. Diane Prevary Kramer of Fredericksburg, Virginia.

The Session's original charge to the committee was to find the best available individual for the following responsibilities:

- 1. Direction of the Christian Education Program
- 2. Lead in developing the mission outreach to the local community
- 3. Assist in the planning and leadership of worship with occasional preaching
- 4. Assist in pastoral care

We feel our efforts have been most fruitful in fulfilling this charge. It is difficult on paper to share with you all of Diane's background, etc., but possibly a few excerpts from her dossier will give you some insight.

"I look forward to serving as a leader in the church. I perceive this leadership to be that which will enable the members of the community of faith to respond to our responsibility to live in this world as servants of each other and of our Iord. Effective leadership is always in tension—of being effectively strong and directive, yet of being effectively flexible! Such leadership identifies and adapts to the various components which define the church's ministry. Effective leadership requires gifts and skills. As pastor in the church I will be responsible for (1) seeing that my own skills are constantly upgraded; and, (2) helping my congregation identify their gifts and providing opportunities for them to acquire requisite skills for leadership within the church.

"The specific areas of the church's work in which I have been involved are varied. I chaired the Membership Enlistment Committee and developed a comprehensive program for the recruitment of new members and their integration into the fellowship of the church. I chaired the Campus Christian Life Committee, working with students from Mary Washington College, involving them both in our church and in the interdenominational Campus Christian Community. I was the Director of the Youth Club—a position which entailed total responsibility for the planning, administration, and implementation of this mid-week Christian experience for the children of our church and the community at-large. I have served on various other sessional and W.O.C. committees at the local level, as well as the Commission on New Church Development at presbytery level (1977, Hanover Presbytery). More recently I served professionally as the Director of

Youth Ministry for the Fredericksburg Church (summer 1982). My responsibilities were to evaluate the existing program and plan and implement a comprehensive ministry to the youth of the congregation. This was a very satisfying summer, both professionally and personally. It is always a mixed blessing to be called to work in a community which knows you well. The danger of a lack of objectivity is always present—both for the "worker" and "employer". I feel very strongly that in this particular case, however, both "worker" and "employer" supported each other, yet benefited from constructive and sensitive evaluation of the job Perhaps the most significant result of my summer's work was a total commitment to the importance of Youth Ministry in the life of the Christian church I look forward to further opportunities to minister in this area.

"My personal interests are, first of all, my own family and their activities and interests. My husband Arnold (Arnie) and I have been married fifteen years and we have three children: Jennifer, 14 years; Virginia (Ginger), 11 years; and Arnold, IV ("Chip"), 9 years. We are active in our community and schools, and of course in our church. The children are budding musicians and sportsmen. Arnie and I enjoy the theater and dining out. We like to entertain in our home and take particular pleasure in opening our home to others during the holidays. I am an avid reader—everything from novels to the newspaper. I used to be an accomplished "needle worker", but time has not permitted this diversion for some I am a spectator sportswoman, although I have been known to hit a tennis ball upon occasion. Overall I would say that I thrive on activity and look forward to a busy and challenging ministry."

One final note is taken from the cover letter written by the Director of Union Theological Seminary that accompanied Diane's entire data form:

"Diane will graduate from Union Seminary this spring. I have been very impressed with her as a person as well as a student. Diane is a very mature woman and will serve the church well."

Please make every effort to hear Diane preach on Sunday, June 5, 1983 and attend the Congregational Meeting to approve her call at the conclusion of morning worship.

It has been our privilege to serve this congregation. We trust you will find the results of our efforts as gratifying as we have found the process.

## CANON DAVID JENKINS IS COMING!

#### **NEWSFLASH:**

On Sunday, August 7 we will have a very special Guest Minister, Canon David Jenkins, Professor of Theological Studies of Leeds University, England.

Canon Jenkins and Jack Bryant of our own congregation met a number of years ago when both were consultants to the World Council of Churches in Geneva: David on theology and Jack on health in developing countries. Their interests intersected around a Dialogue on Moral Issues and Health Care, which turned out to have a formative influence on both of their careers.

One of Canon Jenkins' particular strengths is to combine a deep knowledge of theology with a sensitive understanding of society—its people, institutions, and problems.

He is a brilliant thinker, an exciting speaker, a warm and compassionate pastor.

A biographical description follows:

\*\*\*

David Jenkins is now Professor of Theology and Head of the Department of Theology and Religious Studies at the University of Leeds, England. Born in 1925, he went from school into the army during World War II and became a Captain in the Royal Artillery, eventually serving as a Staff Officer in GHQ, India. Before leaving school he had already decided that he was called to the ministry in the Church of England, and obtained a scholarship

in History to Queen's College, Oxford. After demobilization he read <u>Litterae Humaniores</u> at Oxford (Greek and Latin language and literature, and then Ancient History and Philosophy, both ancient and modern), and then Theology. After ordination training he served briefly on the staff of Birmingham Cathedral before returning to Oxford as Fellow, Chaplain and Praelector in Theology. He was also a University lecturer in Patristics.

While at Oxford (1954-69) he became increasingly interested in the relations between Christian doctrine and questions of social ethics and the organization of institutions. This interest focussed first in the interaction between pastoral questions and the practises of psychology and psychiatry, and then moved on to questions of the National Health Service and the medical profession (hence his eventual meeting up with Jack Bryant!).

In 1969 he moved from Oxford to work for the World Council of Churches in Geneva where he directed the Humanum Study which addressed the question "What Is Man?" In addition, he became theological advisor to the Christian Medical Commission. In 1973 he returned to the United Kingdom to be director of the William Temple Foundation, a small research institute in Christian Social Ethics associated with Manchester University (much work on problems of the inner city, unemployment, the missionary task of the church, and, of course, health services).

In January, 1979 he moved to his present post in Leeds. He is a Canon Theologian of Leicester Cathedral, examining chaplain to various bishops, and involved in numerous church and ecumenical activities; he was an advisor at both the Lambeth Conferences of 1968 and 1978).

His books include <u>Guide to the Debate</u>
About God, <u>The Glory of Man</u>, <u>Living With</u>
Questions, and <u>The Contradiction of</u>
Christianity.

Happily married for nearly 34 years, he has four children and, at the time of writing, four grandchildren. When he has time his main relaxations are walking (especially in

mountains) and observing birds and animals.

We are very fortunate to have Canon Jenkins as our Guest Minister on August 7. The title of his sermon, following from the fact that August 6th is the Feast of Transfiguration, will be "Transfiguration and Change". Coffee will be served after the worship service to provide an opportunity to meet him.

#### A NOTE FROM THE KRAMERS





ACCESSORY APARTMENTS (bath, kitchen, bedroomc etc.) are illegal in Montgomery County. Recommendations are forthcoming to permit such apartments, and organizers ask for help in getting letters of support to the County Council. Contact Peg McRory, 279-1721, for more information.

PRISON TASK FORCE PROJECT OPENS September 22, at the Montgomery County Detention Center on Seven Locks Road with a new four-nights-a-week Alcoholics Anonymous Program. Lon Dring, Langdon Woods, Bob Roman, and Bill Skinner helped make the necessary contacts with prison and county officials. They are now looking for interested persons to assist families of prisoners. GAP (Grant Assistance Program) needs help in providing coffee and conversation to persons waiting to be processed for a grant check of \$30 maximum. MANNA program is purchasing a truck with a county grant. This truck will have a lift gate and will be used for picking up foodstuffs for the program. Also, the truck can be used by CMMC members to collect furniture and things for needy and to assist moving materials as needed. Users must provide their own loading and unloading staff, but a driver will be assigned from a volunteer group.





### STEWARDSHIP SUNDAY: November 6, 1983

The Session has designated November 6, 1983 as Stewardship Sunday. In preparation for the event, the 1984 church budget was approved by the Session and presented to the congregation. There was opportunity to discuss the budget during the Congregational Meeting on October 16, 1983.

The Stewardship Campaign is the annual request for pledges and contributions to support the church's programs and operating expenses. In 1984 that number is budgeted to be \$183,917, which represents a modest \$6,252 increase over 1983. However, the 1983 Budget is a deficit budget—meaning that we expected to pay more than we received. Further, less than one-half of the congregation increased their 1983 pledges over 1982.

Against that background, and the departure of Dr. Uhl, it is vital to the well-being of the church and our common ministry that in 1984 the congregation unite in its commitment to Potomac Presbyterian Church and substantially increase pledges so that we can avoid further deficit financing and can declare to our prospective senior minister that we are a strong, able, and dedicated congregation.

The Session asks each member and friend of Potomac Presbyterian Church to respond on Stewardship Sunday as generously as his or her faith and resources permit.

#### GRANDIN FOUNDATION LOAN

The Board of Directors of National Capital Presbytery has approved the application of Potomac Presbyterian Church to borrow \$20,000 for three years from the Grandin Foundation at 10% interest per annum. The fund is intended to assist churches in meeting unexpected financial obligations, such as the settlement with Dr. Uhl on the Manse.

The Session agreed with the Stewardship, Finance & Personnel Committee that it would better serve the interests of Potomac Presbyterian Church if it could borrow a major portion of the needed funds rather than liquidate nearly all of our cash assets or undergo an expensive refinancing of the Manse at the present time. We appreciate Bob Tietjen's assistance in arranging the short term financing and the Board of Directors acting so promptly upon our request.

#### REPORT FROM THE SESSION

At the Session Meeting held October 17, 1983, Elders voted to approve the following statement about David Uhl's pastorate for inclusion in the National Capital Presbytery's packet for the November meeting. It is traditional for such a statement to be presented to Presbytery when a pastoral relationship is dissolved.

"Eight years ago, after a nation-wide search of a year or more, the Potomac Presbyterian Church called Dr. David L. Uhl to its pastorate. Among the numerous and diverse challenges and duties incumbent in that position, we looked, in particular, for David to strengthen our congregational bonds and enrich our understanding and response to Christ's words.

"It is with a true sense of reluctance but with fond expressions of goodwill toward David and Sue that we, at his request, now have voted to dissolve this pastoral relationship in order that he might accept the pastorate of the Rye Presbyterian Church, Rye, New York.

"We wish the National Capital Presbytery to know that under David's leadership our congregation has achieved deepened ties of faith and fellowship. Our numbers have grown steadily, our mission commitments have expanded substantially and our Christian Education programs, always a core in our church's life, have become even stronger. David has been a very effective leader, nudging us forward—sometimes gently, sometimes a bit more bluntly—in the faith, loving us, and helping us reach ever higher levels of commitment. We will gratefully remember his preaching and teaching and his unceasing care and concern for our well-being, one and all."

#### NEEDED: CARE IN CRISIS

The County Mobile Crisis Team needs families or individuals to provide temporary care in their homes on an emergency basis to adults in crisis. A new service of the County's Assessment Center for Adults, the team is a joint program of the Social Services. and Health Departments.

Selected families or individuals will be expected to supervise the adult in crisis in a warm and caring environment. Only adults who do not need hospitalization and whose crisis can be resolved by brief care in a community home will be placed.

Community care providers will participate in training arranged by the Department of Social Services and Health, as well as the Mental Health Association. Consultation will be available with treatment team members on a 24-hour basis.

#### CROSSWAY COMMUNITY

Crossway Community, a transitional community for single-parent families, is rapidly becoming more than a good idea. A \$49,000 loan from the County has allowed the Crossway Board to hire a building development consultant and an architect. Two sites have been targeted for further study, with work anticipated to begin at one of these

The Crossway Community apartment complex will accommodate 100 families. Rents will be priced below-market, and a range of on-site, reduced-fee support services will be offered. These will include children's day care, career and financial guidance, family counseling and support groups. The program is designed to allow single parents to meet their families' immediate practical and emotional needs while planning for their futures. It is expected that, within their two-year maximum stay, Crossway residents will be enabled to achieve the goal of self-sufficiency for their families.

Modelled after Warren Village in Denver, Colorado Crossway Community hopes to achieve similar successful results. An independent evaluation of Warren Village showed the employment rate of residents doubling and the number receiving public assistance cut by 90%. Given current demographic trends, Crossway Community may well join Warren Village as an important housing alternative for the country.

The need for Crossway Community is clear. At present 10% of all households in Montgomery County are headed by a single parent, with 82% of these women. The median income of single-parent families is less than half that of two-parent households. A recent "Newsweek" article stated that the income of divorced women with children typically decreases 73% during the first year after divorce.


