



BELFAST CHILDREN'S SUMMER PROGRAM





Candidates and Churches

A minister has as much right to run for public office as an actor, a lawyer or an engineer. We cannot understand those who object to Jesse Jackson seeking the Democratic nomination for president on the basis of the fact that he is a minister. We've already had one minister-president — James A. Garfield; there's no reason why we should not have another.

It is not as though a Protestant minister would be bound by the distinctive teachings of his church in the exercise of his office any more than any other Christian would: anyway, that issue was settled when John F. Kennedy was elected president. And what church pronouncement would bind a Baptist?

If the minister uses his pulpit or his church connections for political purposes, that is another matter. But we have to understand that black churches have always been the primary base for political activity in the black community and tradition. Until now, blacks have not had much reason to be concerned about the church-state issue involved.

Now, with Jackson's national nomination candidacy, they will have to look at the matter more seriously. At any rate, Jackson is an interesting candidate — if only people would stop "reverending" him all over the place.

The January 1984 issue of Church and State (\$1 from 8120 Fenton St., Silver Spring, Md. 20910) has an interesting rundown on the religious affiliation and attitudes of the eight Democratic hopefuls and President Reagan. We don't have space to give the attitudes, but we can tell you what the article says about their religious affiliations and backgrounds.

The writers make the comment that "of the eight Democratic candidates for the presidency, six have exceptionally strong religious influences." And what is of particular interest to us is that of the nine candidates (including Reagan), four are Presbyterian or have a Presbyterian affinity.

Those four are:

Walter Mondale — son of a Methodist minister, now member of Chevy Chase Presbyterian Church, Washington, D.C.

John Glenn — graduate of Presbyterian-related Muskingum College in Ohio and still a Presbyterian.

Reuben Askew — to quote the article: "has the demeanor of a Presbyterian Sunday school teacher, which he is." You can decide whether this maligns or compliments Presbyterian Sunday school teachers.

Ronald Reagan — Disciples of Christ (Christian Church) background, but, as we all know from his last campaign, he attends a Presbyterian church when in California (Bel Air). We are told that he does not attend church regularly now for security reasons. That may be a problem for Jackson. But he could hold church in the White House and he wouldn't have to look around for a preacher or stated supply.

Gary Hart was reared in the Nazarene church, apparently rebelled against its fundamentalism and went to Yale Divinity School. He now calls himself simply "Protestant."

George McGovern is the son of a Methodist minister and at one time served as minister of a small church in South Dakota, but was not ordained.

Ernest Hollings has a Lutheran background. His second marriage in 1972 to a Roman Catholic took place in a Protestant church.

Jesse Jackson is a Baptist, and Alan Cranston simply lists himself as "Protestant."

If frontrunners mean anything, the next president is likely to be a Presbyterian, more or less, whatever that means.



A box or chest of acacia wood overlaid with gold. It was too holy to be touched and so was carried by priests and Levites on poles. Inside the ark the stone tablets containing the Ten Commandments were kept. On the ark was the mercy seat, which represented the throne of God and signified his presence and guidance. For this reason the Israelites carried it with them during their wanderings in the wilderness and when they went into battle. Later when Solomon built the temple in Jerusalem, the ark was placed in it.



THE RESURRECTION WAS ONLY THE BEGINNING

Easter Sunday proclaims Jesus Christ was alive on the third day after His crucifixion. In fact, it affirms much more.

He was alive on the fourth and fifth days also. He was alive during the forty days before the ascension, days when He "spoke about the kingdom of God" and instructed His disciples (Acts 1:3).

He was alive at Pentecost when He poured the Holy Spirit on the church, as Peter proclaims: "You with the help of wicked men, put Him to death by nailing Him to the cross. But...God has raised this Jesus to life, and we are all witnesses of the fact. Exalted to the right hand of God, He has received from the Father the promised Holy Spirit and has poured out what you now see and hear" (Acts 2:23,32-33).

Jesus was alive that notable <u>yesterday</u> when He appeared to Paul on the Damascus Road. "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?...I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting" (Acts 9:4,5).

He is still alive today, confronting sinners and saving the penitent, scattering the proud and sanctifying the godly, sifting the self-indulgent and sharing the blessings of eternity with all who love Him.

He is alive forever. This is the insistent witness of the Christian church.

YYYYEEESSSS



Citizen's Action Coalition

CMMC voted to join in the coalition this year to help in the efforts to improve utility costs for the poor. The Coalition plans to branch out into other areas in the coming months. The CMMC Council thought it would be useful to play a part with three delegates.

CABLE TV RELIGION EMPHASIS

CMMC, the Catholic Archdiocese and the Jewish Community are working together to appoint a single person to represent religion on the new cable TV board. The county cable TV system will have to provide opportunities for religious emphasis in programming. The groups are looking for a person with experience in TV programming, communications in general, communications law or otherwise qualified. If you have someone to recommend, do it now. CMMC TRUCK PROGRAM

From January 1 to June 6, the CMMC "Faith Haulers: We Move Mountains" Truck helped 31 families move and 27 agencies used the truck. In August and September, 20 additional evicted families were moved at 50 cents a mile, returning a minor portion of the costs of operation. David White is winding up his 8 month stay as the truck operator. During this time he has served on the County Task Force on Eviction and developed a budget for continuing the program; however, the popularity of the program has prompted advisors to ask for two more trucks and a larger budget.

HABITAT SUNDAY and WEEK

Proclamations by the County Council made September 16 - 23 Habitat Week in Montgomery County. The local group will hold a dinner/dance on September 29 in Sandy Spring to help raise funds to build the house for Pat and her family. Pat will put in 500 hours of time and Habitat will help erect a new house, interest free. County Health Department approval came in September and it is expected that real building will begin after some more red tape is cleared.

GRANT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The GAP program is in desperate need this time of year. Funds are so low that CMMC has loaned GAP \$1,200 out of its operating funds to keep going. GAP funds are given on a one time basis for food or medicine (no more than \$30 to a family) to help people over the waiting period for food stamps and other good reasons. This is a program supported primarily by churches, but next year the county may be asked to appropriate funds for it on the basis that the welfare department sends many of the needy to GAP.

Hunger Drive Approved for Thanksgiving

Potomac Presbyterian Church has been assigned precinct 10-5 to canvass during this year's CMMC Hunger Drive. If this is your precinct, south of Falls Road, across from the golf course, we need your help on Thanksgiving Weekend. Churches from across the county will organize 202 precincts to knock on doors for the Hunger Drive. One third of the money goes to local needs --Manna, Help and Fish groups, and others; one third to national groups -- Catholic Relief Service, Synagogue Council of America and Church World service; and one third to international needs -- UNICEF and AFRICARE. 

REFLECTIONS ON AN INTERIM PASTORATE

Although we regret the loss of a pastor whom we loved and who loved us in all kinds of human joys and sorrows, the leaving is not without its blessing.

An interim between the former minister's leaving and the new minister's arrival points up how we cannot be complacent about what it means to be the Church of Jesus Christ. A unique test of our understanding of that meaning takes place. During an interim most things in the life of a congregation continue. Some with less intensity or direction, but still present and visible. But that is perhaps only the surface of what it means to be Christ's Body in the world. The actual signs that the congregation continues as Christ's Body go beyond worship, study, and the sheer pleasure of being in the Fellowship of the Redeemed.

The interim period enables us to sense the real nature of the congregation not merely in terms of what we see but in relation to what we sense takes place between and among the people.

This sense of what takes place includes how the people look out at the world from the vantage point of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. You can tell how deeply the Gospel has penetrated their lives by gauging how far out of themselves they project that Gospel as their motivating force.

This is not a new or startling comprehension of the Church. It simply comes upon you. And it comes upon you when the congregation, as individuals and corporately, reveals, often in subtle ways, its self understanding

The interim is - happily - drawing to a close, although its end is yet some months away. Perhaps in the time that remains you may personally find some enrichment of the self by reflecting upon what it means for you to be the Body of Christ in the world.



Then, before you stop, say a word of thanks to Virginia Crozier and Wanda Sherfy for delivering the literature on the two previous days, to Jean Hummon for the cake and cider snack greeting the walkers at day's end and to Diane Kramer for lengthening her work week to lend a hand.

So, \$878 is <u>more</u> than the \$500 we received in 1983 and we did it with <u>less</u> territory to cover. Several of this year's helpers wondered how much more we could do if more members of the church would make themselves available next year. "Feed my sheep."

1985 CMNC Budget Up Only Slightly

From a 1984 estimate of \$165,814 the 1985 budget is targeted at \$172,664. This budget will only permit \$35,000 in Grant Assistance Program (GAP) funds, down \$10,000 from 1984, an it includes an estimated \$50,000 from the annual Hunger Relief effort. Ministerial expenses include \$24,456 salary, plus housing, pension and perks for almost \$45,000. Office expenses are about \$15,000 and programs are \$106,000. The elected officers propose the program and expenditures, while the commissioners from the 55 churches must approve the budget and raise the money.

Monthly Meeting of CMMC Discusses Homosexuals

With the new County antidiscrimination law on the books and the Human Rights Commission beginning to ready itself for complaints, CMMC's Executive Committee asked Vice President, Rev. Gordon Forbes, to discuss the advisability of developing a workshop to assist clergy and church members understand the statistics, feelings, laws, problems and opportunities. No decision was made until reaction is received from the CMMC membership. Please tell Commissioner Bill Skinner if you have ideas about this proposed project.

Montgomery County's Human Rights Commission documented 148 religious discrimination cases in 1984; this is among many other kinds of cases; HRC budget is now \$600,000 a year, employing 16 staff and the commissioners serve without pay.

Ada St.John from Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church gave the Council members some encouragement to organize projects on a bilateral and enforceable nuclear arms freeze. She says that this topic is like a lot of Presbyterians: "After all is said and done, there is more said than done."

THE BELFAST CHILDREN'S SUMMER PROGRAM is beginning its fourth year and its purpose is to bring children, both Protestant and Catholic, to the Washington area for six weeks next summer. The trip to Washington will give the children, ages 9 to 11, a much needed vacation from the bombings, tension, and street violence of Belfast. Our goal is to provide an opportunity for the children to experience living in a neighborhood that is free of religious prejudices. The children will find that people of different religious backgrounds can, and do, live in peace and harmony. This ecumenical effort is a non-profit, non-political, tax-exempt program.

Host Families - are needed to take in a child for six weeks next summer. Host family applications will be screened and requirements include that at least one parent be home during the child's stay.
