



If there is something the Ministers or Elders can do for you, we must know about it. This is a good time to let us know how you feel about the Church. A substantial number seem to be saying that they support the work, I hope those silent 46 are not saying that they do not.

I apologize to all of you already committed for this statment, you have responded well to our low key campaign. It has been my contention through the years that our members knew the need, and could determine their fair share of giving to support our mission. I hope I have not been laboring under false impressions for so long.

#### FEBRUARY ADULT EDUCATION CLASS

## REPORT FROM THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

At the last meeting of the Finance Committee, on Monday, December 10th, we noted that the giving against pledges for 1984 has been slipping a bit. We did a spendid job during the Summer, and held giving levels nearly at the same rate as is normal for the rest of the year. For that we are most appreciative, but now, as the end of the year approaches, we suggest that you check the status of your giving, and do whatever you can to catch up \* before December 31st.

#### Hunger Drive Goes On

By December 13, more than \$73,000 had been raised for the Hunger DRive supported by Community Ministry of Montgomery County. Announcement of that success to news sources may stimulate additional giving to make this year's effort the best yet for the door to door campaign. Potomac Presbyterians knocked on doors in Precinct 10-5 and came up with \$888.88 in 2 ½ hours time. Another notable church effort was by members of St. Bartholomew's R.C. Parish on River Road; they raised over \$9,000 during their effort. Congratulations to St. Barts and PPC.

#### LON DRING IS MAN OF THE YEAR -- WASHINGTONIAN MAGAZINE

#### RICA Visited by CMMC


The December meeting of CMMC was held at RICA, Regional Institute for Children and Adults in Rockville. It is a 52 bed institution with a daytime school program run by the county school board, but paid for by the state. 230 staff people, giving 2 teachers to 7 students, it is designed for emotionally trouble children of 6 to 20 years of age. Average stay is between 1 and 2 years; students are referred from many sources.

#### BUDGET APPROVED

A projected \$173,233.00 budget was approved by voice vote giving the CMMC a target for 1985. The GAP funds were \$10,000 less than last year and the total includes \$50,000 for the Hunger Drive, which we have topped already. Several churches have kicked in more this year to help CMMC keep programs alive; PPC also increased its pledge slightly.

They will bring to us their rich experiences as they have ministered to Christians in the Far East.

A bit about the Stubbs'. Vincent is a graduate of both Union Theological Seminary in Virginia and Fuller Theological Seminary in California. Jane's formal training includes nursing and Christian Education. They have served our church as missionaries since 1960. Their most recent assignment was on the largest of the Japanese islands, Honshu—in the suburbs of Osaka, a city of eight million. The main thrust of Vincent Stubbs' ministry at the Otokoyama Church was to challenge the members to be Christ's witnesses in the home, the neighborhood, the school and the office. During his last term a new church building was constructed and then a Japanese minister was called to take over the church's ministry when the Stubbs' were called home for their home assignment.

Jane has been quite active in Bible studies. She has led an English Bible class in the church building, and has led Bible studies in Japanese with her husband. Together with Vincent she has expanded and enriched the ministry of the Otokoyama Church, so that it now offers a full program: weekly women's meetings, morning and evening prayer meetings, church school, youth meetings, worship, fellowship meals and much more. The Otokoyama Church is truly the center of the Christians' lives in that community.

Please join us on Sunday, February 24, to welcome Vincent and Jane Stubbs to the Potomac Church. Jane will lead our Adult Education hour, and Vincent will preach during Worship.

# Beflections Bellections

. . I arrived late. . . .too much to do in too little time. Shaking off the bitter cold which permeated my bones I entered the kitchen and stood looking out over the bustle of activity. Chopping, peeling, stirring, chatting, laughing. .twelve volunteers preparing the meal for this day's guests at THE LORD'S TABLE.

We were all concerned about the weather. Bob Ryan had predicted horrendous events, scheduled to begin at the peak of our "busyness" in the kitchen. More important than whether we would make it home, however, were the empty stomachs which might not venture out into the cold to receive a hot meal.

The doors opened at 3:30 p.m. and slowly the guests arrived. Shivering, they entered the Fellowship Hall individually, in twos, and in family units. We fed 23 people--13 men, 5 women, and 4 children. Sarah, the infant, sat in the high-chair quite uninterested in mashed peas, looking longingly at the warm bottle of milk waiting for her.

There were no crises this afternoon. Sometimes there are, but today was quiet. The Fellowship Hall was filled with an air of shared fellowship. Workers and guests found common concerns. In the kitchen there was a sense of commitment to brothers and sisters less blessed than we--a willingness to witness faith cheerfully, lovingly, and caringly. Most of all, there was the determination to grant dignity to those for whom there is, perhaps, little dignity.

We said good-bye to the guests as they moved out into the cold winter's night. We cleaned up the kitchen and returned to our own warm, secure homes. We will not eat our own dinner tonight without first thinking of those for whom that meal we served was their only one of the day. We will not retire to our own beds without first thinking of our friends who have no beds. And, next month, on the first Tuesday, we will return to THE LORD'S TABLE to cook, and clean, and fellowship, and share.





#### What can you do?



- 1. Contact the President and ask for his intervention.
- 2. Use your network of influential friends and church members to overcome the U.S. administration's reluctance to "do what needs to be done," as requested by William Buckley, Ben's fellow captive.
- 3. Contact your legislators to press the U.S. administration to take action immediately.
- 4. Renew your initiative if you do not hear of his release within ten days.

Youth for Understanding (YFU), a nonprofit, nonsectarian, international, educational organization, is currently seeking families to host foreign exchange students between the ages of 15 and 18 who will be arriving in the United States from 23 countries during August, 1985, for an eleven month stay. #### "Dear All -

Well, I've been in-country for three months now. It seems as though I just stepped off the plane in 80° weather with my winter coat in hand.

I must say that it's quite difficult to summarize all the things I have seen, felt, and experienced since I've been here, but I can say that it has been most interesting. To walk into a culture so strange and feeling so naive - questioning all that's going on and receiving very few answers - it's both frustrating and exciting.

The town I m living in is called Zar Zor City. It's small - with its mud-made houses, tin rooves all crammed together which are separated by redsell to get a few pennies in the pocket to put a plate of rice and soup on the table. The people here are very friendly and just as curious about me as I am about them. They stare, they laugh, they point, they talk - but all in curiosity. At times, it gets old to have to shake the hand of everyone who walks by or say hello to every little child who runs up - as I told my smile, wave, shake hands and say hello to every stranger - but the difference is there are no people carrying cameras, just babies on their backs and water on their heads. But privacy is one thing you have to live without here in Liberia - as with Reagan in D.C.

I m teaching second grade and a fourth grade language arts class, and the children are wonderful. The nicest thing is that since there is so little being offered to them ordinarily, the smallest thing just makes them happy. That's where I really see the difference in the children. Their "toys" are made up of old tire frames and a stick to push or a can on a string. Give a child something like that in the States, and you can guess what kind of reaction you'd get! Everything's simple but very special.

When I first arrived, I was shocked to look around and see the way these people lived. In comparison to home, it makes the street people look like they live very well. But then I realized that these people know of no other way of life and so they are happy and content. Although they struggle, it's not a struggle that's new. It's their life! At home, we "struggle" to save enough for an '85 Mercedes, while here their "struggle" is of a totally different concept. I'm not knocking either way of life, but it's very interesting to see such a difference in the spectrum. It was never really apparent when looking through the National Geopraphic - now for me it's a reality, and it hings and not so much the things that depressed me ...or rather...upset me.

So, in time, and it's taken a lot of it, I feel like I ve re-opened my eyes instead of shut them. (I'm finally glad that I ve overcome all of that, too.)

Their is so much I could write about, but it would turn into a <u>nevel</u> plus I m still trying to sort all the newness of Africa myself. But I just wanted to write a quick note to you all and kind of give you a small idea of this Peace Corps life. It's not easy, it's a challenge, for sure, but the experience gained through this will be richer than anything in my life, and so here I am to struggle along with them and learn of them as they are of me. So - on the edge of Liberia I stay for the next two years!

I hope all is well in Potomac! I hope the days are full of fullfilment with you all.

#### BUILDING COMMITTEE PROGRESS REPORT

This is the first in a series of reports that we have planned to keep you advised of our activities and the current status of our building program. Following congregational and Session approval, we signed a formal contract for architectural services with the firm of Browne, Eichman, Dalgliesh and Gilpin, the firm which designed our present facilities and with which we have been working since the formation of our Facilities Committee.

Over the next several months, the architect will be preparing the final construction specifications and working drawings required to obtain bids for construction of our new wing. We plan to put our project out to bid late this year, when experience indicates that contractors are most anxious to obtain new work, and their bids are the most competitive. These bids will be analyzed and reviewed with the Session, and we will then call a Congregational Meeting to give you a full report and to discuss future actions.

To assist the architect, the Building Committe will be holding a series of meetings with various church groups to discuss such things as room finishes, storage, equipment and furniture requirements. These meetings will ensure that the architect fully understands how each of our new spaces will be used. We intend to involve as many of our members as possible in these discussions and hope you will help us with this important part of our work with the architect.

#### REPORT ON THE BUILDING FUND

Many thanks to all who pledged to our Building Fund. The pledge period began June 1, 1985 and will end May 31, 1988. Payments for architect's fees will be required shortly. Please make your payments on your pledge as you indicated so that we may meet our obligations on schedule.

### A REPORT TO THE CONGREGATION FROM THE STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

It is timely, as we approach the middle of the Fiscal Year of the Church, that we bring you up to date as to how our finances are doing compared with the Budget the Session presented last January.

First, let us discuss our giving. Based upon the data available through May, the total giving is running about 7% behind the rate at which gifts must be received to cover the \$200,430.00 budget. The most notable area of shortfall however, is in giving against pledges. It that area, we are almost \$17,000 short, or 19%! Experience tells us that late year giving usually brings us into line, but it does cause concern to see us fall so far behind, as we enter the Summer months.

In the area of Expenditures, due to Kerry Stolzfus' arrival in our pulpit in April, rather than at the start of the year, we are about \$10,000 below our projected expenditures for Pastoral Services. On the other hand, we did have Interim Minister Expenses for a few months into 1985 that we had not budgeted for, so some of the expenses simply show up in another account.

The Program Committees have done their usual good job of maintaining close control over their expenditures. The Property Committee in particular is to be commended for its excellent job in managing the renovation of the Manse, and with the cooperation of Dr. and Mrs. Stolzfus, has been able to put the house in comfortable condition for a very reasonable sum. Some additional work will need to be done at the Manse, and we will report on that work later.

Let me add, in conclusion, it is my feeling that with God's help, the Potomac Presbyterian Church is poised on the threshold of a great period of growth in both numbers and ministry. The construction of the new wing will provide facilities that will allow us to do things in this parish that we have not yet dreamed of, and we are already witnessing the start of the things Kerry and Diane can lead us toward.

However, all of this needs the support of the Congregation in the terms of Time, Talent, and Treasure. You have responded well to the Capital Construction Appeal made earlier this year, now in the Fall, we will need to consider together our individual response to God's gifts to us. We will be bringing the 1986 Stewardship Program before you early in the Fall, and I urge you to begin to prayerfully consider your role in the expanded programs of our Church.

Thank you for your attention, and I hope you have an enjoyable Summer.

#### Retters...we get letters

**CC** Dear PPC Friends,

We have just completed a fantastic week in the North West Frontier Province. We stayed a few days in Peshawar - just 26 miles from the Khyber Pass leading into Afghanistan and Kabul. Needless to say, we didn't travel on that road.

Peshawar is a real frontier city with lots of Afghan refugees adding to the

native population.

In contrast, it has one of the finest museums in Pakistan, containing an outstanding collection of Buddhist art of the Gandhara period. We were fortunate to meet the director of the museum who explained about the origin of the northern school of Buddhism which started here and traveled across northern India, China, Korea, and Japan.

The city has an old section where many bazaars contain just about anything you want to buy. We now have quite a collection in copper and brass - both old and new. Nancy was able to add to her blue and white porcelain collection. The British built the new section with lots of wide avenues, parks and lovely homes and colleges.

Our main reason for the trip was to visit Chitral (north of Peshawar) and the surrounding valley where the Aga Khan Health Services is carrying out an iodine supplementation program. Goitre is very common because of the lack of iodine, and UNICEF has supplied the iodine oil to be given to women up to 45 years and children up to 19 years. The lack of iodine causes mental retardation and cretinism.

Jack has been asked to help advise the AKHS in redesigning the delivery of health care in these remote areas. It will be challenging and hard to carry out, but as usual, he is very excited about the project. This, of course, is in addition to his work at the medical college which will increase in September when the third class is admitted. The new class is being doubled to 100 which, along with moving into the new building, should cause mass confusion.

At the same time, the teaching hospital will open and plans are being made for the inauguration of the whole complex. H.H. the Aga Khan will attend this ceremony in November, which should be absolutely spectacular.

I just finished serving as acting director for five weeks while Winnie Warkentin was on leave in Canada. It was a busy time, but I enjoyed the work and had a chance to get to know the students and staff better.

The new class of nursing students started their 2½-month orientation on July 1. This summer, I will be helping with curriculum planning. If we don't find someone to teach psychiatric nursing, Winnie and I will probably do that starting in September.

We are enjoying our new home - filling it with Pakistani artifacts. As long as the water and electricity continue, we are able to survive the heat. The monsoons started this week.



#### PERMANENT RELATIONSHIP ESTABLISHED WITH SCOTTISH CHURCH

At the September meeting of the Potomac Session, it was moved, seconded and carried that:

Whereas the Youth Fellowship groups from PPC of Potomac, Md., and South Parish Church of Girvan, Scotland, have together initiated a Faith Share association, [it is (MSC)] that PPC promote a Sister Church relationship with South Parish Church, and through maintaining frequent communication and providing joint fellowship opportunities, extend and nourish the fait share experience to the youth and adults of both congregations.

At the September meeting of the Session of South Parish Church in Girvan a similar motion was made and passed unanimously, thereby joining our two congregations in a permanent relationship. In her letter to John Cowie, Clerk of Session, South Parish Church, Joyce Jenkins, Clerk of Session, PPC wrote:

"It has been obvious that the bond begun last summer with the visit of your young people to our church was greatly strengthened during the visit of our youth and advisors to your church this July. We look forward to enlarging the circle of faith and friendship, not only through additional exchange visits but through shared events and correspondence. We are confident that as we expand our faith through this partnership, we will individually deepen our own personal commitment.

Both Diane Kramer and Robert Cook, who co-ordinated the exchange visits of the youth groups, enthusiastically endorse broadening the concept of FAITH SHARE to include both congregations. In a joint letter to each of their Sessions, Diane and Robert wrote:

"We envisage this FAITH SHARE Partnership as realized through such things as:

the exchange of our monthly church newsletters shared communication between our women's groups exchanges between the children of our respective Sunday Schools shared congregational life through exchange of tapes, slides, etc. future member exchanges (adult, youth, individual families).

Our own experiences these past two years were too rich to be unique, and we would hope that our enthusiasm will inspire you to commit to this FAITH SHARE Partnership program."

In the near future the FAITH SHARE Committee will be appointed and will begin to function, both to plan future exchanges, and also to serve as the arm of PPC which will co-ordinate the ways in which the life of our congregation is shared with that of South Parish Church. 



#### ADULT PROGRESSIVE DINNER



#### THE LEGEND OF THE CHRISTMAS LUMINARIA



Legends and superstitions of many kinds surround the Christmas season, some purely Christian in origin and some rooted in ancient traditions of the winter solstice. In earlier times, no one doubted that every living thing shared in the wonder of the Nativity.

Since those early times, Christmas candles shine in churches and homes to remind us that on this night Christ, who is the light of the world, was born.

In homes, lights shine on the Christmas trees and among the decorations. Many people put lighted candles in their windows, originally from the lovely notion that in this way the Christ child might be guided through the darkness to their home or church.

In New Mexico, small fires are lit on Christmas Eve outside the houses and lighted candles, fixed in sand-filled containers adorn the roofs, walls, walks, and driveways all to light the way for the Christ child.
