As a result of the congregational meeting held December 8, 1985, a contract has been signed with National Asbestos Removal, Inc. to remove and replace those ceiling areas within our present structure which contain asbestos. This action may be considered a preventive and corrective measure since asbestos monitors have not indicated any measurable hazard to this time. However, the removal will require that the entire church building be closed for a period up to, but not exceeding 3 weeks, beginning January 6, 1986. 





SENIOR PASTOR'S STUDY LEAVE

From Sunday evening through Wednesday, February 9-12, I participated in the second of a three-phase program called Clergy in Transition sponsored by National Capital Presbytery. The purpose is to help new clergy in the presbytery make the transition to a new pastorate.

In the first phase we explored the dynamics of what it means to be a new leader in a congregation. We talked about getting to know the members of the church, establishing good patterns for ministry, and learning the history of the congregation. The Session will remember the latter as a meaningful and enjoyable experience at our January meeting. Getting to know some of our peers in ministry and building a support group is another ingredient in the program.

In the second phase we concentrated on discovering our leadership styles and methods of dealing with conflict. We also worked on case studies of actual ministry experiences, and shared insights that would help us to be more effective. Throughout both sessions we worshipped together and sought to deepen our own spiritual lives. Our spouses were included and encouraged to develop their own support system.

In the final phase, April 13-16, we will concentrate on the role of the clergy in encouraging and enabling lay ministry.

This is a very fine program and one in which our presbytery is genuinely engaged in caring for its congregations and pastors. I am grateful for the opportunity to participate and look forward to the fruits of this experience in our ministry together.

On Monday, February 17, our ELDERS AND DEACONS MET TOGETHER to discuss the ministry of our congregation. This is the first time that our two boards of ordained officers have sat down together to share reflections and dreams concerning the work we share here at PPC. Some of the areas of focus were: priorities for 1986; how our congregation is or is not accepting of each member; areas of our ministry which need more attention. Under these large umbrellas, discussions evolved which covered all the program areas of our church. It was a rewarding evening—time well spent—for the officers, and for the whole of our work together.

PULLDING COMMITTEE FROGRESS REPORT

Test borings of the soil where we hope to build our new wing indicated that the underlying soil is mainly loose fill. Despite this delay, contractors' bids are due Fegruary 27, and we hope to schedule a congregational meeting before May 1, 1986 to give you a complete report and request approval to award a contract.

Your Stewardship, Finance & Personnel Committee wishes to keep the congregation informed with regard to the financial condition of PPC.

We are pleased to report that the financial condition of PPC is sound. As we move into a new and exciting church year, we sense enthusiastic and positive support for our ministry and program.

A brief clarification of our 1985 financial picture may be helpful. In reviewing the year just passed, the Session realized that the projection of income was slightly optimistic. However, interms of pledges, with \$3,162 in 1985 pledges received this year, the congregation sustained its long tradition of meeting its commitments. Pledge income closed out at 98% of its total; we simply overestimated other giving--a sum always difficult to forecast.

Projected income for 1986 indicates a very enthusiastic response, with pledges increased 19% over the previous year, enabling the church to expand its mission support. We have estimated other giving conservatively, simply projecting on the basis of actual giving in 1985. The following is a summary of projected income for this year:





CLASS OF '85 CHILI SUPPER serves 4-5

1 Toil

1 LB. lean ground beef

1 medium onion

1 1 LB. can chili flavored pinto beans (for warm chili) or kidney beans (for mild chili)

1 pkg. McCormick brand chili seasoning mix salt to taste

Add beef and onion to oil in large saucepan or pot. Cook until onion is tender and beef is brown; drain off excess fat. Stir in McCormick's seasoning mix and tomatoes. BANANA PUDDING

vanilla cream sauce:
3/4 cup sugar
2 T flour
3 T cornstarch
1/4 t salt
1 pint wilk
2 egg yolks, beaten
1 t butter or marg.
2 t vanilla extract



2-3 bananas vanilla wafers non-dairy topping (Cool Whip)

Mix sugar, flour, cornstarch, and salt in top of a double boiler, add milk slowly and cook over fire to boiling. Place over hot water and cook 20 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Add eggs and butter (or marg.) and cook 2-3 minutes. Remove from heat, stir in extract, and cool to barely warm.

Crumble layer of wafer crumbs in 8x8" or similar size dish. Pour swall amount of vanilla sauce over crumbs; slice a banana and arrange over sauce layer. Pour thin layer of sauce over banana slices. Crumble another layer of wafers over the sauce. Slice another banana and arrange over crumbs. Top with remaining sauce and spread with spatula to cover all banana slices. Arrange whole wafers around dish with flat side of wafers against dish and gently press down to touch bottom of dish. Top with Cool Whip. Garnish with additional wafer crumbs. Refrigerate. May keep in refrigerator up to 4-6 hours. After that length of time, bananas may darken.





CONSTRUCTION REPORT

BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

After the long months of planning and waiting, we have finally reached the exciting phase of our building program.

The renovation work in our existing wing and the construction of the choir loft are progressing, and we hope to be able to begin using these new facilities by October 1, 1986. To facilitate the use of these areas as soon as possible, we have told the contractor to give priority to completion of the new office spaces. This will allow us to move the staff out of the lower level classrooms so that they can again be used for Sunday School classes. Our next priorities are completion of the library/resource center and, finally, the new church parlor.

We are also anxious to start using the new choir loft as soon as possible. Therefore, we have asked the contractor to concentrate on the completion of the new construction work before scheduling the repainting of the balance of the sanctuary and the installation of new carpeting.

Construction of the new wing is well underway, and within the next three to four weeks the exterior walls should be completed and the floor slab should be poured.

We realize that the construction work has made it necessary to cancel or make special arrangements in order to continue several important church programs, and we would like to express our appreciation for your understanding and cooperation in dealing with these unavoidable problems.

TEMPORARY RELOCATION OF SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASSES

In light of the continued use of the lower level classrooms by the church staff, it will be necessary to relocate temporarily our Sunday School classes when our new church year begins on September 7. On September 7, and continuing through September 28, classes for pre-schoolers through Senior Highs will meet next door at Potomac Elementary School. We have been allocated ample space for our needs, and while there is another church using part of the building, we will not share space with them. (The nursery and Adult Class will meet at Potomac Presbyterian Church.)

THEREFORE, BEGINNING SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 7, AT 9:45 A.M., drop your children at the front door of Potomac Elementary School. They will be escorted to their rooms and will be escorted across the parking lot at 10:45 A.M. to our facility for Worship. Enrichment during the worship hour will be held in our own building.

It is the hope of the Christian Education Committee that our temporary relocation will cause minimal disruption to our program. We are looking forward to kicking off the new church year on September 7. The teachers are ready, the students are ready, and the building will soon be ready. Whatever your age, plan to come and join us . . . there is a place for EVERYONE!!!!!!!

WHERE YOUR GIFTS PROVIDED BLANKETS IN '85 (PPC has participated in the "Blanket Offering" for several years.)

- --- Blankets valued at \$680,420 were distributed to drought victims in Ethiopia.
- --- 25,000 blankets were given to the survivors of the volcano eruption in Colombia.
- --- Flood victims in Pennsylvania, Virginia, and West Virginia received 8,500 blankets.
- ---\$50,000 was contributed toward the purchase of blankets for the survivors from the earthquake in Mexico City.
- --- 500 blankets were distributed to the elderly in Mauritius.
- --- 2,800 blankets were provided for refugees in Gaza, Israel.
- --- 11,700 blankets were donated to persons involved in food-for-work projects in Brazil.
- --- Refugees from Central American unrest received 1,000 blankets in Costa Rica.

Community Ministry of Montgomery County (CMMC)

The CMMC Council Meeting held on September 11 was spent replicating for the commissioners the benefits of a retreat, which the CMMC Executive Committee had experienced in August. The objective of this "retreat" time was to refresh the commissioners and, through the commissioners, the participant organizations in their understanding of what their Christian call and mission may be, both personally and corporately. Identified as primary goals of CMMC were direct service to those in need but also advocacy on behalf of those individuals.

A number of exciting ideas were suggested at the meeting. Certainly we will hear more about them through the year.

The idea of a volunteer index or catalog to allow individuals to volunteer on an occasional basis their time, talents, or skills to help those in need may become reality. Each of you will be offered the opportunity to be "on call" to help others based upon referrals through CMMC.

On a larger scale, CMMC affirmed its support for obtaining a World Vision grant to carry on the work of St. Stephens' ministry, a program which sponsors giving assistance on a pairing basis to those in need. Participants choose families or individuals to establish a helping relationship with and to advocate for them so as to improve individual or family life. Currently, there are ministry teams from seven participant churches.


