I've been called many things over the years. When I began as an associate pastor in Tennessee I was sometimes called "the little preacher". Other names have been "Rev", "Pastor", "Dr. Kerry" (by a young child), "theologian", "friend", and "leader". I imagine I've been called other names which I was not meant to hear.

More often than not I am called by my first name, perhaps because my last name is so difficult to pronounce. But I've never been called a "broker".

Bob Hudnut in his book, This People, This Parish, says a minister is called to broker God. find myself in a home, an office, a hospital, a school. Why am I There is only one reasonto broker the transcendent.

Hudnut reminds me that we all live in the dimension of self which we call psychology. We all live in the dimension of others which we call sociology. We all live in the dimension of the world around us which we call ecology. But we do not all live - at least consciously - in the dimension of God which we call theology.

As a broker, it is the minister's task to mediate God to bring the divine dimension to bear on the other three.

You can help - by asking questions. Ask me, how do I see God at work in whatever it is that is happening. And tell me, too, this is what I see God doing and what I hear God saving.

A broker - maybe there is something in

that name.

WORSHIP (Mary Reichley & Bob Crozier): works with the church staff to provide a vital worship program for the congregation; coordinates all programs and activities that contribute to worship; gives special attention to educating and involving the congregation in worship.

PEACEMAKING— They Really Are Asking For Our Opinion!

"They" in this case refers to the PC(USA) Advisory Council on Church and Society who is preparing a policy statement on peacemaking for consideration by the 1988 General Assembly. Issues being addressed include the appropriateness of non-payment of a portion of taxes calculated as supporting military programs and the usefulness of the "Just War Theory" in the nuclear age. The Council decided that such questions are so important that it would be useful to the General Assembly if congregations were asked to offer advice.

To collect such advice and insights, an educational method called "Advocacy Ethics" is being used. In this method, a position is defended in such a way as to bring out a variety of opinions about the position. A study paper entitled "Presbyterians and Peacemaking: Are We Now Called to Resistance?" was prepared by two members of the Advisory Council to elicit discussion and written comments from congregations.

The issues involved are important and it is likely that some PPC members have strong opinions on the various "resistance" measures addressed in the study paper. Your PPC MISSION COMMITTEE considered the possible devisive nature of debating this subject but we concluded that we have a moral responsibility to state what we believe. Furthermore, at our meeting on February 16, 1987, we decided that every PPC member should have the opportunity to express his opinions (verbally or in writing) during the development of our PPC response. If you want to participate, please tell Diane Kramer, John Lytle, or call Shea Johnson at the church by March 15 so we can order you a copy of the study paper and a separate document which rebuts much of what is presented in the study paper.

Some of us have complained in the past about positions adopted by our General Assembly. We now have a chance to state our views and possibly influence what happens. Whether you choose to work with us or not, your prayers for our deliberations are sincerely requested.

It's Suicide/It's Peace

Suicide accounts are always tragic copy in our newspapers and magazines, but are never more so than in recent weeks when we have been faced - almost daily - with news of yet another teenage suicide. A friend observed to me last week as we discussed the death of the young people in Bergenfield, New Jersey, "...we are killing our kids!" I assume he meant that the adults of our society are allowing the pressures of our fast and furious pace of life to render our children incapable of living. This is, I pray, an oversimplification. Suicide is always the result of many different problems, never just one. Pressures accumulate from all sides. Yet, it is true that teenagers today are being forced to forge their own values and make important decisions about such matters as sex and drugs at a younger age. How do we as parents and as the extended family of faith equip our young people to face the life which we have given them? What do we teach them and what do we model for them?

Someone remarked to me that our congregation seems always to be "breathless". We are always running to keep up with our next activity. Obviously, some of this frenetic pace is a result of the nature of running a volunteer organization in which many different schedules must be accommodated. On the other hand, some of our breathlessness comes from our over-extension - we try to do too much and then scold ourselves when we have not excelled in all.

I am struck by the contrast of our breathlessness with the sense I have of the peace in which Christ lived out his life and ministry. Christ did not walk away from controversy and did not refuse to deal with very problematic situations, yet Christ taught and modeled an inner peace to which I believe each of us is called

as we live our Christian lives. I was reminded of this yesterday by our friend Robert Cook, pastor of our partner congregation in Girvan, Scotland. In answer to a question I had asked him in my last correspondence, Robert pointed me to Colossians 3:15:

"The peace that Christ gives is to guide you in decisions you make; for it is to this peace that God has called you together in the one body. And be thankful."

Thankful we are that we have each other and can depend upon each other. Peace in Christ <u>is</u> what we hope to teach and model for our children, but we must always test that. Soon we will be planning our church's ministry for the new program year. In what specific ways can our ministry equip us to meet the needs of our community of faith and at the same time proclaim the good news of our Lord Jesus Christ? In what ways can the ministry we plan model the "peace of Christ"?

These are questions which need our prayerful attention . . . and action.


Building

REFLECTIONS

FROM THE REV. LON DRING, EXEC. DIR., COMMUNITY MINISTRY OF MONTGOMERY COUNTY

(Recently a small group of concerned Christians organized by the Office of Social Development in Washington talked about taxes with Senator Larry Levitan, Chairman of the Senate Committee on Budget and Finance. Following are some of Lon's reflections upon this conversation.)

You wonder as you sit talking to a State legislator what is the sense to him of the idea of caring in a primary way for society's weak. (The newspapers recently told of \$10,000-a-plate PAC breakfasts for members of Congress and of Justice Department delays - fourteen years! - in enforcement of requirements of available drinking water and toilet facilities for migrant workers.)


I tried to come up with some reasons I might give to a government leader for making primary civil policy the care of the needy. I came up with four

- Compassion, real care for others, is the social cohesion without which there would be no society. It is not irrelevant, sentimental rubbish, the illusion of bleeding heart liberals. It is the most realistic, practical stuff, and we ought to be able to claim compassion as a compelling political argument. We care for our poor, because that's the kind of people we are and want to be.
- Care for the marginalized and deprived members of the community in our own self-interest because we ourselves are so vulnerable. We are not really self-made; we need each other. Tomorrow, it may be we who are elderly, chronically ill, or jobless. An American University professor was serving a meal in a D.C. soup kitchen with fellow (CMMC) church members and one of his former graduate school students appeared in line.
- It is a matter of the self-interest of society. Our investments of energy, time and capital - whether in stocks, bridges, or schools - are justifiable only because they benefit people and make them more happy, able, productive contributors to the community (and the more people touched and helped the better). Direct investment in people is an obvious good; indirect investment through other things may be better in the long run but that approach ought to bear the burden of proof. We forget that the poor are people; they are not burdens but promises. They are where life is and where our future lies.
- 4. Equality, while it is certainly not an absolute standard is a moral norm and an indicator of social health. The vast inequalities of income and wealth among us today are signs of serious social sickness and must be of very serious concern to leaders who have our society at heart.

20 th CENTURY PRESBYTERIANISM

Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary has received a grant from the Lilly Endowment, Inc. for a 3-year study of American Presbyterianism in the 20th century. This study is triggered in part by the dramatic membership loss in the Presbyterian Church during the last 20 years, a pattern characteristic of mainstream Protestant denominations. Presbyterians have been a declining percentage of the American population since the 1920's, but in the last two decades membership has declined by approximately one-third.

This study will also focus on theological developments in American Presbyterianism during the 20th century and the church's changing relationship to American culture. It will also investigate the history of the organizational strength and vitality of the Presbyterian Church as it sought to carry out its mission activities.

The results of the research will be communicated through conferences and publications. We shall "stay tuned."

Mission:

COMMUNITY MINISTRY HIGHLIGHTS NEEDS. PPC has budgeted \$4,400 of our 1987 local mission budget for Community Ministry of Montgomery County (CMMC). Elsie and Calvin Reid are our representatives to CMMC and through them we are kept aware of various community needs.

ADEQUATE INCOME FOR THE POOR. One in ten Marylanders must depend on public assistance for survival. Maryland is the 7th richest state, but our welfare grants are 26th in the nation. Almost 200,000 recipients, mostly children, must live on cash grants and food stamps which together equal only 80% of what the Department of Human Resources estimates is necessary to live a minimally decent life. This year's state budget offers an increase of 15¢ per person per day.

FOOD. The Maryland Food Committee estimates that now 700,000 Marylanders are at risk of lacking food each month. Church food pantries and soup kitchens have increased dramatically in response to the need. There are 25,000 frail, home-bound elderly, chiefly in the counties, who cannot get home-delivered meals, due to a shortage of federal funds. There was no increase for elderly meals or grants for food distribution in the state budget.

HOUSING AND SHELTER. Maryland's lack of low income rental housing has reached crisis proportions. It is estimated that by 1990 there will be a shortage of about 39,000 units for families with incomes under \$10,000. This situation results in overcrowding and homelessness. On any given night, 1,900 homeless people cannot find shelter in this state. Most of the homeless - 58% - are under 30 years old, 28% are intact families, and there are increasing numbers of working poor among the homeless. The state has budgeted \$32 million to provide more low income housing units, supportive housing for the frail elderly, but another \$26 million is needed.

EMPLOYMENT. Today at least 100,000 Marylanders who want to work cannot find jobs. Minorities. female heads of households and youth are hardest hit. Federal dollars for job training have fallen dramatically. Low skill, entry level jobs are those most needed. The Investment in Job Opportunities program is a joint effort of the business, economic development and social services community to create jobs, help welfare recipients obtain and retain employment while providing supportive services to clients. The state provides \$5 million to serve about 850 welfare recipients but an additional \$10 million is needed.


heifer project

The Heifer Project International (HPI) was founded 40 years ago by Dan West on the conviction that the best way to achieve peace is by fostering international understanding, defending the dignity of every individual great or small, and insuring that every family has the means to provide food and a livelihood for itself. After World War II, HPI sent hundreds of boatloads of heifers and other farm animals to Germany and Japan as a symbol of desire for reconciliation. Since then, food-producing animals have gone to farm families in 105 different nations and 31 states in the U.S.

In 1986, a volcanic crater lake exploded in the northwest Province of Cameroon, Central Africa, and emitted toxic gases which killed more than 2000 inhabitants and over 4000 cattle in surrounding villages. HPI has initiated a project in cooperation with the Presbyterian Church in Cameroon to restock some of the dairy cattle to these families who are dependent on a daily milk supply for their traditional diet. The project includes a two-week training course in intensive dairy management for the farm families. Participants obtain animals on the condition that they pass on the first female offspring.

John Dieterly, Jr., the Mid-Atlantic Director of HPI, has asked National Capital Presbyterians for their help as the project gets underway. He is asking for \$10,000 to \$20,000 to help them get started on shipping the cattle from Kenya. If you can help, please send contributions to:

I picked up a book recently by Gregory Stock entitled The Book of Questions. The author's intention is to provide a provocative way to stimulate conversation and provide a tool for self discovery.

A few examples: "Given the choices of anyone in the world whom would you want as your dinner guest?" "What is your most treasured memory?" "Are there people you envy enough to want to trade lives with them? Who are they?" "When did you last cry in front of another person?" "Is there something you've dreamed of doing for a long time? Why haven't you done it?"

Perhaps you might like to sit around the dinner table some evening in the closing days of summer and try to answer some of these questions. I don't know whether Stock has considered the spiritual implications of many of his questions, but I was drawn to that dimension.

For example, "For what in your life do you feel most grateful?"
Gratitude is at the heart of our relationship to God and the basis of true worship. Do we spend enough time identifying the particulars of our gratitude? As the old hymn says, "Count your many blessings, name them one by one." Once identified, how do we express our gratitude to others and especially to God? May your conversation be rich and your self discovery spiritually enlightening.





TOGETHER AT THE TABLE

CHILDREN IN THE CONGREGATION

The presence of children in the congregational worship of the Presbyterian Church (USA) is not new. Many of us grew up attending worship each week with our parents, or perhaps even remember snoozing on a grandparent's lap during the sermon! While some churches have, over the years, provided an "alternative activity" for children during the Worship Hour, at PPC we feel very strongly that

our children are to be welcomed and encouraged to participate in corporate worship. Our Creative Enrichment program is not designed to be "instead of" Worship but rather as a supplement to, and in many ways preparation for,

Worship.

On October 4, we will gather together at the Table - we will celebrate the sacrament of the Lord's Supper on what has been designated World Communion The sacrament of the Lord's Supper is closely tied to the sacrament of Baptism, to the preaching of the Word, to the meaning of Christian discipleship, indeed, to the whole fabric of Christian worship and mission. It is most appropriate that we come to this celebration as the FAMILY of faith young and old. All who are baptized, who trust Jesus as their Lord and Savior, are invited to feast at the Table.

We know that children grow in their understanding of and commitment to the Christian faith through the nurture of parents and other caring adults. In turn, when children grow in the faith, those who nurture them grow as well, and we become more aware than ever before of how deeply our faith is a corporate, shared, "family" experience, and not simply an individual matter. We cannot prepare our children to receive the Lord's Supper without, in a profound way, preparing ourselves as well. When children and adults gather together at the Lord's Table, we are given a visible reminder of the truth that we belong to Christ's church, not because of how much we know or the good deeds we have done, but because God has brought us together as a family.

In preparation for our celebration on October 4, reflect together in your individual families on what it means to each of you to belong to a family. Share together memories of special meals which you have experienced together; times when you have gathered together at your own tables and given thanks. Then spend a few moments thinking of our family of faith; of how we belong to and celebrate our thankfulness for that which we experience in this

larger family.

In Scotland our friends sing a grace before meals which begins:

Come and dine, the Master calls us, Come and dine. We may feast at Jesus' Table all the time

On October 4, World Communion Sunday, we invite all who trust in our Lord to "come and dine." + + + + + + + + + + + + + + + +

STEEPLE TO PEOPLE

AN INVITATION FROM PASTOR STOLTZFUS

It is my conviction that the practice of stewardship is at the very center of our response to the Gospel. I believe we all need to listen to God's Word as we examine our response and prepare to re-affirm our commitments of time, talent and money.

Scripture passages are suggested for your reflection and prayer. Plan to spend at least twenty minutes daily. The setting aside of time for prayer and reflection is a stewardship issue itself. Find a place where you can be quiet and comfortable. Spend some time in quiet and be prepared for God to speak through His Word.

Some suggestions:

- + Read the passage slowly. Stay with any words or phrases that catch your attention.
- + You may want to write your reflections. Write a letter to God about the passage or a conversation between yourself and one of the characters in the passage. You might answer the question, "How are you trying to speak to me today, O God?"
- + Other questions for reflection: Did you feel any resistance to what the passage said to you? Did you feel called to any action? What did the Scripture say about your commitments of time, talent and/or money?
- + Make your prayer a time of inner dialogue with God about the insights, concerns or confusions the passage may have raised. You may want to conclude with the Lord's Prayer or a favorite Psalm.

On Sunday, November 1, we will be asked to make our stewardship commitment for 1988. It is my hope that our prayerful reflection through the month of October will greatly strengthen our response to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Of course I would welcome a call from anyone who would like to talk about his reflection on any of the Scripture passages.




