





RELATIONSHIP AND DISCOVERY

Our presentation included five resources available to all of us to help identify and claim God's will for us. They are: scripture, prayer, meditation, ourselves and others. As we moved through the day our discussion was enabled and enriched by everyone's willingness to share her own experiences of faith - truly a "faith share" day!

The next day I found myself experiencing in a very real way all that we "discussed" the day before. Waiting during a long and risk-filled surgery, we were so aware of how important those resources are to us. And, we experienced them. We felt the strength of our foundation in faith through the Word of God and through our time of prayer. But mostly we felt the strength of God's presence with us through the prayers and presence of others. In many ways that day became for me a "day of discovery."

The desire to know God's will is a gift to us. We are truly blessed when we claim that gift and fully realize that we are not alone; that we do not have to "make it" on our own. I believe that the will of God is not some mysterious set of sealed orders which we search for and receive if we happen to hit upon the right formula. Rather, the will of God is a relationship - a relationship in which God's purpose, his power, and his plan for our lives are disclosed. I also believe that this disclosure takes place when we are in relationship with one another.

My prayer for this year is that it will be one of relationship and discovery for each of us. Shalom!

GREETINGS

FROM THE BRYANTS

"On Christmas morning we attended the Karachi International Church. Helping to start a new church in an Asian country is a special experience; one that has helped us appreciate the ways in which a church can be socially and spiritually binding among people from many lands. Of the 65 attending, a third children, eleven languages were spoken: in singles, groups or by families each brought a Christmas message in Urdu, Uzbecki, Azerbyjani, Persian, Aramaic, Tagalag, Cebuano, Sindhi, Finish, Dutch, English. It was deeply moving, that people from so many ethnic and linguistic backgrounds, some refugees, some simply transients in Pakistan, even one a Muslim who had studied in Indiana and wanted to be with Christian friends on Christmas Day, would come together in a spirit of love and friendship, in a desire for peace and solidarity, and do so in this newborn church in the subcontinent of Asia.

Jack has been absorbed into a once-in-a-lifetime kind of assignment. In 1978, a major international conference was held in Alma Ata, USSR, resulting in the now famous goal of WHO-Health for All by the Year 2000. Now, ten years later, the Soviets will host another conference, to review progress and problems since Alma Ata. The conference will be in Riga, USSR, in March, 1988. Dr. Halfdan Mahler, Director General of WHO, asked Jack to write the background paper for the conference. The paper and the discussions in Riga will go into a document to serve as the basis for debate at the World Health Assembly in Geneva in May, 1988, leading to a resolution on what WHO and the member nations should do over the next ten years in pursuit of the goal of Health for All. 

I was reading about the new Jewish Reconstructionist Congregation which worships in our sanctuary and one of the principles which guides their life as a community of faith. It is: THE PAST HAS A WEIGHTY VOTE, BUT NOT A VETO. We might wish to adopt a similar stance as we celebrate our 25th anniversary and anticipate the future.

ADULT EDUCATION Make It R Habit

Habit is a human characteristic that has both good and bad features. Smoking, for example, is one of the questionable habits that many people try to drop, with mixed success. Attending Adult Education sessions on Sunday morning is another activity that can become habit forming, if you give it a chance!

Before the construction program deprived us of a suitable place to hold our classes, we had gathered a growing group of folks. The discussions were generally stimulating, and we hope informative on a range of subjects of interest to Christians in the penultimate decade of the 20th Century.

Unfortunately, the time required for the construction of the new facilities has taken its toll and many of the people who had been regular attenders have "shaken" the habit and no longer come to hear what we have to present. (I bet you wondered how I was going to tie habit back in!)

Now that things are back in order, the Adult Education Committee has been working hard to produce an interesting and varied program of discussions and presentations. Last year we had a series attempting to trace the common roots that connect Christians, Jews, and Muslims back through Father Abraham, and try somehow to gain some understanding of the bitter enmity between the Muslim world and the nation of Israel, in spite of our common ancester. This year we are continuing to delve into issues where it makes a difference to be Christian. We have just completed a two-week discussion of the Central American problem, where the Protestant Church is a leading force for change, and where our denomination has taken a controversial position with which some Presbyterians disagree. We will begin a series on

what Presbyterians believe, lasting through Lent. After Easter, Dr. Donald Miller will join us to lead us through the significance of the post-ressurection appearances of Jesus. Dr. Miller is an old friend, and it is always a privilege to have him with us.

At the request of some members a second track was established that devotes itself to Bible study using the excellent Kerygma course resource materials. This program offers an alternative opportunity to enrich your life by studying thematically how God relates to his people through the Scriptures. Anyone interested is welcome to begin at any point in the theme study.

As the newly appointed chairman of the Adult Education Committee, I would like to invite all the members of the Church to attend one or the other of the classes we offer. We are not limited to two, and if an interest develops that will take us into other paths of study, we now have virtually unlimited capacity to accommodate whatever you want to pursue. Regular Sunday School classes are available for the children at the same time, and it is easy to join us while they are in their own classes.

One more tie back to the "habit" theme. I especially urge those of you who were once regulars in the past to make an effort to give the "New Program" a try. You may find it easy to reacquire the old habit. We will be happy to see you.

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

${f REFLEGTIONS}$

As a part of the celebration of our 25th anniversary, your Editor has invited former pastors to share their reflections in your newsletter about their time in Potomac. We begin with Dr. James K. Leitch, our founding pastor.

"It will be different," I said to Helen upon my return to Garden City, NY, from a visit to meet with a committee of Presbytery and representatives of tht families from Potomac who were petitioning Presbytery to start a new rch. How little I knew how different!

For thirteen years I had been directing the establishing of new congregations - 854 of them, the making of grants and loans for property purchases, manse purchases and the erection of buildings. My last pastorate was in a 1200 member congregation with a very formal building, multiple choirs and a 300 member church school. Now, there would be no congregation, no building, not even a name.

The first problem was where to live. Presbytery's limit of \$30,000 meant no realtor was interested in spending time with us. Finally, after a fruitless search in Potomac, a developer in Rockville agreed to let us rent a house in Rockville intended as a sales model. It was on Gainsboro Road, off Seven Locks. Thirty more houses were under construction. Little did we know that work on Churchill High School was to begin that summer with the levelling of a hill which meant literally hundreds of truckloads of dirt would pass our house, totalling destroying our ungaraged Chevy convertible. Months later, after hearing on the 11:00 evening news that the County Health Officer was moving to California, two of us went to his house early the next morning to talk about buying the house before he contacted a realtor. It became the first manse at 9300 Marseille Drive. Although it had no central air conditioning, very little insulation, and was also part of a development, at least it was closer to Potomac. Besides, across the street was a pond where we delighted in watching giant turtles, a heron and a muskrat in their daily rounds. (continued on page 7)

At the March 3, 1988, Woo Board meeting, the nominating committee reported no luck in recruiting new officers. Therefore, the Board reluctantly voted to recommend to the members and to the Fellowship Committee that the formal organization of the WOC be disbanded. The Board also recommends that the assets of approximately \$7000 be allocated as follows:

Gaithersburg Help \$200, Rainbow Place (women's shelter) \$250, Montgomery County Ministries \$500, Hospice \$200, Stepping Stones (family shelter) \$200, Elizabeth House (unwed mothers) \$200, Sunnyside (Presbyterian Retirement Home) \$200, Medical Benevolence Foundation \$500, for a total of \$2,250 plus \$300 to the Presbyterial Birthday Offering which this year supports Stillman College and Women's Prisons, making the total for Mission giving \$2,550. \$1200 will be held for seed money for the Potomac area church's thrift shop project. In the event that doesn't become a reality, the money would go to our Mission Committee for disbursement. The remainder of the money will be kept in the Fellowship budget earmarked for kitchen equipment.

The Board hates to see many of its programs end and hopes that some of them will continue under the auspices of various standing committees of Session. For example: luncheons and outings -Fellowship Committee; casseroles for Rainbow Place, birthday cakes for Collingswood Nursing Home, stamp collecting - Mission Committee: Women's Retreat - Christian Education Committee.

We are comforted by the hope that some if not all of our programs will survive. We have not teen discouraged by small attendance at our events, but we feel that the lack of people willing to lead makes this necessary.

Potomac was a delightful countryside close to teeming civilization. On the masthead of its newsletter was the phrase "We're against Progress" which meant "no water and no sewers" because they would bring development. Few of the homes had yards because it was "horse country" and white fances enclosed from "two acres up" to provide pasture for beloved horses. The new pastor soon learned that few houses had doorbells.

Our meeting place was the all-purpose room in the elementary school - far too large for our early groups of twelve to twenty - far too bare for any feeling of warmth - a real challenge to someone who had been away from the pulpit, except for special occasions, for thirteen years and, before that, had always been buttressed by the "necessary" church accessories like pulpit, communion table, organ, and accomplished choirs.

Our meetings were held in homes. Our social life centered, for the most part, at the Hunt Club with housewives bringing luscious covered dishes. The manse family room became the choir room once a week; the double garage was converted into a study/office, committee room, and Session room. Helen tended the children whose parents had come to the various meetings in the space "in-between". Five afternoons each week were devoted to door-to-door calls and we became familiar with names like Turkey Foot, Persimmon Tree, sworthy, Travilah, Glen, Seneca, Piney Meeting House, Stoney Creek, Sandy Landing, etc.

Perhaps the greatest joy came from the teen response. Our youth group of fifteen to twenty-five met from six to nine every Sunday evening. That length of time enabled us to build friendships and led many parents to become involved, too. We still hear from some of those "kids" - many are now parents and send us pictures of their kids!

Finally, came the organization, in December of 1963 and the election of elders. Now we were structured but what a shaky structure it was before inexperience finally grew into experience. A search for property for the church eventually resulted in a gift of three acres which had been "off the tax roll" for years due to "faulty soil" but might be used pending the inevitable arrival of the dreaded sewers. What a joy it was to break ground in June of 1966 and to watch the construction of the building, to hold the first service - Holy Communion on Maundy Thursday, to perform the first wedding on Saturday, and to celebrate Easter Sunday with a spectacular attendance of 296. Then came the dedication on the last Sunday of April 1967 which also marked our retirement from the active ministry. What a joy it is to have helped with the groundwork for what has become a truly vital church! Thanks be to God! -JKL

PARTHERS IN MISSION

Plans have been underway for some time by our Mission Committee to join hands in mission with the congregation in which our members, Jack and Nancy Bryant, are participating while living in Karachi, Pakistan. The desire of our committee members is to put some of our mission dollars to work in global concerns, yet to have some first-hand knowledge of how those dollars are being used. Jack and Nancy have been involved, through the International Church of Karachi, in efforts to relieve some of the suffering among the poor of Karachi. They are involved in health "ministry" professionally, and through ICK have identified specific ways in which our two congregations might work to alleviate some of the deprivation so rampant in that part of the world.

We have now made our first commitment. A check in the amount of \$500 was recently forwarded to the Mission Committee of ICK and will be used in the following ways:

\$100 will provide funds for 25 patients at the Mary Adelaide Leprosy Center for personal spending money for a one year period. The Mary idelaide Leprosy Center is a highly responsible and effective church related organization that looks after lepers all over Pakistan. There is a need for small amounts of spending money so the patients with advanced disease who cannot support themselves and who need to be able to buy toothpaste, reading materials and pay for simple transport to visit with friends or family in the city, can do so.

\$300 will establish a loan fund that will enable 5 to 10 women to borrow the money needed to buy a sewing machine or loom, thus providing a means to earn a living. (This fund will rotate loans, thus providing more to many).

\$100 will provide seed money for a fund which will be matched by community people to meet basic shelter needs of a few families. Shelter improvement for the truly destitute is almost impossible. Some have neither a roof nor even a blanket to provide shelter.

In their letter to our Mission Committee, the members of the Finance, Benevolences and Missions Committee of ICK wrote:

You will see that we are involved in mission giving mainly to the very poor, where the need is great, and we give to people of all faiths — Christian, Muslim, Hindu. Where possible, we give through grass roots community leadership and/or organizations, and we try to give in a manner that promotes self reliance and dignity, and therefore often with some sharing of costs, or return of loans.

We look forward to this new shared ministry. We also look forward to the ways in which this ministry will come alive for our congregation. Jack and Nancy will be in Potomac this summer and promise to bring slides and perhaps a video, which will help us to see some of the results of our work as ...partners in mission.



"WEEP WITH THOSE WHO WEEP"

As I walked back to the house last Sunday and opened to the front page of the Washington Post, I was shocked to read of a church bus accident in Carrollton, Kentucky in which 27 people were killed. I immediately thought of Paul's words to the Romans when he encouraged Christians "to rejoice with those who rejoice and weep with those who weep" (Romans 12:15).

The papers continue to report details of the accident including indictment of the driver of the pickup truck on 27 counts of capital murder. The members and families of the Radcliff First Assembly of God Church struggle with profound grief and anger at this senseless tragedy. We may weep with these our brothers and sisters in Christ, persons we will probably never meet, and thus share God's love with them.

A number of the families of our own congregation have personally experienced similar tragedies and shared their gratitude for those who have been there to weep with them.

Beyond weeping, is it not time to work vigorously for ways to see that this kind of tragedy caused by drunk driving is eliminated from our highways?



WHAT EVER HAPPENED TO?

I am often asked what we do with the unsold rummage items. The children's clothing was sent to a Florida church for distribution to migrant workers. All other items were given to The American Rescue Workers. For 80 years, ARW has served the community with a combination of material and Christian aid. Over the years, their social programs have evolved; today their rehabilitation center provides employment and residential care to over 60 alcoholic men per day. Last year they opened a shelter for homeless women. ARW operates eight thrift stores in the DC area. Our rummage leftovers are repaired/ refurbished and sold thereby providing employment, rehabilitation, and money to support the residential centers. Everyone benefits! "The original church building had been completed in the spring of 1967. When I arrived in late summer the Session was ready to begin work on developing a church program. And as I reflect on it now, that's how I spent most of my time and energy for the next seven years. Aggregation to congregation is a never ending process in every church. While I was minister at Potomac our goal was to assist that process by developing the best parish program possible given the people and financial resources available to us. We succeeded in some areas and failed in others. Growth is sometimes painful, sometimes exhilarating. It was for us. We struggled with the debt service. We celebrated the success of the Seven Tens Program. There was a strong commitment to worship, but interest in, and support for, Presbyterian global mission was difficult to maintain. Yet all the while we were confident that God was working in us and through us. I believe that God blessed our work and our worship and that we all became more effective in our personal and corporate discipleship.

"Did the aggregation become a congregation during my years in Potomac? No, but we moved a bit closer toward that goal. God was good to us.

"Thanks for giving me this opportunity to reflect in writing about my years in Potomac. Happy Anniversary to all the Potomac Presbyterians!"

In Sunday, September 11, when the Worship Service returns to 11:00 a.m., we will be introducing a few changes in the Order of Worship. The organist will begin to play at ten minutes before the hour. At 11:00, one of the pastors will greet the congregation followed immediately by the prelude.

The Service of Friendship and announcements will follow the Children's Sermon and will be given by the pastor conducting that portion of the service.

A word should be said about the Service of Friendship. The signing of the Friendship Pad by all worshipers, both visitors and members, is a valuable part of the Worship Service. First, and foremost, it enables us to identify our visitors and gives us their addresses so that we may contact them following the service. It also helps the members to know who is sitting in the pew with them, be they visitors or new members whom you may not yet know. Please make sure that each of you signs the pad as it goes by and looks at it upon its return to familiarize yourself with those sitting with you. If a visitor happens to be sitting at the end of the pew where the booklet is located, please prompt him to start the process.

There will also be a quiet time during the silent prayer with no organ music.

The Worship Committee hopes that these changes will help to enrich the service for you.

REFLECTIONS

Continuing the celebration of our 25th year by publishing reflections from our former pastors, the following is a letter from Dr. David L. Uhl, our third senior pastor.

"We are told that in life timing is everything. How often have we heard someone remark that his success was a matter of 'being at the right place at the right time?' If you prefer it put in the poetic language of Shakespeare it comes out like this:

'There is a tide in the affairs of men, which, taken at the flood, leads on to fortune omitted. All the voyage of their life is bounded in shallows and miseries; and we must take the current when it serves, or lose our ventures.'

"Looking back on the time I spent at Potomac I realize how true those words are. Little did I know when I drove to my new home in Maryland near the end of December of 1975 what the next eight years would bring. There were so many questions which filled my mind and so few answers. As excited as I was to accept the call to be your Pastor I knew that it was not without risk. I remember Ed White's telling me that while the Potomac Church had had some difficulties, it had as much potential for ministry as any church in the Presbytery.

"Looking at the church today it's hard to remember that we struggled to pay the bills, depended on the Potomac Village Nursery School to keep us in the black and worried daily if we could heal wounds which remained. Yet there were so many of you who believed in the church, whose commitment was extraordinary and whose willingness to give of yourselves truly made the difference. (continued on page 2)

"As for me I am still amazed that I did happen to be 'at the right place at the right time.' Not leaving all of that to fate on blind chance we know in our faith the word for such events is Providence. God was truly at work in our life together and we were fortunate enough to realize a dream that so many had envisioned when the church was begun twenty-five years ago.



IS THERE A BOOK LOVER IN PPC?

Do you love books? Do you have several hours a month which are unscheduled? Perhaps you would be willing to combine those two factors and volunteer to help us with our PPC Library. Since our new Library was opened and organized many generous folk have donated volumes to our collection. There is a need now to go through our shelves and take an informal inventory, organize by subject and develop some possibilities for publicizing titles of interest to the congregation. This is the type of "job" which can be done on your own time or as a "team" effort. If you can help us with this part of our ministry, please call Diane Kramer.

". . .I was hungry and you gave me food. . ."

We are fast approaching two significant anniversaries for the PPC Mission program. On December 4, 1984, members of PPC -- along with members of St. Francis and Potomac United Methodist Church -- began a monthly commitment to THE LORD'S TABLE (a community "soup kitchen" in Gaithersburg). Each first Tuesday since that day PPC has been represented as hot meals are prepared and served. On our first day the guests numbered 37. Today THE LORD'S TABLE may feed as many as 100 a day. In 1984 most of the guests were men; today often the majority of guests are mothers and their children. Those who use THE LORD'S TABLE are not, for the most part, homeless; they live in low income housing and struggle each month to continue to keep a roof overhead -- often in lieu of food on the table. THE LORD'S TABLE is often the only hot meal the children have each day.

In February of 1985 a team of PPC'ers was organized to help staff MIRIAM' KITCHEN, a breakfast program housed at Western Presbyterian Church in D.C. Unlike THE LORD'S TABLE, this program caters almost exclusively to the homeless, the significant majority of which is male, and feeds up to 150 people each morning. Our volunteers met at Western Church at 6:30 A.M. on the first and third Mondays of each month and were finished with their duties and on to their jobs by 8:00. Our commitment to MIRIAM'S KITCHEN is now only the first Monday of each month, to provide 2-4 volunteers who, with volunteers from other churches, will set up the dining room, prepare breakfast and serve the guests.

Here are two opportunities for you! One allows you to volunteer during the afternoon, the other in the early morning before working hours. Our faithful team members need some relief -- even if only a month here and a month there. Below you will find the names of all the persons who have staffed these two feeding programs during the past four years. . . .ask them about their experience. . . . then, let us know if you are able to respond to this need. On Sunday evening, October 16, about 35 folks from our congregation, and the Adat Shalom reconstructionist Jewish congregation met with the intention of discussing the Presbyterian study paper "A Theological Understanding of the Relationship between Christians and Jews".

The paper has been the subject of study by our Adult Education group for the past three weeks. It presents a number of controversial positions vis a vis our Jewish neighbors, and the discussions have been vigorous. The Jewish congregation has had the paper for its consideration, and we were prepared for a discussion of the theology involved.

Rabbi Sidney Schwartz and Dr. Stoltzfus introduced the subject, and a discussion period followed. To our surprise, the subject of the paper was addressed only peripherally, and the heart of our conversation revealed the vast gulf of ignorance that exists on both sides, concerning the basics of our beliefs and practices, that makes mutual understanding very difficult.

For example, some of our Jewish friends were surprised that we place so much emphasis on the roots of our understanding of God as revealed in the Old Testament scriptures. Likewise, we were not aware of the real concern for the safety of Jews and Judaism in the penultimate decade of the 20th Century, even in the United States. Rabbi Schwartz said that while regular participation in worship by young Jews is declining, and assimilation into the American culture goes on, 98% of Jews feel a kinship with the State of Israel, and feel it to be important to the survival of Judaism. One man said to me after the formal meeting broke up that his family had lived for over 70 years in peace and prosperity in highly cultured Germany before Hitler and the subsequent Holocaust, so why should they not have some concern for their safety in the U.S.?

The first session was successful, our friends from Adat Shalom are very grateful for the use of our building for their services, and we appear to have a warm relationship developing between our two congregations. We will have another discussion evening with them again soon; I hope you will be interested and will participate at that time.







I invite you to "put your name on the line."


