



# KERRY ON ...

A er his arrest on cocaine charges last week, Mayor Marion Berry came to St. Timothy's Episcopal Church in Southeast on Sunday to make an emotional confession. He said in his public statement, "I have come face to face with my deepest human frailties. I have had to look my human weaknesses straight in the eye." Then his wife, Effie, said, "Marion, for you to admit to the world that you have a problem, that you need to deal with your problem to make yourself whole again, is truly a burden that has been lifted from our souls".

These words express profound spiritual truth and describe the path to healing and wholeness. Some would say, "Thank God, there but for the grace of God go I" and usually refer to someone caught up in wrongdoing. Wholeness for any of us, however, is not dependent upon avoiding being caught doing something wrong. It is rather defined by our willingness to admit failure and weakness and to seek help. King David, caught in a web of personal and political scandal, came to the point of admitting his failure and weakness. From there he was forgiven and reconciled to God and others. He wrote in the 51st Psalm,

"I acknowledge my transgressions, and my sin is ever before me. Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me."

May we all pray for the Mayor and for ourselves in the Spirit of to Psalmist that healing may come to Mr. Berry, our nation's capital and to ourselves.

## C.E. BAILEY-WICK

As I begin to "settle in" here at PPC, my thoughts turn more and more often to youth ministry. I feel as if I have just barely been able to begin knowing the young people here - and my initial reaction is that they're a really nice group of very busy kids. So...how do we as a congregation help them to be more fully involved in their church and in their faith?

In my reading I've happened upon a workbook entitled: "Guidebook for Youth Ministry in Presbyterian and Reformed Churches." I would like to share a portion of it with you.

We do youth ministry in order to lay the groundwork for young people to have a faith in Jesus Christ that is their own. As Presbyterians, we baptize infants and, as a congregation, promise to teach them about Jesus and God's love for them until they can make their own statement of faith. Youth ministry is the special ministry of the church that provides young people the opportunities to work out their questions, their commitments, and their opportunities to grow in faith. Whenever we are in youth ministry, we intend, in some way for the following elements to be present:

- 1. To call young people to discipleship in Jesus Christ.
- 2. To respond to the needs and interests of young people.
- 3. To work together in partnership, young people and adults.
- 4. To be connected to the whole church, community, and world.
- 5. To be inclusive of all young people.

How can we best fulfill these intentions here at PPC? It will take time, concern, and much effort on the part of both youth and adults here for this to happen. I'm eager to get to work with all of you.


# deacon of the month

# the message and mission of the church



The Mission Committee is busy preparing for an active and challenging year of opportunities for us to witness our faith in service and love to others. Although there may be some financial constraints from a reduced budget, there are many things PPC members can do to spread God's Word of salvation in Jesus Christ by giving of their time and talents, not just their dollars. Much of what you will hear from the Committee this year will be an invitation to join with each other in certain "in-kind" service programs. We will also continue our support of three special offerings; the Blanket Offering for Church World Service programs in early February, One Great Hour of Sharing during the Lenten Season, and the Joy Gift Offering at Christmas.

Some of the programs you will hear more about include:

- 1. Thanksgiving in February local restaurants donate 10% of their take on February 20 (see article elsewhere in newsletter)
- 2. Christmas in April -a housing rehab opportunity on one Saturday for all "handypersons"
- 3. Continuation of a support role with the 1989 Christmas families
- 4. Establishing a link with a S.C. church and family hurt by Hurricane Hugo to help them recover
- 5. Investigation into becoming an emergency overflow shelter for the homeless in the winter months and/or providing a respite care program once/month for care-providers in the Potomac community
- 6. Adopting the schoolage population of a local shelter to equip the kids with their "back-to-school" needs next September
- 7. Doing more mission interpretation of our denominational programs and policies
- 8. Continuation of our acquaintance with the Rev. Andres and Gloria Garcia in their Central American ministry

As you can see, we have some ambitious ideas and programs. These will be added to the already existing volunteer efforts with soup kitchens, shelters and nursing homes. If you would like to help plan, study, organize, or participate in any of these programs, please join our committee at its next meeting, February 12 at 8:00 p.m., or call Elsie Reid at 652-6880 (work) or 340-8142. Share with us in the invigorating experience of encouraging our members to put their faith into action.

# WILLIAM SLOANE COFFIN: FIRST FRED BERGER LECTURER

The inaugural Frederick E. Berger Memorial Lecture is presented by Potomac Presbyterian Church in memory of Fred who joined our congregation in early 1985. He died in 1988 after a long and gallant battle with cancer. He was committed to adult education and especially the study of contemporary issues from a theological perspective.

He joined the World Bank as an economist in 1981 and was lead economist in the Latin American-Caribbean countries department since 1987.

This first lecture is given in Fred Berger's memory and to honor his wife, Zidi, and their sons, Christian and Jonathan.

+++++++++

We are pleased to present WILLIAM SLOANE COFFIN, the president of SANE/FREEZE: Campaign for Global Security, as the first Fred Berger Memorial lecturer.

Dr. Coffin was born in 1924 in New York City and was raised there and in Carmel, California. His secondary school years included musical studies with Nadia Boulanger in Paris, and graduation from Phillips Academy in Andover, Massachusetts, in 1942. He served in the U.S. Army as a liaison officer to the French and Russian armies. Returning to Yale in 1947, he changed his course of studies to government and graduated with a B.A. in that discipline in 1949. From 1950-53 he worked abroad for the CIA. He returned to America in 1952 and entered Yale Divinity School. After receiving his Bachelor of Divinity in 1956, he became chaplain of Phillips Academy and later of Williams College. In 1957 Coffin was named chaplain of Yale University, a post he held for 18 years. For the past 25 years Coffin has been a strong presence in the civil rights and peace movements. He has received nine honorary degrees, the keys to three cities and is an honorary citizen of three more. Dr. Coffin became senior minister of Riverside Church, New York City, on November 1, 1977, and founded its Disarmament Program shortly thereafter. In January 1988, Rev. Coffin became the president of SANE/FREEZE and since that time has travelled extensively around the country to promote the organization's programs and priorities.

#### ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING

"Share the Struggle, Share the Joy" is this year's theme for the One Great Hour of Sharing offering which we will be learning about and participating in during the Lenten Season (Feb. 28-Apr. 14). This offering supports ministries of compassion central to our faith and expressed in the Bible. As Jesus spoke to his disciples and indeed to us: "This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you...You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you that you should go and bear fruit..." (John 15:12, 16).

On March 4,Ms. Eleanor Wilchynski Holman, the Regional Director for Church World Service in the Mid-Atlantic Office, will be speaking to our Adult Education Class at 9:45 a.m. She plans to present a new video showing how OGHS monies support integrated development projects in the Dominican Republic. She will enable us to see how our dollars joined with the resources of others have made and are making a positive difference in the lives of the poor. OGHS funds are divided among three church programs. Ms. Holman can help us to understand how the Presbyterian Hunger Program, the Self-Development of People Program and the World Relief Program benefit, in fact, survive because of our answer to God's call to be a loving compassionate people.

Use your Mission Yearbook to learn many of the ways OGHS funds are being used creatively not always as "bandaids" but also as "building blocks" to help people help themselves and others and in turn share their blessings. Join with your children in filling the World Coin Bank with change to teach them, or perhaps to learn from them, that sharing is for all of us. Maybe you can select a coin unit (a nickel, dime or quarter) and donate that amount or multiples of that for each hot meal you share, or for every bed in your home, or for every snack you eat over the Lenten Season, or for each schoolbook you have in the house. You can surely think of many ways your blessings can be counted and then shared. Come and listen to Ms. Holmes on March 4. There will be additional educational materials available during Lent to learn more about OGHS. Finally, we will receive the OGHS Offering on April 8 and 15.



# DEACON OF THE MONTH



# Christmas In April

#### 5. How much should I give?

This is a difficult question to discuss. The answer is a very personal one that each family must settle in prayerful consideration of your response to God's call. One thing is clear, it is not faithful stewardship to divide the need by the number of families, and by strict arithmetic, decided how much to give. Proportional giving is the Biblical method, each giving in proportion to his view of God's blessings.

In this spirit, to provide a perspective to help with an approach for your personal answer, let us offer the following information, based upon the giving profile of our congregation. We would solve our problem if we received the following in additional gifts.

# KERRY ON

SECOND MILE APPEAL

#### 1. What is the "Second Mile Appeal?

It is a special appeal by the Session, asking the congregation to reconsider its giving plans for the remainder of the year, and add an additional \$35,000 to its planned giving for 1990.

#### 2. Why do we need more money NOW?

Soon after the start of the new year it became evident that the response to the fall stewardship appeal was not going to meet the needs of the 1990 budget. We realized that somehow the congregation did not recognize the urgency of the situation, and that we faced a substantial shortfall in pledges.

The Session has been striving to find a solution to the dilemma, but the facts are clear, we have little choice but to raise additional funds, and quickly.

Only by meeting this challenge directly, NOW, can we faithfully support the program, mission, staff and facilities of our church.

#### 3. How did we get into this position?

When the new building was planned, the congregation overwhelmingly agreed to incur a substantially increased debt to pay for the new facilities. During the last few years, for various reasons, we have been sheltered from the full impact of the new, larger payments this debt would require. Now, however, we must face the effect the \$54,000 per year interest and principal cost will have on our stewardship.

#### 4. When does our church need my contribution?

We need to know the amount of your additional gift as soon as possible.

We are asking for your gifts during April. We can delay receiving full payment of both regular and supplemental gifts until the end of the year, if that suits your situation, but we need to know how much you will give, to permit us to continue with our program.

Pastor Stoltzfus will be speaking about the "Second Mile Appeal" during the month of April. Gifts and promises will be received each Sunday.

# C.E. BAILEY-WICK

Jesus said: Let the children come to me, and do not hinder them; for to such belongs the kingdom of heaven (Matthew 19:14).

At our last teachers' meeting we discussed at length the subject of discipline, both here at church and elsewhere. Our talk centered on how to take our church classrooms a "safe place" for both our great volunteer eachers and for their students. A few days later I was reading an article written by a teacher who tutored learning disabled youngsters. As she worked with all the different children, she became convinced that all of us need to have a safe place to grow and learn and develop our sense of self. Her description of this place hit home with me and a copy of "A Safe Place" is now on the walls of each classroom and in the library. I would like to share it with you.

#### A SAFE PLACE

In a safe place people are kind. Sarcasm, fighting, backbiting and name-calling are exceptions. Kindness, consideration and forgiveness are the usual way of life.

In a safe place there is laughter. Not just the canned laughter of television, but real laughter that comes from sharing meaningful work and play.

In a safe place there are rules. The rules are few and fair and are made by the people who live and worship there, including the children.

In a safe place people listen to one another. They care about each other and show this in all that they do.



There are four very important dates and activities for you to note on your schedules during the month of April that relate to our mission as Christians in the world. Please make note of them all:

- 1. One Great Hour of Sharing is the special offering we will be collecting on Palm and Easter Sundays. Our children and youth will be presenting their coin banks on Palm Sunday, and special envelopes will be in the pew racks for everyone else. Did you know that OHGS funds were used last year by our denomination to make an immediate, emergency grant of \$30,000 to victims of Hurricane Hugo? To date, through Church World Service, Presbyterians have contributed over \$800,000 to that cause. OGHS offerings also enable CWS to provide a \$100 grant to each refugee seeking to resettle in the United States, and to provide money for emergency needs and medical care. In 1989, Presbyterians assisted in resettling 1630 refugees, 846 from Eastern Europe and 686 from the Soviet Union alone. Isn't it wonderful to be a part of such a caring and capable church community?

# **ANXIETY AND FAITH**

kiety: a reaction to life experienced by everyone! From what source does anxiety come and can we deal with it creatively?

Dr. I.D. Yalom, MD, professor of Psychiatry at The Stanford University School of Medicine, in his most recent book, <u>Love's Executioner</u>, shares with his readers what he calls his primary clinical assumption:

"... that basic anxiety emerges from a person's endeavors, conscious and unconscious, to cope with the harsh facts of life, the 'givens' of existence".  $(p.\ 4)$ 

The "harsh facts" according to Dr. Yalom are (1) death, (2) our freedom to do what we will with our lives, (3) the fact that ultimately we are alone, and (4) the absence of meaning to life.

Death does exert uncontrollable power over us; aloneness characterizes even the life filled with friends and frenzy; and regardless of our successes, in themselves they do not necessarily give meaning to life.

Christian faith sheds light on these shadows that drift in and out of our lives with different shapes and hues from gray to black.

Easter addresses death. The rich symbols surrounding the resurrection of Jesus Christ speak to our death. Sometimes obscured in their mystery, the symbols still provide "answers" that satisfy the human soul.

Gospel addresses our inner freedom - assuring us that, regardless of the limitations life imposes upon us, we possess a freedom unassailable by what Jesus called "the world".

Although we stand alone (remember the best seller, <u>The Lonely Crowd?</u>), our faith assures us of the presence of God. A final aloneness only occurs when a person lacks faith. (continued on p. 8)

## C.E. BAILEY-WICK

As the weather turns warm and the outdoors beckons us, it is easy to be distracted on weekends and decide to take a week or so "off" from church. But...there are only a few weeks of regular Sunday School left and our teachers work hard to provide a good experience for the children and young people with whom they work. Our Adult classes also continue to provide stimulating topics and speakers. Imagine how frustrating it is never to know how many students will be in Sunday School.



# CHRISTMAS INTERNATIONAL HOUSE






## C.E. BAILEY-WICK



# BREAD FOR THE WORLD



-ead for the World, a Christian hunger movement endorsed by the Presbyrian Hunger Program, is embarking on a three-year campaign to end the arms race, promote peaceful resolution of conflict, and redirect resources toward ending hunger. The effort will be to encourage the President and Congress to reduce defense spending and meet urgent human needs. For example, there are 12 million children living in poverty in the U.S. and 40,000 children throughout the world die each day from hunger-related causes.

Bread for the World is supporting the Harvest for Peace Resolution introduced by U.S. Sen. Mark Hatfield (Rep. Oregon) and U.S. Rep. Matt McHugh (Dem. New York). The resolution calls on Congress to seek mutual reductions in defense and arms spending, to encourage peaceful resolution of conflicts, and to increase spending for Third World development and human needs in the U.S. and throughout the world.



# KERRY on "Preaching"

As your pastor, what do you think I would like to hear as you come out the following worship? "I learned something today; I was moved by what you said; and I intend to do something about it," says Tom Long of Princeton Seminary in his book, The Senses of Preaching. He was paraphrasing Saint Augustine who said preaching "is to teach, to delight, and to persuade."

Presbyterians more than any denomination believe that the pulpit has a teaching responsibility. Pastors used to be called "teaching elders" and are sometimes referred to as theologians in residence. We believe that an informed faith is a vital faith and that it is important to worship God with our minds.

However, Augustine would say, "yes, but..yes, we are to teach but the pulpit is not a lectern, it is a witness stand, and the truth to which we testify demands more than learning. To delight means to be inspiring, touching, moving, involving." Long says we are looking for some sign that the hearers have been emotionally fed by our sermons. I think of it as being able to say some things that will enable people to say, "He knows how I feel."

We teach, yes. We delight, yes. But we are also called to persuade. Augustine was looking for discipleship, the obedient ethical response to the claims of the gospel. We all long to be doing something that has meaning, some task that makes a difference. Long describes Calvin's church in Strasbourg, which had an alms box at the door. You did not place money in the box when you entered the church as if to pay the price of admission. You placed your offering in the box as you left the church. Giving money to the poor was the first act of obedience to the Word you had received in whip.

I pray that most Sundays you will be able to leave worship and say, "I learned something today." "I was moved by what you said, and I intend to do something about it."



## **MESSAGES**

The 202nd General Assembly approved a 1991 Mission budget of \$108,970,402. This figure is a 4.3% increase (\$4,520,818) over the 1990 budget. Half of the monies are expected to come from unified giving by churches such as ours (a portion of our "denominational mission" budget item); the balance will come from designated program gifts, and special fundraising efforts for such things as disaster relief. In future newsletters we will bring you news of how these monies are allocated and spent by our national church.

One of the largest mission areas for our denomination is evangelism and global mission. At the recent General Assembly held in Salt Lake City in early June 85 mission workers were commissioned. This was the largest class of missionary workers in the last ten years. At this same ceremony 33 retiring missionaries were honored.

The recent Assembly also celebrated the 10th anniversary of the Peacemaking Program. The commissioners passed resolutions calling for normalized relations between Cuba and the United States and urged the removal of military bases from the Philippines. A measure to evidence support for non-violent solutions to the political, economic and religious crises of Northern Ireland and one calling for release of hostages throughout the world were passed.

Finally of interest are the comments (as reported in THE NEWS) of the newly elected Moderator of the Assembly on his "agenda" for our denomination:

My audience of choice will be the laity...we need to hear two messages... the first is reassurance [to the average Presbyterian who] has never been to a meeting of presbytery, has never served on a committee outside the limits of the local church...[with the question] can we put aside our differences long enough to make a cohesive witness to the world?..."Are the people in authority still in touch with their congregational life? [My answer is] our staff people...by and large are competent, they're courageous, they earn their keep, but they don't vote...the Commissioners do that."

Message number two will deal with challenge and opportunity...the PCUSA could become a 5 million communicant denomination by the year 2000 if we believe in it, pray for it and work at it.

et's join Price H. Gwynn III in his quest for reviving a sense of communty within our denomination so that we may better witness God's salvation defulfill our call to "go and serve, making disciples of all nations."

NEWS FROM THE LORD'S TABLE

Recently the Mission Committee received a "thank you" from the Gaithers-burg Soup Kitchen. In usual fashion the Board members expressed gratitude for our \$500 gift and indicated that "every cent" goes to running the kitchen, helping and feeding the guests. But the note went on to mention that, after consulting with CMMC and the County Mental Health Association, they had decided to close The Lord's Table for July and August. Their poignant words and their request are reprinted here:

the last year we have seen younger men who appear to us and to the letter providers as being very dependent on free food and lodging; making little effort to better themselves. Women with children and families whom we serve during the cold winter months go elsewhere after school closes. We have few if any during July and August.

During the summer months, the men do have small jobs and spending money but they don't seem to be planning to save for their future. They seem quite content with the present system of a free meal and shelter. The men and women receive meals at the shelter - enough to sustain them. Our goal is to help all we can to achieve independence or as much as they are capable of obtaining. Instead, we find many who are becoming very dependent on this service. Tough love seems to be called for - we are concerned.

Please pray with us so the Lord will guide us to do the best for His people.

I hold you in my prayers.



PRESBYTERIANS RESPOND TO DISASTER NEEDS: PPC/SUNRISE PRESEYTERIAN CHURCH

ring and summer storms have displaced nearly 10,000 people in the South and midwest U.S. this year. According to "The News of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)," July/August, 1990, a special World Service Relief account has been created in our denomination's Louisville offices. This account named "1990 U.S. Storms" is only one way Presbyterians are responding to emergency needs and helping in rebuilding efforts. (Donations may be made earmarked to Account #9-2000075).

To illustrate, in Texas, several Presbyterian churches are participating in a 27-church building coalition; the Arkansas Presbytery recently received \$5000 from "national" to assist flood victims; out West, our church aids relief efforts in the wake of fires that consumed woodlands and destroyed over 400 homes in Southern California alone this summer.

Emergency and immediate response is necessary when disasters occur. Yet recovery is a long-term effort requiring the infusion of capital to rebuild long after the clean-up is over and of concern to restore hope long after the immediate crisis has been met.

In South Carolina on Sullivan's Island a Presbyterian Church much like our own is still coping to overcome the disastrous effects of Hurricane Hugo in June of 1989. We now have a special opportunity to help this fellowship of our church family.

SUNRISE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, a 35-year-old church, lost its sanctuary and ducation wing in the storm. Church contents were lost due to flooding. Iteen of its families lost everything in the storm - 80 homes on the island were destroyed.

Over the last year SUNRISE with help from other churches just like ours has assisted island families in recovery efforts and has continued its worship efforts in a tent, but with great enthusiasm. Praise God.

The church has asked us in response to our inquiries if we might provide new youth songbooks for their young children and youth - a book called "Songs" compiled by Yohann Anderson. These books cost \$8.00 each and they need about 50 of them.

The Session has approved the Mission Committee's request that we challenge our PPC membership to buy these books as a gift for SUNRISE. The books are here. On September 2 and 9, you will have an opportunity to purchase one. Please join us in contributing a gift of property and a gift of care to SUNRISE. THANK YOU.

Worship, education and mission are three moments of the Christian life which are interrelated. In worship we ake the moment to pray and we are in communion with God. The Christian Education Committee at PPC understands the importance of education in uplifting all other ministries of the church, and has arafted a new set of goals and objectives which were approved by Session in June, 1990. Listed on the next page are the goals which will serve as guidelines for programming C.E. for the next five years.

The Goals of the C.E. Committee of PPC are To Enable the Congregation:







CERRY on...

what's best for everybody - family, community, school and nation."

"Defer to authority, listen to advice of parents, teachers and youth leaders."

"Do what makes you feel good and happy."

"Follow religious authority, such as Scripture or religious leaders."

"If doing something helps you get ahead, do it."

These five approaches to making moral choices were discovered by Robert Coles, author of the prize winning book <u>The Moral Life of Children</u> as he interviewed young people between the ages of 10-18. He labels the approaches: Civic Humanist, Conventionalist, Expressivist, Theistic and Utilitarian.

It seems to me we would do well as parents and as a church to talk with our children and young people and explore with them how we believe Christian faith informs our ethical decision making. While doing what's best for everybody sounds pretty much like the "golden rule", doing what makes us feel good and happy may or may not be expressive of love for neighbor. Though following some kinds of authority is admirable, there are times when Christians must stand up against authority. Certainly getting ahead is a worthy goal, but at what or whose expense?

I would make a modest suggestion that we talk in our families about these way of making moral decisions to the end that we might follow God's intentials for us. As Jesus said, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. And you shall love your neighbor as yourself." Matthew 22:37. Also, I would remind you to come to worship each Sunday this fall as I am preaching a series on them "Ten Commandments."

 of his hand. (v.6-7)












#### THE PERFECT CHURCH

# MISSION MESSAGES

MISSION SPENDING IN THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH (U.S.A.) 1991

Mission dollars in our denomination are spent at all levels of our church structure. PPC has its own budget for programs and projects we wish to specifically and directly support.

Yet we, as a community of faith, do much more on a denominational level. Our "so-called" denominational giving, \$20,000 in 1990, was shared among our governing bodies as follows: \$12,000 to our Presbytery, the National Capital Presbytery; \$2,000 to the Mid-Atlantic Synod; and \$6,000 to the General Assembly.

ow are these monies used? Who decides? Are there political agendas being advanced? Are our mission programs properly balanced among the priorities of evangelism, human service and congregational nurture?

These are important questions and our church is increasingly aware of the need to better interpret Presbyterian Mission for us to encourage our participation in and support of our church's desire to be a vital part of the global body of Christ - sharing His love and joy and justice with all people.

The Mission Committee has placed some informative materials in the Library (on the Mission shelf) which set forth the various components of our denomination's mission units and their annual budgets. Althea Burns, a part-time consultant to NCP for Mission funding and a volunteer for General Assembly stewardship interpretation, spoke to our Adult Education class on October 7th about Presbytery programs. We hope to sponsor more interpretive programs next spring.

We have learned that the titles of various Mission units are often ambiguous or their connotations misleading. For example, the Evangelism Unit of General Assembly works on <a href="mailto:national">national</a> (U.S.A.) programs only - evangelism on an international scale is through the Global Missions Unit. When one couples the 1991 budgets of these two units, they are about 1/3 or \$34,000,000 of our total General Assembly 1991 mission budget of \$106,741,000. Or, for another example, the Social Justice and Peace-keeping Unit, which many suspect is an advocate of "political" causes we might reject, spends \$18 million of its \$21 million budget on direct human development and service projects (hunger relief, disaster aid, homelessness) which most of us would support. But, this unit also does support our Church's Washington Office (\$433,000), the Peacemaking Program (\$870,000) and the Church and Public Issues Unit (\$1.3 million). These more controversial programs reflect our struggle to define our church's role as a social witness and to draw a line between politics.

CAMPUS MINISTRIES/YOUR MISSION GIVING AT THE SYNOD LEVEL

The Synod of the Mid-Atlantic, of which our Presbytery (NCP) is a part, supports 34 ministries on college/university campuses in MD, VA, DE and NC as well as in DC. Funding these educational ministries comes from the unrestricted giving churches like PPC provide to our denomination, eg., in 1990 of the \$20,000 given by PPC to our denomination, \$2000 or 10% was allocated to the Synod.

These ministries are dynamic, adapting to the needs and personalities of the individual campuses, their student bodies and the campus ministers. Rev. Susan D'Arcy Fricks, Presbyterian campus minister at Duke, recently posed these questions in an article for The Presbyterian News, 9-90 editions.

What does it mean to proclaim the Good News of the gospel on a functionally secular, affluent, consumer-oriented, academically-pressured campus? And just what is that Good News?...What does it mean to live a life of Christian discipleship?

What can the PC (USA) offer undergraduate members that will encourage and enable them to reflect on their experiences in light of the gospel?...Is there a need to evangelize among the unchurched?

These are all questions and issues which the various campus ministries wrestle to address, but their presence among our college generation is a testament to God's love for our youth and our faith's belief that Christian living is for all times and places.

and religion. As we are called to be God's agents for social justice and peace, what strategies, if any, do we as a Church follow? Very tough questions, don't you think?

In 1991 the Mission Committee has proposed continuing \$20,000 from our budget as support for denominational programs. We are also hopeful of giving an additional \$5,000 to two designated programs being funded solely by "extra giving." These are "Presbyterian Evangelism and Church Development" and "Witness Amont the Nations — the New Missionary Challenge." Both of these efforts address our belief that high priority ought to be given to spreading the Word both locallyh and abroad.

We also hope to delve further into mission priorities and spending at the denominational level - to learn more about the lay and ordained members of e committees who approve project funding and authorize social witness statements. Stay tuned so that you may:

While we recognize cremation is not for everyone, PPC's Memorial Garden, in the timeless tradition of churches through the ages who have provided for the whole of life's experiences, will offer the service of interrment in our garden. We will also offer a means for our congregation, through memorial plaques, to honor and remember their loved ones who are interred elsewhere.

We invite and encourage you to take the time to seriously explore this Christian burial option PPC now offers.

For the past year, our committee has explored extensively all phases of developing our Memorial Garden. We used the following criteria to evaluate sites and establish a design: provide privacy for meditation, be cost effective and self funding, allow for future expansion of both church and garden, have memorial plaques on-site, be evergreen and enhance the beauty our church.

We have established the following timetable to assist you in exploring this burial option:

-During December, please take a minute to view the architect's drawing and model in the narthex and ask questions of the Committee members.

-In early January, expect to receive a Memorial Garden brochure which outlines the specifics and pricing information. Please help us in our efforts by returning the enclosed response card.

-On January 13, an information session will be held during adult education and it will be your first opportunity to make an actual financial commitment to the Garden; i.e., through niche reservation, plaque memorialization or donation.

Assuming we have sufficient financial commitments to cover construction costs, our goal is to proceed with construction this Spring and by May or June dedicate our Memorial Garden. Between now and March 31st, we have to determine your actual commitment and support, so please think seriously now about making the Memorial Garden a reality.






UNICEF AT HALLOWEEN
