

#### "FIND YOUR NICHE" "

Paul begs his readers to lead a life worthy of the role to which they have been called. Some are called to be prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers. The goal is a unity of faith, maturity, and the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ. There is one body and one Spirit, one hope to which all are called, one baptism, and one God who is above all and through all and in all. The body is joined together in Christ, so find the function you're to perform for the growth and well-being of the whole.


Not everyone has the same talents or strengths. Some are thinkers. They envision what should be done but cannot be bothered with the work it takes to accomplish it. We rely on these people to chart the course we'll eventually take.

Others are doers. They are most comfortable when told what to do and don't want to be bothered with theory or speculation. They are the workers within the community; some call them the backbone of the community.

A third group are the translators. They are the people who take the thinkers' visions and translate them into performable tasks for the doers to accomplish. They are important, since they have the capacity to stand with a foot in each camp. Paul knew well that everyone has unique gifts suitable to performing specific tasks. He stressed the importance of everyone working together. Nowhere was it said that one person is better than another since what some would consider menial, others would see as crucial to the body's performance.

The task is to find your niche. Everyone was crucial to Christ, and the Spirit depended on the cohesion that resulted from coordinated efforts. Each one of us has a part to play. Find your role and work well with others as all of us seek to attain maturity in Christ.

Have you "found your niche" here at PPC? There is a place here for your special talents, whatever they might be. Christian Education encompasses the many areas of church life. Join us, wherever you can be of help; join us here in this body of Christ.



A DAY IN A PASTOR'S LIFE - Thursday, January 24, 1991

is my customary pattern I try to spend the major part of the morning preparing the sermon for Sunday. Today I studied a text in I Timothy which speaks of prayer and held it up to the concerns we all have with regard to the war in the Gulf. As always, I hope the sermon will help us all to hear a word from the Lord which will enable us to live our lives in response to God's love for us in Jesus christ.

Phone calls included scheduling a meeting with one of the elders to plan committee work; another regarding plans for Maundy Thursday service. I received a report from our Financial Secretary on 1991 pledges.

A man stopped by to ask for help with his insurance bill - he's on a small disability pension - and I have helped him before. Late in the morning I prepared for confirmation class which is in its second week with ten young people preparing for active participation in this congregation.

During lunch at the Tally Ho I read two periodicals I receive: "Christian Century" and "The Presbyterian Outlook." I didn't see any members from the congregation today as I often do. Then off to Sibley Hospital to visit with Jan Malone and bring the church's presence to her. Frequently I am amazed how much someone in the hospital appreciates this conction with their community of faith. After praying with oan, I returned to the office and made a number of phone calls including one to Dennis McMahon regarding the installation of new thermostats in the sanctuary. 

I received a new book of Lenten devotions in the mail yesterday. The thought of delving into a new book is always exciting, but I never have time to read for very long these days. But...this morning the book beckoned to me. Called Prayers from the Mount by J. Barrie Shepherd, it is a series of meditations on the Sermon on the Mount. The book opened to a particular page, and I began to read. May I share a portion of my reading...

You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how shall its saltiness be restored?

Matthew 5:13

Salt flavors, Lord, lends life, color, zest to all it touches, so our lives should be a source of gladness, vision, hope, yes, even gusto, to a jaded world. This parable tells me, God, that wherever people leap to greet the moment with a song, there is the salt of life. And if I am not there, then I have lost my birthright, given up my saltiness.

But most of all this parable of yours, Lord Jesus, issues forth a warning; states that if we Christians are not what we are supposed to be, do not preserve the very best, add flavor, and resist corruption and decay, then God will cast us out and seek new salt with which to serve this world.

Isn't this the purpose of the church - to be "the salt of the earth"? - to add flavor and gusto and gladness into the lives of all people? PPC has many new programs and offerings, all of which are being offered to you by many hard-working members. Add some salt to your lives - try something new. The Last Supper was a Jewish passover, a "seder", a solemn sacrificial meal carried out according to ancient Jewish ritual by our Lord and his disciples. Why should we Christians reenact the passover?

By understanding more clearly the context in which Christ chose to institute Holy Communion, our participation in it will be enriched. We can affirm that when we come together to share the bread and wine it is passover that we celebrate. As it is said, "Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us." (I Corinthians 5:7)

Further, the great work of deliverance which Christ was to accomplish was rehearsed in a prophetic and symbolic form in the deliverance of the Jewish people from Egypt. The blood of the sacrificial lamb sprinkled on the doorposts signified that God would pass over the houses of the Hebrews. This blood of the lamb foreshadowed the Lamb whose blood delivered the world from the slavery of sin. This is the meaning of the words of Jesus, "This is my body which is given for you" and why we say, at the Communion Service, "Every time we eat this bread and drink this cup, we remember the Lord's death until he comes."



### MISSION

BLANKET SUNDAY on February 3 was a great success. Our congregation contributed \$905, paying for 181 blankets to be distributed by Church World Service to families and individuals caught up in social or natural disasters all over the globe. This was an increase of \$150 over our 1990 contribution of \$755. PPC qualified for an award certificate that could be earned by meeting standards for either per capita giving or giving per family in the church. We met the requirements under both categories.

A BLOOD DONOR CATALOGUE is being prepared by the Mission Committee with Elsie Reid in charge. When completed, this quide will provide us with full information on blood types of all church members who wish to participate. In the past we have often had requests for blood donations needed by a member who has had an accident or is facing surgery. In more cases than not, these calls come on an emergency basis. The deacons have had to cast about trying to find donors with the appropriate blood type. With a catalogue, we will know immediately which of our members are able to fill each call for help.

#### MISSION MESSAGE

MEDICAL MISSION WORK OF THE MEDICAL BENEVOLENCE FOUNDATION

Representatives from Potomac, Gaithersburg and Rockville Presbyterian Churches recently attended a presentation by Dr. Forrest C. Eggleston, Medical Consultant with the Medical Benevolence Foundation (MBF) of Woodsville, Texas. MBF, while an independent foundation, works closely with the Global Missions Unit of the Presbyterian Church USA and has been actively involved in medical mission work in the third world for 27 years. MBF strives to inform members of the Presbyterian Church community of their work, recruit volunteers, obtain donations of equipment and raise funds to provide for the needs of over 100 mission hospitals throughout 30 countries. MBF is continually seeking short term volunteers (up to 3 months) who are willing to assist in the medical mission work in these hospitals. While medical personnel are certainly encouraged, all individuals, regardless of career or background, are needed. In addition, the need for equipment is great. 



I've spent the best part of my adult life trying to understand d communicate the meaning of the gospel to other people for living our daily lives. In those lives threatened by the diabolical forces of violence, drugs, misused sexual powers, a near glut of consumer goods and the lust for them, as well as an often callous disregard for the lives of others and our own, I find one aspect of the gospel constantly pressing against my mind. Jesus taught it and the Apostle Paul echoed it in clear and impressive tones.

In verse 2 of the first chapter of his letter to the people who were the church in Rome, Paul wrote:

"Do not be conformed to this world but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that you may prove what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect."

My vision might be jaded - a common human failure - but I see what I believe is a head-long rush to conform for the sake of gaining approval from others, the questionable rewards of this world, what Jesus called "the chief seats," and a host of other "perks" available only to those who conform - to those willing to sell their birthright for a mess of porridge.

so-called promises of this age regarding what it means to be a person in an often depersonalized society. The world seems to become less hospitable to what the Apostle Paul calls "the things of the Spirit (Romans 8:5)." For that reason alone, we who possess and are possessed by that Spirit should, of all the people in the world, find the power in our faith to withstand molding ourselves or allowing ourselves to be molded by forces that in the end distort, maim, and eventually bring about the death of the soul.

The avoidance of conformity depends upon our willingness to live under the transforming power of Jesus Christ. May we all find in him and his gospel that capacity for ourselves and our children.

#### What Is Right With the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)?

I want to affirm what is right with the church.

- 1. Jesus is Lord of the Church.
- 2. The Church is the body of Christ at work in the world today.
- 3. The gospel of love revealed in Jesus Christ is more powerful than all the forces of evil.
- 4. The Word of God is studied, preached, taught and confessed throughout the world.
- 5. The sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper are administered by the church.
- 6. Christian people pray for one another, for our enemies and the world in which we live, that God's will may be done on earth as it is in heaven.
- 7. Around 400,000 congregations gather for worship every Sunday in the United States. More than 11,000 of those are members of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)
- 8. The Planning Budget for the General Assembly for 1991 is more than \$100 million. More than 24 percent goes for global mussion and 18 percent goes for justice issues of hunger, development and peace.
- 9. Following the constitution of the church, more Presbyterian congregations are spending more for local mission and presbyteries are spending more to empower people in particular churches for effective witness to the world in Jesus' name. "The administration of mission should be performed by the governing body nearest the congregation that can most effectively and efficiently accomplish it" (G-4.90402). "Congregations

serve as essential mission arms of the presbytery and the larger church" (G-7.01021).

- 10. There are 2,938,830 members, 11,573 congregations, 171 presbyteries and 16 synods in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)
- 11. Presbyterians witness in their workplace every day around the whole world.
- 12. Vital congregations do effective ministries in the communities and beyond every day of the week.
- 13. We have 11 theological institutions in the United States and we are related to 68 colleges and six secondary schools.
- 14. We are at work in 80 countries around the world with more than 600 people involved in significant ministries in Christ's name.
- 15. Sixty people from partner churches around the world minister to us. There are 39 presbytery partnerships in cooperation with the Global Mission Ministry Unit and churches beyond the United States.
- 16. We have the best printed resources available that I know for pastors and other leaders prepared by the General Assembly staff for special offerings, special seasons and other emphases of the church.
- 17. The Lord God omnipotent reigns (Revelation 19:6)

The list could go on with what is right with the church. The gloom and doom folks will see only the bad. The overly optimistic will see only the good. Somewhere between those two is where I hope I stand.

He emphasized that Christians in Botswana still welcome missionaries from American churches and are eager for all the help, evangelical and material, we can give them.

## KATHY ON KITCHEN

AN INTERVIEW BY KATHRYN STYNE, CONFIRMATION CLASS MEMBER

I learned many interesting things about Miriam's Kitchen from consulting a volunteer, Kathy McMahon.

Miriam's Kitchen is a "soup" kitchen located in the basement of Western P.C. in Northwest, DC. This kitchen provides breakfast five days/week, year round, to whoever walks through the church doors. Food is donated by restaurants and bake ies; in addition, the kitchen receives government surplus foods. Money is also donated by churches. Over 15 churches are involved in this project. Help is volunteer, the person in charge being the only one who is paid. Most of the volunteers on the first Monday of each month are G.W.U. law students who help regularly when school is in session. Volunteers must be 18 or older or under adult supervision. Kathy got involved in Miriam's Kitchen through PPC's Mission Committee. She prepares and serves food, cleans up, and does whatever else needs doing. She also volunteers at Rainbow Place, a shelter for homeless women, and The Lord's Table in Gaithersburg. She believes the most rewarding thing about working at Miriam's Kitchen ic working with others while pro viding a much needed service for the homeless of Washington.


WHEREAS the result of the project was publication of THE JERUSALEM TIMES, published once for the families and friends of Potomac Presbyterian Church, and

#### MISSION

#### MESSAGES

REFUGEE RELIEF. Responding to the terrible plight of Kurdish refugees in northern Iraq, the Mission Committee on April 12 dispatched a \$500 contribution to Church World Service's Mid-East Refugee Program which is joining with other church agencies in rushing supplies to refugee camps.

We learned from telephone contact with the United Presbyterian Church Office in Louisville that Church World Service and the Vatican have put up initial contributions to what is expected to be a major relief program. On April 10, CWS began chartering planes in Denmark to undertake an air-lift of high protein foods, medicines, and blankets to Kurdish men, women and children fleeing attempted extermination by Saddam Hussein. These people are pinned on snow-covered mountains in northern Iraq and southern Turkey. Some of the blankets being distributed were paid for by our contributions to Blanket Sunday in February.

Other supplies are being distributed through the Middle Eastern Council of Churches which CWS judges to be the best means to assure that help goes directly to refugees.

Anyone wishing to contribute through the church to Kurdish refugee relief may write a check to the PPC Refugee Fund and mail it or bring it to the church office.

CHRISTMAS IN APRIL. Frank Bond once again is leading PPC's participation in Christmas in April, a program of Montgomery County churches that undertakes home repairs for needy families. Please let Frank know if you have time and skills in household maintenance that you would be willing to contribute to this very worthwhile program.

BLOOD DONOR REGISTER. All church families have received through the mail cards to be filled in with blood type and other pertinent information from persons willing to give blood for members of our church at times of surgery or other emergency need. If you will fill in these cards and return them to the church office, we will be able to establish a blood donor register that will permit us to spring into action when emergencies arise. 



# THE SESSION

After much study, discussion and prayer, the Session of Potomac Presbyterian Church passed the following motion at its May 20, 1991 meeting:

"In order that we may complete the task the 199th General Assembly wished to begin, when the Special Committee on Human Sexuality was appointed, we recommend that the Ministry Unit of Theology and Worship be directed to develop ongoing study materials that could assist the church in our expression of the gifts of human sexuality and our witness to God's order amidst the culture in which we live. Such materials should be based on the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments as our rule for faith and life. They should be prepared under the guidance of our historic confessions. We believe such materials would be helpful to congregations and members in their ministry and mission".

We respectfully urge the 203rd General Assembly (1991) to reject the report, "Keeping Body and Soul Together" and dismiss the committee.

We would also like to share with you some of our reflections. No issue for many years has elicited so much response in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) as has the Majority Report of the Special Committee to Study Human Sexuality.

There seems to be two basic reasons for this response. One, the subject is sex, which almost guarantees a high level of interest. Even the newspapers will report church news when this is the subject. More importantly, the challenge to Biblical authority which the report endorses, serves to reverse

the Reformed understanding of the Scripture. Further, the confessional tradition which we hold to be authentic and reliable expositions of what Scripture leads us to believe and do is simply ignored.

We are grateful that one third of the committee believed strongly enough in the witness of Scripture and Confessions that a Minority Report was produced which challenges the Majority's position.

One article in particular has been especially helpful to our thinking, "An Empty Sexual Ethic" by Gary L. Watts writing in the May 8, 1991 issue of Christian Century. He writes:

"Calvin held that fallen humanity is not capable of independently arriving at true knowledge of God and his ways in the world, but must rely upon the revelation in Scripture.

"We are told that the way things are demand that we change our opinion concerning what they should be.

"Karl Barth has noted that we 'cannot speak about God by speaking about man with a loud voice'. The same is true in the realm of Christian ethics: we cannot talk about what should be merely by talking about what is in a loud voice.

"Certainly the church must speak a word to the current situation. But the church must find that word not in the situation, but in Scripture and its creeds.

"A Church which maintains its credibility by abandoning its creeds in order to accommodate itself to society is a church that will soon be indistinguishable from that society.

"The call of the church is not to make itself credible, but to faithfully maintain the gospel which has been entrusted to it."

It is our hope and prayer that our continuing study of these crucial issues of human sexuality in the light of Biblical authority may serve to strengthen our witness to Jesus Christ in a culture that desperately needs to hear a word from the Lord. Finally, we hope that our deliberations and subsequent ministries will be both prophetic and filled with the grace of the same Lord.





BANGLADESH. Each month seems to bring a new national tragedy in some part of the world. This month we have all been moved by the terrible situation in Balgladesh, an already impoverished country, after monstrous storms. The relief situation in Bangladesh is somewhat different from that among the Kurds. The U.S. government has moved quickly to bring what help it can. And our denomination has for some time maintained an ongoing program in Bangladesh to train the people to make better use of their food supply. We have contributed \$250 to the emergency relief effort that has now been attached to the continuing program.

SOUP KITCHENS. Kathy McMahon, coordinator of our soup kitchen program, has issued a special appeal for volunteers to work in the soup kitchen in downtown Washington that we help staff during the summer months. College students who work in the soup kitchen during the winter and spring leave Washington in the summer and as a result we are often short-handed. We need workers from 6:30-8:30 a.m. on the first Monday in the month. Some of our own students who are home for the summer should find this an opportunity to provide much appreciated Christian service.

### MESSAGES

THE HOMELESS. The Mission Committee has undertaken a study of how our church might best utilize its resources to help relieve the plight of the homeless. We already give financial support to two shelters for the homeless in Montgomery County, and provide workers and money for two soup kitchens (see below). At the direction of the Session, however, we are trying to find if there is some way we can become involved more directly in helping to deal with this problem.

At its May meeting, the committee heard from the Reverend Ambrose Lane, director of the One Church-One Home program in the Washington area. Rev. Lane gave us a good overview of the homeless problem and urged that our church commit itself to take responsibility for a particular project during the coming year. In June we will meet with representatives of two other organizations that operate programs for the homeless in Montgomery County. It is our present plan to identify a project to be presented to the Session in early fall.

We have so far divided the homeless problem into at least two separate though somewhat related problems. One group among the homeless are the so-called street people - individuals who have no regular housing and often are operating outside family or other kind of structured existence. Another group have housing but are having trouble keeping it. The latter group includes many families with children, often headed by a single parent. The problems of both groups are severe but differ in important ways. At this point we believe that it may be best for our church to concentrate on trying to help particular families in the second group. The committee will appreciate suggestions and counsel from members of the congregation as we go forward.

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING. Our congregation this year contributed \$1,821 to the One Great Hour of Sharing appeal on Palm Sunday and Easter. Funds collected through OGHS go to Church World Service which carries on both ongoing and emergency relief programs for people in need throughout the world.

In April our Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. contributed \$50,000 raised through OGHS and an additional \$45,000 from the denomination's world service fund to help bring relief to the Kurds and other refugees from the Gulf War and its aftermath.

The world service fund included the \$500 PPC gave for this purpose from our mission fund and an additional \$555 given by members of our congregation individually or as families to help



PROJECT SHARE. In July we will begin participating in Project Share, through which on the third Saturday of each month we will distribute to needy families packages of food worth \$35 each in return for \$13 and two hours of community service, which it will be our responsibility to monitor. Each package contains from 40-50 pounds of food, including 6-8 pounds of meat, fresh fruit, and staple items.

Project Share started in 1983 in San Diego. It now operates in many parts of the United States and Central America. Potomac Presbyterian is the first participating institution in our immediate area.

COMMUNITY MINISTRY. We contribute \$1,750 every three months to support the work of the Montgomery County Community Ministry. Rosaly Thompson of Community Ministry writes: "Your check, which arrived Tuesday, was especially celebrated. The balance in the checking account was just over \$300, and we average \$400-500 a day in emergency grants...Potomac Presbyterian has been such a faithful supporter...You have 'saved the day' more than once!"



### MISSION MESSAGES

THE HOMELESS. The Mission Committee is continuing its exploration of means through which our church can help deal with problems of people who are without homes or who have homes but are having trouble keeping them in Montgomery County.

In June we met with representatives of two organizations that deal with homelessness. Mary Pelz of the Homestart Program told us how her agency works to resettle homeless families and to stabilize families that are in danger of becoming homeless. Homestart not only provides rent supplements on a temporary basis but also assists families in developing a plan to attain economic self-sufficiency. There are more than 550 families on the waiting list for affordable housing in Montgomery County so Homestart's resources are heavily overtaxed.

Ann Reiss of the Springboard Program told of her group's efforts to bring housing assistance and support services to single mothers and their children. Springboard finds homes for young women from ages 18 to 25 with children who have been living in overcrowded county family shelters. At present the program can help only six young mothers a year, but the need goes far beyond this.

The Mission Committee is combining what we have learned from Homestart and Springboard with information from other sources. We plan to come up with an overall plan by early fall.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE. In our talk with Homestart we learned of a family in the Potomac community with special problems and in immediate danger of losing its modest housing. The family fled from Nicaragua after the father had been tortured by the Sandanista government. Although there has been a political change in Nicaragua, the father would risk being killed by Sandanistas still in powerful positions if he were to return. The family includes nine children, the eldest of whom is retarded. The father has found work as a gardener, but is having trouble meeting the rent on the family's small home near his job.

In keeping with our belief that our church can probably be of most assistance in helping intact families with problems keep the homes they have, we are providing this family with a rent subsidy of \$100 each month from July through December of this year.





### KERRY on...

"Sickness is a place more instructive than a long trip to Europe", wrote the great Southern writer, Flannery O'Connor. She spoke out of her prolonged and agonizing experience with lupus, the disease from which she died at the age of thirty-nine.

Arthur Frank wrote a book while battling cancer called At The Will Of The Body: Reflections On Illness. "The ultimate value of illness is that it teaches us the value of being alive. Illness restores the sense of proportion that is lost when we take life for granted." Perhaps we learn this best when we are ill. Or equally well when it is someone we love who is ill.

We are so competent, so skilled, so accomplished that we tend to think we can do anything. Until we are forced to call the office and say, "I won't be in today because I have the flu." Because of our competence and our need to control things, we even avoid those who are sick.

It's a stinging reminder that we do not have all power to control things. Belden Lane, whose mother was dying of cancer, said, "Sickness exposes our compulsive fears of being vulnerable in a society that values only competence".

I would want to say to you that I have seen greater spiritual depth, greater power of the human spirit and a more profound sense of values in people whom I have known, spent with with, who are deathly ill than in most people who are the picture of health. Paul wrote that God's power really is made perfect in weakness.

The Christian Education Committee at PPC understands the importance of education in uplifting all other ministries of the church, and would like to share with you the goals which serve as guidelines for programming CE.



# BRING JOY!

Bill Diehl tells the following story in his book, The Monday Connection. Once each day some customer at the Hausman's Precision Welding shop gets a big surprise: There is no charge for the work. No one - not even the owners, Ron and Judy Hausman, knows at the beginning of the day who it will be. "It just happens," says Ron. "At some point in the day I get the feeling that the next one to come in the door is for free."

"God has given us so much in our lives," explained Ron, "much more than we ever expected. Every day he sends us blessings. And it's all free, with no merit of our own. So we just decided that we'd do the same things with at least one of our customers each day."

"I'll bet people are surprised," I said.

"Yeah, it's funny sometimes. They can't believe it. Many of them think there's a catch to it. Some of them insist on paying, but we refuse to take the money."

"What do you tell them?"

"I just say it's a gift from us. I tell them that God has given us so many gifts that we want to give a gift to them." He paused. "I really don't know if it is God's urging that makes us give to a certain person. I just know that we feel we need to share a part of what we have received."

Christian Education is alive and well and working at PPC. In fact, program is going so well - with new families and new ideas and new curricula - and I am so busy that I offer you thoughts from another church teacher, Marsha Whitmore Hickman, in her book Prayers and Devotions for Teachers.

The Class as Blessed Community .

Our Sunday School classes are not only places for teaching about God, they are holy communities where healing and love and support act out God's love for us.

A young father brings his four-year-old daughter to Sunday school. He says, "We just took Charlotte's mother to the airport for a business trip. After the plane took off, Charlotte said, 'Now I'm going to my class. I want someone to give me a hug and a kiss. "He adds, "It's the first time she hasn't cried when her mother left."

An adult Sunday school class postpones its scheduled lesson to ask instead that the teacher help them discern how they can minister to one of their members who has recently been diagnosed as having cancer.

A junior high boy speaks up in a discussion of the elderly: "We can learn a lot from old people." I, the teacher, think how proud his parents and grandparents would be, and I feel my own affection and regard for older adults enlarged.

On the way into Sunday school, some children have spotted a wounded bird. They tell me about it and we go out to see. The bird cannot fly. We find a box, line it with soft grass and, tenderly, move the bird into the box and take it to the veterinarian around the corner. He is kind, sympathetic, but he cannot save the bird, and it dies as we watch. We take it back and bury it in the churchyard. We stand quietly. Today, this is the lesson - occasions lived in acknowledgement of the presence of God.

DRUGS. We also met in September with Richard Kief, director of the Clean Start program based at Suburban Hospital. Clean Start works at rehabilitating young people between the ages of 15 and 29 who have problems with drugs or alcohol, and carries on an education program in Montgomery County schools aimed at steering youth away from drugs and alcohol before they get started.

'Kief reported that use of cocaine and crack among county teenagers is currently somewhat in decline, but that use of alcohol and various kinds of hallucinogens is on the rise. He asked us to help spread the word of the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and we agreed to sponsor a session as part of our Sunday morning education program to which both adults and teenagers will be invited.

CHRISTMAS INTERNATIONAL HOUSE in Gaithersburg needs help in providing housing for 20 foreign students who will be spending two weeks during the Christmas holidays in our area.

These international guests are currently studying in the United States and have special needs during the Christmas season while they are far away from their homes and families.

Host families are needed for one or two week periods, as well as persons who will help with three all-day trips, three evening parties, and dinners for small groups.

Several families in our church have participated in this program in the past and have found it most interesting and rewarding. If you would like to help this year, please get in touch with our church office or with Mission Committee Chairman, Jim Reichley.

### MISSION MESSAGES

HOMELESS. The Mission Committee during the last several months has been meeting with representatives of various groups that deal with the problem of homelessness in Montgomery County. At the request of the Session, we have set out to find the best means for our church to have impact on this serious problem which takes somewhat different forms in Montgomery County than, for instance, in downtown Washington, but which nonetheless causes much suffering and loss of human resources here as elsewhere.

We have decided that the best way for us to have effect is to help intact families, with one or both parents present, who now have some kind of housing but are having trouble keeping it going. In September we met with Katherine Evans and Elaine Shire of the Dwelling Place, a group based in Gaithersburg that subsidizes housing and provides support services for families in need.

Each of the Dwelling Place's client families is assigned a case manager who helps the family work out a plan to meet its material needs. The family is called upon to pay one-third the cost of the housing found for it by the Dwelling Place. Another third is put up by the county and the Dwelling Place pays the final third. The Dwelling Place now sponsors six families and hopes to double that number in 1992.

In October we will go over the suggestions we have received from the Dwelling Place and other groups and develop an overall plan for our church's involvement.

A FAMILY IN NEED. In one of our earlier meetings with welfare groups we learned of a family of refugees from Nicaragua, mother, father, and nine children, who were in imminent danger of losing the modest housing they had found in Montgomery County. We agreed to pay a small subsidy through the end of this year to help them keep their home.

The Fellowship Committee generously allotted \$796 from its highly successful Rummage Sale in June to the work of the Mission Committee. In August we learned that the refugee family we are helping with housing was having trouble finding money to pay for clothes for the children to go back to school in September. We have approved use of \$400 of the money given to us by the Fellowship Committee to pay for socks, underwear, and other clothing items. We will have a fuller report on this project in a future issue. (CONTINUED ON P. 11)

### Bibles For Russian Troops

While Soviet troops were stationed in Moscow at the height of the coup crisis August 20, staff of the Bible Society in the Soviet Union and volunteers distributed New Testaments to the soldiers. Bibles were delivered by Father Borisov, a member of the Moscow city council/board member of the Soviet Bible Society, dressed in his clerical robes and riding in a minibus containing 4500 New Testaments. The Bibles were given only to soldiers poised to attack coup resisters, and only one officer opposed the distribution.

"This is a real miracle of our Lord," said Michael Seleznev, translation consultant to the SBS. Soldiers were asked not to kill their brothers and to obey legitimate authorities, with positive reaction. Obviously, God's word is very much respected in Russia even among those who haven't read it previously, most common case among the soldiers.

### **MESSAGES**

RAINBOW PLACE. For several years Dawn Thompson has led a group from our church that work during the winter months in the Rainbow Place shelter for homeless women at the Rockville Presbyterian Church.

Rainbow Place, which operates from November 1 through March 31, is now beginning its tenth year. Last year, the emergency shelter provided food and a place to sleep for 80 different women for a total of 3,101 bednights.

According to Marion Lehr, director of Rainbow Place, there are "many more women on the streets" this year. At the same time, the supply of volunteers has been dwindling.

We give financial support to Rainbow Place, but as part of our program to help deal with the problem of homelessness in Montgomery County, we aim to increase our volunteer help at the shelter.

Shelter attendants are needed who can serve from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. or from 7 to 10 p.m. The shelter also requests volunteers who can bake a casserole once a month that feeds 12 to 20 people, bake or buy a dessert once a month, or bake or buy cookies for lunches once a month.

If you can participate, please contact Dawn Thompson or our church office.

THE LORD'S TABLE. We also provide volunteers who, under the leadership of Barbara Perry, help staff the Lord's Table soup kitchen, which provides a meal for needy persons at 3:30 every afternoon except Sunday at St. Martin's Church in Gaithersburg.

The Lord's Table has just issued an emergency appeal for additional financial support and volunteers. We are increasing our financial contribution and would like to send more volunteers to work in the kitchen and serve meals. Those who come to the Lord's Table include many families with small children.

Do something for someone else.

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

### KERRY on...

Probably all of us shared the pain of the announcement by NBA superstar Magic Johnson that he has contracted the virus which leads to AIDS. For million who thought that AIDS always struck someone else, this tragic news from someone so widely admired, hit much closer to home. Almost immediately, Johnson forth-rightly said he would work to get the message out, especially to young people. He has since been named to the President's Commission on AIDS.

What message? "Safe sex is the way to go." However, as Colman McCarthy wrote in the Saturday edition of the Washington Post, "Fine, as far as it goes, which isn't far at all." I am not going to paraphrase all that McCarthy wrote, although I highly recommend that everyone read what he has to say.

The essence of what he says, "Safe sex joins two words that don't belong together. Safe sex suggests intimacy with no risk. Such a relationship is rarely without risk to safety: to the emotions of the couple, to their moral lives, and to their definitions of commitment, honesty and mutual trust." Those words are the essence of the Gospel and the call of our Lord to lead a life that is faithful to Him and to others. Maybe Christians have a new opportunity to stand for something in a society that values "doing your own thing" above all other values.

I believe that we must stand FOR something, not just be against "sleeping around", for example. It would be hard to do better than to share the good news of commitment, honesty and mutual trust. May God grant us the courage and the grace to live out these values and to share them with others.







- 6. Thou shalt learn to be a good receiver. Most of us have more trouble receiving than we do giving.
- 7. Thou shalt put music into Christmas. Buy several Christmas albums and wear them out. Attend the church's special Christmas programs. Sing carols as a family.
- 8. Thou shalt slow down. Remember, Christmas is supposed to be a season of peace, not hypertension.
- 9. Thou shalt remember to worship. The church is the place you are most likely to be reminded of the true meaning of Christmas.





### MISSION


SHARING CHRISTMAS. As part of our celebration of Christmas, our church will once again this year distribute toys and other gifts to children of needy families in Montgomery County.

The response to our Christmas program for needy children last year was so great that we are increasing the number of families we aim to help by almost threefold. We will be bringing gifts to a total of 20 families. Ten of these families have been selected for us by our friend Lon Dring at Montgomery County Community Ministry, and nine more have been named by the Montgomery County Department of Community Services. The remaining family on our list is the family of Nicaraguan refugees whom we have been helping provide with housing since July. Lon told us that his staff at MCCM was "thrilled" when they learned of our program and were asked to suggest families whose children would particularly benefit.

Melanie Mason will be directing the Christmas gift program for the Mission Committee.



### MESSAGES



CHRISTMAS IN APRIL. Looking a few months ahead, our church will participate next spring in the Christmas in April program in Montgomery County.
