



MESSAGES DINE WITH NINE

CHRISTMAS GIVING. Our congregation responded splendidly to our appeal for toys and food baskets for needy families in the Montgomery County community.

Names of children and families were given out at the annual Williamsburg Breakfast and gifts were placed under our church Christmas tree the following Sunday at the Birthday Party for Jesus.

During the week before Christmas we distributed 22 food baskets and toys for 52 children whose names were provided by Montgomery County Community Ministry and the MOntgomery County Welfare Service. This is more than triple what we were able to do last year! Among those delivering gifts to families were: Bill and Pat King, Bob and Ginny Crozier, George and Wilma Boddiger, Lew and Alice Smith, Bob and Kathy McMahon, Jim and Kay McClaine, Calvin and Elsie Reid, Scott and Melanie Mason, Jim and Mary Reichley and Harold and Doris Durfee. Melanie Mason directed the entire project for the Mission Committee.

Cur heartfelt thanks to all who shared some of their Christmas with those financially less well off.

EAZAAR MANNA. The Christmas Bazaar provided \$1000 for the work of the Mission Committee which enabled us to fill several needs that would otherwise have gone unmet. Mission funds from the Bazaar were distributed as follows:

\$250 to the Rainbow Place shelter for the homeless in Rockville.

\$250 to Montgomery County Community Ministry for emergency aid.

\$250 to the hospital in Karachi, Pakistan, that we help support as a foreign mission.

\$250 for special Christmas mission projects in our local community.

ELANKETS FROM BLANKET SUNDAY. Last February on Blanket Sunday members of our church gave \$1,105 to help pay for blankets to be distributed to the poor and needy in all parts of the world.

During the winter some of the blankets purchased through proceeds from Blanket Sunday went for emergency relief among the Kurds and in Bangladesh.

On October 29, Church World Service distributed 20,000 blankets from Blanket Sunday to approximately 50 shelters for the homeless in the Washington area. Blankets we paid for on Blanket Sunday are being used now by homeless or underprivileged children and adults in Washington and our own community.




GREAT PLANS

C.E. BAIOLEY-ONICOK

In the next few weeks, the CE Committee will be organizing a Youth Ministry Design Team, a group of adults and teens who will plan and execute the Youth Ministry program here at PPC. This is the program for young people 12-18. Those 11 and younger would be called Children's Ministry. The adults on this team would be composed of parents, teachers, youth advisors, myself and any other adult who is interested in the future of our wonderful young people. But we really need you. Why is it that so often a church really wants to see an active and effective youth ministry program, but no one really wants to be involved? I'd like to share with you a portion of an article from Church Teachers magazine, entitled "Personhood: Youth Ministry's Challenge".

Youth need an older "Guarantor", someone who cares about them, who, if the occasion arises, will vouch for and support them. Guarantors model both faith and wisdom from their expanded experience. Each young person will be dealing in an individual way with three primary issues: relationship with others, relationship with self, and relationship with God.

Young people are learning how to enter trusting relationships with other people. They are learning, often with aching hearts, how to relate with persons of the opposite sex. They are learning skills in dependability, and they are testing dependability. They are learning about justice and injustice, about humanity's frequent inhumanity.

Each young person is also learning how to be an individual. They are learning how to be male or female, how to be responsible, and how to make decisions based on their personal value system. That means they will almost certainly be judgmental about themselves as well as about others. They are struggling to become, often in the face of tremendous odds.

Finally, young persons are learning how to move from a kind of "handed down" or "second hand" faith to a personal faith that belongs uniquely to them. It is this process that can be helped by Guarantors, older, trusting persons who can model faith without demanding conformity.

We need many of you to help with our youth. We need "Guarantors" as teachers of Sunday School, Advisors to our Sunday Nite Live!! Program, as planners on the Design Team. We'll find a way to use your talents,

At its February meeting, the Stewardship and Finance Committee decided to provide PPC members with regular reports on the status of the church's finances. It is our plan to make this a regular item, not to ask for money, but to keep you informed throughout the year. We hope you find these arbicles informative and interesting. If you have any questions or comments, please contact Gene sharer, Committee Chair, or any committee member.

The budget for 1992 totals \$343,375.25. Congregational pledges of \$295,000 are the main source of income. To this we add income from other sources: gifts from members, fees for building use by outside groups, interest, and offerings from visitors.

The primary use of these funds is for three functions: Worship (about 30%), Education (about 20%), and Mission (just over 10% of the total). The balance is used for other necessities such as heat, light, telephone, and other administrative services needed to operate the church.

In future stories we will provide more details of the results we have been able to achieve through our stewardship of God's blessings.





As I work with the people of PPC, so many good things happen each week - and I never seem to have a chance to share them with you. This month I'd like to give you a glimpse of the "wonderment" that occurs within the confines of this community of faith...

- 1. I'm working with the Senior Highs planning Youth Sunday (March 29). I ask, "What is the most important 'piece' in a worship service?" The answers are different, but each young person backs up his answer with good theology and even some Biblical knowledge. The excitement over being able to share their ideas with you in a worship service is contagious.

- 5. I spend the weekend with our Senior Highs at a Retreat sponsored by the National Capital Presbytery. One of the very capable leaders is our own Lindsay Chapin! She is excited and responsible and helps all of us to have a good time.
- 6. I attend an Adult Education Committee meeting and listen to them struggle about how to interest more of our adults in this vital program. I sense commitment and real care about this congregation.
- 7. I attend a home communion and listen to members share stories about their faith. Some are humorous, some poignant...all carry great meaning and help us learn more about each other as we share communion in small groups.



Last week when Price Gwynn, former Moderator of the General Assembly, visited PPC, he emphasized the key role the people played in the successful ministry of a Presbyterian Church. This series of reports is intended to provide you with an insight into the financial concerns we face, and give you a feeling for onr aspect of your part in the success of our ministry here.

Bill Brill, the church treasurer, reported that February had been a good month. Giving was on the schedule needed, but for the first two months of 1992 we are about \$7000 in arrears against pledges. Somehow this arrears came about in January but with the good level of receipts in February, we are confident we will make up the missing money soon. It is important to maintain giving during the early months of the year since when summer finally gets here, we usually experience some slowdown in giving until September when the church year resumes. The need for cash goes on all year, however, so please try to keep your pledge up to date.

The expenditures are on or below budgeted levels and for this month we have only good news to bring to you. It is a pleasure to prepare a report with nothing to complain about. To give you some dimensions of the size of our job, PPC needs to receive an average of just over \$21,000/month to meet our budget. Keep up the good work, and thank you.




Welcome to our new music director/organist... Cynthia Wright





By now you have received Gene Sharer's letter with your pledge statement/ other giving for the quarter. The good news is that giving in February and March has been right on schedule to meet the budget and things are going well. Somehow we remain about \$7000 short of planned receipts and January giving seems to be the shortfall source. This is puzzling since obviously folks are keeping to plan for the first quarter, except for the missing \$7000, and it is the intention of the membership to fulfill its obligations. We have no doubt that the missing giving will be made up as the year progresses but we wanted to share our dilemma with you.

In case you missed this important fact last month, we need about \$21,000 each and every month to fund the budget. As summer approaches and church attendance declines a bit, the goal becomes somewhat more difficult to achieve, so if possible, paying your pledge ahead would be most appreciated to help the cash flow problem.

Within the next year or so, the church mortgage is scheduled for renewal. We have begun discussions with several lending institutions and will have more to report soon. Church mission would be greatly enhanced if we could reduce the monthly mortgage payments. If anyone has any ideas to offer, please contact Gene Sharer who will be happy to bring you up to date on the issue.

Garden Dedication

In the life of any church there are moments which signify the increased importance Christian identity can play in the total life span of its members. Such an event occurred on April 5, 1992, when the Memorial Garden was dedicated on a bright sunny day as a continuation of the worship service. 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


WANTED: SEWING MACHINES

As I complete my third year as Director of Christian Education and Youth at PPC, I've discovered that I wear many hats and fill many different roles depending on what day it is and who one might ask. So I'd like to share with you how The Book of Order of the PCUSA defines the role.

Christian Educators are persons called to and employed in the ministry of education in a particular church or governing body. They are persons who demonstrate their faith in and love for Jesus Christ, are dedicated to the life of faith and are serious in purpose, honest in character, and joyful in service. Christian Educators, with the session and pastors, share the responsibility of providing for the spiritual growth of members for their ministry. They perform a variety of tasks including teaching the Bible, recommending curriculum materials and resources, training and supporting lay workers, and planning and administering the educational program of their congregations. Christian Educators shall be persons with skills and training in Biblical interpretation, Reformed theology, human development, religious educational theory and practice and the polity, programs, and mission of the Presbyterian Church (USA). They shall be encouraged by their session and presbytery to meet the certification requirements of the PCUSA.

At this writing I have just completed the written examination for Certification as an Educator in the Presbyterian Church. It was a takehome exam and I have been working on it in my spare time for the last six months. The results of this work is a 60-page document which has been reviewed by a committee which included Kerry and Diane Chapin, and has now been sent to General Assembly offices in Louisville. It will be read by three judges around the country and then go before the certification commission. I should receive the results sometime in November.

I have placed a copy of my exam on the table in my office and I invite any of you who might be interested to peruse it at your leisure. My hope is that you will be further enlightened as to the role of your church educator. Thanks for your care over the years.

How Can We Help?



AND ALL THE PEOPLE SAID, "AMEN."

In some congregations the pastor uses this lead in to encourage the congregation to respond with an "Amen" to signify their affirmation of what has just been said. Other congregations are more spontaneous with their "Amens" and people signify their affirmation during sermons and prayers.

The word "amen" comes from the Hebrew and means "so be it" or "that's what I say, too." It is especially appropriate after a prayer that has been said on behalf of the people. In the Middle Ages Christian worshippers did not sing hymns, rather the choirs sang and the people responded with an "Amen." Doxologies were sung following Psalms and ended with an "Amen."

During the Reformation the people themselves began to sing hymns and they no longer needed to sing "Amen" at the end. The great hymn writers Luther, Watts, and Wesley did not include "Amens" on their hymns for singing had been given back to the people. During the early 1800's the Oxford Movement in England began to translate earlier Latin Hymns which always ended with a doxology and therefore an "Amen." Gradually the doxologies were omitted, but the "Amen" somehow remained. By the late 1800's hymnbooks included "Amens" at the conclusion of all hymns.

By the 1920's hymnbooks began to omit the "Amens" as more authentic expression of the Reformation heritage and because most hymn writers did not include "Amens" in their texts. Furthermore, many times the "Amen" is not appropriate musically or theologically to the hymn thought or musical design. (continued on p. 11)

Many wonderful hymns end in a glorious and uplifting way and I encourage you all to sing them with joy and thanksgiving. Occasional "Amens" during or at the end of sermons might surprise me at first, but I'll get used to it.



You got a phone call last night. "I'm calling for the Nominating Committee at the church. We would like to nominate you to serve as an elder (a deacon) in our church."

What's behind that phone call? Certainly, the Nominating Committee prayerfully and thoughtfully considered a number of candidates. One's previous activity and service in our congregation or in other churches is important. The Committee also seeks the guidance of the Holy Spirit in its deliberation. Being called to serve is not a reward for previous service but a recognition of the gifts and dedication of the candidate.

When a person gets this phone call, he must consider another "call" and ask himself, "Is God calling me to this office?" Sometimes an affirmative answer is immediate and other times further thought and prayer is required.

In the end, once again, we must listen to God's Spirit. When an affirmative answer is given, the words of the ordination service echo, "God has called you by the voice of the church to serve Jesus Christ in a special way."



Make an Advent Wreath or a Yule Log.

You will need:

- 5 candles 4 purple (one for each of the 4 Sundays of Advent. Purple reminds us of preparation and repentance). 1 large white candle (which is lit on Christmas morning for the coming of Christ).
- Large bowl or pan and sand, or A log with 5 holes drilled the diameter of the candles.

Evergreen boughs or holly.

How to make:

- · Fill the pan or bowl with sand, or drill holes in the log.
- Place the large white candle in the center and the 4 purple candles around it. Anchor them good — well down into the sand or holes.
- Circle the bowl or log with evergreens reminding us of God's unending love.


How to use:

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

The Gospel Alive in Pakistan




Many Presbyterian mission workers feel they have done their job when the people they minister to become full partners in the evangelism effort.

Fred and Margi Stock are experiencing this joy in Pakistan where they teach the gospel to those living near Kurachee. They have seen the most dramatic impact of the gospel in the lives of the Hindus there who have lived with oppression and the traditional Pakistani caste system.

One Hindu man made a tremendous difference in his village and today works as a partner to bring the gospel to other villages. He was introduced to Christianity during a stay at a local Church of Pakistan hospital. He was drawn to Christ's messages and stories; but, like many Hindus, was hesitant to proclaim his faith publicly for fear of being ostracized. One day he came to the Stocks and asked to be baptized. His baptism was planned for Easter morning. When the Stocks arrived at his village to transport him and his family to the church, they found 35 others also wanting to be baptized. Today he and his wife teach the gospel in the villages near Kurachee. They have also helped begin an adult literacy program.

In today's political climate in Pakistan, it is difficult for foreigners to travel without government escorts. The Stocks are thankful that the Pakistani couple is able to take the gospel message to villages where they are unable to go. These newly literate Christians are taking on the responsibility of true hand-in-hand evangelism.



Did you know that Christmas finally slipped through the Sunday School into the sanctuary as a religious festival in the late nineteenth century?

Our first response is probably, "Sounds typical of dour Scots and straight-laced Puritans". Yet most of us as Christians have questioned the awesome influence of a secular Christmas culture...gift giving excess, mad party schedules, carols as background music for the ringing of cash registers, and a frenzy of family activity.

The question is this, who is going to determine how we will celebrate the birth of the Christ child? Will it be the secular tradition or the spiritual center of our faith?

"Where meek souls will receive Him still, the dear Christ enters in."

(I wish to acknowledge the research of George Kroupa for the information regarding the Reformed and Presbyterian history of Christmas celebrations. Mr. Kroupa is a member of National Capital Presbytery and an article on this subject appeared in a Presbytery Newsletter several years ago.)


The Wright Note


My 1992-93 Shopping List for the World
