Library News

Among recent acquisitions are three books by the late Paul Tournier, a Swiss physician whose writings have won acclaim for their blending of psychiatric insights and the Christian faith. Learn to Grow Old, writes the magazine Christian Century, "ought to be read by persons in their twenties and should be required reading for those who have reached forty." Our other new Tournier titles are To Understand Each Other, a book on marriage, and A Listening Ear: Reflections on Christian Caring.

Other new additions to the library include <u>Hostage Bound and Hostage Free</u>, Ben (Presbyterian minister) and Carol Weir's story of his sixteen months' imprisonment by Shiite Muslim extremists in Lebanon, as well as <u>The God Named Hallowed: The Lord's Prayer for Today</u> and <u>To My People With Love: The Ten Commandments for Today</u>, both by John Killinger, a pastor and seminary lecturer.

Books may be checked out according to a posted procedure. Titles are shelved by subjects. New acquisitions are selected by the church staff and the library committee and are purchased with budgeted funds or received as gifts. - Jon Hawley, for the committee



KERRY ON ..

Paul wrote to the Corinthians, "I will sing with the heart and sing with understanding also". (I Cor. 14:15). For me this expresses the unique contribution of the Reformed Tradition. As Presbyterian Christians we affirm that God calls us to respond with our hearts and our minds. Worship is a special opportunity to make our response to God in the company of God's people.

It would be a false dichotomy to suggest that preaching deals with the mind and music with the heart. When either is faithful, both the emotions and the intellect are touched by God. Good preaching helps us to understand what God has done for us in Jesus Christ and what God wants us to do about this Good News. It also, in the power of the Holy Spirit, seeks to move us to a deep response that comes from the heart. It is my conviction that the word "music" may appropriately be substituted for the word "preaching" in the previous statements.

Therefore, it is of utmost importance that music, scripture, sermon, prayers and all parts of the worship service be crafted and planned so as to speak to and elicit response from the heart and mind of the worshippers.

Nicholas von Zinzendorf wrote in the 1700's, "The hymnal is a kind of response to the Bible, an echo and an extension thereof. In the Bible one perceives how the Lord communicates with mankind and in the hymnal how mankind communicates with the Lord". (Paul Schilling, The Faith We Sing). The importance of hymn singing cannot be overestimated as it forms a primary way in which we are invited to respond to the love and grace of God. May we sing with the heart and sing with understanding also in the near year.

Super Sunday



TV IS THE MOST INFLUENCIAL TEACHER IN YOUR CHILD'S WORLD - BUT WHAT IS HE LEARNING?

Coming to PPC on Super Sunday, January 31...Dr. C. F. Melchert from Lancaster Theological Seminary on "IS TV CHANGING YOUR RELIGION?"

TV is different from other forms of the media...what difference does that difference make? Are we affected not only by what we watch but even by the fact that we watch? TV is profoundly reshaping American culture, values and perhaps even our religion. The average American spends more than 15 hours/week watching TV but less than one hour in church. Does TV have values, beliefs, even theologies? Are they Christian? Does it matter? Do we know how to respond appropriately to TV? Is TV addictive? Should the church care that research claims that TV affects viewers' quality of life?

Dr. Melchert will lead the Adult Sunday School Class at 9:45 using video excerpts to show how TV sells us news, products, politics and the church.

Overflow Shelter

Montgomery County has only one vear-round shelter for women. Rainbow Place of Rockville PC is in its 11th year of opening its doors each November 1st to give winter shelter to women who cannot find space elsewhere. This November was an unusually difficult one for Rainbow. Within days of opening, the shelter was at capacity and Rainbow staff asked the county for help. An additional winter facility is now available, administered by CMMC, and providing minimal services. The shelter needs a variety of items: blankets, pillows, paper goods, casseroles, coffee, tea, hot chocolate, sugar, creamer. 



Rainbow Place

RAINBOW PLACE is a loving refuge. Women of all ages come to find warm shelter, food, kindness and a sense of belonging. Those who find themselves homeless have arrived at this condition for many reasons. Mental illness, divorce, and general inability to cope with a mainstream of lifestyle are the most frequent.

The commitment of RAINBOW PLACE is CARING. The shelter is in its 11th year. The over riding desire of the shelter staff is to accept the women with a non-judgmental outlook, to make them physically comfortable (hot water, showers, laundry facilities go a long way) and well fed. There are casseroles from many churches; also volunteers who help with dinner and prepare lunches for the next day. Everyone who participates in this Christian outreach shows endless patience, understanding and a lot of hard work.

Rockville PC should be commended for housing this shelter and for supervising its activities.

A couple of years ago one of our girls wrote the following poem for the Rainbow Staffers:

"May there always be work for your hands to do

May your purse always hold a coin or two

May the sun always shine on your windowpane

May a rainbow be certain to follow each rain

May the hand of a friend always be near you

May God Christ Jesus fill your heart with gladness to cheer you.

Questions for the New Year

The opening exercise for the Confirmation Class this year was a getting-acquainted activity in which the young people were asked to tell us a few things about themselves including a time when they felt God's presence and a faith question that they wanted to ask.

I would love to do this exercise with the whole congregation! Where were you the last time you felt God's presence in your life? Did you get a chance to tell someone about it? Too often these moments in our lives go by too fast. We don't take the time to reflect on what happened and celebrate the moment and file it away in our memory bank so that we can call up that experience when we need some emotional reassurance. It helps your remembering process to actually put that feeling into words by telling someone about it. It also helps whoever you tell to recognize God working in their life, too. (In the olden days they called this witnessing - too bad that it has gone out of fashion!)

I suppose you know that Kerry and I won't be able to answer all the faith questions that the young people ask. I've just finished reading Why Did God Make Bugs and Other Icky Things? by Kel Groseclose (now available for lending to anyone interested) and I want to share a paragraph from his introduction.

"Children and adults do not always need answers, at least not those of a final, ultimate nature. What they do want is to be heard, to be taken seriously. Children, in particular, need the significant people in their lives to join their quest for knowledge. All of us could benefit from periodic reminders that questioning is not only permissable but highly desirable. It never indicated a lack of faith. Quite the contrary, questioning is one essential mark of a serious seeker. Frequent inquiries ought not to be the exclusive province of four and five year olds. Questioning is intended to be a lifelong endeavor. Those who stop wondering, stop growing."

So ask us your questions, too! We want to answer the easy ones and ponder with you over the really tough ones.

HELP OTHERS WHILE LEARNING: VOLUNTEER FOR HOTLINE

Volunteers, 18 years or older, are needed for Montgomery County Hotline, a 24-hour telephone crisis intervention service. Volunteers will receive a 36-hour training and 16 hours of individual on line supervision, learning fundamental clinical listening skills that all mental health professionals are taught. In return, volunteers are asked for a commitment of 4 hours/week for at least 1 year. Interviews to be eligible for the training begin January 5.

Volunteers help hot line callers who may be struggling with personal relationships, family stress, depression, or mental illness as well as give information and referral. Volunteers who learn the art of listening achieve greater self-understanding which can help transform their own personal relationships.

All in all, our Sunday School program is on a full upswing with lots going on. -Alvce Tamzarian







KERRY on.


The AMADA Wright Note

Over the Martin Luther King Jr. holiday weekend, the Presbyterian Church hosted an ecumenical re-entry retreat at the Stony Point, NY Mission Conference Center for returning missionaries, co-workers and volunteers. Having been sponsored by the PC to spend two years in China as an English teacher, I was invited to attend. The retreat was outstanding in every way. I felt very proud that my denomination's leadership set the pace in meeting the needs of returning mission workers.





About six years ago, when the Rev. Lon Dring asked Armen Mardigoussian to start the Thanksqiving in February program at his Flaming Pit restaurant in Gaithersburg, he didn't really know how successful a plan he was inaugurating.

On February 2, PPC members, families and friends joined with hundreds of other supporters of the CMMC to patronize cooperating restaurants to raise money for the non-profit organizations that provide food to the county's needy.

The program has grown every year . with wider participation by restaurants (120 this year) and supporters. Mr. Mardigoussian estimates that 80% of his February 2 business came because of Thanksgiving in February.

Restaurants contribute 10% of their gross revenues on the night of the TGIF program. Final results are not yet available; we'll publish the totals at a later date.



Montgomery County has a Shelter Network of 14 programs which serve the needs of families and single adults. Last year the following statistics were noted: 3,650 persons were served in the shelter system; 93,205 bednights were provided, an increase of almost 10, 000 over the previous year; the rate of occupancy averaged 101%; 4,459 requests for shelter were denied because the facility was over capacity; 75,161 meals were served at three soup kitchens; Montgomery County expended \$3.6 million in homeless services: the volunteer support in County Homeless Programs including financial support, in-kind services, and the comparable worth of volunteer hours equalled \$3.7 million.

THE OTHER SIDE OF THE DOOR A Letter Received By Rainbow Place

"On Christmas Day I went back to Rainbow Place to do some volunteer work. Boy, was it strange at first to be volunteering alongside the same people who used to see me as a client!

I talked to the women who were there about how I had once been where they are now and that it is not impossible to get off the street (as it once seemed). And I enjoyed myself so much I've been back a few times since. I've made lunches, served dinner and visited with the clients at the shelter.

The pain of street life is due, not only to the stigma that goes along with homelessness, but also to the person's feeling of being a lost soul, one who is wandering among the discarded trash and forgotten memories, one who is non-existent to family and friends. There is no one else to care what happens.

Some of the women turn to drugs and alcohol to deal with, or not deal with street life. Some turn to sex. Some decide it is a good time to get pregnant, although sometimes that just happens.

The ladies are much more appreciative and sincere than I was. I really enjoy being with them.

I thank God each day for the blessings He has given me by letting me experience the hardship of being homeless and mentally and emotionally ill and then letting me get well and help others to get off of the street. May God help them to succeed and bless them along the long, and sometimes hard, winding road back to where they belong."

We know that you will be glad that your Easter flower "overflow" money will be going to this worthwhile mission. God does bless a cheerful giver. —Dawn Thompson



According to a recent nationwide poll, "Religion was found on the upswing - considered very important by 69% of adults, up 10% points from a year before." "Regard for money as very important also rose 10% points to 40%." We may even go so far as to say that how we deal with money reflects our relationship with God.



On Growing Up Christian

When I was growing up, much of what I learned about being a Christian was taught outside the walls of the church. We did a Christmas Pageant in Pre-School. We sang hymns in Girl Scouts. We read the Bible and prayed in the classroom every day. My high school English textbook had Bible passages as examples of poetry and story telling. I needed a course called, "The Language of the King James Bible," to get a BA in English. And Bing Crosby was showing me what church people looked like in the movies.

The culture has changed a lot in my lifetime. Our children get absolutely no religious education outside of their church and their home. No one goes to church in the movies that they watch. No one mentions the Bible in their schools. The community is no longer helping us to educate Christian people. If we want out children to know the story of God's People – and to come to understand that they, too, are a part of the Story, we have to be much more intentional about seeing that they get opportunities to hear the Story.

Send your children to Bible School!!! It's the only time all year we get their attention for more than a few minutes. Send us those PreSchoolers and keep sending them every year as they grow. This year the plan is for 4-year-olds through 5th graders. (Older kids may just learn something if they come to help - call Bridget Newton or Chris Dowd to volunteer). It's the week of June 21-25, from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. We need to claim every opportunity to live up to the promises that we made at their baptism - to nurture their faith and help them take their place in the continuing story of God's People.


Our church's important ANNIVERSARY CAMPAIGN, which seeks to support two two vital Presbyterian bicentennial mission building projects and reduce our own mortgage, approchases its conclusion at the end of this month. As of last Sunday, about 65 giving units in the church had pledged to contribute over three years, or had already contributed, a total of over \$116,000. Among the latest additions to the church library is Tell Them Who I Am: The Lives of Homeless Women, by Elliot Liebow. The book, by a distinguished urban anthropologist who is a quest researcher at the National Institute of Mental Health and a professor at The Catholic University of America, is based on extensive interviews and interactions with homeless women living in emergency shelters in Montgomery County people such as members of our congregation have sought to assist through Rainbow Place. This participant observation study - a method of study in which a researcher seeks to participate as fully as possible in the lives of the people being studied - offers valued insights into the homeless. The Library Committee thanks Dawn Thompson for bringing the book to the church's attention during remarks she recently made in worship about Rainbow Place.

Contributions and pledges to the Anniversary Campaign now total \$130,600! The campaign phase having come to a close, we rejoice in this support for our church and its mission. As the pledges are paid within a three-year period, almost half of the receipts will be forwarded to our denomination's Bicentennial Fund, which celebrates 200 years of Presbyterianism in America through rededication to vital mission projects. The other half of our receipts will be used to reduce our own church's building debt, thus strengthening our capacity to meet our mission goals and conduct other important congregational activities.

CONGREGATION BASED SHELTER PROGRAM

With the approval of the Session, our church this fall will undertake a major new mission initiative.

From October 17 to 23, we will provide shelter, dinner, and breakfast each day in Fellowship Hall for approximately 25 of Montgomery County's homeless who are participating in the Congregation Based Shelter program sponsored by Montgomery County Community Ministry.

The Congregation Based Shelter program (C.B.S.), which began operation last fall, is descended from the old Overflow Shelter program, which we helped support financially. Under the Overflow Shelter program, churches in the community provided shelter for a week during the cold-weather months for homeless persons who could not be accommodated in the county's shelters. This was strictly a shelter program, with no attempt at restoring participants to economic independence or personal rehabilitation.

The new program is the result of long consultation between the county and Community Ministry. It is the first stage in a three-tiered approach of assessment, treatment/rehabilitation, and finally, stable housing for selected single men and women. It is intended to go beyond the "band-aid" approach, to a beginning at long-term solution. Since the program began last fall, 75% of the 134 people served have been referred to the next shelter stage or have returned to independent living.

Persons going through the C.B.S. program have been interviewed by social workers to assure they are willing to commit to a treatment program as a means to end their homelessness. While in C.B.S., they go through a medical and social evaluation program during the day, and are given shelter for the night, with a hot evening meal and breakfast, by their host church for that week.

C.B.S., unlike the Overflow Shelter program from which it is descended, is a year-round program. Many area churches have already been hosts for one week. We decided to participate

after our Mission Committee had determined through talks with Community Ministry staff and volunteer coordinators at other participating churches that the program is a worthwhile car rying-out of Christ's commandment to us to help the needy and is practically feasible.

Our participation in the program will begin with the arrival of our homeless guests for the evening meal on Sunday, October 17, and will conclude with breakfast the following Sunday. Guests arrive at approximately 7:00 p.m. and lights are turned off at 11 p.m.; guests rise at 6:00 a.m. the following morning and leave the church by 7:00 a.m. During the day they will be in contact with a county facility, where they will be able to take showers. Although it is not required, we have elected to give each guest a bagged lunch each day in our week.

A staff professional from Montgomery County will be with us each night from dinner to breakfast. Our church will provide two volunteers to sleep over each night, and also volunteers to prepare and serve the meals.

Community Ministry provides sleeping mats and blankets. We are asked to provide 25 sets of sheets and towels (which we can then store to be used again the following year.)

Our guests will be limited to using Fellowship Hall, with its two adjoining bathrooms. Only single men and women are admitted to the program.

This program will be a full church effort. In addition to volunteers to sleep over and provide meals, we will need many volunteers to gather supplies and for other tasks. We intend to involve our youth fully in all phases of the program.

Mary and Jim Reichley have agreed to coordinate the program for our church. Other members of the Mission Committee will be heavily involved.

This undertaking will be a step beyond our already extensive mission program. We feel that Jesus calls us to do no less.



Have you ever heard the Gospel in a TV commercial? There is one for diamonds, the scene is romantic and the couple somewhat middle aged. She is opening a present and as she takes out the diamond necklace, we hear the words, "Tell her you would marry her all over again."

To me it is a beautiful linking of the past, present and future. A commitment we made once in the past is remembered with a special celebration, and renewal of that promise for the future.

This year Potomac Presbyterian Church remembers a commitment made thirty years ago by a small group of faithful Christians who met to worship in the Potomac Elementary School. Through the years over 1300 people have made a vow to be faithful members of this congregation. Some have moved on to other communities, others have frankly drifted away, many are vital members of the congregation today. In the faces of our children and youth we see the future of PPC.

I am pleased to invite everyone to gather for worship on Sunday September 26 to celebrate the 30th Anniversary of this congregation. And to say to our Lord and one another, we would do it all over again. A luncheon will follow the service and our Deacons will be calling with details.

Is Anybody Listening?

Why don't my children listen to me? I tell them to put their "stuff" away every day and not let it accumulate on the kitchen table until we need power equipment to move it downstairs. (We haven't actually eaten there in years.) I tell them to drive very carefully, and never exceed the speed limit or run yellow lights. I tell them to use their time wisely so they don't spend the entire gorgeous weekend indoors at the mall, and have to cut the grass in the almost dark because it won't wait one more day. They never seem to appreciate the wonderful words of wisdom I regularly share with them.

Those children have pointed out to me lately, that most of the junk on the table is mine; that no one in our family sneaks through as many yellow lights as mom does; and the person most likely to be up at 2AM doing something that has to be finished tomorrow-- is me. My children learned much more than I intended. It's not that they don't hear me, it's just that they live with me, too.

Children have very good listening skills. They hear words and feelings—that we don't remember saying out loud. Why do they pick up the impatient tone in our voice that we use when we are very angry with our spouse and use it every time they talk to their siblings? And why can't they pick up the measured kindness we use to talk to complete strangers, instead? Our children do hear us—it's just that they hear what we do and not what we say. They are very observant. They see more than we wish them to see. They see who we are, and not who we tell them we are.

As we begin a new season, let's try--one more time--to be more intentional about what our kids are learning. Let's give them an opportunity to see us thinking seriously about our faith; responding to God's love for us through service to others; bowing our heads in prayer; and working for peace and justice in our world. Careful! The children are listening!





Have you ever heard the Gospel in a TV commercial? There is one for diamonds, the scene is romantic and the couple somewhat middle aged. She is opening a present and as she takes out the diamond necklace, we hear the words, "Tell her you would marry her all over again."

To me it is a beautiful linking of the past, present and future. A commitment we made once in the past is remembered with a special celebration, and renewal of that promise for the future.

This year Potomac Presbyterian Church remembers a commitment made thirty years ago by a small group of faithful Christians who met to worship in the Potomac Elementary School. Through the years over 1300 people have made a vow to be faithful members of this congregation. Some have moved on to other communities, others have frankly drifted away, many are vital members of the congregation today. In the faces of our children and youth we see the future of PPC.

I am pleased to invite everyone to gather for worship on Sunday September 26 to celebrate the 30th Anniversary of this congregation. And to say to our Lord and one another, we would do it all over again. A luncheon will follow the service and our Deacons will be calling with details.

Is Anybody Listening?

Why don't my children listen to me? I tell them to put their "stuff" away every day and not let it accumulate on the kitchen table until we need power equipment to move it downstairs. (We haven't actually eaten there in years.) I tell them to drive very carefully, and never exceed the speed limit or run yellow lights. I tell them to use their time wisely so they don't spend the entire gorgeous weekend indoors at the mall, and have to cut the grass in the almost dark because it won't wait one more day. They never seem to appreciate the wonderful words of wisdom I regularly share with them.

Those children have pointed out to me lately, that most of the junk on the table is mine; that no one in our family sneaks through as many yellow lights as mom does; and the person most likely to be up at 2AM doing something that has to be finished tomorrow-- is me. My children learned much more than I intended. It's not that they don't hear me, it's just that they live with me, too.

Children have very good listening skills. They hear words and feelings--that we don't remember saying out loud. Why do they pick up the impatient tone in our voice that we use when we are very angry with our spouse and use it every time they talk to their siblings? And why can't they pick up the measured kindness we use to talk to complete strangers, instead? Our children do hear us--it's just that they hear what we do and not what we say. They are very observant. They see more than we wish them to see. They see who we are, and not who we tell them we are.

As we begin a new season, let's try--one more time--to be more intentional about what our kids are learning. Let's give them an opportunity to see us thinking seriously about our faith; responding to God's love for us through service to others; bowing our heads in prayer; and working for peace and justice in our world. Careful! The children are listening!

SHARE GOD'S GIFTS - SERVE ONE ANOTHER

God's gifts of talent, skill, wisdom, insight, and ability all enable us to earn money. That money enables us to purchase goods and services and enjoy many pleasures. HOW DO THEY LEARN?

I don't think it is an accident that the very first chapter in the book that the Christian Parenting Class is reading is entitled, "Money - designer jeans and presents." Our attitude toward money - how we choose to spend it, to share it, or to save it - is as much a statement of our basic values - our theology - as anything else we say or do.

It's hard to talk to our kids about money. We don't want our pre-schoolers to take our mortgage payment coupon book to Show and Tell; but when Grandfather dies, everyone is appalled that he never discussed his financial situation with any of his children. Somewhere in between, someone should have been brave enough to begin the conversation.

It is our goal at Potomac to introduce children to the general concept of stewardship from the very youngest classes up. The two's and three's have a Noah bank that they drop their pennies into every time they come. The older classes have a basket they use in some way every week to collect the offering. It is important that each child get a sense of making their own contribution every time they come to Sunday School. (If your children sit with you in church at the Offering time, they need to have something to put in the plate every time it is passed - otherwise, they get the idea that the money comes from others, and their contributions are neither wanted nor missed.)

This year the Sunday School has made a \$500 pledge to the Bicentennial Fund. It's a wonderful way for teachers to talk about the ways that the church spends its money. We spend a part of it to make it possible for this congregation to worship in this place (the building debt reduction), we spend part of it to help others in our community (the Winter Growth elderly care program), and we spend part of it to help God's people all around the world (the hospitals of Northern India Program).



What gifts will we give for Christmas this year that will truly last? It is sometimes easy to dismiss material gifts, but some "things" do have lasting value. Meg Greenfield wrote in her recent column in Newsweek how she noticed the same expression on the faces of the people who lost their homes in the terrible California fires or the Midwestern floods, and the refugees who wander homeless in places like Sarajevo and Sudan. They have lost everything we say.

A treasured quilt made by our great-grandmother has lasting value. A pocket knife, long carried by our father and now lovingly kept, elicits a similar response. An old tattered cookbook that our mother used is thought by us to be priceless. A child's painting, prominently displayed, is considered a masterpiece. It is, I think, because material things take on emotional and spiritual significance because of who made them or to whom they belonged.

These kinds of "things" are priceless because the givers give part of themselves. Is that not the message of Christmas? God gave himself to humankind in the birth of a baby in Bethlehem and invites us to give ourselves to one another.

the first night. Several of our young people returned during the week to talk, play cards, or watch television with the guests. Many church members joined in providing the packed lunches that we gave the guests to take with them each morning. Others cleaned up the kitchen, purchased supplies, transported mats and blankets, made signs, contributed sheets and towels, and performed other services. In all, more than 100 church members helped in various ways with the program, and they, in turn, were ably supported by the church staff.

A few of the guests asked for Bibles or took copies of the *Upper Room*. During the week, particularly before they left on Sunday morning, several guests expressed appreciation for what we were doing. At the end of the week, they presented us with a card, signed by all of them, on which one had written: "Thank you for your kind hospitality and thank God for nice people like you!"

It would be foolish to exaggerate either the help we gave our guests during the week or the effect of our participation in CBS on the overall problem of homelessness. All our guests had serious economic or personal problems when they came to us and still had them when they left. They are only a small fraction of the homeless even in Montgomery County, and among these are by no means the worst off. But at a minimum they had shelter and food for a week, and some of them at least seemed to find some measure of friendship and reassurance through being with us.

The Russian novelist Leo Tolstoy, an Orthodox Christian, wrote: "Be where you are." This week of service to the homeless was one of the many ways in which Potomac Presbyterian Church helps meet the needs, spiritual and physical, of our community.

OUR GUESTS

During the week of October 17, Potomac Presbyterian Church played host in our Fellowship Hall to about twenty-five of Montgomery County's homeless, providing shelter for the night, cooked dinners and breakfasts and packed lunches.

Our guests were participants in the Congregation Based Shelter Program, a year-round program designed to help those among the homeless who are willing and able to seek regular jobs and stable housing. Sponsored during the past ten months by Montgomery County Community Ministry, the aim was to find churches that would act as hosts, each for one week. The county agreed to give counseling and backup services for twenty-five homeless persons, each of whom would be expected to stay in the program for about six weeks. After careful study by the Mission Committee and the Session, we decided to be one of the host churches.

During our week, participation ranged from about seventeen over the weekends to about twenty-five at mid-week. Some of our guests have places where they can stay part of the week and some, for one reason or another, did not make it to the church on a given night. During the day, most guests received vocational or psychological counseling, obtained medical treatment, looked for jobs, or worked, in some cases at jobs they had found. They ranged in age from early 20s to late 60s. About three-fourths of them were men, and the rest were women. Several are receiving therapy for cancer.

Members of our church prepared and served cooked meals each night. Two church members, a man and a woman, along with a staff person from Community Ministry, slept each night on mats with the guests in Fellowship Hall. The youth of our church cooked and served a hamburger and hot dog supper on Sunday,

We have already alerted Anniversary Fund pledgers of this consideration. Please consider this in light of your own financial and tax situation. If you are able to make advance payments to the church before the end of this year, we will be better able to reduce our mortgage debt. This will help your church with the significant challenges and opportunities we face in 1994.


