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KERRY ON . . .

I went to see the movie Schlindler's List recently, and it was, to say the least, an emotionally powerful experience. It tells the story of the holocaust through the eyes of Oskar Schindler, a German industrialist living in Kracow, Poland. I had to prepare myself to see this movie, asking whether I wanted to view again the unspeakable horror of this chapter in human history. It was indeed horrible, especially as portrayed with all the latest in movie-making technique as given to us by director Steven Speilberg.

Of course, it is a reminder of inhumanity, and like the recently completed Holocaust Museum, a challenge never again to let this sort of thing happen. But it is something else, a story of moral ambiguity, one man's tale of mixed motives. Schindler begins simply as a clever businessman, currying favor with the Nazis in order to gain contracts for war supplies. His personal morality is anything but exemplary. He at first hires Jews from the ghetto as simply good business.

Eventually, he is moved by something other than the profit motive, all the while making a fabulous fortune. Well, you will have to see the movie for yourself - I don't want to give away the whoe story. What fascinated me is this matter of moral behavior that is not pure. It is a reminder to us that this side of the Kingdom, we all act with mixed motives, and proceed along a shadowy path which only sometimes shines bright with noble and courageous acts. The movie left me with a haunting question - how would I have acted in similar circumstances?

IMAGINING GOD

I've been thinking a lot lately about the image of God. Presbyterian Women are taking a lot of political heat over a conference last fall called "Reimagining 1993." It was an ecumenical conference on women's issues, and I guess some of the speakers said some really outrageous things - they always do. New ideas rarely come from those of us whose views are in the center of things. They come when someone on the "lunatic fringe" of the church says something insightful and wise. We have to listen to a lot of very foolish commentary, and ofter there is just a tiny grain of truth among all the chaff of noise that filters in and takes root and starts to grow. Sometimes it is a weed that has to be thrown out . . . is this starting to sound like a story you know? (Matthew 13:24)

It's been very hard for many women these days to come to terms with the very masculine language and images of the church. My mother doesn't see the problem. I see the problem, but I don't care very much. My daughters CARE! I wish we had paid much more attention to that commandment about making graven images. Does any picture of God interrupt our efforts to understand who God is? Even word pictures? A picture is worth 1,000 words - even if we didn't mean it to. Intellectually, I understand that God is not male, but I can't get that picture out of my head. Maybe it would help if the picture weren't reinforced by every line in the hymnbook? Maybe I need to be more careful of the words I use when I talk to your children? To address God as Our Father is regular, but a prayer addressed to Our Mother is outrageous . . . Excuse me, I'm still working on this . . .

So God created humankind in <u>his</u> image in the image of God, <u>he</u> created them; male and female <u>he</u> created them. Genesis 1:27



ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING—OFFERING

March 27 and April 3

"This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you."

John 15:12

It began with a Saturday evening broadcast 45 years ago, after United States church leaders had recognized the great needs of people in Europe and Asia in the aftermath of World War II. The broadcast asked Christians to give sacrificially at their churches the next morning. Presbyterians have been a part of One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) since that beginning. It is one of our primary ways to support ministries of compassion and self-enablement.

We responded quickly to the earthquake in Southern California by sending cots, tents, and blankets.

Individuals disabled by violence in Soweto, South Africa, have been given help to start their own businesses to gain income and dignity.

Teens in Detroit, Michigan, where unemployment is high, are being taught job skills and are learning to market those skills to create their own businesses. In the mid-west, we are helping family farmers band together to market their products and to rebuild.

In the Washington, D.C. area, we are supporting Hispanic health clinics and promoting health awareness among a growing immigrant community.

In our area, we are helping tenant cooperatives acquire and manage their apartments, preserving their homes and teaching valuable business skills.

All this, and more, we do in Christ's name. As we witness together, we proclaim our gratitude for God's grace and fulfill our role in his redemptive plan.

How much should we give to OGHS? Perhaps the answer can be found if we think how much per week we can share, to make this once a year offering a meaningful one.

The people of Bangladesh, among the poorest in the world, gave \$100,000 to the U.S. for mid-western flood relief this year. Having received much in their times of need, they were called to share with their brothers and sisters in our country.

Let us joyously and generously celebrate God's love for us and his presence in the world.

COIN BOXES FOR SHARING

The Sunday School children received a Coin Box for One Great Hour of Sharing on the first Sunday of Lent. The funds received from OGHS are used to respond to relief and development around the world. It is divided between Presbyterian World Service, the Self-Development of People Fund, and the Presbyterian Hunger Program. Last year, OGHS raised nearly 19 million dollars. The need is great this year, and we hope you will want to give generously.

Please help your children think about the needs of others every day during Lent. We have prepared a calendar to help you remember all the blessings we take so much for granted, and which are not available in all parts of our world. It is on a purple piece of paper, and we invite you to pick one up the next time you are at church, if you don't already have one. It was designed to go along with the children's boxes, but all families could use it. We hope you will use the calendar every day from now until Easter—perhaps with a word of prayer for the needs of the world and gratitude for all we have. Your children need to see you care. Your children need to hear you pray!



Kerry On . . .

I was reading an article recently entitled, "What Do Lay People Want, Anyway?" It was written by a lay person who listed some do's and don't's for pastors. I would like to share something he wrote that challenged me to think about my calling as a pastor.

"I'd like pastors to support and challenge me to live the good news in my daily life. Sometimes I need a pat on the back and other times I need a kick in the pants." I believe very deeply that the Gospel calls us to live out our faith in our daily vocation. Another way of saying this is our work matters to God. This is a real challenge to me to help us reflect on the meaning of our work and to bring a spiritual dimension to it.

On the other side the author wrote, "don't expect me to be too involved in the internal affairs of the church. I'm willing to do my fair share, but the institutional church is not the center of my live." Serving God in and through the church represents a small portion of my time and energy. This is the flip side of seeing our major calling within our vocations.

Often we recognize the contributions of people to the life of the congregation and this is good. What if we began to recognize the Christian ministry of our people as they serve God in their daily lives? A beginning at least is "Faith at Work Sunday" in the fall when some of our members speak about how they are trying to apply their faith in the work world.

I promise to do my best to support and challenge you as you live out your faith at work.

At staff meeting last week, Kerry asked me to write a farewell message for the *Steeple* to *People* for April. I hate to substantiate a rumor that I'm not very good at doing what I'm told, but I'm not planning to go away!

Just because I'm not going to occupy the office space, does not mean that you (and especially your children) will not occupy space in my heart. Stewardship by Example

Arthur Roy set a clear example of what stewardship beyond a life-time really means.

For years, Mr. Roy faithfully set up, maintained and operated the sanctuary sound system for his church, the First Presbyterian Church in San Diego. Unfortunately, Mr. Roy met with an untimely death in 1981 when he was struck by a bus and killed instantly. Mr. Roy's contributions to his church, however, did not end with his passing, for he had a will in which he named his church as the sole beneficiary.

Mr. Roy instructed in his will that his entire estate of \$22,624 be forever entrusted to the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Foundation, which would be responsible for investing the money and paying the income earned to the First Presbyterian Church of San Diego.

Over twelve years later, Mr. Roy's gift had grown to more than \$57,000—more than double his original gift. The income generated by his gift over those years amounted to nearly \$20,000.

Mr. Roy's bequest has enabled him to give beyond his lifetime and to give more than he would have ever imagined. His gift of everlasting stewardship is an example to us all.

Currently our congregation has three separate endowments. The Endowment committee is encouraging all members to consider putting PPC in their wills for "stewardship beyond a lifetime."





Kerry On . . .

Someone once said, "Don't say you don't have enough time. You have exactly the same number of hours per day that were given to Helen Keller, Pasteur, Michaelangelo, Mother Teresa, Leonardo da Vinci, Thomas Jefferson, and Albert Einstein."

The real issue is HOW we use the time we've been given. As Christians, we also put emphasis on the word GIVEN. All of life is a gift from a gracious and loving God. The Psalmist wrote, "This is the day the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad in it." None of us earn or deserve the hours and days and years of our lives—every moment is given to us by God.

If all time is really a gift, then we are invited to receive it with thanks and praise. We are invited to share it with others as perhaps the most precious gift we will ever give another person. Undivided attention, empathy, and presence are gifts of great value. We are invited to use our time wisely, as the hymn reminds us:

reetings! I'm delighted to be in ministry with all of you here at Potomac Presbyterian Church; I'm meeting lots of kind and friendly folk and appreciating more and more the work of my predecessors, Bev Bailey and Diane Hutchins. To tell you what it's like to be in a new place right now, I must share a story of the Easter season with you.

The disciples were assured success as they began to build Christ's church.

So, this is a good season for new beginnings! It's about answering God's call, stepping out in faith, and, ultimately, feeling empowered by the Holy Spirit to do the tasks that God sets before us.

May we all continue to feel empowered by the Holy Spirit as we seek to do God's work together in this place.





Kerry On ...

According to Martin Marty, writing in *The Christian Century*, church giving in America to benevolences in 1993 amounted to \$3 billion. This is the total of all giving for mission and ministry beyond the local congregation. At the same time, we spent \$330 billion on legalized gambling. Not only are the numbers astounding, but the rate of increase for gambling has risen by 1,800% since 1976.

I am reminded of the words of Jesus, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Matthew 6:21)

You may say, "That's not us doing all the gambling." Perhaps so, but all states except Utah and Hawaii now sanction leagalized gambling, and for the most part, churches have been strangely silent as one state after another has gone into the gambling business. It is touted as an economic panacea with benign social impact. Spiritual values are rearely part of the discussion.

If we trust the words of Jesus, we might do well to reflect on the gambling phenomenon, and seek ways to model his teaching in our lives. Further, is God calling the churches to speak out?



Kerry On . . .

This month I am beginning the 25th year of pastoral ministry, and recently I learned that a friend from our congregation in Knoxville, Tennessee, had decided to go to seminary. He is my age, and he asked me if he was getting started too late. I told him I didn't think so, as he has had over 25 years of good experience as an engineer and real estate developer. However, I agreed to put down some thoughts on pastoral ministry for him. I would like to share the results with you in two installments.

SOME THINGS I'VE LEARNED IN PASTORAL MINISTRY

Part I

- 1. Every sermon must have ONE theme which can be clearly stated in a simple sentence. Identify the theme as early as possible in the process of preparing. Then you will be able to bring to the theme a richness of experience, books, movies, news, pastoral contacts. Anything which does not serve the theme, no matter how good (jokes, stories, examples), must be set aside.
- 2. The result of every sermon is to have people say, I learned something today, I was moved by what you said, and I plan to do something about it.

 This is just another way of saying that sermons have to do with mind, heart, and will. Of course, one of the three may be emphasized more than the others on any given Sunday, but all three should be present to some extent.
- 3. Listen to your life.

It is essential to be about the task of listening for God in the circumstances, events, and people who touch our lives. If we are sensitive listeners in our own spiritual lives,



we will be better able to really hear what someone is saying to us. Frequently, we don't bring God to others, but rather help them discover God in their lives. He usually gets there before we do.

4. Be careful about telling other people what God is saying to them.

It is better to ask questions and offer reflections that help people say for themselves what God is saying to them. This is especially important when people are dealing with tragedy and grief, for many of us only come to understand what God is saying when we look back and discover God's hand at work in our lives.

5. Work matters to God.

In preaching and pastoring, we can never underestimate the value of affirming that God calls all Christians to vocation. Almost nothing brings greater satisfaction to people, and pleases God more, than that his children enjoy their work and serve others through it.





Kerry On . . .

Last month I shared with you the first part of "Some Things I've Learned in Pastoral Ministry." A number of you have spoken with me about these reflections, and I very much appreciate hearing from you. This month I share with you the conclusion of my reflections for now. You see, I want to reserve the opportunity to add more thoughts as we travel the journey of ministry together."

SOME THINGS I'VE LEARNED IN PASTORAL MINISTRY

Part II

- 6. Make appointments with yourself and your family. Except for emergencies, these appointments have at least equal value with whatever you do in the congregation. In this way we model for people a sense of balance between work and family.
- 7. Build trust! You can say hard things, challenging things—even confrontational things—as long as the people trust you. Trust is built over time, through thousands of small promises kept, ("I'll call you next week," and being sure you do call). Most of all it flourishes where people know that you sincerely do care about them.
- 8. Talk about money. How people earn it and spend it and give it away is perhaps the number one symbol of what they really value in life. Don't hesitate to ask people to give, for in that invitation, you are offering a blessing. Remember a person's need to give is always greater than the church's need to receive.
- 9. Get out of the way. It's not your church and of course it's not theirs either. The church belongs to God. Just as we want the people to trust us, we have to trust them to do the Lord's work. This means, for example, that you don't have to attend every committee meeting, or propose every new program, or head up every project.
- 10. Keep on studying, learning, discovering and growing. This is the key to keeping a freshness and enthusiasm in sermons and teaching and pastoring. Try something new and revisit something old, for both contain treasure. It also does wonders for your own sense of looking forward to each new day.





Let me reiterate a unique conversation I had recently with a new musical member of our congregation. It went something like this:

"I'd like to inquire about joining a choir."

"Strange you should ask, since directing's my task."

"At home we all sing and have rhythm to ring."

"Stop, say no more. I'm the one with the score."

"Are there rehearsals at night when my work day is done?"

"Yes, for adults who find music is fun."

"What about children with schedules demanding?"

"We practice on Sunday: the program's outstanding."

"You've got me convinced, but I'll never remember."

"I'll write it all down if you'll join in September."



fter a few years of working in the church, I've developed a couple of soap boxes from which I'm glad to preach at any opportunity. My most pas sionate topic is the ineffectiveness of the Sunday School. It's not that we have ineffective teachers, poor curriculum, too little money for supplies and equipment, or unwilling students. It's that we expect too much, and we have too little time in which to try to meet those expectations.

In your typical church in the Washington suburbs this year, Sunday School classes will be held on about 33 Sundays. Assuming everyone arrives on time and stays until the end of the class, each class may have approximately one hour of teaching-learning time a week.

Thus, we have, more or less, 33 hours per year of Christian education available. However, Sunday School is a voluntary pursuit, so we see almost none of our students every Sunday. Attendance two-thirds of the time would be considered very good. So, for our best attenders, we may provide around 22 hours of Christian education each year.

Into those 22 hours, poor children, youth, and adults who see each other only once a week (and need time to interact on a social level) Poor children, youth, and adults who have

been dealing with crises at home, school, and work (and need time to be cared for on an emotional level) Poor children, youth, and adults who have been frantically scrambling since the alarm went off to get to church on time (and need time to focus Poor children, youth, and adults who have parties, football or soccer games, and shopping in the afternoon on their minds You begin to get the picture: there's not a lot of time for the content, which includes Bible stories, theology, Christian living, prayer, worship, and service to others.



What's the church to do about it? We can offer opportunities beyond Sunday morning; we can work hard to ensure that our teachers, curriculum, supplies, and equipment are as effective as possible; we can urge folks to participate every week. In short, there's not much more the church can do than it is already doing, except...

We can encourage and assist families in again becoming a primary locus for Christian education. Surprised? The Sunday School is a new invention. It began in England in the 1780's, with the aim of teaching children who worked in factories to read. Since they worked six days a week, Sunday was the only day this could happen. In the US, Sunday Schools (with a joint education-religion focus) spread westward before churches. The attachment of Sunday Schools to churches happened only in the late 1800's. Throughout most of the history of the church, Christian education, in whatever form, happened primarily in the home.



We hope you will join us in making 1994's bazaar another outstanding success.



Let's ease into November with a few "short takes" . . .

- Did you have a big crowd of trick-or-treaters at your house? We go all out for All Hallow's Eve, but we almost never remember the actual holiday—the next day. It's All Saints' or All Souls' Day! Celebrate a belated All Saints' Day now, by remembering someone who has nurtured you in the faith. If that person is living, you may want to call or write a note to him or her.
- I'm a big proponent of labor-saving devices. I welcome most new technology, but now, with call forwarding, call waiting, e-mail, answering machines and cellular phones everywhere, it's getting harder than ever for me to pretend I didn't know you called. (This truism works as well with the parties reversed, I might note!)

- I find I'm able to spend the most concentrated periods of time in prayer when I'm cleaning out the refrigerator or washing dishes. I can be fairly certain no one will interrupt me in those pursuits.
- Have you used an Advent calendar in your home in recent years? Try one this season—you still have plenty of time! I'm thinking of the paper ones that have doors or windows to open each day. Using the Advent calendar helps heighten the sense of waiting and preparation that the Advent period is all about.





Kerry On . . .

Why do we come back to the CHRISTMAS EVE SERVICES every year?

The "faithful" who come to church almost every Sunday are here. They expect more of the same (Good News), they never seem to get enough. They know the story backwards and forward; some of them could probably tell it better than the preacher. Christmas Eve is different somehow, the hushed stillness, the candlelight, the music and the incredible news that in that one tiny baby in a manger God invested the totality of his love. God just pulled out all the stops and made a baby.

The "lapsed Presbyterians," many of them children of the faithful, are here. Something draws them, and it is more than just Mom and Dad's expectation that the family will sit together on Christmas Eve. They too want more, more than the fast paced whirl of career and more than you can find at the Mall. The endless round of parties begin to lose a certain luster. Events of the past year conspire to bring them face to face with mortality and other big questions. Perhaps this year they say, "the story will be for me," and Christmas will be a spiritual gift.

The "reluctant seekers" are here, cajoled into coming by spouse, or family or friend. They see no need for the church, especially the institution called church. They ask themselves, however, in a quiet moment, "What if it is true?" And they wait to hear the story again. Perhaps the preacher will put a new twist on the narrative.

Maybe this time it will make sense.

All are welcome of course! I'll see you Christmas Eve.

Lines from LYNETTE

Our son, Jake, will be 20 months old on Christmas Day. My husband and I will soon have to decide whether Jake will go see Santa at the mall this year. For years before Jake was born, I swore I would never introduce my children to the idea of Santa. Now, as a parent, I equivocate. The commercialism of Santa still rankles, but I remember how magical and wonderful Christmas morning was to me as a child: with my family, walking into the living room in the pre-dawn darkness, with only Christmas tree lights twinkling, to see what Santa had left me.

The Santa myth is fun. It's part of the holiday season. It was important to me as a child, and I don't remember forgetting about Jesus' birth. On the other hand, I regret that gifts from Santa (which were always exactly what I wanted) overshadowed well-intentioned, thoughtful, and less expensive gifts from friends and relatives (which often weren't what I wanted). I regret remembering Jesus' birth simply and worship-fully on Christmas Eve and then celebrating Santa's arrival with excess on Christmas Day. I regret the noisy "give me, give me" mentality of the Santa myth prevailing over the quiet, "I gave for you" of God.

How can Ray and I, as Christian parents, make a sane and sensible path through the ideological and traditional muddle? I don't have an answer yet. I hope that, through the years, our family can recover the tradition behind Santa Claus: the tradition of St. Nicholas, Bishop of Myra, who gave gifts generously and secretly to persons in need. I would like us to focus on giving, rather than receiving; to focus on the needs and wants of others rather than our own wants.

God's Christmas gift to us, perhaps not what we want, but certainly what we need, is a Savior. Without bright paper and bows, our gift arrives wrapped in plain cloth, lying in a manger. It's hard for Jesus to be noticed in Santa's technicolor world, but I want Jake to rejoice over God's gift on Christmas morning, not Santa's. God gave: for you, for me, for Jake.


