





A GOOD HERO IS HARD TO FIND

t's tough to find a good hero these days—it seems the tabloid media has the "dirt" on just about everyone. Whom should we admire? And, isn't it disappointing when those we admire stumble? How devastating to learn that our heroes are human, too!

God's good news to us is that God's heroes are human! To recall but a few, there's Jacob, who steals his brother's inheritance; Rahab the prostitute, who saves the lives of Joshua and Caleb; David the King, who takes another man's wife; Peter, the straight-A student disciple, who denies his Lord three times. God welcomes us and uses us, perhaps not in spite of our

human foibles and failings, but <u>because</u> of them. We can be examples of God's grace and forgiveness at work.

Are your children becoming acquainted with the heroes of our faith—are they learning to make these heroes their own? Share stories with your child about heroes and heroines of the faith: biblical, historical, and contemporary. Follow up these stories with conversations about—or even with—these faithful people. How is their faith important to them? What can we learn from them? There may be heroes in your neighborhood or here at church. Introduce your children to people for whom faith is real and active.

Are your children becoming acquainted with the heroes of our faith—are they learning to make these heroes their own?

I invite you to join me during Lent in creating a montage of heroes of the faith, of names and faces, in the downstairs children's hallway. Draw or bring pictures or photographs of people who have modeled the Christian faith for you. Use a card by the downstairs bulletin board to write down a hero's name, and a brief sentence about how that person's faith and faithfulness has impacted <u>your</u> life and faith. A good hero shouldn't be hard to find!



ur denomination's official survey arm, The Presbyterian Panel, recently released results of its February, 1995 interviews on Bible reading. The Presbyterian Panel is a representative sample of four groups belonging to the Presbyterian Church (USA). These four groups are: members, elders currently serving on the session, pastors, and specialized clergy (such as chaplains, professors, and counselors).

A majority of members and elders reported infrequent or no Bible reading during the previous year (62% of members; 56% of elders). A majority of members (52%) said they never read the Bible in a group devoted specifically to Bible study.

Family Bible reading occurs rarely—the two exceptions are the holidays of Christmas and Easter. At those times, a majority read the Bible as a family (54% of members, 51% of elders, 66% of pastors and specialized clergy).

Asked whether they had read the Bible to children (their own or others') outside of a Sunday school class, 66% of members and 65% of elders reponded they had not. Only a few (6% of members, 5% of elders) often read Bible stories to children outside Sunday School.


I'm distressed. Are you?

We have dedicated volunteer teachers and

leaders, but one hour of Sunday School each week, even faithfully attended, won't make our children faithful Christians. We must, as parents, take responsibility for our children's Christian education-make time to read the Bible, look at Sunday School papers together, tell Bible stories, watch Bible videos, talk about our faith. If we don't step up to do our part, it's a cinch that no one else will!

Let's begin some dialogue here! What are you doing at home to share and strengthen your faith? Is it working? Is it not? Share your ideas with me or with the Christian education committee as we seek, together, ways of helping families grow in faith.

The Lectionary provides an Old Testament, Gospel, Epistle (New Testament letter), and a Morning and Evening psalm for each day. The reader's—or the preacher's—challenge is to find a common thread running through many or all of the day's passages. The three years of the Lectionary are designated Years A, B, and C; the year begins with the church year, on the first



What's the thing the pastors wear around their necks? Why do the pastors have them in so many different colors?

Dear Close:

Thanks for asking! It's called a stole. Pastors wear it as a symbol that they are under the authority of Christ. (Think about it as an ox yoke, yoking the oxen together, and keeping them under their master's rein.) The various colors mark the seasons of the church year.

To state it quite simply, white is the color used for the holiest, happiest of seasons, like Christmas, Epiphany, and Easter, as well as baptisms and the Lord's Supper. Purple is used for the seasons of waiting, preparing, and reflecting, like Advent and Lent, although dark blue is sometimes substituted for Advent. Red is used to mark times of great courage, like Palm Sunday and Pentecost. Green is used for all of the long, "ordinary" times of the church year, between Epiphany and Lent, and from Pentecost until Advent. You might think of green being used for "Christian growing season."



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Forgive Us Our Debt

Mortgage Reduction Campaign

May 1996

It has been three years since Potomac Presbyterian Church held the Bicentennial Anniversary Campaign to support the Winter Growth day care program in Montgomery County and Christian Mission Hospitals in North India. This Anniversary Campaign also raised funds which allowed the church to make a one-time payment of \$50,000 to reduce the facility mortgage principal with Riggs Bank.

At the recommendation of the stewardship and finance committee, the Session approved a Mortgage Reduction Campaign during the month of May to again fund a reduction of mortgage principal. Our present mortgage agreement with Riggs stipulates that principal reduction with reammortization of the monthly payments be made in \$50,000 increments.

Presently, PPC has approximately \$25,000 available toward a second \$50,000 principal payment. The existing funds of \$25,000 are a balance in the Anniversary Campaign account for mortgage reduction, as well as a significant gift from a PPC member to the Building Fund.

By receiving pledge commitments for \$25,000, the mortgage principal can again be reduced saving approximately \$5,000 a year in interest payments. These saved dollars can be diverted and used for other ongoing PPC programs as well as for the development and growth of future new programs.

Gambling loses—for now

Casino gambling in Maryland, which many of our church members signed petitions against, suffered resounding defeat in this year's session of the state legislature.

Citizen protest was so strong that proponents of casino gambling, including several influential legislative leaders, decided not even to take up the issue in this year's session. Instead, an attempt was made to place slot machines at race tracks. This proposal also was rejected. The only gaming bill that became law was a trial application for Washington County.

Community Ministry of Montgomery County presented petitions against casino gambling containing more than 500 signatures, including many from our church, to our state representatives. The opposition of the churches is said by observers of Maryland politics to have been crucial in the legislative fight.

According to Community Ministry director Lon Dring, "It was something of a total victory for groups opposing increased gambling in the state." Dring said that the Presbyterian and Methodist churches were particularly active in the fight. He warned that proponents of casino gambling are even now planning to relaunch their efforts next year.

KERRY On

I am sometimes asked to offer a prayer at various non-church gatherings, and I usually make an effort to sincerely ask for God's help and blessing and at the same time not offend anyone. The more I've thought about it the harder it has become to pray such a prayer.

A friend and professor of preaching, Fred Craddock, tells about one such prayer that he gave. It was a prayer that he has been saying every day for the past forty years.

Gracious God, I am grateful for a way of life that's more important than how I happen to feel about it today.

After the meeting a successful looking middle aged man came up to him and said, "You are the one who gave the prayer aren't you?"

"Yes." said Mr. Craddock.

"Well, I don't agree. There's nothing more important than how you happen to feel today. It's how you feel that gives something it's importance. If you don't feel it's important, it's not important."

There you have it, the gap between the Gospel and a modern lifestyle based on how one happens to feel. May God give us grace to choose the former.





Himalayan Highlights

News from Missionaries Jay and Rebecca Mashburn in Nepal

We are now living in the home of a Nepali family. They have become our good friends and helped us with the transition from America to Nepal. We share a western style toilet with three families, and we have electricity most of the time and a hot bath if we take the time to heat a water bucket up on the stove!

We have started formal Nepali language studies. The task of concentrated language studies is both frustrating and challenging. Imagine trying to speak like the very best two year old you know.

We attend church on Saturday, since that is their day of rest. We can now follow along with some of the songs. The Nepali Church was underground until just five years ago. There is great excitement as the church grows rapidly because of the new freedoms. How else can one describe Christians who sit on the edges of their seats for a one hour sermon. We sit on the floor for the full two hour service.

The culture of Nepal is basically that of the Hindu religion. There are millions of gods, 164 holidays per year and just as many ways to interpret the Hindu faith. One thing is for sure: religious or not, the culture is rich in rituals and tradition.

Hundreds of years ago, there were many feuding Hindu kings within Nepal, In the 1700's, the Rana kingdom was established and Nepal was united. The king introduced the caste system in order to control the masses. Each tribe or family group was assigned specific tasks, and to this day, the caste system remains. This makes it very difficult to rise out of a predeter-

mined mold but does offer a certain order to life. Prearranged marriages are still the norm and quite accepted. Folks say one learns to love after marriage, not before. In the Hindu faith, it is the eldest son who must perform the death rituals so important for eternal life, thus leading to the importance of male offspring. So many things are foreign to our way of life and our Christian belief system; some healthy, some not. At first, traditions seem unfair and rigid until we understand the reasoning behind them. We are striving toward this depth of understanding before we pass judgment.



Eugene Peterson writes in Living the Message,

An appetite for God is easily manipulated into a consumer activity. There are entrepreneurs among us who see the widespread hunger for spirituality as a marketplace and are out there selling junk food. The gullibility of the unwary who bought relics from itinerant monks in the Middle Ages—splinters of wood from the true cross. finger bones from the saints, a few pieces of thread from Jesus' seamless robe—is more than matched by North Americans in matters of spirituality.

A consumer mentality is so ingrained in us that we seem to think that we can find spiritual life in the same way. The problem is a mind set that is based on wanting and a notion that our wants can be satisfied by buying something. Even if we have realized that things cannot satisfy spiritual hunger, a consumer attitude still influences our spiritual quest.

I like Peterson's translation of I John 2:17 which I think brings some clarity to how best to satisfy our longing.

> The world with all its wanting, wanting wanting is on the way out — but whoever does what God wants is set for eternity.



Someone once said to the preacher at the door following the service,

News from the Mashburns, United Mission to Nepal

from Rebecca . . .

"I have been very busy at the clinic as we've had some very seriously ill patients. We have been instrumental in starting a "charity" fund through the local church, a first for them. Remember that until 1990 it was illegal to be a Christian and so the church has not had a history of community outreach but one of conflict and survival. Anyway, the church is very excited about learning how to serve one another through outreach. Last night I was called to the clinic to see two men who had barely survived an avalanche. . . They were buried with 10 feet of debris for over 2 hours. . . These guys were suffering from hypothermia and had multiple abrasions and global bruising and really sore backs. I am still very worried about Amour Badhar; he cannot walk for back pain and is staying with us while his friend is staying in a nearby "hotel." The church is paying the clinic bill, housing, and food and is planning to buy them some basic provisions once they are able to leave. Their village is a full day's walk from here. I asked what would have happened to these men if the church were not here and the clinic said they would sleep outside (it's been raining non-stop for three days, hence the land-slide). What about food? No one could answer. This is a tough culture for those of low caste or with just plain bad luck. Candice has spent the afternoon reading/showing books to him. He had never seen a book before. In fact he didn't even know how to open them. She told him about how God created the world and everything in it and how God loves everyone, including him. He had never heard of such a God. May the peace of our loving God be with you all.



Not too long ago, I read about a "controlled burning" of some forest land in upstate South Carolina. What a wonderful thing it is to be able to determine the best use of some land for the future and to devise a deliberate plan to get the land into the proper shape for it. Rangers and firefighters were able to arrange the path of the fire in

such a way that it never burned too high or too far afield—and the fire burned, exactly according to plan. It also was put out, exactly according to plan.

It occurs to me that "firefighting" is a fairly common occupation in the church. But church firefighting tends not to be "controlled burning." We spot a fire (a person or program needing attention), stomp it out ("take care" of it), and then we wait for the next fire to be called in. Sometimes there are so many fires we can't even take the time to figure out what's burning. Other times there aren't any fires (that we know about, anyway), so we sit around and pass the time of day.

One of the greatest blessings—and curses—of our Presbyterian form of government is our system of committees. In any Presbyterian church, committees are established to assess needs and develop forms of ministry to meet those needs. As committees formulate plans, the Session approves, disapproves, makes suggestions, sets funding and staffing, and schedules them, based on the direction that the Session sees for the whole church. This system of committees can (and should) ensure that programs are well thought out and do meet needs in the church and community.

This same system of committees can also make individual church members feel far removed from the inner-workings of the church, feel that they have no one with whom to discuss their needs, or feel that the wheels are moving so slowly that their needs are not ever going to be addressed.

A "fire" in the church makes us recognize the urgency of dealing with a particular program or of addressing a particular need, but there shouldn't always have to be something "wrong" before our committees begin to assess, formulate, reformulate and program! The good news is that nothing is wrong! The better news is that we're looking at the BIG picture! New officers have just been elected, the Session is going on retreat November 17 to learn new ways to be spiritual leaders within the congregation, and over the next few months, many of our committees will be getting new leaders and seeking new members.

If you are asked to serve on a committee, consider it seriously and prayerfully—we need dedicated people to undertake the work of God's church! If you have or see some areas of need, please let the relevant committee members and chairpersons know about these needs. It's important for us to know whether we're doing the jobs we set out do!

Let's hear it for "controlled burning"!



Our church-wide Advent theme this year is "Light." This is a great idea-play: We think of Jesus' coming as the "Light of the World," and at the same time, we visualize the Nativity scene, with the bright Christmas star over the stable. Be listening for the word and looking for signs of light throughout the month of December!

The following paragraphs come to us from "Church Family Newsletters" (© 1995, Augsburg-Fortress) and serve as a good introduction to our Advent theme. Read on!

Have you ever been awake at night when the electricity went off and everything got dark? That can be scary! It can also be a time of hope, because you know that the electricity will come back on eventually, and daylight will come again. That's what Advent is all about. The word Advent means "coming." We see things differently because Jesus came to us and will come to us again, and that fills us with hope.

That's why Advent's color is blue—for hope. It could also be purple—reminding us that Jesus is a royal king.

On the "New Year's Day" of the church—the first Sunday of Advent—we start using a different series of Bible readings in worship. Some years we read from the book of Matthew, the next year we use Mark, and then we use Luke. The Gospel of John is used every year.



Advent is a time of waiting. Sometimes the four weeks of Advent seem like a long time, but that time can help us remember that there is more to Christmas than shopping for Christmas presents! Some people light a candle on each of the four Sundays of Advent, both at church and at home. Some people use Advent calendars to count the days until Christmas. Some people drill holes in a log, one for each day before Christmas, and put a candle in each hole. One candle is lit each day. Sometimes Advent carols are sung, and prayers for those who are homeless or hungry are shared. Why not try some of these ideas in your home this year? Jesus came to save us all!


