

Most of you know how much I appreciate Fred Buechner and his writing. Perhaps his words may serve as a guide for our lives in 1997:

Listen to your life. All moments are key moments.

I discovered that if you really keep your eye peeled to it and your ears open, if you really pay attention to it, even such a limited and limiting life as the one I was living on Rupert Mountain opened up onto extraordinary vistas. Taking your children to school and kissing your wife goodbye. Eating lunch with a friend. Trying to do a decent day's work. Hearing the rain patter against the window. There is no event so commonplace but that God is present within it, always hiddenly, always leaving you room to recognize him or not to recognize him, but all the more fascinatingly because of that, all the more compellingly and hauntingly If I were called upon to state in a few words the essence of everything I was trying to say both as a novelist and as a preacher, it would be something like this: Listen to your life. See it for the fathomless mystery that it is. In the boredom and pain of it no less than in the excitement and gladness: touch, taste, smell your way to the holy and hidden heart of it because in the last analysis all moments are key moments, and life itself is grace.

And as we let our own light shine, we unconsciously give other people permission to do the same.





Sabbatical Plans



Hutchinson gives first gift to general endowment fund

Do you ever wonder why you do not see me very often at coffee hour on Sunday mornings? Following my postlude, there is usually a line of curious young elementary-age musicians waiting at the organ bench. They come up to learn about the organ.

When they first began coming, I would allow them to push the cancel button, turn off the power switch, pull down the roll top, and turn the key to lock the instrument. But then they started asking questions about the manuals, the pedals, the stops, the pistons, the sound names and how to produce them. I could not resist their curiosity. Gradually, with my careful instruction and supervision, they began

setting stop combinations, playing designated notes, identifying manuals by name and creating chords—each child contributing one finger or one foot to the finished product.

These children are now starting to listen more carefully to the hymns, responses, and special music during the worship service. I know this by the questions a comments they make about my registrations (the way I combine organ stops to create certain instrumental sounds). On January 19th, one student said that I made the organ sound like "Star Wars." After 34 years of serving as a church organist, I have finally arrived!

Thank you, God, for the refreshing curiosity of children.





Berger Lecture Sunday, March 19

The distinguished theologian and sociologist Os Guinness will deliver the fourth Frederick E. Berger Memorial Lecture in our church Sunday, March 9. Dr. Guinness will speak at the 9:45 a.m. hour in Fellowship Hall and preach at the 11:00 a.m. worship service. His theme will be applying God's will in a pluralist society.

Os Guinness was born in China where his parents were medical missionaries during World War II. He remained there until 1951 when the Communist government forced most foreigners to leave. He was educated in England at the University of London and Oxford University, where he received a doctorate of philosophy in social sciences from Oriel College.

He has lived in the Washington, D.C., area since 1984. He has been a Guest Scholar at Woodrow Wilson Center for International Studies and a Visiting Fellow at the Brookings Institution. From 1986 to 1989, he was executive director of the Williamsburg Charter Foundation and one of the drafters of the Williamsburg Charter on religious freedom. Currently, he is Senior Fellow of the Trinity Forum, a seminar-style forum for senior executives and political leaders. His books include *No God But God: Breaking With the Idols of Our Age* and *The American Hour*. His next book will be on the subject of vocation.

The Berger Memorial Lecture is presented by Potomac Presbyterian Church in memory of Fred Berger who joined our congregation in 1985 and died in 1988 after a long and gallant battle with cancer. Fred was committed to adult education and especially the study of contemporary issues from a theological perspective. His wife, Dr. Zidi Berger, and their sons, Christian and Jonathan, are members of our congregation.

hen my husband and I moved into our home—six years ago this Memorial Day—we fit comfortably. For six years, we've added things: "treasure" and junk, furniture, and, of course, two children and all the paraphernalia thereof. We no longer fit so comfortably into our house. n fact, over the past few months, this prospect has become downright alarming to us. We cannot buy any more anything—to my bargain-hunter's heart, this is a crushing blow.

We've spent some time trying to sort through, pare down, donate, give or throw away. In this process we've learned a few valuable lessons:

- 1. If we don't know how to handle something, we hang on to it. We've done this with door prizes from family reunions, ancient travel brochures, not-quite-junk mail, and unmatchable socks.
- 2. If we remember a time when an article of clothing once fit us, we hang on to it. Who knows, we may one day be that size again.
- 3. If we know something is part of a larger set, we hang on to it. We do this even though we have no idea where the larger set is.
- 4. If we know something is truly antique, we hang on to it. It may prove to be valuable—even if it's too ugly to display or too fragile to use.
- 5. If we know an item was given to us by a close friend or relative, we hang on to it. We may be asked to produce it in the future.

There are doubtless more lessons to be gleaned from our over-stuffed home, but I'll stop here. It does occur to me that these lessons might have some relevance to church life as well. Bear me out as I stretch my metaphorical yarn:

- 1. Things we don't know how to handle, we hang on to. Conflict, hurt feelings, missed deadlines, unclear expectations—yup! We hang on to them in the church.
- 2. Things that once "fit," we hang on to. Ideas, programs, equipment, you can name others. Some are still great, but we need to recognize that some have served their purpose. We can still enjoy them in the photo album.
- 3. Things that are part of bigger things, we hang on to. Our connectional system





The frugal penny-pincher in me hints that Emma won't care if she gets recycled toys this year.

Once we're all home, the TV tells us that there are fantastic new toys Jake shouldn't have to live without. The newspaper tells us that Ray and I really deserve the best—jewelry can be purchased in easy monthly installments, after all. And the toy store ad in our mailbox tells us that, if we truly love our baby, we'll want her to have the best, latest, most colorful, developmentally appropriate items ever created.

Whew! How do we sort out the voices? When we buy gifts, what criteria do we use in selecting them? Even were money in unlimited supply, we would (I think) still make choices about what to buy or give.

It is my contention that there is faith language to describe how we make choices in our gift-giving. I am challenging myself to be courageous enough to try that language with my family. It is my tendency to express convenience instead of conviction. I say, "That's too

expensive" rather than use the language of stewardship to say, "You have enough"—or to say, "I'm not buying that for you today" rather than use the language of holiness to say, "Guns hurt people, and we don't believe in buying hurtful toys."



News from the Mashburns . . .

"Dear Family, Friends, and Innocent Bystanders,

I must start by catching you all up on some of the people in our other letters. You will all remember the little girl that Rebecca diagnosed to have a serious heart condition. She was being raised by her grandfather. The Testers of Johnson City, Tennessee, wrote to ask about the possibility of being able to adopt her. Rebecca sent word up to her village, but no response came back. Rebecca continued to get word to the grandfather until she was finally informed that the little girl had already died, and that is why the grandfather had not replied.

The little boy who had the badly infected hand did finally get medical help. He ran off and hid all day long to prevent Rebecca from working on his hand. His hand hurt so much that he was afraid of having to tolerate any more pain. Well, he was balled out by his little brother for his lack of courage, and his brother finally shamed him into allowing Rebecca to work on him. Well, his hand has almost fully recovered. He is now a semipermanent fixture in our house. He loves Joel and Candice's "television." Candice and Joel each have a "Viewmaster." For people who have never seen a television, it is a television. The really nice thing about a Viewmaster is that there are never any commercials.

We had a visit from Colorado friends just in the knick of time. They brought over some basic medical supplies that are not available, in reasonably good quality. They brought microscopes; and a lab technician from the United Mission to Nepal working in Kathmandu came out to do some training.

The Project's first serious accident occurred when two workers were crushed between wheel loaders in a tunnel. The Coloradans had just brought chest tubes and Rebecca used one to save one man's life. However, at the instant she inserted the tube she was struck with the fear that she had just killed him. So much blood came streaming out of his chest she thought that she must have hit his heart. Her relief came when the man who was gasping for breath said, "I can breathe, thanks." The microscopes and new training were used for blood and to find a donor for the gravity-feed blood transfusion.

The next day, Rebecca was sent for when a man severed an artery in his arm. With tongue depressors as retractor, Rebecca was able to stop the bleeding and send him to Kathmandu for surgery.

That evening, a rock fell in one of the tunnels, breaking a man's back. Rebecca and the clinic staff worked on this man late into the night. The man had use of his legs when the accident occurred, but after the long stretcher ride down the mountain, he had no feeling.

Now the most recent news is that the first two men were discharged from the hospital yesterday. The one man had fully collapsed one lung and half collapsed the other. The other man had lacerated his liver, and developed pneumonia in the hospital. The man with the cut arm is back at Kirne, and still hasn't regained movement. The man with the broken back is back in Kirne and Rebecca is caring for him. He has regained most of his feeling in his legs.

The excitement of all of this has now settled down, and I have to believe that Rebecca is the right person to be here. We Presbyterians are thought to believe in predestination. For me, predestination is being at the right place at the right time with the right reason. The friends who visited were at the right place at the right time because they believed that God wanted them to be there. At least two people, who would have been dead without the supplies they brought, are alive. I will take that as evidence that God did want them here.

Commit to Growth and Renewal

Godspeed to Kerry as he begins his sabbatical; we hope he will find rest, study, reflection, growth. We also look forward to this time as one of growth and renewal for our congregation. We expect that when we reunite as pastor and church, there will be a synergy from our independent experiences which will be greater than the two parts. Please commit to working together to reap the most benefit we can from these three months. It is an exciting time, full of potential.



You might enjoy rethinking some of the old familiar Bible stories. Sometimes it helps to identify with different characters in the story. What if I were Samuel, or David's father Jesse, or King Saul, Bathsheba, or Nathan, as well as David himself?

Thank you for being such a fine congregation and providing us with this sabbatical time. You are in our prayers during this time that we are apart—May the Lord bless you and keep you.

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



nections" with one another. They are times to give thanks for past blessings, to enjoy the present opportunity to see face to face, and to envision our hopes for the future.

Five We are all invited to be more attentive to Sabbath time. Maybe we won't have three months away, but we can stop for briefer times and reflect on who we are and where we are going. We need to take time away from busy schedules to be quiet and to hear God's still small voice. It is God-honoring to stop the busyness long enough to acknowledge that in the end it is God's grace that is sufficient and not our ceaseless activity. I knew the truth of this, but sabbatical time reminded me that it is essential for physical and emotional and spiritual wholeness.

Conclusion I believe that these reflections can be guides for your faith journey as well. You worship and care for one another, and you are "God-namers, God-noticers" too. hills of Tennessee. Being away from this place of worship helped me to see what it is that ultimately brings people together on Sunday mornings. Here we affirm that we have come to listen for God's word to us.

Here we return again and again because we belong. We are welcomed, comforted, encouraged, and cared for by the people of God. Of course God can speak to us on a mountain top or by the sea, but it is in the company of God's people that speaking takes on human form. No wonder the Gospel says, the Word became flesh and dwelt among us full of grace and truth.

Here we pledge allegiance to God revealed in Jesus Christ and we do so in a culture that is apathetic and sometimes hostile. In worship we speak promises of love for God and neighbor and by doing so in public we say that we are willing to be held accountable. What we hear and say in worship shapes our character and challenges us to live out the Gospel in everyday life.

Two I have always preferred the title of "pastor" and during my sabbatical my calling has been reaffirmed. Good programs are important but they come and go—relationships last. The Gospel is about human beings learning how to care for one another. It reaffirms the words of the prophet Micah, that God has shown us what is good and what the Lord requires—to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with God. Being with you in times of both joy and sorrow is the richest treasure a pastor can enjoy.

Three I have been reminded and encouraged to be a "God-noticer, a God-namer." That's Gene Peterson's definition of a theologian. God gives the stuff of everyday experience—the mundane and the ecstatic—as the raw material of theology. To me this means looking beneath the surface to see what God is saying. In the middle of the awe inspiring Canadian Rockies it is not too difficult. You almost have to exclaim in the words of the hymn:

O Lord my God! when I in awesome wonder Consider all the worlds thy hands have made, I see the stars, I hear the rolling thunder, Thy power throughout the universe displayed. Then sings my soul, my Savior God to thee, How great thou art, how great thou art.

In the delicate weave of circumstances, people, places, and experiences we can see the hand of God at work. I give thanks to God for the people of faith who have gone before me and given of themselves that God's purpose for my life has been unmistakably shaped. It was God who guided my parents to pass on a vital Christian faith to me. It was pastors and teachers and professors who shaped my sense of calling to ministry. It is family and colleagues and the people of this congregation who continue to challenge and encourage me. In all of these ways I name God as the prompter in the drama of this journey called faith.

Four Remember to make connections. Birthdays, anniversaries, reunions are priceless treasures. If you're thinking about one of these kinds of celebrations, just do it. Sometimes its the last opportunity you'll have. Did you ever consider how the Bible is full of feasting, parties, and celebrations. God's way is for his children to keep on making "confeasting," the state of the st



Some Things I've Learned About Church

Since returning from sabbatical I've been thinking about what church means to me. Perhaps being away from the place called church I was better able to think about the people called church. Next month I will continue with these musings.

- 1. The church belongs to God, not to us. We are really stewards of this community of faith that for all its failings and triumphs is the primary expression of God's presence in the world. In Scripture the church is in fact called the Body of Christ. It is like a treasure entrusted to our care and a gift to be shared with our neighbors.
- 2. We don't choose it—God calls us to church. God initiates love toward us and forms us into a family. Our choosing has to do with our response to God's love. Consumers choose what product or service to buy—congregations are chosen by God to be a people. We don't go to church—we gather for worship and then go out to be church.
- 3. The only hypocrite I worry about is me. People say, "I don't belong to a church because the church is full of hypocrites." That may be true, but it's one of the reasons we need church. We need to be held accountable, to be challenged, to be guided and forgiven. Someone said, "the church is not a club for saints, but a hospital for sinners." Besides, no one can fool God.
- 4. Where else can I hear about compassion and justice, self sacrifice and gratitude, fidelity and loyalty. Church is where we are invited to be, by the grace of (See Kerry, continued on page 8)







God, the best we can be. The culture more often than not appeals to our lesser instincts. The culture plays the tune loud and clear—me first! 5. Church is where we learn the language of prayer. It's fair to say we have a certain natural inclination to pray. In the moment of a crisis people cry out, "Oh my God!" In the company of others on the journey, we discover words to express the deepest human emotions. Our best words are often set to music and they express what is on our hearts as well as our minds.

On Being a Christian Educator

As I have been introducing myself to your children this month, I have really struggled with how to describe what I do in their terms. Frankly, sometimes as I look out at your friendly, smiling faces, I wonder . . . just what do these people expect from me? What do I know that might make a difference in their lives? What do they think a Christian educator can add to the ministry here at Potomac?

I usually tell the children that I plan and organize Sunday School and Enrichment for them. And I do see that those things happen.

But in the regular Sunday School year
from September through June there are
only about 37 Sundays. So, if your children come every week—and I know they
will—we have about 37 hours, assuming
they are here on time at 9:45, to teach
Bible stories, basic theology, Christian
living, prayer, fundamentals of worship,
and mission responsibility and service—
not to mention engendering a sense of joy
and passion about following Jesus and
developing a personal relationship with
God in Christ. We'll do our best, but it won't be enough.

educator that really matters in your children's lives is you. . . . No matter what we say on Sunday morning, they learn about being a Christian from living with you.

I will do my best for you, but the only Christian educator that really matters in your children's lives is you. They learn to take their faith seriously by watching you. They need to see you read the Bible. They need to see you bow your head in prayer. They need to see you responding to God's love through service to others. They need to see you working for peace and justice in the world. No matter what we say on Sunday morning, they learn about being a Christian from living with you.

Being a Christian educator is a full time job. I hope I can help you to think about how to do it better so we can keep all that God has commanded upon our hearts, "And to teach them diligently to your children, and talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise up." (Deut 6:7)

- 6. Church is where we share our deepest joys and sorrows. Weddings and baptisms are moments when joy abounds and the community gives thanks to the God who made us in love and gives us the capacity to love. Walking the road of suffering together makes the burden a little lighter. When loved ones die, we often discover how much our friends in Christ truly care. In this community, God binds up the brokenhearted and keeps hope alive.
- 7. Church is where our ancestors in faith have a say. They have a voice at the table, but not a veto. Scripture is really the story of God working with those who have gone before us. Our Reformed heritage and the story of Presbyterians in America give us theological roots. The people of this congregation who ventured in faith to begin a ministry back in 1963 shaped a vision for us. We now take up the challenge to share our faith with those who come after us
- 8. Worship is the center. Wherever you travel, you can find the church and the one thing you will be sure to find is worship. It is our first and best response to God's love made known to us in Jesus Christ. Worship is an invitation for us to orient our lives toward God. "It is a time of deliberate attentiveness to God," says Eugene Peterson. "If

Goal is to fill entire Ark

For the last few years, the Sunday School offering has been going to the Heifer Project International, a wonderful organiza-

tion that began in 1944 with a dream to provide hungry families with a source of food rather than short-term relief. They have a farm up in New Windsor, Maryland, which I have visited. Every year we have sent them a check for nearly \$500—not really quite enough to buy one whole heifer—but almost. This year, two of our junior high students came to me to ask if we could buy a whole Ark this year—I told them I'd be pleased if we could just buy a whole cow—but they didn't think that was enough. So, with some trepidation, the Christian education committee announces that our goal this year is to fill that whole Ark! It will mean that the Sunday School offering will need to be more than 10 times what is was last year.

Children need to know what they do matters

Children really do understand a lot about money. They know how important it is in our world. They need to understand how much good it can do. They need to know how good it feels to share. They need to see cheerful giving. (If you frowned at the arrival of your pledge card last week, your children noticed, and stored it away in

their collection of memories.) They need to know what it feels like to give and not expect anything in return. They need to know that what they do matters.

There is a Noah bank in the class for two- and three-year-olds in which they can drop their pennies each week. There are offering baskets in every Sunday School class and in the Enrichment groups. There are boxes of dated offering envelopes for children, if that would help them make their contributions regularly. Ask any of the teachers for a box or pick one up in my office.

Give with a glad heart—thank God for all he has given us

Help your children learn about stewardship by talking about it. We'll be sending home information about the Heifer Project from time to time during the year. Please help your children understand what we are trying to do and how they can help. Watch for a partially filled Ark at coffee hour, check on its progress every week you are here. Talk about how you plan to share your time and talent, as well as your treasure, with the church in the coming year. Teach your children to give with a glad heart—as a way of thanking God for all he has given us. Help your children feel they have a part in the work of the church by affirming the importance of their offering every week. Help us fill that Ark!

Kerry On . . .

As Advent begins again I get out my tape and start listening to Handel's "Messiah" in the car as I drive on Falls and River Road in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and ninety seven. I drive along, still paying attention to the road, of course, but in a way I step out of time and listen for eternity. I stop at the light and wait to make a left turn, but the line is long and I have to wait for the next light. Then the symphony begins to play and in some ways I hear the best words of all, "Comfort ye, comfort ye my people saith your God." My journey to Bethlehem has begun.

Another day I'm listening to the news of the latest massacre in Egypt, not too far from the birthplace of the Messiah. Then I tune out and begin to think about the grief and sorrow that has touched our church family this past year. I think of those we have loved and lost. I am mindful of those who struggle with cancer and other diseases. I think of strained relationships and a variety of disappointments and hurts. Then the chorus sings, "And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed."

Another day, later in the afternoon, I see a magnificent sunset, handiwork of the Creator, and the music rings out, "Arise, shine, for thy light is come, and the glory of the Lord is risen upon thee." One day at lunchtime I pull into a parking lot and a friend comes over to the car. I roll down the window and turn up the volume and the chorus sings out, "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given." He smiles and says, "Magnificent, wonderful, indeed, unto us."

As Joseph McCabe says in his book, Handel's Messiah: A Devotional Commentary, "To make that pilgrimage, with the glorious music and the deepest meaning of the familiar words, is to know ourselves to be living in grace." May your journey to Bethlehem this year be rich with the treasure of God's grace.

SHARING OUR MISSION

Steeple to people of Mount Zion Baptist Church, Ladonia, Texas

For some time, PPC's mission committee has worked to identify for assistance one of the black churches destroyed during the nationwide spate of burnings in the past couple of years. It was through the help of the National Council of Churches that the relationship with Mount Zion was established.



ctober 14, 1997, Potomac Presbyterian Church's mission committee presented on behalf of PPC a check in the amount of \$1,425 to Pastor Cedric Barksdale and Treasurer

Wynetta McCoy of the Mount Zion Baptist Church, Ladonia, Texas. The church had been destroyed by fire January 19, 1996—arson the suspected cause. The funds are to finance the steeple of the new Mount Zion church, under construction and scheduled for dedication January 24, 1998.

Church built on gift in 1877

The Mount Zion church was founded in 1877 by Henry Green, the great-grandfather of Ms. McCoy. Mr. Green was a former slave whose father was the owner of the plantation where Henry worked in the cotton fields. After the Civil War, the plantation owner decided to leave Texas and move to the North. He gave Henry Green 140 acres of the plantation as a farewell gift. It was upon this land that the spirit moved Mr. Green to work with his friends to build a church—a log cabin.

The congregation met on the first and third Sundays of each month, and the tradition has continued ever since. Only twice in 120 years has the congregation not met—once during an ice storm, and a second time immediately after the 1996 fire. The decision to meet at the church on only two Sundays a month was made in consideration of the many parishioners who lived so far away that traveling to and from church meant a full weekend away from farm work. A second church was built on the other side of Ladonia's county to help accommodate travel needs—it met on the second and fourth Sundays.

Church burning reviewed

The church which burned in 1996 had been constructed in 1938. A team from the Atlanta-based Center for Democratic Renewal, sponsored by the National Council of Churches, reviewed on site the circumstances of the burning and in its report noted "arson (and) possible racial and antireligious motivation." The National Council of Churches identified Mount Zion Church as eligible for assistance from its Burnt Churches Fund and provided a grant of \$40,000 for reconstruction.

The Mount Zion congregation has engaged in self-help efforts and also has




