

Fred Buechner once wrote,

God acts in history, and in your and my brief histories, not as the puppeteer who sets the scenes and works the strings, but as the great director, who no matter what roles we are given, conveys to us somehow from the wings how we can play those roles in a way to enrich and ennoble and hallow the whole vast drama of things, including our own small but crucial parts in it.

Often we don't get to choose our roles; some we like and some we don't. Sometimes we play the roles perfectly, not even knowing we had it in us. Other times we bumble, mix up our lines, get stage fright and generally make fools of ourselves. We have a kindly director and he is always giving us a second chance. It's always a gigantic production with a cast of thousands. We never quite know how the drama is going to turn out, but the director knows where the story is going.

Sometimes we change roles and take on parts we never dreamed we would have. That's part of the excitement of the New Year. Some of us will take parts that we would not have chosen for ourselves. It may be very difficult and even painful but we can have absolute confidence in the director. Others will play parts so filled with joy that our hearts will nearly burst. All of us will have our everyday roles that demand patience and persistence, but they are grace-filled too.

Let's begin the New Year listening carefully to the Director's promptings from the wings and let's play our roles with all our hearts. Remember the One who went before us and showed us how the drama is meant to be. He invites us to be part of it and empowers us to do our best.

READY OR NOT, THEY'RE GROWING UP!!

One aspect of being a parent is being a teacher for our child. We teach our child to walk and to dress himself or herself. We delight in first words and first smiles, and rejoice when bicycles finally stay upright with the precious cargo on board. But when our child begins to ask questions about sex, some of us break into a cold sweat and pray to disappear! That just isn't in the instruction book where we found the answers about when to introduce solid foods and how to treat fevers

"There is something powerful about the need to know. When children ask questions, they have the need to know the answers. If children are old enough to think up the question, they are old enough to have it answered. That is when learning best takes place. Always take advantage of teachable moments."

That's the preface to the Parent's Guide for God's Plan for Growing Up, the new Presbyterian sexuality curriculum for elementary children. In 1990, the General Assembly directed the church to develop some resources to help parents prepare their children to see sexuality as a natural and healthy part of God's plan for their lives, and to help parents gain confidence about their role as primary sex educators and role models for their children. The material was introduced at the educators meeting in Chicago in 1996, and is now available.

There is also a resource book for children in grades 2-3. Wonderfully Made, and another book for children in grades 4-5, Amazing Stuff. I invite you to stop by my office and take a look at these resources. I have them to

lend to you for as long as you need them, or I can order copies for your family to own. Perhaps you would like to borrow an audiotape called "Listening In," which is an introductory conversation between the two authors about their experience in developing the curriculum and in taking advantage of those teachable moments in their own families. I thought it was very helpful.

I know you don't want to think about this yet! But last month the Christian Living Group was discussing how we deal with Santa Claus, and we moved on to how we have any serious conversation with our children, and before we knew it, we were talking about sexuality. You never know where a good conversation will lead. Did you notice

Diane Hutchins will continue helping this group understand the order of worship as it is printed in our bulletin each week and to identify the different elements of our worship service.



Kerry On . . .

As most of you know, I love to read and I try to read widely and not confine myself to so called "religious books." Gene Peterson reminds me why this is a good practice. He talks about "spiritual reading," which refers not to the content of what is read but the way in which a book is read. It means reading any book in a spiritual way — listening to the Spirit, alert to intimations of God. It is a way of reading that shapes the heart at the same time that it informs the intellect.

I offer a few suggestions for your spiritual reading:

Pete Hamill, *Snow in August* — The story of a young Catholic boy, his friendship with a rabbi, and baseball.

Mitch Albom, *Tuesday's With Morrie* — A young sports writer and his old professor, Morrie, who has Lou Gehrig's disease, meet and talk each Tuesday about life's greatest questions.

Charles Frazier, *Cold Mountain* — A National Book Award winner about a soldier returning home at the end of the Civil War.

Doris Kearns Goodwin, Wait Till Next Year — Written by the Pulitzer prizewinning author about growing up in the suburbs of New York in the fifties. She weaves a tale of family, the Brooklyn Dodgers and the Catholic church.

Thomas Troeger, *Borrowed Light: Hymn Texts, Prayers and Poems*. I met Dr. Troeger last winter at the Stetson Pastor's School and really appreciate his way of articulating profound spiritual truth in creative ways.

The first four book are readily available at the library and you are welcome to borrow my copy of *Borrowed Light*. I would of course be pleased to talk about these books when you read them. As you'll notice, two of the books have to do with base-ball—and you thought I was only interested in golf.

Now that I think about it, this is normal for me at this time of the year. This winter has been warm, but it has been dreary. I need to see the sun again—therefore, I am on my way to San Antonio to spend a week with my sister and my newlyweds. I need some new ideas—therefore, I am on my way to Boston to spend some time with the Association of Presbyterian Educators—that's bound to put some new ideas in my head and some new books on my reading list. Hmmm, do you think this is why APCE always meets the first week in February?

Do you, too, need some renewing and rejuvenating in February?

Plan to spend the weekend of February 20-21 at Presbytery's Big Event, "Reaching, Receiving, Renewing!" Friday night's keynoter will be Dr. Timothy Niova-that Presbyterian minister who was in the news last summer when he was beaten for protesting human rights abuses in Kenya. I know he will be a powerful voice from the mission field. Saturday's keynoter is my favorite poet, Ann Weems. Her poetry will be featured during the worship presentation, "Lent: A Challenge for the Unamazed." There are 65 workshops to choose from-including 2 for elementary children led by Bev Bailey's new group, "New Paths." Pick up a brochure in the narthex.

He is going to take all that old furniture that has been accumulating in my basement for years! I'm going to be alone again! Thanks for listening, I feel better already. Which Sunday did you want to lead that Enrichment group?



Do you ever come home from church and over lunch discuss the worship service? Of course you do! I am a minister's daughter, and as I grew up, we always relived what went right and what went wrong with every-

thing—except, of course, the sermon. We were particularly hard on the music. Why did the organist play so loudly during the prelude? Was she trying to get our attention? What did that anthem have to do with anything? It just seemed to fill the time after the announcements or give someone a chance to sing a long-awaited solo. And the hymns! They were the same standard dozen we sang all year. I loved all the tunes, but had no idea what the words meant or if they were supposed to relate to the scripture lesson on the sermon.

I wironic that 35 years later I should be explaining to you how I attempt to incorporate appropriate music in the worship service.

When I submit musical titles for a service, it is a result of considerable research based on Kerry's worship theme, scriptural references, the liturgical season, the choir's preparation, and the congregation's role as listener and participant in hymn singing. If I suggest a new hymn, I scrutinize it to see if it is singable, if the melody and text are compatible, and if it enhances the intent of the service.

If Kerry agrees the hymn is worthy, I find ways of incorporating it as a prelude arrangement or choral introit to help acquaint the congregation with the new tune. Sometimes a new hymn is a new

text set to an old, familiar tune. Whatever the case, Kerry and I plan these hymns together and are careful about the frequency of adding new hymns.

have so many wonderful, old hymns to cherish and enjoy. I love them, as you do. I also feel that there are some new hymns being composed which bring profound new texts to light. I continue to look for musical integrity in the setting of theology appropriate to our Christian growth.

So, during your next Sunday lunch discussion of the worship service, analyze the various aspects according to how well they all related to one another and to the theme of the morning. Hopefully you will discover that indeed there was a purpose and a sense of direction.



Kerry On . . .

Once again we enter the season of Lent and are invited to consider the magnitude of God's love for us expressed in the suffering and death of Jesus. Every time we eat the bread and drink the cup we enter into that love. This year our Lenten journey is marked by special opportunities to respond to the word of Jesus, "Do this remembering me." We begin on Ash Wednesday with Communion, journey to homes for the Lord's Supper, and draw near to the Lord on the night in which he was betrayed (Maundy Thursday). Come and join with your family of faith for as many of these service as you can.

I recently discovered the following prayer which expresses so well the promise and hope which is given to us by the Lord in the meal which he has prepared for us.

Strengthen, O Lord, the hands which have been stretched out to receive thy holy things, that they may daily bring forth fruit to thy divine glory. Grant that the ears which have heard thy songs may be closed to the voice of clamor and dispute; that the eyes which have seen thy great love may also behold thy blessed hope; that the tongues which have uttered thy praise may speak the truth; that the feet which have walked in thy courts may walk in the region of light; that the souls and bodies which have fed upon thy living body may be restored to newness of life.

And with us may thy great love abide forever, that we may abundantly render back praise, praise to thine eternal majesty. Amen.

Potomac Presbyterian Church praised in Texas dedication

"The Lord has brought us to this House! May His name be praised!"

"We have been bound for Mt. Zion with the help of many! May the spirit of the Lord bless them as it has helped us turn tragedy into a beautiful building! We are now standing on holy ground! Let all the people say AMEN!"

In this spirit of praise and thankfulness, the Mt. Zion Missionary Church of Ladonia, Texas, about 100 miles northeast of Dallas, was dedicated January 24, 1998. The newly built church replaces a structure destroyed in 1996 in the spate of suspected racially motivated burnings of Black churches in the South.

On this great day, the sun broke through the clouds after months of rain squalls, and the white gabled brick church with its glistening steeple appeared as a shrine to the 300 faithful who gathered with Pastor Cedric Barksdale to celebrate in the still unheated, unplumbed, unfurnished structure rising literally out of a sea of mud.

The worshippers looked beyond the pain of the past and inconvenience of the present in sharing with their pastor, their Elders, the guest churches and their choirs the pastor's belief that "God gave them a vision about His Kingdom and how their church would be used to bring about a change in this Kingdom, as it relates to the area in which the church now stands."

Many voices were raised in tribute to the forebears of this church in its struggle for survival since its founding in 1877 by an ex-slave, the great-grandfather of the present treasurer and building chair, Ms. Wynetta McCoy.

Pastor Barksdale and Ms. McCoy led moving tributes in song and testimony to critical major agencies of support.

Ms. McCoy also pointed out that Mt. Zion was being rebuilt by many far away individuals and benefactors moved by the grace of God, such as the Potomac Presbyterian Church of Potomac, Maryland. Ms. McCoy then read Pastor Kerry Stoltzfus's letter of congratulation on the dedication, and an affirmation of his church's financial support toward Mt. Zion's steeple, baptistry, and Bibles. The rapt worshippers raised their voices in praise

Our choir has been diligently practicing the six anthems that the massed chorus will be singing by memory. The guest conductor is Joan Gregoryk, the director of the Children's Chorus of Washington. She will begin rehearsal with them at 10:00 a.m., March 7, and the day will culminate with the worship service at 2:00 p.m. Come and revel in this celebration of music, sung entirely by children and accompanied by a magnificent pipe organ, piano, and handbells.

One Great Hour of Sharing





PAINT THE CHURCH RED!


As the rains have washed the chalk from our sidewalk, the joy and excitement of our Easter celebration will soon begin to fade into the routine of "ordinary time." But before it does, the church has one more grand and glorious occasion to celebrate on May 31!

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit!

Acts 2:1-4a

There are not just two "don't miss!" days in the Christian year. There are three — Christmas, Easter and Pentecost. Our culture has overwhelmed the church's celebration of Christmas. It cooperates — if a little reluctantly — to help us with Easter. But for Pentecost, the celebration of the gift of the Holy Spirit that empowered those few believers in the upper room in Jerusalem to become the Church of Jesus Christ transforming the world; we are left completely on our own. Hallmark will not print Pentecost cards for you to send. Teleflora will not have a special tongues-of-fire bouquet to decorate your dining table or send to your mother. Don't you hate it when your little one wriggles in church? It can get so bad that we spend so much time "shushing" the children that we forget to teach them what they're really in church for!



Beth was so eager to share with all of you what she learned, that the Christian education committee has asked Diane to lead us in a workshop based on this book.



Kerry On ...

The assumption of spirituality is that God is always doing something before I know it. So the task is not to get God to do something I think needs to be done, but to become aware of what God is doing so that I can respond to it and participate and take delight in it.

I saved this thought from one of Eugene Peterson's books and it helps me to think about consciously looking for God's activity in our lives. As pastor I am not called to bring God to people—that's far to presumptuous—but to help you become more aware of what God is doing in your life. It's easy to talk about "luck" and "coincidence," but a more faithful response is to say "God." You tell me stories about incredible circumstances sometimes and together we can say "God."

I try to remember this when I go to the hospital or the home of a grieving family. God's Spirit is already there and perhaps together we can discern what God is doing in the midst of illness and even death. Sometimes we may not be able to discover what God is



THE JOY OF WORSHIP WITH CHILDREN! Is that possible????

Last month I chatted with a few parents about worshiping with their children. We looked at a book by Robbie Castleman called *Parenting in the Pew*. The parents were concerned that their own children are too squirmy and too noisy in the sanctuary—but they rarely notice anyone else's children being too squirmy or noisy. This book insists that the only rule for children is that they can't disturb other people's worship. The author reminds us that learning to worship requires participation, practice, and patience. Both yours and theirs!

Most important is to worship with your children gladly

The most important thing you can do for your children is to worship with them gladly. Let them know it is important to you for them to be there with you. Smile at them. Hug them. Hold their hands. (My own kids always hated that—I would reach out and take their little hands whenever their pew activity exceeded my tolerance level—I think I did it last Christmas Eve.)

Sit where your children can see —probably in a front pew

Sit where they can see. Yes, that probably means a front pew, but you know how hard it is to pay attention when you can't see. Try to be early so they can choose where to sit, and you have time to answer their questions before they need to be quiet. Remember that quiet isn't the end, its just the means for helping them learn to worship with us.

Children should have bulletins

Children need bulletins of their very own-wait for the usher to offer one to your child. The bulletin contains both the liturgy for the day and other announcements for the congregation. Help your child know one from the other. Remember that the word liturgy means. "the work of the people." Preschoolers can find the numbers, or find the letters of their name. Check off things for them until we get to the Children's Message. Early readers can mark the words they know. They can find the hymns. Ask them to underline all the names for God they see. Later, ask them to mark the words they don't know, and take time to explain them after church or look them up together when you get home. Use the children's bulletins with care. The yellow ones are for very young children to color on before worship begins or to take home with them. The green ones are designed for children who can read wellyou might want to give them to your children at a later point in the service. Don't let them learn to ignore everything that is going on around them in the sanctuary. The children's bulletin is an emergency supply for when your child just can't stay with us for one more moment.

Sing!

And yes, you do have to sing! The Psalms tell us over and over to sing to the Lord. It doesn't say, if you have a lovely voice and can read music. It just says, "Sing!" I al-


ways sing loudly, and quite badly. Please join me. Help the children to follow the words from verse to verse even if they can't read fast enough. They can catch up for the Alleluias at least. They need to know that you have favorites you know well, and that there are some hymns you are still learning. Sit and hold the book at their level, or let them stand on the pew to be at your level.

Put something in the offering plate

Always put something in an offering plate! I know that you probably write a check once a month, but put a dollar in those pew envelopes and put it in every week. The offering is a symbol of our intention to return to God a portion of all that God has given us, the financial transaction is secondary. Children should have something to put in the plate too, or to take with them to their Enrichment group. If you give a child a quarter in the narthex before church, when the plate comes down your pew, that child owns the quarter and it is a sacrifice to give it away. That's the lesson.

Children hear everything!

Parents always tell me that their children never listen to them. I think the problem is that they hear EVERYTHING. They hear your own reluctance and your own doubts, even if you didn't mean to mention it. They hear your body language as well as your words. They hear what you don't mention just as loudly as they hear what you say. They hear when you say Sunday School is important, but you don't take them every week. They hear when you insist that they pray at bedtime, but they never hear you pray. They hear you say that we need to go to church every week, and then let any excuse keep you home. Be careful—the children are always listening.



With summer approaching, we all think of vacations, relaxing, taking stock of what we have accomplished and what we plan to do after our R & R. Our choirs will take a short break from regular rehearsals and give individuals a chance to worship on the lower level

of the sanctuary and also to share their musical talents in solo or ensemble capacities from the loft. This all happens after June 21 when the men of the church participate in our seventh annual men's chorus. This event has occurred on Fathers' Day since my first summer at PPC in 1992.

ach year our men's chorus has grown. Last year we had 22 fine singers who gathered an hour before worship and amazed themselves-and thoroughly delighted the congregationwith their stirring rendition of a hymn medley incorporating some of everyone's favorites. This year we will invite all men, regardless of musical reading skills, to come to Fellowship Hall at 9:00 a.m., Sunday, June 21, to discover the joy of choral singing. Coffee and rehearsal will be followed by the presentation of yet another fine hymn medley in the 10:00 a.m. worship service. There will be a sign-up chart in the narthex on June 7 and 14. 1 want to make sure I have enough chairs set up for the throngs of male singers who have been waiting all year for this event to happen again. I look forward to greeting you all.

It's that time of year again!

When Jesus gives The Great Commission to his followers, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit," he doesn't stop there. He goes on to add, "and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you."

It does take a lot of time, but you have as much as the person in the pew beside you; it is just a decision about how you are going to use it.

When we baptize a baby in this congregation, we promise, in the name of the whole church of Christ, to undertake with these parents the Christian nurture of their child.

Here at Potomac Presbyterian Church, we teach what Jesus taught us in many different ways, and we help parents to nurture their children in the Christian faith in many different ways. One of the most identifiable and concrete ways we do this is in our Sunday School hour every week.

We offer Christian education opportunities to people of all ages. We believe that teaching three year olds that God loves them —and the church does too — is just as important as teaching adults to understand what Karl Barth had to say about Romans.

We are a congregation with many different talents, and we all teach in many different ways, but I invite you, as someone does at this time every year, to consider committing yourself to teaching a Sunday School class next year. It is a huge responsibility, but we share it with at least two people for each age level. It does take a lot of time, but you have as much as the person in the pew beside you; it is just a decision about how you are going to use it. I know you are out of town often, but we can coordinate your schedule with someone else who is also out of town often.

Jesus doesn't leave his followers with just tasks to do, he also leaves them with the promise, "And lo, I am with you always, even to the close of the age." I count on that promise to include every hour that I am in a class with young disciples — and you can too!

Why I love teaching Sunday School

Six years ago I was visiting my grand-mother in my mother's hometown.


Grandma was too sick to go to church that Sunday, so I went alone. When I signed my name on the "Friendship Pad" in the pew, the woman sitting next to me turned and stared at me. She kept glancing at me. At the end of the service, she turned and stated, "I know who you are." Since I didn't have a clue who she was, and I was reasonably certain that I hadn't been featured on "America's Most

Wanted," this declaration baffled me. She continued, "I know who you are, and I want you to know your mother was a mighty fine Sunday school teacher." Before I had a chance to respond, she went on, "but your grandmother was the best Sunday school teacher I ever had in my life." She paused ever so slightly then added, "and of course you know that your great-grandmother was the greatest Sunday school teacher who ever lived!" She then touched me gently on the arm and asked, "Have you come here to teach Sunday school?" In an instant analysis, I realized which end of the totem pole I would be on in this family progression, and I politely declined.

I share this little story because it highlights one of the big reasons I love teaching Sunday school. I remember the absolute joy and excitement my mother shared with me as she was preparing her Sunday school lesson every week of my childhood. I never had my mother as my teacher, but what she taught me at home was that Bible study was interesting and applicable to everyday life.

There is no greater Bible study than preparing a Sunday School lesson

What I have learned in teaching Sunday school myself for the past 22 years, is that there is no greater Bible study than preparing a Sunday School lesson. I can't tell you how many times the 5th grade lesson for the week has been a timely reminder for me in my own life of what God expects me to do. God speaks to me in every lesson, not just to the kids. God was important to me as a child and I pray that at least some of my Sunday School lessons leave children with the same vibrant feeling of God's love and care that I felt in my own childhood. If this is not happening for your child, please let me know, so I can apply for even more divine intervention on Saturday night! Or better yet, volunteer to teach Sunday school and help me out as part of the strong and enthusiastic teaching team at PPC.

If you'd like Diane to order a copy of the book for you, please let her know. If you would like to borrow her copy, after May 3, you are welcome to!




Mark your calendars! BIBLE SCHOOL June 22-26







SHARING OUR MISSION

PPC supports local community

One of the ways in which Potomac Presbyterian Church supports the local community is by participating in "The Lord's Table," a program which helps feed the hungry in our county. PPC provides both financial support, administered by our Mission Committee, and personal participation by members of our congregation.

Each month, this church, with two other scheduled participating curches, provides an evening meal for people served by "The Lord's Table" — homeless people and others whose financial resources are short of their real needs, including even some entire families. Our volunteers, usually four to eight in number, go to the host church in Gaithersburg early in the afternoon of the first Tuesday of the month, prepare and serve the meal, clean up afterward, and do whatever else is needed and can be done. Additional services, such as counseling, are provided by the county.

This is truly a worthwhile mission, and those who contribute time and effort deserve our recognition, our support, and our love in Christ's church.

Report from Texas

The Mount Zion Missionary Baptist Church of Ladonia, Texas, to which PPC has provided funds for a steeple, baptistry and Bibles, has given the Mission Committee a recent progress report. For the first time in its 120-year history, Mount Zion now has a service every Sunday instead of just twice a month. The church has also inaugurated Bible sessions on each Tuesday of the month. Work is still continuing on plumbing and landscaping at the new church, which replaced the former church burned in the 1995 and 1996 spate of racially motivated burnings in the south.

Mount Zion is still in need of assistance to meet its total financial commitments, but the congregation is flourishing in its new structure and is very grateful for the help contributed by PPC.





Kerry On . . .

It's November and Thanksgiving is coming. Well, the day we call Thanksgiving will soon be here. Actually it is a word that is at the core of our spiritual lives and spills over into the daily ups and downs of our busy schedules. It is really an attitude that shapes our ways of relating to one another and our more basic relationship to God. "O give thanks unto the Lord, for he is good," says the Psalmist.

I especially like how the late Henri Nouwen speaks of this relationship to God from the perspective of the parable of the Prodigal Son.

"Here lies hidden the great call to conversion: to look not with the eyes of my own low self-esteem, but with the eyes of God's love. As long as I keep looking at God as a landowner, as a father who wants to get the most out of me for the least cost, I cannot but become jealous, bitter, and resentful toward my fellow workers or my brothers and sisters. But if I am able to look at the world with the eyes of God's love and discover that God's vision is not that of a stereotypical landowner or patriarch but rather than of an all-giving and forgiving father who does not measure out his love to his children according to how well they behave, then I quickly see that my only true response can be deep gratitude."

In just a few weeks we will be experiencing the meaningful weeks of Advent. During the four Sundays that precede Christmas, we will be preparing verbally and musically for Christ's birth. Many of you will ask, "Why don't we sing

Christmas carols, starting with the first Sunday of Advent?" One answer to that question lies in the theology expressed so beautifully in the twenty hymns grouped together in the Advent section of our hymnal. These texts support the scriptural references used during the time of preparation called Advent.

In the Christmas section which follows, are forty selections appropriate to the events surrounding Jesus' birth. Are these all carols? Are some Christmas hymns? Is there a difference? How can you tell which is which?

First, let us look at abbreviated definitions of carol and hymn. Carols date back to the Middle Ages. Religious texts were set to secular or popular melodies. They were not restricted to just Nativity themes. These old carols were simple and direct, reflecting the common people. In carols, the tune seems to be of prime importance. In hymns, the words take precedence. Hymns are songs written to praise or adore God.

How can you tell which is which? Look at Silent Night, #60. Directly under the title is printed "Stille Nacht," the hymn tune name. To the immediate right is the hymn tune composer, Franz Xaver Gruber. To the left is the text writer, Joseph Mhor, 1818. In contrast, look at "The First Nowell," #56. The musical reference to the right says English carol. The text reference to the left says, English carol, 17th century.

Here is your Advent homework: Which of the following are carols and which are hymns? "O Little Town of Bethlehem," #44; "Joy to the World," #40; "It Came Upon the Midnight Clear," #38; "O Come, All Ye Faithful," #41; "Hark! The Herald Anges Sing," #31; "Angels We Have Heard on High," #23; and "Away in a Manger," #24 and #25. The answers are readily found in our current hymnal.





MARILYN'S MESSAGE

If you're like me, you lack patience.

In fact, I can't wait to have patience! If God doesn't hurry up and give me some patience soon, I think I'll burst! I want patience while I wait in line at the grocery store. I want patience while I drive on the beltway and am stuck again at the interchange of I-270 and I-495. I want patience while I wait for God's leading on decisions I have to make. I want patience, and I want it RIGHT NOW!

Of course, this is silly. Patience is, by definition, waiting for something that takes time. It is listed in those virtues that we know as the fruit of the Spirit (Gal. 5:22-23). We are told throughout Scripture to wait for the Lord.

The concept of waiting for the Lord is especially important during the season of the church year we call Advent. This is the four-week period before Christmas when we wait in anticipation of the coming of the Messiah, both in the form of Jesus Christ, and the s econd coming. Lighting the Advent Candles

Idvent is a word that means "coming" or "arrival." It is also the name given to the season of the four weeks of waiting for Christmas. We use an Advent wreath to help us wait and think about why Jesus was born.

The Advent wreath is made of evergreens to symbolize the eternal life that Jesus brought; and the wreath — a circle — symbolizes His neverending love.

The Advent wreath contains candles to help us mark the passing of time. The candles also remind us that Jesus came to be the Light of the World. Jesus said, "I am the light of the world; he who follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." He came, and still comes, to light up our lives with His love.

The use purple candles to symbolize royalty and penitence. Jesus wants us to be of His kingdom. Remembering the ways we are unfaithful to God and feeling sorry about them is called penitence which is symbolized by the color purple.

We wait for Christmas, for Jesus' blessing, for a new life with Him.
