

MARILYN'S MESSAGE

I was happy to receive from my friend Nancy Clark a copy of the charge she gave to me at my installation service in October. As I read it over, I thought it contained some wonderful insights for anyone serving in a church, which includes church professionals, but also all of its members. So I pass this on to you, with Nancy's permission, as a charge to you for the New Year.

"... [I know] how you have sought to follow God and live for God for many years ... I have seen your faithfulness as you have responded as God called you to new places. And, I have seen your excitement as God called you here, knowing that indeed it is the living God who calls you and empowers you to service.

"As you serve in this position, I encourage you to remember three things:


- 1. When God calls you, be bold and step out with confidence; be ready and willing for the many opportunities that await you here. Be prepared to respond when God beckons you into uncharted territory.
- 2. Keep your eyes on God. I am sure you remember the story of Peter on the water. Jesus came to the disciples on the water at night. Peter said, 'Lord, if it is you, tell me to come to you.' Jesus said, 'It is I.' And Peter stepped out of the boat and walked on the water. But then he looked around and saw the storm, and began to sink. It will be easy for you to start out and then to notice the problems ... not enough time, not enough money, or personality conflicts. Storms are always brewing and it will be easy to become disheartened and begin to sink. Keep your eyes on God. It is God who has called you out. It is God who is sufficient.
- 3. Finally, when you do look around and become afraid or begin to sink, do not try to make it on your own. Cry out to God. When Peter cried out, 'Lord, save me,' Jesus reached out his hand and caught him. God is there for you and will be your strength in all circumstances.

"Only by the call of the sovereign God, the grace of the resurrected Lord, and the power of the Holy Spirit can you accomplish what you are called to do. Remain in these."

Kerry On . . .

"What brought you to church today?" the pastor asked as he greeted John at the coffee hour,*

John replied, "I woke this morning feeling so good, so blessed, so alive — so created — I just had to say thank you and this is the only place I could think of to say it adequately. I wanted to say it to Jesus."

When we plan worship and when I prepare sermons, I try to remember this particular reason many folks come to worship. There are many other reasons, including habit, which is not always a bad thing. Actually, a good habit can be described as a spiritual discipline. Sometimes I imagine that God surprises us when we least expect it, when we might have thought we were just going through the motions.

We also come to worship when our pain and sorrow and loneliness are great. We come hoping for a word of blessed assurance. Often the hymns will do it because the words and music express a peace that passes understanding. A familiar Scripture read, something in the sermon — and it is God's word to us. Add to that a warm welcome at the door and a listening ear at the coffee hour and we sense that healing has begun.

Then, too, we come because we know that we need to be challenged, that we need encouragement to stand up to the temptations and glitzy promises of our modern culture. We need to know that there are people we can call family, who join us in trying to live out the Christian faith in the face of enormous pressures. We are gladdened to know that others have gone before us, that friends will go with us on the way, and that there is hope for our children.

More than these and other human needs is the God and father of our Lord Jesus Christ who calls us to come and worship. I'll look forward to seeing you on Sunday.



MARILYN'S MESSAGE

From February 2 to 6, I was privileged to attend the Ecumenical Church Educators Event in Chicago. This is usually the Presbyterian church educator's event, but this year it included over 2000 educators from at least eight different denominations. It was a week of growth and faith for me, in many ways I wasn't expecting.

irst of all — and speaking to a congregation of well-traveled people, I'm sure you will find this amusing — I have not flown in about 15 years. When we va cation, we always drive. I found myself in awe at the beauty of our country, and amazed at the technology that not only got me where I was going safely and on time, but got my luggage there as well! I grew in respect for all of the people responsible for that.

The ecumenical flavor of the week was something I was frankly not looking forward to, but which turned out to be delightful. This was particularly evident in the worship times. We heard excellent preaching and storytelling from several different traditions, and oh, the music! It was fun to stumble over hymns from other denominations, while others around were singing loudly and strongly. Our worship was enhanced by an Asian choir, and by one of the best gospel choirs I have ever heard. It reminded me that it's okay to move out of my comfort zone, and that God speaks and hears in many different ways. My faith grew.

Ithough the week was very full, I allowed a little time for rest and relaxation. I was able to go to the Art Institute, which was incredible. I connected not only with people from our presbytery (There were about 25 of us there!), but with former classmates, teachers, and colleagues. I took some time to reflect on where I have been, where I am now, and what God may have in store for me. I relearned how to listen for God's voice, and that helped me to grow even more.

Finally, my children were given some new independence in my absence. Although they were in constant touch with people, and I called them often, they were on their own for some of the time. This not only gave them new confidence in themselves, but reminded me that they are becoming young women who too soon will be on their own. They grew and so did I.

Thank you for the opportunity to attend this conference. You have, in effect, watered the seed that has been planted here and allowed it to grow.

WORKCAMP Update



During Lent, our hymns will reflect the contemplative nature of the season. When you see the hymns listed in the bulletin, you may want to consider more than the title and page number. Just below the title is the hymn tune name printed in capital letters. Next to that name will be a set of numbers, letters, or even the word irregular. These pertain to the syllabic scheme of the hymn. For instance, in the hymn "Holy, Holy," the numbers 11, 12, 12, 10 mean that there are 11 syllables in the first line, 12 in the second, 12 in the third, and 10 in the last line.

The composer of the hymn tune is printed on the right side of the page, and the text origin is on the left. The very bottom of the page gives

copyright information. Some hymns are old enough to be in the public domain; thus, you would find no printed information below the hymn.

Some hymns will have scriptural references in the upper right or left hand corners. "All Glory, Laud, and Honor" has Matthew 21:8-11 printed on page right. Other hymns may not print scriptural references, but indeed speak to Biblical teaching. The staff looks for these direct and indirect applications in choosing the hymns each week. The goal is to relate what we sing to what we hear from the preaching and reading of the word.

My hope is that all the music in any given worship service will bring enlightenment and further meaning to the message of the day. The message will vary, as will the music. As we move from the sadness of Lent to the joy of Easter, may our hearts be filled with music both minor and major, soft and loud, reflective and explosive.



Kerry On ...

John Ortberg writes in The Life You've Always Wanted,

Too often people think about their "spiritual lives" as just one more aspect of their existence, alongside and largely separate from their "financial lives" or their "vocational lives" or even their "family lives." Periodically they may try to "get their spiritual lives together" by praying more regularly or trying to master another spiritual discipline. It is the religious equivalent of going on a diet or trying to stick to a budget.

The truth is that the term *spiritual life* is simply a way of referring to one's life — every moment and facet of it — from God's perspective. Another way of saying it is this: God is not interested in your "spiritual life." God is interested in your life.

I find this a very liberating notion. God is interested in the totality of our lives.

God is pleased when we enjoy beauty and art and all manner of good things. God is pleased when we do good work, whether we are engineers or lawyers, ministers or students. God is pleased when we use our gifts and talents to help others and to enhance the quality of life for our families.

Spiritual life is meant to be the core of our being and all other aspects of life are meant to interact with who God intends us to be at the center. True morality has its roots in our inner being as does a genuine sense of calling. It is my hope that our life together as a congregation helps us to relate to all of life from God's perspective.

MARILYN'S MESSAGE

Christ is risen! We hear these joyful words often at this time of year. Are they merely rhetoric, or are they meaningful in our lives? Ask elementary-age Sunday School students what Easter is all about, and they will say, almost by rote, "Jesus rose from the dead." No big deal. Yada-yada. A mere miracle.

Well, it is a big deal! It is a *huge* deal! Easter is surely the most significant holiday for Christians. It may also be the most difficult to understand. Our logical minds can't understand how someone could be brutally killed on a cross, then buried in a cave covered by a huge rock, only to be seen walking, talking, and eating a few days later. The empty tomb is scientifically impossible for us to fathom, and in fact there have been many alternate theories as to what happened to the body of Jesus, if he was even really dead. To make it even more confusing and less believable, the accounts in the gospels are significantly different. One commentator remarks, "It must be conceded from the outset that, conceived as a matter to be submitted to a jury, the case is seriously flawed."

He goes on to say that, in fact, the case was not meant to be brought to a jury. The resurrection is a faith story, a story of God's love for us and God's sovereign power. We are asked to proceed on faith, even childlike faith, in our understanding of Easter. It shouldn't be surprising to us, if we believe in God's power, that Christ could be raised from death. Perhaps we should be more surprised that God has such love for us in our sin and disobedience, that the reason for Christ's death and resurrection is our salvation.

We truly have much to celebrate, and how fitting that the celebration is in the spring, a time of new life and growth. May each of us experience abundant renewal and growth and hope and faith in this miraculous season.

EASTER EGG HUNT



Endowment Funds Distribution

As continuing proof of the value of endowment funds, the Session approved at its January meeting distribution of some of the funds accumulated last year:

MARILYN'S MESSAGE

Just Say Yes! I know that's not the typical message you hear these days. But I think it is one that should be heard more in the church. 

Doug and Janet Dunlop



STEPHEN MINISTRY

The last week in April found Kerry Stoltzfus, Kathy McPherson, and Ruthanne Stoltzfus in St. Louis attending a Stephen Ministry leadership training to learn how to establish a Stephen Ministry for PPC.

From Ruthanne:

There were 524 in a very large ballroom of the Renaissance Hotel. From 40 states we convened to hear about the program. (Since 1975 6,839 congregations have enrolled in this ministry.). There were a large number of Presbyterians, Lutherans, and Methodists.

Stephen Ministry gives our church an effective way to train and organize members to provide one-to-one Christian care to individuals struggling with a crisis like grief, divorce, loneliness, relocation, hospitalization, terminal illness, or unemployment. By equipping lay people, we can help fulfill our calling as Christians and also expand the amount of caring ministry available through our church. Thanks for the opportunity to participate in this exciting ministry.

From Kathy McPherson:

At the conclusion of our leadership training conference in St. Louis, Kerry, Ruthanne, and I were commissioned as "Stephen leaders." We join Nancy Tietjen, a Stephen leader for many years.

Our next step as a leadership team will be to recruit, select, and train members of Potomac Presbyterian Church to be Stephen ministers, the ones who will provide one-to-one care. After training is completed (50 hours), each Stephen minister will be matched with an individual in need of care. Stephen ministers will also receive ongoing supervision and continuing education throughout their participation in the program. We ask for a two-year commitment.

On Sunday, June 27, at 11:15, we will show a brief information video on the Stephen Ministry in the church library. We encourage you to come if youmight be interested in becoming a Stephen minister. Also, please feel free to talk with Kerry, Ruthanne, Nancy, or Kathy if you have questions.

MARILYN'S MESSAGE

he past couple of months have seen a flurry of children's and youth activities here at Potomac Presbyterian. We had a meaningful experience of worship with our youth and children on Youth Sunday. We continue to plan for our youth mission trip to Greenville, Michigan, with fundraisers and meetings. Our confirmation class has completed their rigorous training, have written statements of their faith, and have joined the church. The "God's Family at the Table" children's communion class has finished its instruction and taken the Lord's Supper for the first time.

We are so proud of our young people for their accomplishments and their choices. What a contrast with the tragic events of the past two months, with the senseless killings in Colorado, and fear of further incidents! I know that many parents began to look a little more closely at their children's activities after that. I know that many teenagers and children have wondered if they or their friends would be next. Going to school has become an exercise in apprehension and uncertainty.

ne of the reasons we try to have lots of different activities at the church for youth and children is that we want them to have a safe place to be, whether that means a sanctuary from physical harm, or someone to talk to who will listen to them, or an outing they know is safe and wholesome. In our church's programs for children and youth, they are expected to respect each other and themselves; they are encouraged to stand up for their beliefs, even in the face of persecution; they are invited to question and challenge in an atmosphere of love and acceptance.

Please continue to pray for our children and youth. They need your prayers now more than ever. I firmly believe that a strong and supportive church family can make a huge difference in lives that may be disjointed or confused or afraid. Let us truly be a community of faith as we bear each another's burdens. The results may change lives!

The Reformed Churches' Recovery of Spirituality

"Theology Today." the quarterly publication of Princeton Theological Seminary, devoted its April 1999 issue to the widespread and intensive renewal of interest in Christian spirituality. The editorial page referred to this interest with these words:

"Bookstores are brimming with works on spirituality, Lectures, tapes, conferences, spirituality centers, spiritual formation training programs, and small groups abound. Protestant seminaries are now hastily pressed to add spiritual formation to their already overburdened curricula, Monastic guest houses welcome thousands of exhausted go-getters annually."1

What is spirituality? Definitions abound, but they all point in one direction. Spirituality is the discipline and practice of what Reformed (Presbyterian) Christians call "the means of grace." Those means are what Howard Rice, Presbyterian pastor and former professor of ministry at our denominations's San Francisco Theology Seminary, describes as "... spiritual disciplines that enable the development and maintenance of distinctive Christain identity." Professor Rice lists the following means of grace: prayer, reading scripture, meditation, feasting and fasting, serving others, worship and sacraments, reading devotional classics, and Sabbath rest.3

Why the rush and press to recover and practice Christian spirituality? The general agreement among writers and practitioners of Christian spirituality is this: people concerned with their lives and the lives of their children seek something substantive, a nurturing of their souls through a vital relationship with God, that will restore meaning, purpose and enduring satisfaction to their everyday lives.

For six weeks this summer I will reside at San Francisco Theological Seminary in San Anselmo, California, about fifteen miles north of the Golden Gate bridge, for the purpose of enriching and updating my ministerial skills. This will include some study activities, in company with faculty and clergy, directly related to the reclamation of Reformed Christian spirituality.

Upon my return home I will resume my reading of the works and commentaries upon the works of C.S. Lewis, the Oxford Don whose writing for so many years have helped and even now help clergy and laity alike in their search for a vital relationship with God. The reading will provide the basis for two products, so to speak: a dissertation on "The Spirituality of C.S. Lewis: A Model Spiritual Discipline and Practice," and the formation of at least one and possibly two spirituality groups with the congregation.

You may begin your participation with me in this summer of study and the work that follows by practicing your Christian spirituality now: pray for my efforts on behalf of my ministry.



We have already had one very generous donation of a computer from a member of our church. We would like at least two more computers (we already have monitors and keyboards). In addition, the Session has authorized some general endowment funds to help us get started, and there is some money available for CE facilities. We are well on our way!

Your help is still needed, however. Ideally, we would like the computers to be donated so that the church does not have to incur the expense, and we can use these other funds for software or renovation of facilities to accommodate the computer lab. If you or your business are in the process of updating your system, you may be able to help, and get a nice tax deduction for the donation. The following are the minimum requirements for computers:

- Pentium processor, with a minimum of 100 MHz of speed
- CD-capable multimedia computers with 16 megabytes of RAM
- 8-speed CD drive or higher
- Windows 95
- · Sound card and video card
- Mouse with roller ball on top (so it can be passed from user to user)

Many of you may have 386 or 486 computers that you want to give away, but unfortunately these will not run most of the recent software at speeds that make the games usable. Please do not donate these.

If you would like to help in this effort, but don't have a computer to donate, we will accept donations of cash to help purchase software. The initial package, which includes a variety of programs for all ages, costs \$201 per computer. If you would like to make a donation for all or part of this, please designate this on your check. Another need is for a couple of "techies" who would be willing to help us get started.

David McKune: I have never had a resident as nice as Mildred Glover. She was very much in need and very, very appreciative.

Rich McPherson: When I first arrived in Greenville, I had feelings of anticipation, nervousness and fear. These emotions soon turned to joy as new lifelong friendships were made and old friendships within our youth group were made stronger. The work my crew did this week helped someone in need, while it helped my crew grow in faith. The workcamp experience opened my heart, mind and eyes and showed me that there is nothing better in the world than helping and loving your neighbor.

Sharon Reid: This week I truly found that everyone you come upon in life is fighting a harder battle. These battles shape our lives. For without these battles, we would never have met the people that help us to overcome them. I not only believed that I helped my fellow workcampers, but they helped me overcome one of the greatest battles - figuring out how to live my life. I have arrived on one solid answer as the week closes—fully rely on God.

Furthermore, they built in their relationships with fellow Potomac campers and their relationship with God. This experience will give them a touchstone for the rest of their lives.

Marilyn's Message Workcampers Have a Wonderful Week!

After almost a year of planning, fundraising, and wondering, ten youth and two adults loaded up Rich McPherson's Durango and the Rudnic's Suburban on Saturday, June 19th and headed west, not knowing exactly what to expect, but knowing that this was going to be an experience. We stopped just north of Youngstown, Ohio, to spend the night at the Joseph Badger Meadows Camp and Conference Center, a Presbyterian camp similar to Camp Glenkirk. The people there were very nice and accommodating, and we were able to make a campfire and *attempt* to build S'mores.

We got an early start on Sunday (although not as early as we planned because the alarm clock mysteriously got turned off!), and headed to our destination, Greenville, Michigan. When we arrived at Greenville Middle School, the place was a flurry of activity with teenagers everywhere. Many youth groups including ours, had identifying T-shirts, and it was fun to see where the different groups were from. That evening we learned that there were close to 500 people at this camp, the largest of the summer. We met our work crews, who were as nervous as we were about these strangers we'd be spending a good bit of our week with, and assigned crew responsibilities.

The next morning, after a commissioning of the crews, we all headed off to our worksites. Some of us worked on trailers, others on houses. Some worked in dark basements, others worked outside the whole week. Some did roofing, others painted, some built wheelchair ramps, others hung drywall. We talked with our residents, many of whom were older people, or single mothers. We all learned some new practical skills, and also learned some important relational skills. At some point during our workday every day, we stopped for devotions, which kept our focus on God. The theme for the week was "Supernatural God," and each day developed a different "supernatural" theme (compassion, life, joy, forgiveness, power). These themes were further developed throughout the evening in the program and in youth group devotions.

The evening programs were full of singing, prayer, skits, slides, and fun. Five hundred people in a gym with a couple of ceiling fans was an interesting experience, but no one seemed to mind too much. Michigan weather proved to be interesting, with generally pleasant temperatures in the morning, and sweltering heat and humidity in the afternoon and evening. We also had thunderstorms several times during the week, but only one was during work time.

All told, there were 81 six-person crews who worked on 69 homes. Four hundred eighty-six people became fast friends with at least five people they'd never met before. At least 69 residents have a new respect for teenagers and for their commitment to God. The whole community of Greenville was involved in this important ministry, and it was a delight to see looks of appreciation on the faces of the people in this small, rural town (the out-of-town plates and the large group of teenagers gave us away!).

Our group was also very excited to be a part of Potomac Presbyterian Church while we were at workcamp. Many of you sent cards and packages, and it kept us feeling connected to you even though we were far away. Special thanks to all of the deacons, who "took us on as a project."

I was bursting with pride all week with the behavior of our youth. They followed the rules, and there have to be rules when that many people are together in that small place. They participated fully in all the programs. They took our youth group evening devotion time seriously. They were great! I know they are excited about sharing their experiences with the other youth in our church who were unable to go, and with the adults. The entire workcamp will be presenting an adult education class on October 11. Please make plans to be there.

As a preview to that, I asked each of the workcampers to write a few sentences about their experience at workcamp, during the 13 hour trip home, (partly to give them something to do, and partly to capture thoughts while they were still fresh). Here are the reflections of our workcampers: (continued on page 9)

Reflections of workcampers:

Carl Atwood: When I first signed up for going to workcamp, I was thinking. "Hmmm...cute idea. Sounds like fun. Why not? When I got to Greenville, my thoughts about the trip were the same. As the week continued, I gradually realized what I was actually doing for God, my resident, and myself. I can't explain this change in words, except that I had an experience; a religious experience. This experience changed my whole thinking about me, my work, and my religion. I came back to Potomac in a whole new way.

Courtney Chapin: When workcamp was first mentioned to me I thought that I would just be working all week on houses for people who needed help. But to my surprise it was that and much more. It was an experience that let me overcome my fear of shining like a star while singing in front of 480 people, realizing what my strengths are, and meeting some amazing people who taught me a lot about myself. The openness and compassion from the town, campers, and residents changed me and made me realize what I had taken for granted. And that with God's grace I know I can do anything I put my mind to.

Catherine Dorman: Workcamp was a wonderful experience for me. I met so many new people all there for the same purpose. I'll never forget the feeling it gave me making a difference in someone's life.

Erin Dunlop: When asked to write about my workcamp experience I didn't know where to start. I learned so much, including how lucky I am and also how it feels to help people. Workcamp was a lot of fun, and I look forward to next year.

Andrew Grier: This week allowed me to view God from a different perspective. The other workcampers and my group leader, Brother Bob, opened my eyes to all facets of Christianity.

Liz Johns: As this was my fourth workcamp experience, I thought that I would not be surprised by what I saw, either at the worksites or at the camp. I was pleasantly surprised, however, at the differences between this year and years past. This year was, by far, my favorite year, due to a wonderful youth group who got to know each other a lot better in the course of a week, and my wonderfully close-knit crew, who met each other for the first time on Sunday



C E News - A New Model for Children's Church School

The Christian Education Committee has been hard at work looking for ways to make our church school program more interesting and relevant to the children. After study and discussion, we have decided to begin a new model for children ages 4 through grade 6.

In our well intentioned efforts to have the children learn the whole Bible in three years, they are getting quite a bit of quantity, without necessarily getting a deep understanding of the more important Bible stories. In the new model, we will slow the process down considerably. Instead of one week on, say, the Prodigal Son, it will be explored for four weeks, using different teaching methods, media and people. One week might have the children making costumes and acting out the story. One week might be a computer game about the Bible story, and in another week the children might create a song about God's faithfulness to us. A fourth week might be the children preparing a feast to welcome the prodigal home. This is only an example, but it gives you an idea of how creative and exciting this program can be. And those children will know the story of the Prodigal Son inside out!


One of the great concerns of our time is that many children do not attend Sunday School every week. Many children spend every other weekend with their other parent, many people (in this area especially) travel often on the weekends, many families just have busy schedules. If one Bible story or concept lasts an entire month, most children will experience in at least one form, rather than missing it altogether if they missed that particular Sunday.

It is also our hope that this model will utilize the gifts and talents of a wider segment of our congregation. We are blessed with the talented artists, musicians, computer wizzes, and many others who might not want to commit to teaching a whole year of Church School, but would be willing to give one week a month, or one month a year to help. While each class will still have two primary teachers who will be there on a regular basis, we hope that for at least one or two weeks a month there is a "guest teacher" who can bring their expertise to the class.

How can you help this model be a success? We need LOTS of help! First, we need to have a **design team** willing to meet together a couple of times over the summer and at mid-year to plan the lessons for several months. Ideally, these would be teachers or others with an understanding of age-level characteristics of the children, and also artistic, creative people who can see

possibilities. We also need some classroom teachers, particularly for the lower grades, who are willing to share teaching two or three times a month with another teacher. Our guest teachers are the key to the success of this model. If you have a little bit of time and are willing to share your talents (even the talent of showing a video!) on an occasional basis, we would like to know. We have had offers of donations of computers, and will be purchasing Christian software soon. Any "techies" out there would be appreciated in setting up our computer lab space, and getting the programs up and running.

The Christian Education Committee thinks this model is very exciting, and will make Sunday School a more inviting, interesting, educational time for our children. Our overall goal is to share the gospel with our children, so that when they are youth and adults they will want to embrace Christ in their own faith. There's no reason that goal cannot be accomplished in a fun and creative way. 

Memories and Thanksgiving

Fifty years ago the then Brooklyn-Nassau Presbytery on Long Island, New York, employed a retired Presbyterian minister to survey the new Levittown development. His task: determine the possibility of establishing a new Presbyterian church in that community. The minister visited over 5,000 of the final more than 18,000 houses built by The Levitt Company on land once used for duck and potato farms. The U.S. government, faced with a post-war national shortage of home building materials, restricted purchasers of the homes to U.S. war veterans. Almost all veteran purchasers served in the armed forces of World War II.

The Presbytery purchased a tract of a little over two acres on which stood three old structures: a potato storage barn, a fodder storage barn, and a frame farm house. A contractor converted the potato storage barn into a chapel-sized church with a multi-purpose sanctuary/fellowship hall, two first-floor church school rooms, and several rooms in a windowless basement. The fodder barn proved unconvertible and suffered the fate of demolition. As the church school grew, the house became a church school annex.

Because the church grew by about 250 new members each year, the congregation built a sanctuary with class rooms and other facilities. As the church school reached about 1,200 members and the congregation about 1,100, the congregation constructed a fellowship hall and expanded the parking lot. This comparatively young congregation of World War II veterans conducted three successive and successful building fund campaigns to pay for the construction costs. By that time, the staff consisted of two ministers, Tom Miles and Jack Callender.

Tom Miles, our Parish Associate, was the first installed minister of this First Presbyterian Church of Levittown, New York. He began his ministry there in May 1951 immediately after graduating from Princeton Theological Seminary.

As part of the 50th anniversary celebration by the congregation, all previous ministers preached one Sunday at the church, beginning last February. Because Tom was the first minister of the Levittown Church, he will preach last, on Sunday, September 26. The congregation will celebrate fifty years of ministry on Saturday and Sunday, November 6th and 7th. Tom will attend the celebration for the weekend. The present Moderator of the denomination's General Assembly will preach on November 7th.

An interesting note: our own Lew and Alice Smith were members of a Dutch Reformed Congregation in Levittown while Tom was there; however, the Smiths and Tom did not meet until they did so here in our congregation in Potomac.

Kerry On . . .

I've just started reading a book by Richard Morgan entitled, <u>Remembering Your Story: A Guide to Spiritual Autobiography</u>. He invites us to recall the past without clinging to what has been. Siren Kierkegaard once said, "Life can only be understood backwards; but must be lived forwards."

Moses said to the Israelites in Deuteronomy 8:2, "remember the long way that the Lord your God has led you these forty years in the wilderness." He was urging them to let the same God lead them into the future and the promised land.

Why not try out this remembering at the family dinner table? It might work especially well with teenagers who tire of the question, "How was your day?" or "How was school?" Tell a story of something that happened to you in the past that is still important to you today. How does this story shape who you are today? See if you can discern God's grace in the story and how God's hand continues to guide you into the future. Perhaps you could identify a Bible verse or story that brings light to your story.

If you are the listener you have a precious gift to offer the story teller. Morgan writes,


There is probably no service we can render other persons quite as great as or important as to be listener and receiver to them in those moments when they need to open their hearts and tell someone their story.



MARILYN'S MESSAGE



"I Sing a Song of the Saints of God"

is a favorite hymn of mine,

which is often sung in late October as we approach All Saint's Day. Besides the easy melody and child-friendly lyrics (who doesn't imagine Maurice Sendak's Where the Wild Things Are as you sing about the "fierce wild beast" in verse 2?), I am especially intrigued by the ending of each verse in the call for each of us to be saints of God. If you are like me and grew up in the Roman Catholic/Episcopalian tradition, the term saint has a connotation that couldn't possibly imply that a regular person could ever be one. In that understanding, a saint was someone beyond reproach who walked around with a halo above their heads, and was immortalized in statues and medallions.

I looked up the word saint in a Bible dictionary, and the definition surprised me: "a person set apart to God by virtue of a personal relationship with him." Well, that doesn't seem to limit sainthood to only the most pious, or to martyrs. It seems that the requirements for being a saint of God are faithfulness, obedience to God's call, and a deep and abiding love for God. Think for a moment about the people you have known and know now. People who have influenced your faith in meaningful ways. People who remained faithful to God even in dire circumstances. People who were willing to put their comfort on the line for the sake of their faith. These are the saints in our lives. These are the people we look to for strength in our own faith journey.

Could you be a saint? One of the greatest honors one can receive is for someone to look at their lives and say, "I want to be like you." What a wonderful goal for each of our lives: to have someone look at our life and want to emulate it!

The last verse of the hymn includes the following: "They lived not only in ages past, there are hundreds of thousands still; the world is bright with the joyous saints who love to do Jesus' will. . . For the saints of God are just folk like me, and I mean to be one too." This All Saint's Day, reflect on the qualities of the saints who influenced you, and seek out ways to be a saint of God to others.




I delight in writing songs that help children enjoy the process of singing, and especially singing in church. One of those ditties appeared last month in conjunction with the musical train campaign to alert our church family to the choir opportunities here at PPC. Our Primary Choir is currently singing it and playing the train whistle part on choir chimes.

The response to all our fall start-up rehearsals is gratifying. Yes, we even have three new handbell ringers! We have one important challenge, however. Not too many boys have come forward to sing in our two children's choirs. We know how much our men's sections mean to the Sanctuary Choir! The ground is laid for meaningful adult singing when we are children. Because I am a mother of two sons and a grandmother now of a grandson, I think I know about boys interests and hang-ups. I construct choir rehearsals to be fun and meaningful to both boys and girls. I wrote the following to be used as a responsive warm-up spoken with expression by a leader and repeated line by line by the singers in their speaking voices. In a speech chant in four-four time with the rhythm of each measure being four eighth notes followed by two quarter notes. The only exception is in line six where "thing" is a dotted quarter and "when" is an eighth note. Try it with the young men in your house and let them know they are invited to participate in our choir program.

Let me see if I understand you, you're bothered by the thought that you will be non-existent in, say the year 2025. Has it ever occurred to you that you were likewise non existent in the year 1825? Of course it hasn't: for the simple reason that, by the forces of nature alone, you got bravely through that first attack of nothingness and were born. Well, all the Gospel is telling you is that your death - your second bout of nothingness - is going to be even less of a problem than your first. By the power of Jesus' death and resurrection, you will get bravely over that too, and be reborn. In fact, you already have been; so go find something more dangerous to worry about.

We are beloved by the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ and we are in God's loving hands before what we call time begins for us. Likewise we remain in God's merciful care in what we name beyond time. Perhaps God simply wants us to make the most of the precious gift of life that is measured by our years on this earth. The lines from the hymn say it well,

Take my moments and my days; Let them flow in ceaseless praise.

HOMELESS 5K WALKATHON

The 12th Annual Walkathon to Help the Homeless will take place November 20, 1999 in Washington D.C. About 25 years ago, our Presbytery established the Robert Pierre Johnson Housing Development Corporation to assist the homeless. RPJ has participated in the Annual Walkathon as a means of raising funds for its own projects and those of others.

Here is how it works. Walkers sign up donation (adults \$20 and youth \$10), or contributors make a pledge or write a check, and we take the money to the Walkathon with thousands of others at Freedom Plaza on Pennsylvania Avenue, N.W. between 13th and 14th. RPJ has a banner to carry in the walk.





MARILYN'S MESSAGE


One of the most exciting things that has been happening in many different areas of our church (and maybe this is new, or maybe I just noticed it!), is that there have been many interesting theological questions being raised in many different settings. The Wednesday morning Bible study always has difficult questions on "troublesome" Bible passages. The beginning Presbyterian class on Sunday mornings got a taste of Calvin's theology, and had some issues with some of it. The youth groups are struggling monthly with "tough questions," such as if Jesus was a Jew, why aren't we also Jews? and is it important to have Christian friends? The session met for a retreat and discussed Marcus Borg and N.T. Wright's book, The Meaning of Jesus: Two Visions, and had serious and thought-provoking discussions. Tom Miles' studies continue to challenge our thinking.

I think this is exciting because unless we struggle with some of these tough issues, we will never grow. Our faith will be stagnant, and the light will go out. But when we stretch our thinking, look at another viewpoint, and wrestle with those tough questions of faith, we are in a growth spurt, and that can only be a good thing. We may not like what we hear, but it will cause us to think a little more deeply and examine some of those doctrines and assumptions we always took for granted. If we are worried that God might not look favorably about our exposure to different ideas, I think we are not giving enough credit to God. God can take the heat. In fact, I think God wants us to challenge our belief systems and confirm what we have believed or look at it differently.

I hope that as the new year approaches, you will take advantage of the opportunities available to you: the sermons, Sunday School classes, youth groups, weekday and weeknight studies, our library, and our human resources in this church to stretch your spiritual and theological muscles and give them a good workout. As one elder remarked after the discussion at the retreat: "It's sort of like going to the gym: it's hard to get motivated to do it, you don't like it when you're in the middle of it, but you feel so good after having done it!"

CHILDREN'S SUNDAY SCHOOL



Music is always a vital part of our Advent celebration and meditation. On each Sunday our choirs will help us prepare for Christ's birth. I would like to highlight two Sunday morning worship services in particular. One is December 12th when the Sanctuary Choir will present "Child of Wonder," a Christmas cantata by Samuel L. Forcucci based on the poem by Christina Rossetti. The other is December 19th when the Children's Choirs and children from Sunday School will present "Calling All

Angels," a delightful Christmas musical written by Helen Kemp.

"Child of Wonder" is a somewhat haunting musical composition which sets the bleak midwinter scene for Jesus' birth. This musical treatment of a very strong text will view the Christmas events from the physical setting, the presence of God, the stable participants, the angels, the joyful praise and the meaning it has for us in terms of our personal gift to the Christ Child. The Sanctuary Choir will be singing from the front of the church. A four-hand piano accompaniment will guide the choir through this beautiful Christmas musical journey. Please join us on December 12th for this sermon in song.

The second date of December 19th is what we call Pageant Sunday. This year the pageant will be the same, yet different. As has been the custom, members of the Sunday School classes will have the opportunity to wear costumes to portray animals, shepherds, kings and the Holy Family. Since all the classes will be studying the Nativity, they will research their roles more thoroughly and even contribute to making scenery and special costumes. The different aspect of the pageant will be the manner in which the story is told. It will be musically presented by the Primary and Children's Choirs who in the play are called the Cherubim and Hallelujah Choirs. They are chosen by soloist, Gabriel, to announce Jesus' birth. The spoken and musical dialogue of "Calling All Angels" is compelling and at times, humorous. The choirs are working hard in their weekly rehearsals to prepare this musical drama. Note to the parents: The Primary and Children's Choirs, soloists, readers and accompanists will have a special practice together on Saturday, December 18th, at 2:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary. The rehearsal with the Sunday School participants will be the next day, December 19th, during the Sunday School hour. The musical play will be presented during the early portion of the 11:00 o'clock worship service that same morning. Come, hear the angels sing!
