

MARILYN'S MESSAGE. I recently read the results of a survey of 200 high school students, most of

whom were 16 or 17 years old. The general tone of the survey seemed to be aimed at advertising for young people, but some interesting information was discovered.

We read in the newspapers and hear on the news that the American family is disintegrating. Believe it or not, the vast majority of students (85%) say that their relationships with their parents matter to them. 74% say a parent is the most influential person in their lives. 83% say that their family is the most important source of morality and values (only 11% said they look to religion for morality and values).

What does this mean to us a church? Should we dissolve all of our youth programs and activities? I don't think so. I think it says two things. First is that we as a church family need to support our parents in as many ways as possible. When young parents are struggling, experienced parents should step in with advice and encouragement. When parents of teens are overwhelmed and feel out-of-control, the church should help them over the rough spots. We have offered parenting seminars in the past, and will do so in the future. We will be offering a human sexuality class for 7th and 8th graders and their parents in the spring. The staff is always ready to help if we can with issues that come up. Part of the equation however, parents, is your willingness to ask for help. Don't be afraid to call the church if you are unsure of your parenting methods.

Secondly, parents should encourage their young people to attend church and Sunday School. The best way to influence them is by your example. If you show them by your example that church and Sunday School is only for kids, or only for crisis times, or only when it's convenient, they will learn that. The teen years are a time when young people test their independence and want to be adults. Show them that responsible adults never stop learning.

Another exciting result was that 46% of teens surveyed said they wanted to develop a more spiritual part of their lives. Your example is invaluable, and the church can help. In youth groups we spend a good portion of time on prayer. The goal is to develop in young people ways to have a spiritual life outside of church, so that when they are in their college dorm, or out in the "real world" they will have some tools upon which to draw. It is not so intimidating if you practice a little.

Parents, just when you feel as if they aren't listening to anything you say, remember that they are listening to everything you say, and watching everything you do. You're not in this alone; the church family is here to help you.



MISSION HELP TO SHELTERS

It is to the least of God's creation, indeed it is to God Himself, that our church ministers when we serve the needy around the world and in our local community. On behalf of the Mission Committee, I want to highlight a few of the local shelter and feeding programs which PPC supports.

For many years, several of our members have regularly volunteered at The Lord's Table, a community food kitchen in Gaithersburg, that offers one meal a day, six days a week to 40-50 or more persons. At the Lord's Table nourishment is not all that is shared; winter clothing and blankets are often distributed, and referrals are made for health care and other social services. Similarly, in the District, a volunteer supports the work of Miriam's Kitchen, feeding breakfast to, and sharing fellowship with 150-200 of the urban hungry in our midst.

Our church also lends financial and other support to several area shelters and housing assistance programs. Most of us are familiar with the Congregation Based Shelter facility in Rockville, at which we provide meals and companionship one week per year to the 30 or so men and women who have been given a bed there while seeking to regain employment or recover from illness or simply overcome bad luck.

In addition, we support three women's shelters--Rainbow Place, a winter women's shelter in Rockville, Cordelia House (now Montgomery Avenue Women's Center) and Sophia House, programs that offer shelter and counseling to abused and troubled women without a home of their own.

PPC also helps Stepping Stones, a housing program for families to whom it offers temporary housing and when possible transitional apartments until they can become self-sufficient again. Donations of clothing and home furnishings are put to good use there.

We also support the Robert P. Johnson Housing Corporation, a non-profit endeavor of our denomination seeking to find long-term solutions to housing affordability needs--they sponsor the Hearts and Hammers program in which some of you have assisted. The recent Walk against Homelessness raised money for RPJ and other housing programs.

Christmas in April also is another program to help improve housing for people in need -- a program that our congregation enthusiastically supports. Likewise, the congregation aids Habitat for Humanity.

In all, dozens of our church members have and do participate in these programs-this year our budget provides for nearly \$20,000 in financial assistance to these activities.

Much more, no doubt, can be done, however. God has done His part by showing us the needs of our less fortunate neighbors. The Mission Committee seeks to find ways for our membership to be engaged in this ministry to those who are hungry, homeless, or in despair, spreading both the Word and the Love of God.

Berger Lecture

Jean Bethke Elshtain, Laura Spelman Rockefeller Professor of Social and Political Ethics at the University of Chicago, will present this year's Berger Memorial Lecture in Fellowship Hall on Sunday, February 20 from 9:45 to 10:50. She will also give the sermon in our regular Sunday morning worship service.

Dr. Elshtain will speak on "Christianity and Cultural Renewal," the focus of her current research. She is the author of many books, including <u>Democracy on Trial</u> (1995) and <u>Augustine and the Limits of Politics</u> (1996), which was named one of the top five religion books in 1996 by <u>The Christian Century</u>. She lectures frequently in the United States and abroad, and is a contributing editor for <u>The New Republic</u>.

The Berger Lecture honors the memory of Fred Berger, an active and dedicated member of our church in the 1980's, who played a major role in shaping our Adult Education program and was particularly interested in the meaning of Christianity for contemporary moral and social problems.

What do you mean by betraying your intellectual integrity and becoming a Christian? There are so many other options. Walker Percy said,

What options? The critic said,

Well, there's Eastern philosophy or spiritualism or new age thinking or secular humanism or astrology or materialism, and he continued with the list.

Percy waited until the critic was finished, and then he said,

That's what I mean. What options?

Sounds to me like something to think about. If you want to read Percy, try, <u>The Moviegoer</u> (National Book Award Winner for 1961), <u>Love in Ruins</u>, <u>The Second Coming</u>, <u>Thanatos Syndrome</u>, I have a copy if you would like to borrow it.

MARILYN'S MESSAGE

One of the meetings I try to attend every month is the National Capital Presbytery Educator's Group. This group meets for support, sharing of ideas, and education. January's program was an excellent, though disturbing, one led by the religious coordinator for the Holocaust Museum. She shared some of the history of the Christian Church in Germany during the reign of Adolf Hitler, and how easy it was for Christians to be caught up in the charisma of this man. Many people, theologians to whom we look today with respect, made abominable statements in support of the persecution of Jews in Europe during this time. Of course, looking back on the Holocaust with new eyes, many of these people were horrified to think they participated in it.

How many times has this happened to us? We accept what the media tells us about a situation; we develop a prejudice against an entire group of people because of an incident that someone related to us in our youth; our fear grows into hatred simply because someone believes something that is different from what we believe.

In the Comparative Religions class that met in January, our main focus was not how we differ from other faiths, but the many ways in which we are the same. We don't need to fear those who practice a faith different from ours. All people of faith experience physical birth and death, and we all are trying to figure out the purpose of our time in between. Let's try to look with tolerance and respect at those who worship differently than we, and pray for the ones who have no faith to look to for the answers to life's difficult questions.



Berger Lecture

Jean Bethke Elshtain, Laura Spelman Rockefeller Professor of Social and Political Ethics at the University of Chicago, will present this year's Berger Memorial Lecture in Fellowship Hall on Sunday, February 20 from 9:45 to 10:50. She will also give the sermon in our regular Sunday morning worship service.

Dr. Elshtain will speak on "Christianity and Cultural Renewal," the focus of her current research. She is the author of many books, including <u>Democracy on Trial</u> (1995) and <u>Augustine and the Limits of Politics</u> (1996), which was named one of the top five religion books in 1996 by <u>The Christian Century</u>. She lectures frequently in the United States and abroad, and is a contributing editor for <u>The New Republic</u>.

The Berger Lecture honors the memory of Fred Berger, an active and dedicated member of our church in the 1980's, who played a major role in shaping our Adult Education program and was particularly interested in the meaning of Christianity for contemporary moral and social problems.



Not long ago I was reading an article in a professional music journal about selecting music for choirs. At the bottom of the four-page article was a statement set apart and enclosed in a border. It said, "Just because you like it, doesn't mean your choir should sing it." Obviously the author was trying to emphasize that church music is effective when directors take many factors into account - not just personal - when choosing choral music for the worship service.

Since all of you are not choral singers, I will not discuss my criteria for selection of anthems. But all of you are hymn singers and are keenly aware of the hymns we sing as a part of our worship. You have your own favorites based on your family and religious background, your musical expertise and your theology. I have my favorites, too. Some I know from my childhood when, as a nine-year-old pianist, I would accompany the men's Bible class Sunday after Sunday morning. I have new favorites, too, that I am discovering from the new hymn writers. One such writer is our friend, John Hormon, Director of Music at Warner Presbyterian Church in Kensington, Maryland. Kerry has introduced us to the profound texts of Tom Troeger as well. And don't forget Mary Cathey, a former director of Christian education of this church. She has contributed four texts that appear in our hymnal.


When I am asked to assist in the hymn selection for worship, I do not rely on my favorites or yours. I first read the scripture lessons which reflect the liturgical season and sermon theme. I look for hymns where texts are based on these scriptures. The one that comes closest usually becomes my suggestion for the hymn following the sermon and affirmation of faith. The first hymn of the day is usually a gathering hymn of praise. I look for variety, relation to the season, and a feeling of vigor and anticipation. If the hymn is new, I am careful to introduce it during the prelude and again in the introit. You can check on me by reading those hymn tune names that are printed to the right in the bulletin. The final hymn usually relates to the sermon as well as to the joy of giving our gifts or the receiving of communion.

If somewhere along the way one of your favorites is sung, then you can sing forth with added gusto. On other weeks, someone next to you in the pew may be singing with extra gusto when his or her favorites appears. From where I sit as organist, I am usually inspired by the enthusiasm of your congregational singing every Sunday. Could it be that good preaching and good singing are the vital ingredients in meaningful worship? My hope is that the music in any given service contributes to the message of that day.

MARILYN'S MESSAGE

I recently returned from the annual Association of Presbyterian Church Educator's Conference, which this year was held in Houston, Texas. I like to travel, and since I haven't been *anywhere*, it's always interesting to see new places. A very nice dinner was held for us at the Johnson Space Center, so we were able to see some of NASA's activities.

I came away from this gathering of over 1000 Presbyterian educators with a renewed sense of appreciation for this church, and for your support of me. There are educators in our denomination who are really struggling to have a viable ministry. They have little support from their pastors and congregations, very limited financial resources, no connections with their presbytery or other educators, and no way to get continuing education. I have experienced most of these things firsthand over the course of my ministry and it really can wear you out. I am so grateful to be here in this place, with excitement for new programs instead of fear, with a pastor who gives me plenty of opportunities to stretch my wings instead of feeling threatened by that, and with financial support for Christian education from the congregation instead of always having to function on a shoestring.

The children's Sunday School has been learning the Beatitudes (Matthew 5:1-12 if you want to look them up). The word 'beatitude' means blessing. I do think that some of our blessings are related to our attitude of our circumstances. Some can take a difficult situation and see the good in it, which can make a blessing out of a curse. But I also believe that God smiles on us at times in our lives, making it a little easier, and I think this is one of those times for me. Thank you for your smiles, your open-mindedness, your trust, and your loving support of me and my daughters. You are a blessing to me!

Did you Know?

When asked to indicate the importance of each of 15 factors in their decision to continue to attend their congregations, majorities of members rate two as very important: it satisfies my spiritual needs (60%), and I believe God is at work in this place (58%).

Worship Opportunities During Lent

Lent is the season in our church year consisting of the 40 days before Easter, NOT counting Sundays. It is a time for personal reflection and penitence (thinking about how we may have been unfaithful to God) which is symbolized by the color purple in the Sanctuary.

On February 6th our Children's Choir sang an introit in church entitled CALL TO PRAISE. In an exuberant style, the composer, Jim Taylor, listed many ways we sometimes praise God. He began the anthem with the phrase, "Praise Him with..." and continued with a total of fifteen expressions of praise: music, dancing, singing, laughing, crying, working together, trumpet, cymbals, keyboard, French horn, gong, strumming, drumming, clapping and joyful song.

To help the children memorize the song, I made individual colored cards containing each praise expression and the note pattern on which it was to be sung. We scrambled the cards, and then each child picked one or two cards. The whole choir sang, "Praise Him with..." and then individuals sang the appropriate phrase found on their cards. This exercise became a game when we went into the sanctuary and hid in different pew locations around the church. As I played the anthem on the piano, the mystery soloists popped up and, in the proper sequence, surprised us with their musical expressions of praise. We learned the song and experienced great joy in our acts of praise.

Is it acceptable to have fun in church? Can worship include outbursts of joy? Can practicing and learning actually be enjoyed? For me, the answer is yes. I look forward soon to seeing some of you at one of our choir rehearsals.

Christian Education Opportunities

Spring is almost here, and that means that the Christian Education Committee is beginning to plan for summer and fall programs. There are several opportunities for you to help in this important ministry:

<u>Summer Creative Enrichment teachers</u>: Sign on for one or two weeks during the summer. Curriculum materials provided. We would like to have one class, for ages three through those who have completed first grade.

<u>Youth Advisors</u>: For Sunday youth groups. Help weekly or occasionally, whichever fits your schedule. You could help with the regular weekly sessions, or with special outings or activities.



KERRY ON ...

I was at Princeton some time ago and heard Tom Long tell a story that goes something like this. He arranged with a friend to meet in New York to enjoy a Broadway play. He said, "Let's meet at the clock in the center of Grand Central Station at 7:00 pm." This was going to be a special night. The anticipation began to build. So the friend arrived a little early and at 6:55 no Professor Long. At 6:57 he had not arrived and then the clock stood at 6:59. Right at 7:00 here he comes, just like he said.

Tom said, it was not what you did that brought me, but that I promised to meet you. Maybe that's what worship is like and the Sacraments. We come to the appointed time and place. God has promised to meet us. Jesus said, "Where two or three are gathered in my name I am present." When we stand with our child in our arms for the Sacrament of Baptism, it is God who acts to welcome us into the family of faith. Our affirmation of faith and our promises bring us to a holy place where we can meet God. They don't bring God. When we come to the Lord's Table it is like coming to the big clock, and we begin at the right place at the right time. God arrives entirely on the basis of His promise.

Worship every Sunday is the same. In the company of God's people we have an appointment and we are invited to show up with a deep sense of expectation. Let's meet at 11:00 am Sunday at the "clock" and the One who promised to meet us there.

I was honored in the past month to serve on the commissions for two special services for my friend Nancy Clark, who you may remember was here for my installation service, and who taught an adult ed class here last June. Nancy has been ordained as Minister of Word and Sacrament. The two services were her ordination service, held on February 20 at Centreville Presbyterian Church in Centreville, Virginia, and her installation service, held March 19 at New Hanover Presbyterian Church in Mechanicsville, Virginia, the church to which Nancy has been called to serve as Associate Pastor. This is a very exciting time for Nancy, and I was so happy to share it with her.

The services were also meaningful to me because they were so different from each other, and so unlike our worship experience here. The music and preaching styles were particularly unusual to me. One church sang a lot of praise music with the words printed in the bulletin. The other had words projected on the wall. Neither church used the Presbyterian Hymnal, and I was surprised at my distaste for the non-inclusive language that was present throughout. The preaching styles were very different, too. Both ministers had notes but didn't use them much, both wore wireless mikes and wandered around the chancel during the sermon, and both wandered in their thoughts as they preached.

I came away from those worship experiences with a greater appreciation for the diversity in our denomination. These were not my favorite styles of worship, but they seem to be effective for the members of those congregations. Isn't it wonderful that we have a choice? I would recommend that when you are out of town you visit other Presbyterian churches. Notice some of the differences, and then notice what is ultimately the same, that is, the proclamation and interpretation of God's Word. We don't all have to be the same, or believe exactly the same things, or worship the same way. Our common bond is our love of God and our desire to serve others. Let us celebrate our differences, and appreciate the fact that we have found a church home that we love!


Maundy Thursday Fellowship Meal and Communion Service April 20, 2000

Kerry On...

Writing in the magazine "Christianity Today," Martin Copenhaver, who is pastor at the Wellesley Congregational Church in Massachusetts, describes two kinds of preaching,

You hear what the psychologist says, what the historian says, what the New York Times editorial writer says, and then the sermon concludes with, "And perhaps Jesus said it best...

The alternative way of preaching says,

You have heard it said... but Jesus says to you...

It is my intention and I believe my calling to engage in the latter. I use movies, books, newspapers, and examples from politics to remind us of the shape of the culture in which we live. Sometimes these things reflect the values of the Gospel and help us to see that what Jesus says does have an impact on the way we live. There are examples of self-sacrifice, compassion and generosity.

Often they reflect conventional wisdom that stands against what Jesus proclaimed. I recently said in a sermon that we come to worship to "reposition" ourselves in relation to the Lord of Life. During the week it is easy to align ourselves with pride and power and the American goddess called "success." It is tempting to believe that as long as we remain super busy we must be doing something worthwhile. We can be seduced into thinking that how we look is somehow a true measure of our worth. The consumer culture sings a siren song, "buy this, buy that, and you will be happy."

In worship we listen for the Word of the Lord and seek to reposition ourselves. All week long we have heard it said, but in the hour of worship we bow down and listen for what Jesus says.

MARILYN'S MESSAGE

We are blessed in this congregation to have a growing number of children. We spend a lot of time and energy on teaching them the basics of the faith, so that as they grow older they will be able to make their own faith decisions. A big part of that education is teaching children how to worship. We begin this process at the very youngest ages by inviting children to participate in a portion of the worship service. At first and second grade, the focus of Creative Enrichment is worship education. By third grade, children are usually able to be in regular worship for the entire service. Here are some tips to helping your child (and you) get the most out of the worship service:

Encourage your child to participate. There are many parts of the worship service in which your child can participate. The Lord's Prayer and Apostles' Creed are examples, and they can follow along in the front of the hymnal if they're not sure of all the words. They also know, or quickly learn, the Gloria Patri and the Doxology that are sung every week. Encourage them to follow along in the hymnal, even if they can't sing the tune.

Sit where your child can see what's going on. I know, Presbyterians have a strong distaste for sitting in the front. But it really helps children to see better, and thus feel more a part of the service.

Point out any special interest items. Read through your bulletin as you arrive in church, and show your child where there is special music, or new colors for the liturgical season, or a baptism, etc.

Let your child help. Ask your child to mark the pages in the hymnal and Bible that pertain to the day's activities. Let them put your offering into the plate. Let them sign the friendship pad.

For younger children, have something for them to do during the sermon. Save the children's bulletin until this time; mark a particular Bible story you want your child to read; bring Bible storybooks or other appropriate materials. Encourage them to listen to the sermon by reading the scripture ahead of time, picking a word or two that you think will be mentioned often, and asking your child to count the number of times that word is said. You'd be surprised at how much they pick up of the message. Leave the toys at home.

Talk about the service later. Include the children in your discussions on the way home and at lunchtime. Ask what they liked best about the service; share positive comments you have. Children learn quickly from the examples their parents exhibit. Be sure they hear more positive than negative comments.

Update Komen National Race for the Cure



I was born and raised in Wheeling, West Virginia and am a graduate of Duquesne University in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.



KERRY ON...

Thirty Books that have shaped my ministry over thirty years.

Most of my reading has been built on the foundation that one constructs in seminary and in personal spiritual life up until that time. I have always loved to read and have fond memories of buying my first books from the "Weekly Reader" book lists that we had in grade school. In many ways the best reading a minister does is after seminary. Then every page must be related to real life in the congregation. Of course there are novels, mysteries, sports books and books on cooking and travel that sometimes serve to provide a vacation from thinking about the work of ministry. Though many times these books suggest unexpected theological themes.

Since the time of formal theological education the shape of the building changes, new building materials become available, new rooms are needed more than others, social and political issues influence the way that the building looks. Colleagues suggest and challenge me to explore alternative building methods. The congregations I have served and continue to serve have called me to rethink some of my plans. You have urged me to revisit some old themes that needed to be refurbished for a new day. Children have asked me tough questions, especially in confirmation class and I had to go back to my foundation work and see how I can explain in clear terms just what makes for a strong foundation in the Christian faith. You have challenged me to look outward and see how we can include a larger family in this building called the Christian community.

Lines from Marilyn

The Senior High Youth Group recently shared an experience with the Parable of the Talents (Luke 19:11-27). Before telling them what the topic of the evening was, I gave them a Baggie filled with odds and ends: toothpicks, cotton balls, scotch tape, an index card, and other treasures. Their only instruction was: see what you can do with this. They were extremely creative, some working together, some alone, and we ended up with things like a boat, a person, a weapon (there's always one!), and some interesting abstract art. All were unique and imaginative.

We then read the parable and made the connection between the fact that God gives each of us gifts, and what we make of the gift is up to us. Each of us can take God's gift and be creative with it, and make it uniquely our own.

This is a powerful message as the church celebrates Stewardship season. What are you going to do with the abundance God has given to you? In the church's efforts to raise money and receive pledges, we often forget about the other abundance God has given to us. Some in this congregation have been given gifts of artistry, or music, or storytelling. Some have strong backs and willing hands. Others have time to give to the ministry of the church.

The last part of the lesson on the Parable of the Talents was that each person was offered a \$10 bill to take and make something of. Some of the students did not take the gift. Many did, and agreed to try to make that \$10 grow over the course of the month, and bring it back along with any profit they made. As they thought about ways to do that, they had some extremely creative ideas. I'll keep you posted on their progress.

Nov 21st Nothing Like It In The World, a history of American railroads by Stephen Ambrose


Dec 19th Plainsong, a novel by Kent Haruf







Lines from Marilyn

I was pleased to attend a National Capital Presbytery Educator's Group event on Sabbath-keeping this month. This year's General Assembly approved a very well done paper on this topic, and one of the writers was the leader of the workshop.

It was interesting to note my actions before and after this event. On Wednesday, I was rushing to get the items on my ever-present list checked off so that I could take the day Thursday to go and learn about resting. The list was much longer than the time I had, and my stress level rose steadily throughout the day. By the time Thursday morning came I considered not going to the workshop because I had so much to do. But I had paid for it, which is always a strong incentive for me, so I went, although grudgingly.

At the workshop, we were reminded that God gives us the Sabbath because we need to rest — seems simple enough, doesn't it! We need to have one day (whether it is Sunday or not) where we do not labor at our jobs, one day where we do not labor at home, one day that is markedly different from the other six. Some of us grew up in a time when stores were not open on Sundays, and somehow that was all right. We survived. The modern-day notion of Sabbath is not necessarily that we stay home all day reading the Bible. The idea is that we set aside one day a week for refreshment and renewal. This is, after all, what God did after creating the world.

The workshop itself was a time of refreshment and renewal for me. I renewed a personal commitment to spend some time each day in prayer and in the Scriptures. I left feeling great and ready to get back to work.

The next day, the list loomed large, but as soon as I felt myself getting stressed, I stopped and said, Will it really matter if I don't plan 50 games for the lockin? Will the ministry of the church suffer if I don't have the Enrichment lessons written six months in advance? Will the world stop spinning if the laundry doesn't get done today? Then I relaxed a little. And guess what? The lock-in was fine without 50 games, everyone had lessons for Enrichment, and we all had clothes to wear.

We live in a culture where over-achievement is rewarded, and rest for the sake of rest is questioned. We in the church should do our part to keep that in perspective. Instead of leaving church on Sunday and going back to the office, why not spend some time with your family? It is an act of faith to let God handle things for one day of the week. Let us honor that!
