KERRY STOLTZFUS SCHOLARSHIP

Our tribute to Kerry establishing a scholarship was overwhelming. My September 5 kick-off letter said: "It is the spirit and the statement---not the amount that counts." What a statement we made with our gifts: creating a \$22,100 endowment--- exceeding the original \$10,000 goal significantly---ranging from \$1 to \$1,000 each---coming from over 300 individuals in 19 states. Yes, and the \$1 gift was as touching as the \$1,000 gifts. The significant gift from Potomac Presbyterian Church, on behalf of all of us was beautiful, too. The gift from the Erin Presbyterian Church Session in Knoxville, Tennessee, where Kerry served from 1970 -1985 before coming to Potomac, was very gratifying and a further compliment to Kerry.

Your gifts created an endowment that will provide a \$1,000+ scholarship each year, in perpetuity, for a Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary student preparing to serve in the Presbyterian Church (USA). Also, each year the Seminary will provide us with the satisfaction of knowing who the recipient is and what his or her goals are. In a very real sense we have established a new mission. We truly made a significant statement to ourselves, the seminary, its students, and to other churches.



Deacon's Corner


The Deacons would like to thank all of you who joined us for yet another successful Williamsburg Breakfast. As usual, the goodies were delicious and the fellowship enjoyable.



Our new confirmation class has begun. Fifteen students in 8th grade make up the class, which is led by four adults. As we begin the confirmation process, we tell the students about what it means to go through the class and make a commitment to Christ and to the church. Confirmation is the fulfillment of the promises we make at baptism to nurture children in the Christian faith. When a young person is confirmed, the church can breathe a sigh of relief and say, "Whew! It worked! We have done what we promised to do, and the young person has made the decision to follow Jesus Christ!" It is something about which we can rejoice and be glad.

We can be especially glad when we have made a personal contribution to the life of these teenagers. We have taught a children's Sunday school class, or substituted in Creative Enrichment when a teacher called in sick. We have prayed for the children in our church, or contributed to the budgetary needs for children's and youth ministry. We treated a child with respect and caring, showing them that people in the church do love them, so maybe God loves them too.

Advertisements often remind us that investing in a child is an investment in the future. GEORGE ADROUNY MEMORIAL

On November 6, 2000, Tulane University School of Medicine celebrated the establishment of "The First Annual George Adrouny Memorial Lectureship" in biochemistry as well as "The First Annual George Adrouny Award" to be given to the first year medical student achieving the highest grade in biochemistry. The daylong event in New Orleans included many reminiscences of George ~ as teacher, scientist, friend ~ by his colleagues as well as introductory comments by members of the Russo and Adrouny families. Dr. Kenneth G. Mann, a world authority on the biochemistry of blood coagulation, gave the first lecture.

Deacon's Corner

On Sunday, January 7, I had the honor to be ordained as a Deacon. As part of the process leading up to that moment, each of us were asked by the Pastor to share some brief reflections with the Session on one of the questions we were to be asked during ordination. I was asked to reflect on acceptance of the Trinity and it's importance to our faith. I chose as a reference the writings of the British author C. S. Lewis, who came to the Christian faith in his mid thirties after a long personal struggle. I want to share a brief passage from on of his books, Christian Behavior, that I found especially inspiring:

"A ordinary simple Christian kneels to say his prayers. He is trying to get in touch with God. But if he is a Christian he knows that what is prompting him to pray is also God: God so to speak, inside him. But he also knows that his real knowledge of God comes through Christ, the man who was God – that Christ is standing beside him, helping him to pray, praying for him. You see what is happening. God is the thing to which he is praying – the goal he is trying to reach. God is also the thing inside him, which is pushing him on – the motive power. God is also the road or bridge along which he is being pushed to that goal. So that ... is [what] is actually going on in that ordinary bedroom where an ordinary man is saying his prayers." 


of Musicians, an organization whose membership I maintain through your church support. That mission statement reads as follows:

Lines from Marilyn

It is two days before Valentine's Day as I write this, and the air is filled with thoughts of declared love, sweet gifts and construction paper hearts. At this time of year, we especially think of those we love, and sometimes we remember with sadness love that has gone away, either by relocation, or death, or failure of a relationship to live up to our hopes and dreams.

I once served a church with a very transient congregation. Many of the members worked for the government, and they were young and just beginning their careers, so they were often transferred to other places after being there for two years or so. Right after I went to that church, I made good friends with two couples who were subsequently transferred, and who I knew I wouldn't see often, if ever, again. It was a very sad time for me. But then I realized that if I hadn't had those wonderful friendships, how less enriched my life would have been. I realized that one of the risks of loving others is that your heart will be broken, or at least cracked. But it's worth the risk!

Flo Casper and I were very close friends, in addition to being colleagues in ministry for PPC. We had lunch together most Mondays, and talked about everything, from parenting issues, vet schools, faith issues, churches we had been part of, and many other things. I delighted in seeing her smiling face every morning in the office, and she listened to me complain about my computer or having more to do than time to do it (chronic problems!). Her untimely death at such a young age was shocking to me, as it was to all of you.

For an instant in my grief, the thought crossed my mind that it's easier not to get close to people because it hurts so much when they leave. But, just as instantly, I knew that I wouldn't be the same person without having known Flo, and I'm sure that I'm a

better person for knowing her. Yes, it's very sad, but what a blessing to have shared part of my life with this caring, faithful, funny, sharing person! I thank God for the opportunity to have known her and worked with her and loved her for the short time I did. I pray that God will give all of us the courage to open our hearts to others, even though we may suffer for it, because, in the long run, the blessings are so much greater than the pain will ever be.

CAMP GLENKIRK

In 1959 a group of Presbyterians in the Washington D.C. area decided to find a place in the country for a retreat center and camp. Acreage was bought on the banks of Broad Run and was named Glenkirk which means church in the woods. A.T. and Doris Brown were hired to be the camp directors and plans were set into motion.

Over the last 40+ years Glenkirk has continued to change and reform itself in an effort to keep up with the needs of the Presbytery. Truman Nabors was hired to be the next camp director and along with Wayne Jones they continued to develop Glenkirk into a small group camp environment for the summer program and a rustic retreat center for the churches to use the rest of the year. During this time Lake Manassas was built in place of Broad Run leaving Glenkirk with over a mile of shoreline. Acreage continued to be acquired until it reached the current size of 230 acres.

Glenkirk currently has sleeping facilities for 89 people in heated buildings and another 20 people in the Loghouses. There is more room in the woods for those who like to camp in villages of treehouses and platform tents.

You are invited to visit Glenkirk on one of the Open House dates this spring. April 22 and May 6 from 2-5 p.m. have been set aside for you to come see Glenkirk for the first time or the 91^{st} time. Refreshments will be served, you can visit a village and meet some of the staff.

SHARING OUR MISSION.

During the Lenten Season, our church will once again participate in ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING. We join other Presbyterians in responding to Christ's love for all by sharing it in tangible ways with people in need through this ministry-emergency relief, refugee resettlement, and long-term development funds.

Since 1949, American Christian churches have joined together to raise funds for world relief efforts. By doing so in a united time and fashion, these church denominations (now ten) have proven to the world how great is the power for good that can be done when Christians unite in a common cause. The original radio broadcast, made on March 26, 1949, was called "One Great Hour." The annual campaign, referred to as "One Great Hour of Sharing" (OGHS) since 1952, has retained its original purpose: to collect special gifts to help those in need.

OGHS funds enable our denomination, together with Church World Service, to provide immediate emergency relief for victims of natural disasters. Secondly, OGHS funds are used to help people improve their economic situation with vocational training and development activities.

Contributions to OGHS make a difference in the lives of people. It may be supplying a blanket, a tent or a warm meal in times of disaster, such as in the recent earthquake in India or the Mississippi Valley floods of several years ago; or vocational training for unemployed young Palestinians in the Gaza strip; or funds to operate a convalescent camp in Poland for children still suffering severs health effects from the Chernobyl nuclear disaster in nearby Byelorussia; or the staffing of medical clinics in Somalia; or the purchase of sewing or knitting machines for poor women in Siberia so they can earn a modest living. In all these ways, Christians are present in the world, loving their global neighbors.

For over 50 years God has called us through One Great Hour of Sharing to go into the entire world and proclaim the good news. May each of us prayerfully consider what we can do as ambassadors of God's love and justice to hear our neighbors' cries and share their hopes for a better world. OGHS donation envelopes will be placed in the church pews in March.



Ann Lamott in her book, <u>Traveling Mercies</u>, tells a story about a little girl who was lost somewhere in her neighborhood. A policeman stopped and picked her up and they began to drive around looking for something familiar. Up and down the streets they drove and then finally she exclaimed,

"This is my church, and I can always find my way home from here."

I have thought about that a lot and what she said is a profound spiritual and theological insight. We are not alone on our faith journeys. Our church is a place and a people who help us to know who we are. They welcome us as we are and they challenge us to be more than we are by the grace of God. There is comfort and compassion for our pains and sorrows. At the same time we are pushed to explore that which is beyond the familiar. 
% Horizons House Opens %

It seems as if "giving up" and "giving to" are pretty similar. Both involve some degree of sacrifice. Both exemplify the way our Lord Jesus Christ lived his life. Both fulfill God's call to us to love God with all our hearts, souls, minds, and strength, and to love our neighbors as ourselves. Come to think of it, "giving to" might be a little easier than "giving up." There is great joy in giving to someone in need. Our focus is on their needs and we get a good feeling knowing that we are helping. The simple act of giving is something we know pleases God, and what could be more pleasing to us?

I urge you in this Lenten season, to find ways to give to others. Let giving be a part of your Lenten devotions. The rewards are great and God will smile, knowing that those of us who are blessed in so many ways are willing to help those less advantaged.





Very few people look forward to doing homework. Yet, if the homework assignment is reasonable, and if we do it carefully, we are usually more prepared to participate in the next day's related activity. Well, I am about to give you some information about our Palm Sunday worship service. Your assignment is to read the following description of the Children's Choir and Sanctuary Choir's call to worship and hymn introduction. As you read, picture yourself sitting in the pew, listening to the triumphant Palm Sunday prelude. You have a palm branch in your hand, and you can't wait to proceed to the

next portion of the service during which you will wave that branch and join in on the catchy musical introduction to the first hymn, "Hosanna, Loud Hosanna!"

At the time when the Sanctuary Choir normally sings an introit, the Children's Choir will instead walk down both central aisles, chanting in rhythm the speech phrases alluding to Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. When they finish, they will be lined up in the front of the church. You will hear them say these words, "Raise high your branches. Hosannas raise!" Here you may raise your palm branches, as well.

Next you will hear the Sanctuary Choir enter with a recurring musical theme, "And the people cried Hosanna, Hosanna to the King. Bless Him who comes in the name of the Lord". They will sing this two more times in response to phrases sung by the Children's Choir concerning the crowd, the colt and the throwing of garments on the road. When the Sanctuary Choir comes in on a third and final response, the children will give the congregation a signal to sing along. Trust me, the theme is very easy to follow.

Following your enthusiastic musical response (which will include raising your own palm branch), the organ will play an introduction to the first hymn, "Hosanna, Loud Hosanna!". You will stand and sing the hymn from the hymnal, as you do any other Sunday. The Sanctuary Choir will provide a special descant during the third verse and a coda written by Robert Lau in his anthem, "And the People Cried Hosanna".

Now, this isn't a bad homework assignment, is it? I look forward to hearing your joyful voices and seeing your waving palms on April 8.

Chank you all for sharing our joy and thanksgiving in the birth of our first grandchild, Madeline Faith Shook. We are blessed to have her and her loving parents.


Komen National Race for the Cure

Presently, one of my neighbors is fighting a rare form of cancer. Upon learning of this, many of us have started a chain of events to

assist her family during this difficult time. These include preparing meals, shopping, giving gifts, child sitting, etc. But what is most ironic is that the one who "professes no faith" is one of the most active in the ministry to this ill friend. She has no clue that God has entered her heart and is caring for His beloved child through her. She may not think of her actions as Christian witnessing, yet they are. Every act of loving kindness reflects God's love for His people. We give to others because God has so freely given His love to us. He is the example we follow. I pray that next time, she will knowingly and willingly open her heart for Him



Lines from Marilyn

It's baseball season, and one of the striking (pun not intended!) things about watching a baseball game is seeing the inevitable signs in the stands – JOHN 3:16. What does this mean? Why do people always have that sign?

John 3:16 is one of those foundational verses that we all had to memorize as children. I remember my children having races to see who could say it the fastest. It is a fairly short verse, but it contains so much!

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.

The verse first reminds us that God is the one who takes the initiative in our salvation. It is dependent on God's love for us, not on how good we are or how much we deserve God's favor. Salvation is simply based on God's love.

God gave the ultimate sacrifice because of that great love for us – his Son, Jesus Christ. We have just experienced the agony of Holy Week and the triumph of Easter Sunday. God sent Jesus to earth to live among us, to understand us and help us to understand him. Then Jesus had to die a painful and horrible death. And all because God loved us so much!

The second part of the verse is often emphasized at memorial services. It reminds us that if we believe in Christ, our life is not over at the time of our death, but continues into eternity with God. What could be more comforting! What greater gift could God have given to us?

So why the sign at the baseball game? I think that the people who bring those signs think that if even one person who doesn't know what John 3:16 says goes to a Bible and looks it up, it might be a life-changing experience for them. Jesus delivers this verse as part of a lesson he is giving to Nicodemus, a member of the Jewish ruling council who meets Jesus in the dark of night to ask him some questions. Perhaps non-believers today can benefit from Jesus' teaching in the same way that Nicodemus did, at their own pace, and when they are ready to ask the question.

Take a moment to revisit John 3:16 and the verses surrounding it. We who are in the church sometimes lose our focus and forget why we do all the things we do. John 3:16 can help us to remember what our faith is all about. God loving us, and sacrificing his Son, so that we might have salvation and eternal life in heaven. Hmmm, you might call it a home run!

Peacon's Corner

Before last summer, I knew very little about autism. Then in July, my 2 ½ year old nephew who lives in Boston stopped talking, playing with his toys and interacting with his three siblings and parents. He was diagnosed as autistic and suddenly I had personal knowledge of the pain and anguish of this disease.

Although I have never known someone with autism, it affects 1:500 children, typically in the first three years of life. Children with autism experience severe impairment in language, social interaction, cognition, and communication. It is more common than Down's syndrome, multiple sclerosis, or cystic fibrosis. There are no known causes and no effective treatments at this time.


I felt helpless, hopeless, and despondent when I thought about my nephew who seems all but lost to us now. The distance between Potomac and Boston might as well have been thousands of miles because I felt like I was useless to my family as they try to help my nephew.

In an effort to make a difference for him and others, I decided to organize a 5K Run/1 mile walk to raise money for a cure for autism. On July 4th, we will kick off the first <u>Cure Autism Now - Run 2001</u> to benefit Cure Autism Now. Cure Autism Now is a national non-profit organization of parents, clinicians, and scientists working together in their dedication to finding effective biomedical treatments and a cure for autism and related disorders. It is the largest private funder of autism research and resources in the country. The Mid-Atlantic chapter is headquarters right here in Potomac.

I began my efforts in October as one individual and since then the outpouring of support has been tremendous. I'm fortunate to have some wonderful friends who agreed, early on, to serve on my race committee. To raise financial and in-kind support, I have reached out to family, friends, and the community. I have been blessed by many but particularly from friends at the church who brought my efforts to the attention of the Mission Committee last month. I was pleased and honored to receive their support as a child health mission. To date, we have raised over \$50,000 for this cause.

I am excited about the upcoming race that is geared to families with children of all ages. It will take place in Potomac Village and promises to be a wonderful way to kick off the 4th of July with an early celebration. I hope many of you can join us either as participants or volunteers. 

I would like to write a few words to our graduates and invite all of our church family to listen in.



Lines from Marilyn

This month I will begin class work on a Doctor of Ministry degree at Virginia Theological Seminary. For some time, I have been wanting to further my formal education with the pursuit of another degree that would help me to develop new skills in ministry, sharpen the skills I already have, and give new insight and energy to programs I lead.

Virginia Theological Seminary is located in Alexandria, Virginia, and is affiliated with the Episcopal Church. Their program, however, is intentionally ecumenical, and they have several Presbyterian faculty members. The education received at VTS is highly regarded in our denomination. There are only eight candidates in each D.Min. class at VTS.

The program is designed to allow those who are working in ministry to continue in that ministry while pursuing the degree. I will be in residence at VTS for three weeks each summer for the next three years. During that time I will be 1) participating in and leading worship, 2) taking an intensive class in some aspect of the Bible, 3) presenting and receiving feedback on case studies I have written, and 4) taking classes in a variety of aspects of ministry. For the rest of the year I will have some reading to do, but will not be required to take classes or be away from the church. In addition, I will be designing, implementing and evaluating projects at PPC and at the presbytery/GA level that will enhance the ministry of our church and of other levels of the PCUSA in which I am involved. During the final year, there will be a major thesis project due, which I must research, prepare and defend.

For this year, I will be away from the church from July 2 to July 20. This follows directly on the heels of workcamp, so I will actually be out of the office for four consecutive weeks. Vacation Bible School falls during this time, but our intern, Carrie Smith, has agreed to oversee the activities that week - the majority of the work is done ahead of time, and we have two wonderful co-directors, Kay Mitchel and Judi Miller. In addition to my absence, another way PPC will be impacted is that the projects will introduce some new models or programs into the church's ministry. I hope that this is a very positive experience for all of us, and that the ministry of PPC will grow.

Many have asked if I will be a pastor after completion of this program. The answer is no. I will have a Doctor of Ministry degree, but I am still called and committed to educational ministry. I am confident that this educational experience will help me to be better equipped to do the work God has called me to. I appreciate your prayers during this time away, and look forward to sharing my experiences when I return.

So, as you go through your summer closet changeover, put your reusable items into shopping bags and place them in our recycling bin. If you need a receipt for these items, the forms will be available in our church office or by calling the Clothing Recycling Company at 703-204-1040.

If you have other "gently used" items such as toys, games, children's books, dishes, flatware, pots and pans that you wish to share with low-income families in Montgomery County, you can deliver these items to the Interfaith Clothing Center, 751 Twinbrook Parkway, Rockville MD 20851. PPC Youth Help the Needy!!!

A group of young people from Potomac Presbyterian Church recently participated in a weeklong workcamp mission in Fayette County, West Virginia.

During the week of June 24-30, the 25 youth and their 7 adult sponsors participated in the "Country Roads" Workcamp located in Smithers, West Virginia, which was sponsored by Group Workcamps of Loveland, Colorado and the Appalachian Labor Service. The participants paid their own expenses and provided their own transportation to the workcamp. The young people spent the entire week repairing and weatherizing family homes for elderly, low-income, and disabled people.

Approximately 475 other young people and their adult sponsors from locations throughout the United States, representing many churches and denominations, also participated in the "Country Roads" Workcamp. Potomac Presbyterian Church was the third largest group represented at the workcamp.

Each of the workcampers was asked to write a short reflection on their experience. When those are all received, they will be compiled into a booklet for you to read. Hopefully, it will give you a taste of the good, bad, and gracious moments of workcamp. We could not do this project without the generous and loving support from this congregation. You are making a huge difference in the lives of young people, who will never forget this experience.


All of the workcampers are thankful to be home, thankful to our nurturing family, and thankful to God for the opportunity to minister in His name to the people of West Virginia.

For me one of the best expressions of the wholeness of proclaiming the Gospel is in the words of <u>Living Faith</u>: A Statement of Christian Belief.


As God sent Christ to us, so Christ sends us into the world. We are here to proclaim Christ in word and deed.



Last month I reported to you that I was beginning the Doctor of Ministry program at Virginia Theological Seminary. This month I am pleased to report that I have completed my first three week summer session and it was wonderful!

There were 14 students in the program, representing eight different denominations. I was one of two women and one of three who were not pastors, but I felt right at home and was able to keep up with the large amount of work (reading, writing, evaluating, studying). Everyone was very welcoming, and we were able to find a little time for some activities together as a group (field trips to the National Cathedral and to Adams-Morgan, an evening outing to Wolf Trap, and a dinner in Old Town Alexandria at the end of the program). We shared the seminary with a group of about 15 students working on their Master's in Christian Education.

Each day began with worship, followed by Bible study led daily by students. Then we had our seminar class with the Rev. John Yieh, a Presbyterian minister, on the book of Matthew. This was extremely challenging, with a great deal of writing and research, but was very interesting and stimulating. We also met in case study groups where we reviewed the case studies each of us brought with us. This was a more relational activity, and was helpful for sharing ideas and strategies for ministry and leadership.

For the remainder of this year, I hope to do at least three projects which will inform my case studies for next summer. The three areas in which I will be writing case studies are: Nurturing Personal and Spiritual Growth, Teaching and Proclamation, and Engaging the World. Kerry and I have already discussed some possible projects in these areas. I will also have some reading to do, and an examination or two to take.

I very much appreciate the support of the session and congregation for this endeavor. I truly treasured my time at VTS, and look forward to next summer's residency. I was surprised that meeting new people was so easy, and that even though the academics were rigorous, I was able to hold my own and do well. Thank you for your continued prayers and encouragement.

Men's Book Group Parlor



STEEPLE TO PEOPLE

Potomac Presbyterian Church

KERRY ON...

September 11, 2001, the World Trade Center in New York, the Pentagon just a few miles from this church. Perhaps not since the attack on Pearl Harbor, or the assassination of President Kennedy have we as a nation been plunged into such a state of shock. A "day that will live in infamy," seems an apt description. Pain and sorrow, anguish and disbelief, shock and fear has descended like a dark and ominous cloud over our nation.

Let us first remember those who have died and their families, as well as those who gave their lives in rescue efforts. Let us give thanks for everyone who has stepped forward to help, whether professionals or ordinary folks. Let us give thanks for our President and the members of Congress who stand united. Let us give thanks for everyone who has been able to go back to work and school and so signal to the world and all would be attackers that we will continue to live life in the context of the precious freedoms we cherish.

What can we do all of us are asking. I would like to share with you a portion of the pastoral letter we have received from the Stated Clerk of our Presbytery.

As long as there are deeds of compassion to be done, we are not at all helpless. As long as there are victims to pray for, we are not voiceless. Let us all keep our people from scapegoating, from militaristic belligerence, and from looking for God in all the wrong places. In the fine words which Stephen-Cobbs Smith offered to his people, "God's heart was the first to break this morning." If we let these horrific events cause us to abandon faith, then evil will indeed have triumphed.

We have all been devastated by the tragic events of Tuesday, September 11. One of the dilemmas we face in the aftermath is what to say to our children about this. Although as I write this it is only about 48 hours after the attack, and it is probably a week or more later as you read this, conversations with children and youth will be ongoing. Remember that you and our church family may be the only ones to talk with young people from a faith perspective. I offer the following suggestions, which have been gathered from several sources:

- Your children will look to you for a response. You need to be a model of hope and stability. This does not mean making promises that you cannot keep, like "nothing can happen to us now." It also does not mean hiding your sadness and your own questions. Sorrow is the appropriate response, but as people of faith we are able to say "I will not let my fears overwhelm me, because God is with me."
- Preschoolers will barely understand what has happened and will have no concept of the consequences of the events, but they will pick up on your feelings. Simple explanations are best: "Something very bad happened to many people and it makes us sad." It would be appropriate to pray for the people who are hurt and for all the families who are sad. Young children should be protected from the violent images on TV. Resist the temptation to listen to the television or radio non-stop. Wait until they are tucked into bed. Many preschoolers may be afraid simply because mommy or daddy works in a big building too.
- Try to limit the amount of TV coverage your elementary age children watch. They do not need to see the constant replays of the terrorism. Instead, discuss the information as a family by providing simple, accurate information to your children's questions. It is okay to say, "I don't know." Remember that you do not have to answer questions they are not asking.
- Many younger youth may not grasp the impact of the human suffering side of the story. That's their world right now. They need it personalized. Older youth may be worrying about the real possibility of war and what this means to them personally. Again, honesty is the best response. We do not know what will happen; tell them that. Encourage your teenager to think theologically, with questions such as, "How do you think God feels about what happened?"
- Listen to what your children are saying and how they say it. Paraphrasing their words and recognizing, naming, and reflecting on their feelings can help them. (Example: "You are afraid that . . .") This will help them work through their concerns and help you recognize any misconceptions they might have. Again, keep responses simple.



- Children need to maintain as normal a routine as possible to comfort them and assure them of their personal safety. Spend extra time with your children to talk and offer reassurance. Holding or touching may comfort many children.
- There is no good answer to the "why" question, but it is important to let them know that this was not God's will. God is grieving with us over this act of hate. This is why it is important for people to learn what to do with their anger in non-hurtful ways, like talking out feelings instead of hitting. When anger grows and grows, it turns into hate, and hate can twist our sense of right and wrong.
- The Bible tells us to love our enemies and pray for those who persecute us (Matthew 5:44). This is not what we always feel like doing, but reacting in hate just repeats what happened on Tuesday. Resist demonizing all Muslims and talking about revenge. These are not the kinds of responses we want to teach our children.
- The Bible also tells us that God has not given us a spirit of fear, but a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline (II Timothy 1:7), and that nothing can separate us from the love of God (Romans 8:28-29). Assure your child that love is bigger than our fears, and we can use the minds God has given us to respond constructively and to protect ourselves.

May God grant us an extra measure of grace, mercy and love in these difficult days.

Remembering Our Missionary Families

PPC has been actively supporting a number of overseas missionary families for many years. At times like this when our nation is feeling threatened and is mourning the tragic loss of so many of our brothers and sisters, we should remember and pray for our broader Christian family, many of whom are living and working in difficult conditions all around the world, actively engaged in bringing the Good News of the Gospel to all the nations and people of the world. Let us pray that the Lord will keep them safe, nurture them and give them continued strength as they go about their daily lives separated by so much distance from their own family, friends and loved-ones.

I can remember growing up as a kid in Taiwan in the sixties and early seventies when the war in SE Asia was being so fiercely fought. Oftentimes, we were the only visible local face of an American government, and American policies, and we were dealt with accordingly by a local populace that felt powerless to respond in any other way. At times like these it was so encouraging to know that in addition to the strong local friends and community we had around us we were being supported and prayed for by our churches and friends back home. Those prayers meant so much to us then and I know they will mean a lot to our missionary families today.

Drs. Richard and Judith Brown are serving as medical missionaries in Kenya. They have been serving most recently in Chogoria Hospital, a Presbyterian hospital located about 120 miles north of the capitol of Nairobi. Prior to this they have served a number of terms in the Congo and in Haiti. Dr. Brown oversees the internal medicine ward and trains young Kenyan doctors from the Univ. of Kenya. Increasingly his work has focused on treating patients suffering from AIDS, a disease that has reached epidemic proportions in Africa and throughout much of the developing world. The Brown's are just finishing their term in Chogoria this summer and are planning to relocate to Nairobi where they hope to develop a medical program specifically designed to address the diagnosis and treatment of AIDS in Kenya and the care and spiritual support of those people suffering from AIDS and its related diseases.

Dr. Judith Brown will be in the US this fall and we are hopeful that she will be able to visit us in Potomac. It would be wonderful to get to know her better and to have the opportunity to learn more about their ministry there in Kenya in her own words. The Brown's ask that we will pray for them as they seek the Lord's guidance in preparation for their new term of ministry in Nairobi working with the AIDS program there.

KERRY ON...

On Sunday October 14 I extended an invitation to our congregation to join me in stepping up our spiritual training a notch. It doesn't matter if you are a spiritual couch potato or a spiritual marathoner. There is no need to consult your physician before we begin.

In this time of national crisis we are called upon to strengthen ourselves spiritually. Of course God is the source of all spiritual strength. At the same time, God calls us to spiritual training. In the First letter to Timothy we read,

Train yourself in godliness, for while physical training is of some value, godliness is valuable in every way, holding promise for both the present life and the life to come.

John Ortberg suggests this analogy. Say you decide to run a marathon. No matter how hard you try it cannot be done unless you have been in training for the race. You have to start slow and build up. It may take a long time of preparation. But when you have done the training you can run a marathon. Wishing and hoping for spiritual strength in times of crisis will not work.

Spiritual training has four components: Scripture, prayer, worship and service. I invite you to take your training to a new level and I would be pleased to talk with anyone who would like some coaching.



Deacon's Corner

Thanksgiving approaches this year after our shared experience of horror, grief, and loss as a result of the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center and Pentagon. We seem to have reached a national collective emotional low point from which a new high point of overflowing thankfulness seems elusive if not unattainable. Though we have so much to be thankful for, will we ever be as happy as we thought we were before September 12th?

Years ago, during an emotionally devastating time in my life, I reached a point where I thought the good times would never come back again. Through the wisdom and support of family, friends and my PPC congregation, I attained previously unknown levels of happiness and thanksgiving. In a book I read during that journey entitled "The seven Habits of Highly Effective People" the following passage struck me as the essential message of the book and a reason why despite devastation wrought upon us, the future for us, our children, and our country will be brighter than ever.

"It's not what happens to us, but our response to what happens to us that hurts us. Of course, things can hurt us physically or economically and can cause sorrow. But our character, our basic identity, does not have to be hurt at all. In fact, our most difficult experiences become the crucibles that forge our character and develop the internal powers, the freedom to handle difficult circumstances in the future and to inspire others to do so as well... Nothing has a greater, longer lasting impression upon another person than the awareness that someone has transcended suffering, has transcended circumstance, and is embodying and expressing a value that inspires and ennobles and lifts life."

We should have great confidence that America and our world, through our character and determination, and the inspiration of amazing grace transcend the acts of terrorism that have hurt us so, and that this year we should give thanksgiving for the future Thanksgivings when our world and America will be better and happier than this Thanksgiving.



Marilyn's

Message

This month at its annual retreat, the session looked at the topic of worship. The first thing we discussed is what worship is and who worship is for. So many of us come to worship because we need that spiritual "shot in the arm," or because we want to see our church friends, or because we have some task to perform. At the retreat, the elders were challenged to look at worship first as an offering to God. Now, that doesn't mean that we don't get something out of it too, but that should be the secondary motivation. Our primary reason for worship should be to respond to the love that God first offered to us.

Looking at worship first as an offering to God changes dramatically everything we do in worship. The focus is not on performance because we want to look good, it is on excellence because God is so worthy. We don't wear special clothing to impress our friends, but because we are entering a holy place where we expect to encounter our Holy God. We sing with joy, not because we are great singers, but because God loves to hear a joyful noise. We wait silently in anticipation, not for the beginning of the show, but for the entry of God into our cluttered lives. What a privilege it is to worship God, who accepts our attempts with love and appreciation!

As we gather together on Sunday mornings, we do often receive as well as give; however, our gift from God in worship is greatly enhanced if our hearts have come in humble offering. We join our dear friends with whom we have been in worship for years, our new friends who may be worshiping with us for the first time, people of all generations with a common faith. We sometimes leave worship as renewed, changed people, nourished by the Lord's Supper, joined together in Baptism, enlivened by the preaching of the Word of God. We may have had the opportunity to minister to another in need, or to be ministered to, just by the sharing of a greeting and a smile. All of these are wonderful gifts, given to us by a God who gives abundantly.




