



### KERRY ON...

How would you like some help in developing a spiritual "action plan" for the new year? I recommend Philip Yancy's book, Reaching for the Invisible God. In it he gives a very insightful sampling of his action plan:

- Question your doubts as much as your faith. By personality, or perhaps as a reaction to a fundamentalist past, I brood on doubts and experience faith in occasional flashes. Isn't it about time for me to reverse the pattern?
- Do not attempt this journey alone. Find companions who see you as a pilgrim, even a straggler, and not as a guide. Like many Protestants, I easily assume the posture of one person alone with God, a stance which more and more I see as unbiblical. We have little guidance on how to live as a follower alone because God never intended it.
- Allow the good natural beauty, your health, encouraging words to penetrate as deeply as the bad. Why does it take around seventeen encouraging letters from readers to overcome the impact of one caustic, critical one? If I awoke every morning and fell asleep each night bathed in a sense of gratitude and not self-doubt, the hours in-between would doubtless take on a different cast.
- For your own sake, simplify. Eliminate whatever distracts you from God. Among other things, that means the ruthless winnowing of mail, giving catalogs, junk mail, and book club notices no more time it takes to toss them in the trash. If I ever get the nerve, my television set should probably land there as well.
- Find something that allows you to feel God's pleasure. The sprinter Eric Liddell told his sister, "God made me fast. And when I run, I feel his pleasure." What makes me feel God's pleasure? I must identify it then run. Continued on page 2

# Marilyn's

## Message

One of the projects I have been working on for my Doctor of Ministry program is that I have been writing daily devotions for the Stephen Ministry training class. When this is completed, there will be 25 weeks of five devotions per week. These are designed to be encouraging to the Stephen Ministers during their training as well as when they are "in the field" giving care to people. Many of those in the training class have found doing a daily devotional exercise is a helpful discipline for them.

I would like to suggest this practice to you as well. The New Year would be a good time to begin to develop the habit of daily reading in the scriptures, or using one of the devotional books you will find in the literature rack in the narthex. You may want to look for inspirational books or biographies of faithful Christians and read a chapter a day. Fifteen minutes of listening to the great music of the church will do much to lift you up. You can also try different spiritual practices, which you can learn about in such books as *Soul Feast*, by Marjorie Thompson, or *Spirit Windows*, by Ann Kulp.

Whatever you decide to do to make a small space in each day for God, do so in the context of prayer and silence, so that not only will you be able to share your concerns with God, but you will be able to listen for God's words to you. As you go through the day, think about a particular scripture or thought, and see how God interprets that for you.

This is one New Year's Resolution that will have long-lasting benefits, and that you might actually enjoy!



Eugene Peterson writes,

Worship is the strategy by which we interrupt our preoccupation with ourselves and attend to the presence of God. Worship is the time and place that we assign for deliberate attentiveness to God ~ not because God is confined to time and place but because our self importance is so insidiously relentless that if we don't interrupt ourselves regularly, we have no chance of attending to God at all at other times and in other places.

Attending to the presence of God implies that God is always present and invites us to become aware of the presence. Sometimes this may happen when we are alone and stop our busyness long enough to say the words, "Praise God," in the face of incredible beauty or uncommon kindness. It may happen when we cry out in despair, "God help me." We may be surprised by God in a baby's smile, the greeting of a friend or the joy of a simple meal with our family.

Corporate worship is when we attend to the presence of God in the company of others who believe. This safeguards our preoccupation with ourselves even when it comes to seeking that presence. Singing and praying and hearing Good News together deepens our spiritual awareness. Attending to God in the company of God's people challenges and strengthens us for faithful living. I look forward to being with you for worship on Sunday.

# Inquirers' Series

In writing a song, what comes first: the words or the tune? When I write for one of our children's choirs, I often settle on a text first and then write a tune that gives vocal security and musical logic to the young singer who is learning pitch difference and musical score reading. When I write introits and other responses for the Sanctuary Choir I tend also to think first of text and then of tune. When the melody is secure, I then add harmony and rhythm to bring forth the spirit of that text.

In the case of the anthem I was asked to write in honor of Flo Casper, my process was quite different. First I had the emotional impact of grief mixed with fond

memories. Then I felt the challenge of finding an appropriate way to musically express our sentiments as a congregation, but at the same time, emphasizing Flo's good deeds and strong Christian faith. What I did next was simply wait, all the while thinking, remembering and jotting down pertinent thoughts about Flo's life and work in the church.

That was nearly a year ago. It was mid-spring when I went to the piano and began playing from a penciled manuscript I had written several years ago. It had evolved for no particular purpose and had never been played for anyone except my attentive dog who always guarded me when I sat at the piano and for my husband who often hears me from another room. I occasionally played this little piece because it somehow soothed me with its melodic line and flowing accompaniment.

Suddenly I realized that maybe I could vocally adapt this piano composition to become an anthem dedicated to Flo. The words gradually came, and when I started harmonizing the melody, it changed and developed as well. I worked diligently all summer and finally decided to call the anthem A CALL TO SERVICE. I presented it to the Sanctuary Choir in the fall for their opinion. They were very gracious and as always, very honest. They told me where it was too hard!

I then put the manuscript away for a while. After Christmas I took a fresh look and of course made a few modifications in both words and music. I was most gratified to hear the choir portray this tribute to Flo Casper on Sunday, January 13, 2002. Many of you who were at church that day have requested the text. I am happy to do so here. As you read, please realize that the words are removed from the music, and the music is a vital part of their expression. At least now you know how the music and the words actually found each other.



### **KERRY ON...**

Reinhold Neibuhr, perhaps the greatest American theologian of the 20<sup>th</sup> century began his ministry in a small working class congregation in Detroit. I have been reading his classic work, <u>Leaves From the Notebook of a Tamed Cynic</u>. It is a brief account of thirteen years of parish ministry and it shows why his later theological work was always in touch with real life. He wrote,

On the whole, people do not achieve great moral heights out of a sense of duty. You may be able to compel them to maintain certain minimum standards by stressing duty, but the highest moral and spiritual achievements depend not on a push but a pull. The language of aspiration rather than that of criticism and command is the proper pulpit language.

Jesus more often issued an invitation rather than giving a command. He said, "Come and follow me." In his life and death he showed us what we can become and promised to be with us. The way may not be easy but it promises a life worth living. The paradox of the gospel is that the way to the cross leads to life. The disciples could not grasp the way of suffering and death. Only after the fact did they give their lives to the path that Jesus had shown them.

Countless millions have accepted the invitation to follow Jesus and reached out to take his hand. Only Jesus had to walk alone. We hold onto his hand and the hands of his friends. Thanks be to God.

# The Sixth Berger Lecture

The Rev. John Yieh, an Instructor of New Testament at Virginia Theological Seminary (Alexandria, VA), will present the Sixth Berger Memorial Lecture. He received an M.A. and an M. Phil. in Religious Studies from Yale University, and is finishing his Ph.D. in New Testament also at Yale. His scholarly interest is focused on the Gospels, history of biblical interpretation and cross-cultural hermeneutics. Originally from Taiwan, he has published scholarly works both in English and in Chinese. His publication includes a NT Greek-Chinese Dictionary, a Study Edition of the Chinese Bible (in drafting and editorial team), and several articles in the area of Biblical studies and comparative hermeneutics. An ordained minister of the Presbyterian Church USA, he has served as pastor to the Taiwanese Presbyterian Church of Northern Virginia which meets in Oakton, Virginia.

The Berger Lecture honors the memory of Fred Berger, an active and dedicated member of our church in the 1980's, who played a role in shaping our Adult Education program. He was particularly interested in the meaning of Christianity for contemporary moral and social problems.

Once again our church is privileged to participate in ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING (OGHS), an annual offering supported by nine of the mainline or larger Protestant Christian denominations in the United States. Since 1949, members of these denominations have united in an outpouring of generosity in the name and to the glory of God to meet human needs. Their gifts, and

ours, have clothed, fed, and housed persons displaced by natural and manmade disasters. See how our hands, in the form of monies given to OGHS, enable God's love to be known and shared around the world. Special pew envelopes will be available for your donations throughout the Lenten Season. Checks can be mailed to the Church office as well, payable to the church but designated for OGHS.

The vision of those who began this offering in 1949 is still ours to fulfill—to unite in Christian love and attend to God's children in need, trusting that He will multiply our small efforts with His grace. May we: "Serve one another with whatever gift each... has received." (I Peter 4:10(b).



room where the children's choir rehearses at 9:00 a.m. There is always a friendly patter of greetings present as each child sleepily signs in, gets his or her music folder, and takes a seat. I arranged my music and lesson plan on my music stand near the small keyboard I keep on a side table. One of the third graders, who happens to be a new piano student, asked if she could play "Ode to Joy." Of course I readily agreed. What a wonderful way to start a Sunday morning! She got half way through and couldn't quite remember the second portion. So one of my

sixth grade pianists stepped forth and finished the famous melody.

Then I suggested that we all get hymnals and look up a tune and find the hymn that we all love to sing. We found the hymn, "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee." 



At the time of this writing, my mind is full of the glorious ways all of our choirs are singing and ringing hosannas in preparation for the celebration of Palm Sunday. The Primary Choir is singing about the meaning of Lent and the anticipation of Easter. The Children's Choir raise their voices in hosannas as the gates of Jerusalem open, and their palms wave in praise of the coming Savior riding on a mere donkey. The Handbell Choir begins a series of overlapping tones that suggest, without spoken words, the spirit of hosanna. Then the Sanctuary Choir sings antiphonal hosannas from one side of the sanctuary to the other.

We all assume that we know the meaning of the word hosanna. Upon consulting my Harvard Dictionary of Music, I found the definition from the Latin, Greek and Hebrew to be "save, we beseech thee." It continues to say that it is used as an acclamation in the phrase "Hosanna in excelsis". The Webser's Dictionary shares a more familiar interpretation: "an exclamation used in praise of God or Christ; a shout of praise or adoration."

Whatever explanation we use for the word hosanna, we feel great enthusiasm and anticipation when we sing it, say it, ring it or hear it. The Palm Sunday celebration of March 24, 2002, is now a memory, but do our hosannas have to cease? I pray that they continue in our hearts and on our lips. Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord - anytime.

### CHRISTMAS IN APRIL

Join us on Saturday, April 27 as we fix up two homes of elderly neighbors who have lived side-by-side in Gaithersburg for almost 30 years, sharing a carport that connects their homes. ### Deacan's Corner

Recently, we marked the six-month anniversary of the horrible events of September 11th. It was a time of death, destruction, and sorrow, but also a time of bravery, self-sacrifice, and reflection of our faith. These events made us look at our faith in God and for most, if not all of us, the tragedy strengthened it. I suspect we will never fully understand why those events took place, or why the terrorists see death and destruction, rather than peace and reconciliation, as the path to enlightenment and understanding. The events of September 11<sup>th</sup> remind us of the evil that can be in the hearts of some, and the need for us as Christians to engage with other people, so that we may seek peaceful ways of understanding each other.

Being a Christian means to accept God into our hearts and to give praise and thanks for his son Jesus Christ. In this way we open our hearts to God's love and we give thanks for Jesus Christ who died for our sins. It is through our faith that we seek the blessing of the Lord, and ask him to shed his light on us.

Our faith was tested on September 11th and the months following, and will certainly be again in the future. ### Message

One of my favorite characters in the Bible is Peter. He especially comes to mind as we finish the lenten season and move into Easter. Peter seems to personify the transition from examining our sins to the great gift of forgiveness we get from the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Peter, as you know, was one of the inner-inner circle of Jesus' disciples. He was definitely more of a "doer" than a "thinker," and tried his best to please Jesus. Remember the Transfiguration, where Peter, James and John witness the amazing transformation of Jesus, and the appearance of Moses and Elijah. Peter, not one to sit quietly in awe, immediately tries to figure out what he can do, always the overachiever.

We think of Peter during Holy Week, as Jesus predicts at the Last Supper that Peter will deny him three times. Peter vehemently rejects this prediction, saying, "If all fall away on account of you, I never will," and "Even if I have to die with you, I will never disown you." (Matthew 26:35) He's pretty sure of himself, but then, in the courtyard, the prediction comes true and Peter does deny Jesus three times, in exactly the way Jesus said he would. As he realized what he had done, Peter "went outside and wept bitterly." (Matthew 26:75)

How many times have we done the same thing? We have all good intentions; we claim we will *never* hurt someone we care about, we will *never* say those things to our children, we will *never* do that illegal or immoral thing. And then, without even thinking, we do exactly the things we swore we never would do.

The good news is contained in the story of Jesus' appearance after his resurrection. Read John 21:15-19 sometime when you are feeling down on yourself for all of your human failings. Peter is asked three times to declare his love for Jesus, and each time he affirms his love, it as if one of the denials in the courtyard is being erased. Peter goes on to establish the Christian Church and make many converts through his preaching.

We, along with Peter, are redeemed through the life, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Praise be to God!



# Deacon's Corner

On July 4, 2001, the first annual Cure Autism Now - Run 2001 - a 5K race, coupled with a 1 mile run-walk, to benefit the Cure Autism Now Foundation was an amazing success:

- Over 1,200+ participants (700+ runners, 500+ walkers)
- 74 Corporate Sponsors/Partners
- Over 80 Volunteers
- \$100,000 (net) to the Cure Autism Now Foundation
- And, importantly, publicity and education regarding the anguish of autism.

I initially organized this race in response to my nephew's diagnosis of autism---it was my way of helping him and others by raising dollars to support research to find a cure. As my family continues to struggle with my nephew's condition, we pray that someday he will benefit from today's research. So many families from our congregation participated last year by either running/walking or volunteering on race day. I truly felt the support from my PPC community and I thank you from the bottom of my heart.

Our work is not done. The astounding thing about autism is that even today, in the year 2002, we know only three indisputable biological facts about autism: 1) It strikes before the age of three, 2) It effects four boys for every girl, and 3) It causes severe impairment in social and communication abilities.

On July 4, 2002, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual 5K race/1 mile walk to benefit Cure Autism Now will take place in Potomac Village at 8 am. Again, Independence Day will have added meaning as we share a morning at this fun-filled event for competitive runners as well as families with children of all ages.

### Message

- May is a time for enjoying warm weather, the hint of summer to come, finishing up resonsibilities at school, and the church school year winding down. May is also the month in which we celebrate Mother's Day. It has been our custom at PPC for the last several years to have Youth Sunday on Mother's Day, giving our high school seniors and the rest of the youth a chance to dedicate a worship service to their moms. This year, however, because of an early Easter, Youth Sunday will be on the following week, May 19, which happens to be Pentecost this year. All we have to do is listen for the Spirit and pay attention! One way to begin to listen is to join us on Youth Sunday to hear God speak to us through the voices of our young people. As we remember the birth of the Christian Church in the first century, experience for yourself the rebirth of God's Spirit in you.

Sports writer, Sally Jenkins writes,


"The amount of success you are capable of enjoying, and the pleasure you are capable of feeling, is equal to the number of people you are willing to share it with."


### Ecuador Cardiac Mission





Does this verse say something significant about God's perfect will for our lives? Next time someone says they would like to find God's perfect will for their lives and that they want to be in the center of His will, just send them to the center of His Word!

Isn't it interesting how this worked out? Now, I would like to share a small prayer: "Father, God Bless Everyone in whatever it is that they know he/she may be needing for this day! May everyone's life be full of your peace, prosperity and power as he/she seeks to have a closer relationship with you. Amen."

She flew there for training in May, and after driving a Ryder truck to Pennsylvania, West Virginia, North Carolina, and back to West Virginia, she and her crew drove back to Loveland for final evaluation. Rachel and I decided it would be fun to pick her up there rather than fly her home, so we reorganized our CDs, got the oil changed in the car, packed it up, and hit the road!

We discovered many interesting things on this trip:

- ~ 1850 miles is a LONG way to drive in three days!
- ~ A trip with two people is very different than a trip with three people.
- ~ Don't assume, just because one of your children has her driver's license and loves to drive, that you will have help with the driving. ("I'm really looking forward to being a passenger on this trip, because I've been driving all summer.")
- ~ I like driving on country roads more than on the interstates.
- ~ Small towns have a great deal of uniqueness.
- ~ There may be more cows than people in the state of Wyoming (One town we drove through had a sign which read *Population: 4*).
- $\sim$  I like green trees and rolling hills better than flat plains or brown desert.
- ~ It is possible to have intelligent and meaningful conversations with teenagers, and between two teenagers.
- ~ We have been blessed with a beautiful country, and we are strong regardless of efforts to weaken us with terrorism.
- ~ People tend to turn to God for help rather than to blame when they are in crisis. The Oklahoma City Memorial is quite moving, and almost seems like holy ground when you are there. There are fences on which people can leave messages or memorials to loved ones, and over and over again we saw messages of hope.

As we approach the anniversary of our country's most devastating tragedy, may we live as hopeful people, recognizing the many blessings God has given to each one of us and to our nation, even in the midst of hardship.

# Workcamp 2003

39 youth and adults from our church had a wonderful week in Jacksonville, North Carolina, this summer! All were challenged to "Ignite the Light" for Christ through service, Bible study, youth group participation, and in their interactions with others in their daily lives. Thank you very much for all of your support for our largest workcamp group ever! A "Workcamp Reflections" booklet will be coming out soon, and the workcampers will speak to the adult education class on November 3, so stay tuned for further insights into this amazing adventure.

At the end of our week in Jacksonville, we explored our options for next year's workcamp location, and decided by majority vote to attend a camp in Buffalo, New York. On further investigation into this camp, it was discovered that it is a "minicamp," with only 80-125 campers. This type of camp is designed for smaller youth groups, and it really wouldn't suit ours. So, we went back to the drawing board.

2003 marks our fifth year of youth workcamps at PPC. Because it is an important milestone, we have decided to take a huge (1900-mile!) leap of faith, and go to workcamp in Fountain, Colorado next summer. We will need to fly, so the cost of going will be higher, but we have some money left over from last year's very successful fundraisers, and the youth are willing to work hard, so Colorado, here we come! The town is at the base of Pikes Peak mountain, and is in great need of assistance. We will mainly be helping elderly and retired military families whose pensions have not kept up with the rising cost of living in that area.



The 2003 workcampers appreciate your continued support - we plan to only do a large endeavor like this every five years. In addition to support of our fundraisers ~ the first will be a car wash/bake sale on Sunday, September 15 ~ we would love to hear from anyone who has contacts for inexpensive airfares and van rental or loan in Colorado.

We are confident that God will bless this trip as we have been so richly blessed over the past four years. Please keep the workcampers in your prayers as we begin our planning.

On World Communion Sunday we affirm that,


In Christ there is no east or west, In Him no south or north; But one great fellowship of love Throughout the whole wide earth.

I have always wanted to write a heavenly article. The closest I can come is today aboard a Boeing 752 high above the clouds somewhere in the skies over Texas. Lynn and I are returning from a wedding in San Antonio where we found ourselves not separated from Potomac Presbyterian Church, but strangely connected in unexpected ways.

On September 13<sup>th</sup> we discovered that the Majestic Theatre, famous for its historical architecture and ornate interior carvings, was located just across the street from our hotel. The evening attraction was the San Antonio

Symphony and Mastersingers performing works by Mozart, Copland, Thompson, Britten and Roumain. It was the very same hymnal as the official hymnal for the Presbyterian Church, "Hymns, Psalms and Spiritual Songs". Yes, it was indeed the same hymnal that we have in our own pews. What a wonderful ecumenical discovery!

Good music seems to follow us wherever we go. May our 2002-2003 musical season at Potomac be an inspiration to those of you who participate and to those of you who listen. May it truly be an expression of our faith.

Something special will be brewing Sundays during the Fellowship Coffee Hour following worship service. Starting Oct. 6, PPC will be serving good coffee for a good cause. Through Equal Exchange, an interfaith coffee program, PPC will be supporting small coffee farmers in Central America, Africa and Asia by serving fairly traded coffee during the coffee hour.

As world market prices for coffee plummeted to historic lows last year, thousands of small coffee farmers and their families in some of the poorest countries of the world were devastated. In an effort to assist these communities, the Equal Exchange Interfaith program was developed. By working directly with small farmer cooperatives, Equal Exchange offers farmers a fair price for their efforts, providing affordable credit and a long-term trading partner.

As we enjoy our coffee, we have a unique opportunity to share our community with these small coffee farmer communities in Kenya, Guatemala, El Salvador and elsewhere.

By working with Equal Exchange, we are trading directly with democratic small farmer cooperatives, helping to build better communities. Examples of some of the projects supported by this effort include women's

leadership training in Nicaragua, community stores in Columbia, health clinics in Mexico and small business development in Tanzania. We hope you enjoy these special coffees during our coffee hour each Sunday morning.

After all, we don't send care packages to our students and workcampers because we think their sugar intake may be run down on distant college campuses or summer work sites, but just as a small reminder to them that we the church community are with them in our thoughts and prayers. time of fellowship and growth among the congregation. And, of course, in helping to nourish others, we the deacons nourish ourselves in our ability to offer 'sympathy, witness and service' to those around us.



## Marilyn's Message

A couple of Sundays ago I was walking around the children's Sunday School classrooms, making sure everything was ready for the day, and was given a wonderful gift. On the wall of the art room was a huge poster with the Presbyterian seal in a rainbow of colors! Now, this might give anyone a lift - especially if they're Presbyterian - but it was especially meaningful to me. I have been writing the lessons for the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> grade Creative Enrichment class along the theme of "Symbols of Faith." For the first month, the children studied the Presbyterian seal. I spent a lot of time making overhead transparencies of each of the different parts of the seal (the flames, the dove, the pulpit, etc.) and asked each class to trace and color a part of the seal onto the poster on the wall, so that conceivably by the end of the four weeks there would be a complete picture. My shock and amazement on that Sunday morning was that it actually worked! It was so gratifying to see something I had created in my mind come to fruition with the class.

It made me think of two things. One is that everyone in the church should take a stroll through that education hallway once in awhile, preferably when classes are in session. It is wonderful to see four-year-olds learning Bible stories on the computer, second graders making rain sticks while reviewing the story of Noah, fourth graders acting out the story of Baby Moses. We have dedicated and loving teachers, and they are leading creative lessons. The wonderful thing is that the children are really learning the Bible stories and concepts.

The other thing that multi-colored Presbyterian seal on the wall made me wonder is whether the joy I felt at seeing my "creation" come alive is something like the joy God feels when one of his creations fulfills the dream God has for him/her. God certainly spent a lot more time and effort making each one of us than I did making those transparencies. When we do something kind for someone, when we study hard and get good grades, when we say 'thank you' even when it isn't necessary, when we stop and help a child, when we repair the leaking roof of a less-fortunate neighbor, or any other myriad of ways we celebrate the gifts God has given us, I think God looks on us and gasps in unbridled happiness and pride, thinking, 'Yes! It worked - just the way I wanted it to!'

"I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well" (Psalm 139:14). May we all continue to strive to make our Creator delighted in that which he created.



## Message

Our session has decided to embark on a new ministry for PPC! Beginning sometime early in 2003, we hope to begin a partner program with another church and someone hearing a call to Christian educational ministry. This will be a year-long internship where the educator/trainee will work part-time in a church in our presbytery and be with us part-time for education, mentoring and training with me. It is hoped that at the end of the year, the person would either be hired by the partner church to a permanent position, or be more qualified to seek a call to yet another church while she/he continues her/his training.

There is a severe shortage of qualified Christian educators in our denomination, partly because many people considering this call cannot drop what they're doing (raising a family, etc.) to go to a seminary to get the proper education. This project will give a person on-the-job training in two different churches, while also enabling them to begin the process toward becoming a Certified Christian Educator by meeting the educational requirements for the first year. While the person is working and learning, they will also have an experienced educator with whom to share frustrations, ideas, and questions.

The intern will probably be in our church two days a week, including one Sunday a month, and may turn up at some committee meetings and other groups. Our church will benefit, not only from giving this gift of training to a potential educator - and ultimately to the PCUSA - but also by having someone with new ideas to help us with our existing programs or perhaps help develop new ones. The project will also foster relationships between our church and the partner church, and may include a pulpit exchange and/or choir exchange, or perhaps some occasional combining of youth group activities at some point during the year.

I am in the process of seeking just the right person to be the intern. When I find that person, I will begin the search for the right church with whom to partner. When the program gets underway, you will hear specific details of our relationship with the intern and the partner church.

This is an exciting time for me as an educator, and for the church as we begin a new ministry. I am very thankful for the session's willingness to take this on, and your willingness to help in the process.




