





Every month, the Christian Educators in National Capital Presbytery meet for a morning for conversation, a program, and lunch. This month, the topic was accessibility issues for churches. It was thought-provoking to learn of some of the things we forget about in our routine as a church. Some of the issues for all churches were:

How can a person with an allergy to wheat or eggs participate in the Lord's Supper? How can someone in a wheelchair teach or participate in our Sunday School program? Would a blind or deaf person be welcome and able to participate here? Are we doing enough to ensure that elderly people can enter and exit our church safely?

There are lots of other things we take for granted, and should think about as a church. We have a reputation for being welcoming and friendly, but it never hurts to take inventory and try to think of ways we can improve our hospitality. If you have any personal issues with the accessibility of our church, or think of things to improve our hospitality, please tell a session member or a staff member. And get involved in helping to address the problem!

WINTER CLOTHING NEEDED





Clarence Jordan founded Koinonia Farm near Americus, Georgia, in 1942. It was at experiment in communal Christian living. He believed that the most vital need in the South was the reconciliation of blacks and whites. The farm was subjected to shootings, bombings and vandalism. One couple, Linda and Millard Fuller, visited Koinonia some years later and Habitat for Humanity was formed. Clarence was a dirt farmer with a Ph.D. in New Testament Greek.

He worked tirelessly to connect the Gospel from the first century to everyday life in the twentieth century. He translated the Gospels into what he called "The Cotton Patch Version." The story is told that once he was being given a tour of a big church in a major city and the minister said to him as he pointed to the cross on top of the steeple, "That cross alone cost us ten thousand dollars." "You got cheated," said Jordan, "Times were when Christians could get them for free."

As we prepare to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus on Easter we would do well to remember something Clarence Jordan wrote:

The resurrection places Jesus on this side of the grave, here and now, in the midst of life. The good news of the resurrection is not only that we shall die and go home with him but that he is risen and comes home with us, bringing all his hungry, naked, thirsty, sick prisoner brothers with him.

WHAT I LEARNED FROM "CHARLIE BROWN"

☆ There are about a million details involved in putting on a musical production.

But, there are plenty of people willing and able to help with those millions of details. When we needed money, it was donated. When we needed backdrops painted and sets built, they were made. When we asked for help with refreshments, it was done cheerfully and well.

When we needed signs put up around the community, they went up.

Teenagers are willing to act silly and make themselves vulnerable.

One of the most important things for actors is to follow direction, even if it makes them look "un-cool." A high school senior prances around adoringly with his security blanket, a high school junior dressed in a dog suit bounds around the stage, another senior guy sits on a bench with a paper bag over his head — these things take a healthy self-esteem and a willingness to put oneself "out there" for a good cause. Not only that, they invited their friends to come and see them!

The music never seems to stop running around in your head.


Early on in the process, I made rehearsal tapes for each of the singers. I don't think I've had a coherent thought since!

☆ Directors never sleep.

Debbie McKune was an amazing director for this production. We had some challenges with this show, particularly in finding a pianist. She never lost her cool, at least not that I witnessed. She was always respectful to the kids and adults involved in the show, even when they were sometimes pretty annoying. She also worked very hard at making this a positive experience, particularly for the youth. She has been involved in several productions, and we have as well, where the director became a tyrant as the performance drew closer. Debbie was determined that the show could be done with a Christian perspective. There was prayer at every rehearsal. Appropriate behavior was always modeled. People drew closer as a result of this endeavor.

☆ The people of this church constantly outdo themselves in generosity.

The costs of a production like this are significant. It was a step in faith to send off the check for the use of the materials, not knowing if it could be done. The pre-show sales of tickets, particularly for Saturday night, were light. As we waited on Saturday evening for people to arrive, there was a real fear in the pit of my stomach that there would be 20 people there, and the performers would be playing to a very small group. But we almost packed the Fellowship Hall on Saturday, and Sunday was even better. After all of our expenses, we netted over \$1700 for our Workcamp mission. Amazing! On behalf of all of the workcampers, thank you so much!!!

Marilyn's Message

Change...depending on your personality, that word can evoke feelings of either terror or excitement. It is the natural tendency of human beings to be resistant to change. Change involves risk, uncertainty, vulnerability, and imagination. It's often just easier to leave things as they are. Unfortunately, or fortunately, depending on your viewpoint, change is inevitable. The world changes. Our society changes. Our lifestyles change. Our needs change. If you believe in the very Calvinist notion of total depravity, you believe that just by our human nature we will never be perfect on this earth. With imperfection comes change.

Two things come to mind to help us not only deal with change, but embrace it and enjoy the ride. The first is that change usually represents progress. The institution of the church is in a period of reexamining itself and trying to figure out how it fits into 21st century society. The fact that we at PPC have been engaged in that process as a church is a sign of health. We have decided to seek an Associate Pastor to help with the care of the congregation. This is something new for this church. If we stubbornly dug our heels into the ground and insisted on doing things the way they had always been done, we would probably die as a church. Looking at ourselves and being willing to try new things says that we want to stay alive and healthy to help others and spread the gospel to our community and to the world.

The second thing to remember about change is that we must have faith in God's plan for this church and for us as Christians. God is in charge. We are imperfect human beings who must

constantly seek God's will for ourselves and this church. With prayer, openness to the leading of the Spirit, and a willingness to step out in faith a little, God's plan will be worked out.

As we approach Pentecost, another time of great change for the church, let us be ready for the Spirit to lead us. "The Spirit of the Lord will come upon you in power,...and you will be changed into a different person. Once these signs are fulfilled, do whatever your hand finds to do, for God is with you." (1 Samuel 10:6-7)

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

I look forward to this special time every year.



"If you have not read Dan Brown's The Da Vinci Code, you're in a shrinking group. More than 7 million hardback copies of the novel are in print, and it has by the publisher's count been translated into more than forty languages. It has remained at or near the top of the best seller list since its appearance a year ago."

Mark S. Burrows, "Gospel Fantasy: Dismantling The Da Vinci Code," *Christian Century Magazine*, June 2004, p. 20.

Many of us have joined the readers of this, "conspiracy tract set in a fictional frame." The men's book group read and discussed it and I have received numerous questions about the novel. There is enough fact to lend some credibility and plenty of intrigue to hold your interest. Mark Burrows is a professor of history at Andover Newton Theological Seminary. He has written a very informative piece and I commend it to you.

I have wondered what it is that makes the book so popular. A pure mystery novel would not gain such interest. Elements of church history, mixed with abuse of power, corruption, and abuse, heighten the intrigue. Spirituality is in, and the more non-traditional, the better. Studying the Gospels seriously appears not to be nearly as interesting as a fast paced thriller and a grand conspiracy theory. Perhaps interest in such a book will send readers back to the Scripture and to the study of church history. Our own Adult Education Program offers a solid biblical and theological resource for this kind of study. The new Reformed Institute provides another opportunity for serious study and reflection. I invite you to participate in these offerings.

DEACON'S CORNER



I was in my early forties when I discovered the joys of exercise in Step Classes at my gym. All it took, it seemed, was a bunch of energetic students, great music with a beat, an enthusiastic teacher, a firm stepstool, and pair of feet. I just loved it! How could these ordinary ingredients in such a defined space produce so many interesting, choreographic moves, be so fun, and work up such a sweat? I gradually learned all the step jargon and felt like an athlete. I was in the company of true athletes (I know this because they wore Spandex), and they were half my age and half my size, but I was holding my own. As my baggy, cotton T-shirt said, "Life is good," and I always wore it to Step Class.

I was even older when I discovered the unparalleled joys of ringing handbells. Although I came from a family of musicians, and was a student of piano as a child, as an adult I couldn't imagine having anything musical to offer. Just as I had known I was not a true athlete, neither was I a musician. But how I loved that music! One particular Sunday, the Handbell Choir rang as I had never heard them before. The worship hour had been transformed by their offering, and I wanted to be a part of it. My calling had come. I went to Cindy. Patiently and lovingly, she worked with me, decided she could use me, and soon I was a handbell ringer!

The ingredients for our Handbell Choir are simple, just as in my Step Class. You just bring together a bunch of dedicated people, an enthusiastic leader, inspired music, three octaves of bells, and a pair of hands for each bell. Most of us ring several bells. We read music and understand rhythmic notation, and with those basic tools we soar to places we had not imagined. The variations on a simple ring are amazing! You ring hard, you ring soft, you dampen, you let vibrate, you tower swing, you flex your wrist, you shake, you tap to the padded

table. It goes on and on and all the moves have names. The nuances are subtle or dramatic. The overall musical effect is for the congregation to appraise, but at a personal level, what is astonishing is the transforming joy which results as we nine ringers, from school age to "old," bond in our love for God through this experience.

Are you fit for this musical and spiritual challenge? If so, "Step into Bells"! Call Cindy! Believe me, many is the Sunday when I sweat it out while we are ringing, and many is the gym class when I hum and count beats while stepping, but I figure as long as I don't walk into Step Class with bells, or walk into Handbell Choir with a stepstool, I haven't lost it completely. Now I call myself an athlete AND a musician. I call myself deeply enriched.



DEACON'S CORNER

A few years ago the youth of the church attended a movie called "Pay It Forward." If you are unfamiliar with the movie, the basic theme was a young boy's answer to a challenge set before him by his teacher. The teacher challenged each individual of his class to come up with a project that would have a meaningful impact on human life. The young boy's solution was to do "good deeds" for three different people. In turn, these people were to each help three others, and so on, and so on.

Acts of kindness can impact a life we don't even know. A person's bad day can be changed by an unexpected kindness by another. Loneliness can be shattered by a caring act. Every act is a gift. I have fond memories of times when others have taken the time to help me, a stranger, out. My favorite, the bus driver in Amsterdam who, after looking at my girlfriend and me (along with four children under the age of ten), didn't charge us for the drive.

One of my acts of kindness is what I call my "Tollbooth Ministry." How lonely it must be to stand all day in a box built for one, collecting change from strangers. So, along with taking the ticket or handing the money, at every tollbooth comes a cheery "Hello" or "Good Morning" and "Have a wonderful day!" Occasionally, I receive no response, but most of the time a smile comes across the face of this unknown person and an impersonal act becomes a warm exchange. It only takes a moment to impact another's life with kindness.

"For this very reason, make every effort to add to your faith goodness; and to goodness, knowledge; and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, godliness; and to godliness, brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness, love. For if you possess these qualities in increasing measure, they will keep you from being ineffective and unproductive in your knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Of the many new books, I'll mention just a few.





John Buchanan writing in the Christian Century Magazine quotes Karl Barth,

Gratitude is the precise creaturely counterpart to the grace of God.

The Wright Note

When we gather for worship, I am above and behind you ready to lead you through the musical portions of the service. When you hear the organist play the prelude, you meditate and prepare yourselves for worship. When you hear the introduction to the hymns, you open your hymnals, stand and begin to sing meaningful words of praise and prayer. When you hear the strong introductory chords to the Gloria Patri or the Doxology, you sound forth with great voices of affirmation. You hear the organ accompany the Sanctuary Choir as they sing anthems. The organ also supports solo singers and instrumentalists. During the offertory, the sounds of the organ resound as you give your gifts.

But do you realize that you hear the organ more clearly than I or the members of the choir? That is due to the fact that the main speakers to the organ are located in the rear of the sanctuary in an enclosed box behind the organ bench. The sound is directed to you, not the choir. Thus, it is difficult for those of us in the loft to attain a balance between accompaniment and singers or soloists. We simply cannot hear the organ when the organ and singers are making music at the same time. Of course, if I were to play loud enough for the singers to adequately hear the organ, then you in the congregation might think I was playing too loudly.

To hopefully correct this problem, auxiliary speakers are being installed in the loft. From the organ console, I will be able to control which speakers function. When I accompany the choir, I will activate only the auxiliary speakers. When I am playing for congregational singing or playing preludes or offertories, I will activate the main speakers that face out into the congregation.

I would like to thank Bill Malone and his committee for investigating this organ speaker situation. They have spent many months considering the most appropriate options. I feel that a reasonable solution has been reached. You will not hear new organ sounds, but you will hear sounds appropriately balanced when the organ is used to accompany singers or soloists in the choir loft.

DEACON'S CORNER

Last month, my little brother got married. Some years ago, when Cyndy and I were first married and we'd attend friends' weddings, I would always think back to our wedding day and remember the joy and excitement of that day. At my brother's wedding, however, as I saw Alexandra walking down the aisle being the perfect little flower girl and Matthew running around in his oh-so-cute tuxedo, all I could think about was that, one day, I'd have to let them go to be on their own.

While I suspect I'm not the first person to have had this revelation, the thought of letting our kids go into today's world seems to be even more frightening than ever. We live in fear of terror within our borders, in fear of losing another young man or woman in combat and in fear of random violence in our cities and neighborhoods.

We each deal with the fear differently. Some of us have decided to just ignore fear. We have stopped watching the news or reading the paper. Others among us have let fear become all-consuming. We follow every news alert, regard every stranger with suspicion and allow terror to alter our lives. In our reactions, we seem to be either fearless or fearful.

As I worry about the future for our children, I also realize that we can learn from them. Our son, Matthew, is 15 months old and, like many children his age, is fearless. He'll climb bookshelves without considering what will happen if he falls. Our daughter, Alexandra, is 3 years old and is fearful of monsters that may be lying in wait in her bedroom. As parents, our job is to help each of them understand danger without suppressing their desire to explore. In other words, we have to teach our kids to be fearful yet brave, not fearless.

The Bible assures us that in the midst of our fear, we can have confidence that God is working on our behalf. We can be fearful but we should certainly be brave.

Trust in the Lord with all your heart; and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make your paths straight. Proverbs 3:5,6

Marilyn's Message

The morning Christian Living group had a lively discussion in September of the *Left Behind* phenomenon. If you haven't heard of this, it is a series of novels, and subsequent videos, depicting the end times. The beginning of the series has an airline pilot ogling an attractive flight attendant because his wife spends all of her time reading the Bible. Suddenly the flight attendant announces that many of the passengers on the plane have disappeared, leaving only their clothing and belongings on their seats. Other happenings convince a few of those "left behind" that this is the rapture, which marks the beginning of the end. The only ones who will possibly be safe from eternal fire are those who find faith and survive the seven years of tribulation that follow the rapture. The novels in the series continue through the devastating events that take place before God finally comes in and saves the day.

This series is hugely popular, with over 60 million books and videos sold. The authors claim that thousands have come to faith as a result of reading the books, although researchers have not found much direct evidence of this. The authors claim that yes, the books are works of fiction, but that the basic premise is true: there will be a rapture in the way they describe. There have been dozens of books written to explain the *Left Behind* books, and as many written to refute them.

Not surprisingly, at the women's group we had a diversity of opinion on the usefulness of the books. Some felt that the books were helpful in getting people to open their Bibles to see if the stories were an accurate representation of the end times. Others thought they were dangerous because they seem to promote war and violence, and might make people believe that this is what Christians are called to do. There is also the "fear factor," that notion that people might come to faith because they are afraid not to. We thought about the images of God and Jesus Christ presented in the books, and how those connect with our understandings.


Generally, the theology in these books is way out of line with Presbyterian theology. We do not find biblical evidence for a rapture, and the two-tiered coming of Christ seems contrived to make difficult Bible passages fit together. We believe in a gracious God who loves us and does not delight in the destruction of any of God's creation. The books give neat, easy answers to dilemmas that Presbyterians are comfortable keeping in tension.

Marilyn's Message, continued:

I came away from the discussion appreciating our Presbyterian heritage all the more. We are not prone to accept just anything as truth as much as we are to investigate, experience, and live into the truth. We are satisfied at times saying, "I really don't understand this, but I'm willing to keep looking for an answer." We are people of the Book, and although we read the Bible as the inspired Word of God, we do so through the lens of its historical and literary context. We can discuss these things in a group and appreciate everyone's point of view and allow it to help to shape ours, even though we may disagree.

In a culture that values black-and-white answers and winning at all costs, we are fortunate to be in a church that encourages us to use our minds and celebrate our diversity. We are blessed to be able to disagree and still love each other.

Are we listening to each other? Amid the sound bites and political TV commercials I was thankful for the Presidential debates. For the most part we were able to listen and watch the candidates debate the issues and state their positions. More depth would have been preferred but at least we listened to both sides on the same stage.

The "Presbyterian Outlook" carried an interesting report earlier this month.

A survey found that conservative radio talk show host Rush Limbaugh has roughly the same number of fans that liberal film producer Michael Moore has. Of those participating in the study, 7% indicated that they had listened to Limbaugh's program during the previous week, while 8% said they had seen Moore's film *Fahrenheit 9/11*.

What was most revealing was the finding that ¼ of 1% had exposed themselves to both that very conservative and very liberal voice.

It is troubling when folks only pay attention to the voices they agree with and hear the other side only as interpreted by like-minded voices. This unfortunately is happening in Christian denominations as well. It has become too common for Christians of varying theological perspectives to each claim that they know what God's will is on any number of issues. "It is important to remind ourselves that our interpretation of God's will is in fact our interpretation."* I strive to listen to a variety of voices and share them with you in sermons. I pray that we will continue to grow in our appreciation for the political and theological insights of others.



Marilyn's Message

I am always delighted to come to worship on Sunday and look out at the members and friends of our congregation eager to worship God. I am thrilled at the diversity of ages in our sanctuary, from the youngest babies to the most "seasoned" worshipers, all together as one family of faith.

From time to time I am asked why our church doesn't offer Sunday School and worship at the same time, as many churches do. On the surface, it seems to fit our 21st century lifestyle: trying to fit as much into as short a period of time as possible. Parents can worship, children can learn. Everyone's out in an hour!

I believe that there are some long-range consequences to this type of Sunday morning schedule. If adults are in worship while children are in Sunday School, that means that children never get to worship, and adults never get to learn. Teaching children about worship is valuable, and our Enrichment classes do just that. But to then expect our children to automatically know how to worship is like reading a book on how to play golf and then expecting to win the PGA tournament. You have to experience it to really learn it.

Our goal in teaching young children the parts of worship and some of the worship music is that by the time they are in the third grade they will be able to stay in the worship service and participate. True, they won't grasp every word of the sermon, but they will know how to praise God and follow in the hymnal, they will know how to look up the Bible verses and say the Apostles' Creed. The rest comes with practice. Sitting still for twenty minutes during the sermon is something that is learned through practice. Understanding the mystery of God in worship takes a lifetime of practice.

I firmly believe that children who are not given the opportunity to participate in corporate worship with the whole church family will not know how to do it, and will therefore avoid going to church as adults. It takes courage on the part of the parents - and it takes understanding on the part of the congregation. If we are to faithfully raise these children to love God and participate in the church, as we agree to do when they are baptized, we must allow for - no, rejoice in - a little paper-rustling and fidgeting as we help them grow into their faith.

Next month, I'll give a list of tips for parents and others in helping to raise our youngest ones in the faith through corporate worship.

New Organ Speakers Installed: The supplemental speakers for the organ

have now been installed. 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

KERRY ON...

Looking for a Christmas gift that will provide spiritual insight? I suggest giving a book that can be appreciated daily in 2005. Over the years I have used a number of books for daily devotional reading. Some are written or compiled to provide a reading for the full 365 days of the year. It is a real challenge to find one, however, that will sustain your interest for a whole year. One that did it for me was All Saints: Daily Reflections on Saints, Prophets and Witnesses for our Time, Robert Elsberg, ed. In fact, in the following years I began to read biographies of Christians and found the experience to be very rewarding. I also appreciated Listening to Your Life by Frederick Buechner, which is a collection of 366 quotations from his twenty- seven books.

Most years, I read a number of books that can be read in short portions as daily readings. One of my favorites was Beyond Doubt: Faith Building Devotions on Questions Christians Ask by Cornelius Plantinga. It will last 135 days. Another is Presbyterian Questions, Presbyterian Answers by Donald McKim. It has 92 questions. Kathleen Norris wrote Amazing Grace: A Vocabulary of Faith and it will sustain you for 80 days. You could spend a hundred days with a book by Henry Gariepy, Songs in the Night: Inspiring Stories Behind 100 Hymns Born in Trial and Suffering. I have also appreciated 134 days with Borrowed Light: Hymn Texts, Prayers and Poems by Thomas Troeger for its freshness and creativity.

I encourage you to give such a gift, and maybe one for yourself.

The Wright Note

This month I am devoting my entire article to the discussion of the upcoming Christmas presentation called CHIMES IN THE NIGHT, a musical for young voices by Allen Pote, with text adaptation by Tom S. Long. Our children's choirs, with choir alumni and friends, will present this story within a story at the 9:30 a.m. worship service on Sunday, Dec. 19th. In the past, this Sunday has been called Pageant Sunday. But this year the wonderful nativity story will be presented as part of an old legend about the chimes on Christmas Eve that refused to ring year after year, no matter how impressive the gifts offered.

The choirs have the musical responsibility and periodic dialogue. Six youth will provide narration and dramatic character roles. We have one of our own families to portray Mary, Joseph and Baby Jesus. We have a few spaces for young animals. The choirs and actors are trying to prepare this musical during our weekly rehearsals. This is far less than the rehearsal schedules experienced in their schools. I am asking, however, for one rehearsal for everyone involved in the production to be held in the Sanctuary on Saturday morning, Dec. 18th at 11:00 a.m. Please arrive at 10:45 a.m. to receive costumes and stage direction before rehearsal starts at 11:00 a.m. There are other rehearsals scheduled for earlier that morning, but they are for the 19th evening program, not the musical for the morning of Dec. 19th.

Mark your calendars now for 9:30 a.m. Dec. 19th to experience CHIMES IN THE NIGHT with our children's choirs and friends. This nativity story, told as part of the old Christmas legend, will NOT be repeated at 11:00 a.m. service.

DEACON'S CORNER

As I write this, I am on a train bound for the company office in downtown Manhattan, three blocks from where the World Trade Center towers used to stand. During my visits to the New York office, I would walk over to the shops in the WTC and pick up a gift for my oldest daughter, Sara. The last time I was in the New York office, I had to rush out to grab a train back to Washington in time to join Pam at the hospital; it seemed that Emily wanted to come into the world early. It was a joyous day and exactly three weeks later, September 11, 2001, the towers and the shops were gone. When the towers fell, I recalled that I had neglected to visit the shops when I was there the prior month; I figured I'd be back soon, anyway, and I'd stop by then. Of course, that will never happen. It represented a lost opportunity, albeit a rather trivial one--one that pales in comparison to what was really lost that day.

I wonder how many of the people in those towers, not unlike me, were putting off till tomorrow what could have been done today, waiting for the *right* day. That day, and what they had planned to do with it, will never come for them, at least not here on Earth. There is an old message that says to treat each day as the *gift* that it is from God, as tomorrow is promised to no one.

That brings me back to putting things off. We are in the season of Advent. We are waiting to celebrate the coming of Jesus Christ. This is the end of year, and many of us are following an old tradition associated with the New Year, taking stock and making resolutions. Things like, starting an exercise program, stopping smoking, making more time for family, and serving our community. We are waiting to do something good. Why are we waiting?

We belong to a church dedicated to service. In Cynthia Wright's "We Celebrate Together," the last line is, "We now renew that vision to share without reserve." I think the most important word in that line is, **now**. Well, I **now** renew that vision, to serve without reserve, my congregation, my community, and my family. As I think about that day, those people, my life, God's gifts, and that tradition, I wonder, can I really *afford to wait*? Isn't it time to stop *waiting* and start **doing**?

Marilyn's Message

Last month I tried to present a rationale for our Sunday School and worship schedule, and the value of teaching children to worship by doing it. This month I've listed some suggestions for worshiping with children, either your own or someone else's. This is a revision of an article I wrote 4 ½ years ago.

We are blessed in this congregation to have a growing number of children. We spend a lot of time and energy on teaching them the basics of the faith, so that as they grow older they will be able to make their own faith decisions. A big part of that education is teaching children how to worship. We begin this process at the very youngest ages by inviting children to participate in a portion of the worship service. At first and second grade, the focus of Creative Enrichment is worship education. By third grade, children are usually able to be in regular worship for the entire service. Here are some tips to helping your child (and you) get the most out of the worship service:

Encourage your child to participate. There are many parts of the worship service in which your child can participate. The Lord's Prayer and Apostles' Creed are examples, and they can follow along in the front of the hymnal if they're not sure of all the words. They also know, or quickly learn, the Gloria Patri and the Doxology that are sung every week. Encourage them to follow along in the hymnal, even if they can't sing the tune.

Sit where your child can see what's going on. I know, Presbyterians have a strong distaste for sitting in the front. But it really helps children to see better, and thus feel more a part of the service.

Point out any special interest items. Read through your bulletin as you arrive in church, and show your child where there is special music, or new colors for the liturgical season, or a baptism, etc.

Let your child help. Ask your child to mark the pages in the hymnal and Bible that pertain to the day's activities. Let them put your offering into the plate. Let them sign the friendship pad.

For younger children, have something for them to do during the sermon. We now have worship bags, specifically made for third graders as they transition into adult worship. These bags contain a picture Bible, Bible storybook, bookmarks to mark the

Bible and hymnal, and other helpful items that will keep hands busy and allow them to listen. Encourage your child to listen to the sermon by reading the scripture ahead of time, picking a word or two that you think will be mentioned often, and asking your child to count the number of times that word is said. You'd be surprised at how much they pick up of the message. Leave the toys at home.

Talk about the service later. Include the children in your discussions on the way home and at lunchtime. Ask what they liked best about the service; share positive comments you have. Note their good behavior in church. Children learn quickly from the examples their parents exhibit. Be sure they hear more positive than negative comments.


COLLEGE STUDENT SUNDAY




