# Marilyn's Message

At the beginning of a new year, we often try to break bad habits and develop new good ones. I offer here a few suggestions for developing new habits that might have a profound effect on 2005:

Bring your children to Sunday School every week: We offer an interesting and fun way to learn Bible stories through computers, video, drama, art, games, cooking, and other ways that will engage your children and give them insights into the major stories and concepts of the Bible. ## Rozner Scholarship Endowment Assists Polish Theological Student

The Rozner Scholarship Endowment memorializes the life of Alexander Rozner by providing scholarships to Presbyterian theology students. Every year our Session designates a Presbyterian theological seminary or student as the recipient of the annual earnings of the fund.

Alexander and his mother Klara came to this country from their native Poland with Alexander's wife, Solveig, sometime after World War II. They all became members of the Potomac Presbyterian Church and actively participated in the mission of the congregation. Everyone remembers the wood Easter eggs owned by Klara and used by Pastor Kerry in his Easter children's sermon. Alexander died suddenly and unexpectedly on March 24, 2000, while traveling in Europe. Klara died on December 12, 2004, on her 101<sup>st</sup> birthday.

The Mission Committee considered it appropriate to find a Polish student studying for the Presbyterian ministry and award the fund's 2004 income to that student. Fortunately, the committee located two small Polish Presbyterian congregations—one in Poznan and the other in Wroclaw. These two congregations receive some support and ministerial guidance from the congregation and pastor of the Llandaff Presbyterian Church (Reformed) in Cardiff, Wales.

The Mission Committee established email contact with the Llandaff pastor, The Reverend Dr. Peter Naylor. He furnished the committee with information about the two Polish congregations and a Polish theological student. These contacts culminated in the committee designating the fund's 2004 income to that student.

Like other endowment funds of our congregation, the Rozner Endowment remains open to contributions by the congregation in memory of Alexander and, now, Klara.

The committee will seek contact with the Polish student and provide the congregation with further information.



#### KERRY ON...

The Apostle Paul tells us "to weep with those who weep and rejoice with those who rejoice." (Romans 12:15) The earthquake and Tsunami in South Asia have brought weeping almost beyond our imagination. The numbers of dead and injured and homeless are staggering. Yet individual stories of a child or parent with tears in their eyes bring home to us the grief and sorrow. I believe that God weeps as well in the face of such suffering. Perhaps we should be reminded that God weeps daily for any of his children who suffer and die.

Could it be that the outpouring of relief and support throughout the world gives new meaning to the rejoicing part of Paul's admonition? Usually we think of it as being glad for our family and friends when they experience something good. Can we not also rejoice as we watch the TV accounts of those who are hungry and thirsty receiving food and water? Rejoicing can take the form of our children and youth preparing health kits. It can be made real as we write a check for disaster relief.

I believe that there is hope for new understanding among nations as the human community responds to this tragedy with care and compassion. As Christians we are called to love our neighbors and reach out to those who suffer. Jesus shocked his contemporaries by radically expanding the definition of neighbor in the parable of the Good Samaritan. Our witness in his name can be no less expansive as we consider, "who is my neighbor."

#### **DEACON'S CORNER**

In January, the Annual Deacons' Retreat is held. This is the first time the newly elected deacons and the continuing deacons gather as a group. During this last retreat, each deacon was asked to share his/her goals for the coming New Year. As we shared with each other, it became clear that for the new deacons, the role of a deacon was unclear. Upon reflection, I wondered how many of you were unsure of the deacons' mission. The purpose of the office of deacon is described as one of "sympathy, witness, and service" after the example of Jesus Christ (as set forth in Scripture.)

Jackie Evans, Deacon Class of 1995, wrote, "Deacons serve as representatives of the church, facilitating communication between church leadership and parish members. They are hosts and hostesses, welcoming other members and visitors. They sponsor and take part in various functions that foster and strengthen relationships between members of the congregation and the church, and between each other. They express the concern, joy and compassion that the church feels for all of its members."

Our mission is implemented in various ways. We not only host Coffee Hours but encourage church members to serve each other by being hosts with us. In the spring and the fall we hold All Deacons' Coffees. After school starts in the fall, we sent our college/graduate students care packages. # The Wright Note

Are you ever confused by the musical titles and credits listed in our worship bulletins? Some of you keen observers and careful readers are puzzled – and for good reason.

An organ selection or an anthem title is printed on the left side of the page. To the right is printed the composer or arranger's name. In the case of hymns, however, the hymn title appears on the left; its tune name, not the composer's, is printed to the right.

Isn't the tune name the same as the title of the hymn? It can be, but most often it is different. The composer of the music to which the text is set decides what that tune should be called. Thus, you may find more than one hymn text that can be sung to a particular tune which accommodates the text's scheme of syllable distribution.

How do you identify the tune name? In our hymnal, it is listed in capital letters directly under the title. The composer, arranger or general tune origin is found to the right, with the text origin to the left. If there is no known composer, then a descriptive phrase such as African American Spiritual or American folk melody is printed.

The next time you see the familiar hymn, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God", you will recognize that its tune name, EIN' FESTE BURG, will be listed to the right in the bulletin. The composer of the tune and the text writer just happen to be Martin Luther. His name appears twice on the hymn page, once to the left and once to the right. Only the tune name, not Martin Luther's name, is printed in our bulletin.

After reading this article, do you feel as if you are preparing for a course in Hymnody 101? My hope is that you will sing our hymns with even greater enthusiasm now that you understand that many of those German title captions actually refer to the hymn tune title. You may even decide to consult the hymn tune index in the back of the hymnal to discover other hymn texts that are set to the same tune.

# Marilyn's Message

To: Kerry and Session Members

From: Marilyn Johns

It is with very mixed feelings that I ask you to accept my resignation as your Director of Youth and Christian Education effective March 13, 2005. My six and one-half years at Potomac Presbyterian Church have been, without question, the best years of my career. It is not often that a Christian educator is given the opportunities I have had at PPC. Not only have Kerry and the staff been wonderful friends and colleagues, but you, the session, have always been supportive and open to new ideas. You have been more than generous to me in my compensation, and in allowing me to work at the presbytery and denominational levels, and you have encouraged and supported me in the pursuit of my Doctor of Ministry degree. From even before we arrived here in 1998, the congregation of this church has made my family and me feel genuinely welcome and a part of this family of faith.

I have been approached by the Virginia Theological Seminary in Alexandria to manage a grant they have received from the Lilly Endowment. This is a six-year grant which will focus on encouraging the work of small church pastors in Protestant denominations. In this position I will use my skills in conference planning, as well as the relational ministry I love, and I will be pushed to develop new skills, including grant management and working with small churches. I believe that after 14 years in church educational ministry, God is calling me to this new thing. I am excited and more than a little bit scared about leaving the security of that which I know very well to go to a new position doing something quite different than I've ever done before. I am certain God will support me in this ministry, but I do ask for your prayers.

For the time being, our family will continue to live in Damascus, and Liz and Rachel will remain active members of this congregation. My church membership will stay at Idylwood Presbyterian Church, and I look forward to worshiping with them on the Sundays that I am in town.

Over the next month I will do everything I can to prepare the Christian Education committee and others to carry on the educational ministry that is such an integral part of the life of this church. All of the present programs will continue for the time being, and the committee will be challenged to look at programs and evaluate them and perhaps make changes. It can be a breath of fresh air when there is a transition in leadership, and I trust the people on the committee to do their best to discern God's will for this congregation. You will be in my prayers, but I am confident that the excellent volunteers in the educational programs will rise to the tasks which lie before them.

The members and friends of this church – youth, children, and adults – will always be a part of me. We have done valuable ministry together, and we can and will do valuable ministry apart. May God continue to bless each one of us as we minister in his name.

### A Peek into the Wonderful Wednesdays Choir Experience

There are only six of us: Sara, Jackson, Grace, Noah, Lauren and Bryan. We are a mixture of kindergarten, first and second graders who come every Wednesday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock to sing with Mrs. Wright. She's funny. She usually brings toys or special props to help us learn how to use our singing voices – not our playground voices. We float up to high notes when she brings her balloon. We lift our voices high when she lets us lift her 2-lbs. weights. We even grab the edges of a hoopla-hoop to move it up and down as the melody moves up and down.


To experience the movement of a melody line in steps or skips, we sometimes sing a song on the various steps leading from the narthex to the hallway above. We are getting pretty good at this, and can now relate our scampering up and down the church steps to the notes moving up and down on the musical staff.

Do you know what is really fun? It is when Mrs. Wright gives us each a sheet of paper with a musical staff printed on it. As we sing one of the songs we are learning, she gives us tiny marshmallows or cheerios or even valentine hearts to use as notes on our staff. As we sing each note, we place that candy or cereal on the right line or space of the staff. When we place the notes correctly, we get to eat our tune! We often play our notes on choir chimes, too.

Are we learning about God and the teachings of Jesus? Hum, we don't think about that very much, but we actually are. We sing songs about God's love, songs that tell stories from the Bible and songs about how Jesus lived and how we should live as Christians. We try to treat each other kindly. We never laugh when any one of us is trying to match a pitch or if anyone makes a mistake. We always pray at the close of every choir practice. We form a little circle and join hands. (Oh, no! Does a boy really have to hold a girl's hand?) The prayer that we sing goes like this:

Thank you, God, for music.
Thank you, God, for song.
May the joy we feel while singing
Last the whole week long. Amen

### TSUNAMI DISASTER RESPONSE UPDATE

The earthquake and tsunami disaster that struck South Asia and the Indian Ocean region on the day after Christmas last year has killed hundreds of thousands of people and destroyed countless of other lives, homes and communities. The suffering has been, and continues to be, unbelievable as so many families struggle to cope with their loss and come to terms with rebuilding their lives in the face of hardship, disease, lack of adequate food and clean water and economic resources. The Presbyterian Disaster Assistance program had set a goal of raising \$2.5 million dollars to respond to the disaster and as of Feb 2 they have reported that they have surpassed that goal. In addition, our Sunday School classes have assembled health kits that are used to provide immediate medical assistance when disasters strike. 



Many of you know that I love musicals. Last year for Rachel's graduation gift, we went to New York to see a Broadway musical called "Wicked." It's a kind of prequel to the Wizard of Oz story.

There is a song in "Wicked" near the end, when two friends are parting, and the gist of the song is that because of their relationship with one another, both of them have been changed for the better. The song begins:

I've heard it said that people come into our lives for a reason, Bringing something we must learn, and we are led to those who help us most to grow, If we let them, and we help them in return. Well, I don't know if I believe that's true, But I know I'm who I am today because I knew you.

For several weeks now – no, for  $6\frac{1}{2}$  years – people in this church have been very eager to thank me for what I've done to teach their children, youth, and themselves. I've never felt so appreciated in any place I've worked.

But you must know that I've learned at least as much from you as you have learned from me. I have learned about open-mindedness from you. When I first came here in 1998, I broke the cardinal rule of new ministry - I came in and said, "We're going to do workcamp next summer." I didn't wait the requisite year before starting something new, I just jumped right in, and you were open to that. Thanks to Rich McPherson and other leaders of the youth program, combined with the testimony from my own daughter who had been to workcamp, you accepted the idea, and not only gave lip service to it, but enthusiastically supported it, and with your help, it has changed the lives of many people inside and outside of this church. You have shown me that it is better to start off saying yes than looking for all of the reasons why something will not work.

I have learned that it is possible to be pretty diverse theologically and politically, and still peacefully coexist in one church. You have shown me that we are all one in Jesus Christ, and it has given me the ability to work with all kinds of people.

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
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So you can see that you have given me as much or more than I have given you. The song from Wicked also includes these lines:


Think about it. What matters most... to your immediate family, and as members of this wonderful congregation, our church family?

#### **Theological Education Sunday**

Sunday, May 1 was the first annual special day devoted to the recognition, understanding, and appreciation of the Theological Seminaries that prepare and sustain our pastors, missionaries, educators, and lay leaders. Seminaries also provide theological and biblical research and resources critical to the vitality and growth of the whole Church. Theological Education Sunday was a time to celebrate our past gifts from PPC members and our mission budget---and to consider our responsibility to expand both. The need continues to increase. Kerry's sermon is further recommended reading on the PPC website.

#### Potomac Presbyterian has responded

- Annually PPC gives \$4,500 from our church mission budget to Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary (Boston), Princeton Theological Seminary (Princeton), McCormick Theological Seminary (Chicago), Union Theological Seminary (Richmond), and provides International Student Aid which rotates annually among these four seminaries established in 2003.
- 2000 <u>The Kerry L. Stoltzfus Scholarship Fund</u> was created by 175 PPC members and friends as an open endowment. The fund has grown to \$30,000, is administered by and for Gordon-Conwell, and currently provides \$1,500 in annual scholarships.
- 2001 <u>The Alexander Rozner Endowment</u> provides funding for seminary scholarships and rotates among Gordon-Conwell, Princeton, McCormick and Union seminaries.
- 2001 <u>The William Albright Endowment</u> provides funding for summer interns at PPC, special continuing education for staff, seminary scholarships for PPC students, as well as other opportunities such as theologian in residence programs.

- Designate gifts to PPC for these or other seminaries
- Establish an endowment at PPC for seminaries and/or seminarians
- Your gift can be given in a variety of ways: cash, check, marketable securities, or life insurance; corporate matching grants (i.e. Verizon, IBM, SAIC); charitable lead trust, gift annuity, or remainder trust; bequest through a will or living trust.

#### The need continues to increase

- Typically, seminaries receive only 10% of their annual operating budgets from Presbyterian denominational support (in years past it was as high as 20%), are dependent on annual gifts from individual churches and church members for 30% of their budgets, and need 30% provided from tuition and fees. They use endowment income and grants to cover 30% of their budgets, face substantial annual increases in all expenses, and are fighting to keep tuition and fees low.
- Typical full time seminarians are paying substantial tuition and fees, are faced with annual increases in tuition and fees, depend on scholarships and outside work to continue their educations, graduate with significant personal debt, and are looking ahead to lean earnings with which to repay their student loans.

Theological seminaries and PPC endowments have already enriched the ministries of many congregations through the services of: Kerry Stoltzfus – Gordon-Conwell & McCormick, Tom Miles – Princeton, Beth Williams – Wesley (Washington, DC), Marilyn Johns – Union, Diane Hutchins – Wesley (Washington, DC), Debra McKune – Union, Gordon-Conwell Seminarians - (Six—So Far), Rich McPherson - Summer Intern, Carrie Smith - Summer Intern, Rafal Sielicki - Polish Presbyterian Seminarian.

... Most Christian churches no longer sing the hymn "Onward Christian Soldiers." Some say it is a victim of political correctness. Others argue that warlike images do not accord with the message of Jesus. I tend to agree with the latter. Then again I had some second thoughts the other day when I read something about the Salvation Army and its founder William Booth. Perhaps the "army" gets it right for they are a very peaceable lot in spite of their name and military protocol. The image is of hardy souls ringing a bell outside stores during the Christmas season and asking for donations to help the poor. They have a worldwide ministry of countless soup kitchens, shelters and relief efforts. The "army" has had an untainted reputation in fiscal matters and is highly respected for their humanitarian efforts.

Perhaps they exemplify the kind of army that the hymn portrays. They are out to wage war, but not in the way of military operations that we understand in our world. William Booth declared in his last public speech the kind of war that was to be waged.

While women weep as they do now, I'll fight!
While little children go hungry as they do now, I'll Fight!
While men go to prison, in and out, I'll fight!
While there is a drunkard left,
While there is a poor girl left upon the streets,
While there remains one dark soul without the light of God, I'll fight!
I'll fight to the very end.

Something to think about.

I know you will enjoy hearing many of our talented church musicians sing or play instruments this summer. I appreciate those of you who participate so willingly in this musical contribution to worship.

I feel really silly, but something just happened to me that I thought only happened in the movies or on TV. My cat, Felicity, got stuck up in a tree. It was, of course, a very tall tree with no branches until about 25 feet high. We could not simply climb up and get her. So yes, it really does happen, and no, the fire department will not come. Being a product of the younger generation, my children googled "cats stuck in a tree" to find out what to do. The best advice we got was: put some food at the bottom of the tree and they will come down. We did that and thirty-six hours later the food had been consumed by a variety of wild life, but our cat was still up the tree meowing her heart out. So I broke down and began calling tree services wondering how much it was going to cost me to get this cat out of the tree.

As this was going on, we were the entertainment for the whole neighborhood. Finally, after many phone calls and anxious waiting, we found someone who could come to rescue Felicity. But before the tree man even started up the tree, he warned us of two potential risks: one, that often the cat will climb higher when it sees someone coming after it; and two, that fifty per cent of the time, the cat will jump.

So what does any of this have to do with faith or church? I couldn't help but wonder if God doesn't feel about us the way I did in this situation. I gave the kitten her freedom. I let her go outside and explore this wonderful creation. I told her what trees she should avoid. But she still ended up stuck! Then when I sent someone to rescue her, what did she do? She ran even higher placing herself and the tree man in greater danger. Nonetheless, the tree man, after some mild cursing, faithfully climbed even higher until he could reach her and bring her safely home. Is this how God feels when he looks at us? He sees us stuck in our trees, calling out for help, but we do not climb down and take the food that has been offered to us. Instead, we run the other way, into even greater danger. God then sends the real "Tree Man" to rescue us and bring us home. This was costly for God: He sent his only son Jesus Christ to be our tree man. He climbed the tree, not just risking his life for us, but giving his life for us, so that we might come safely home. I will sleep better tonight knowing Felicity is home. When each of us comes home to God, we are the prodigal son, the wayward cat...and God rejoices.


## **Youth News**



## THE WRIGHT NOTE

#### Make Time for Choir!

Isn't it amazing that the same mechanism that allows us to speak on so many levels and in so many languages can also be used to produce a singing tone that eventually can make melody and tones that harmonize with a melody? Singing is truly an amazing, ever satisfying accomplishment.

Some of us are better singers than others. This may be due to genes or to how, when, or if we were ever effectively introduced to singing at all. Singing does not feel the same as talking. Some of you may have never felt the true sensation of the singing part of your voice. Thus, you may have talked your way through "Jesus Loves Me" as a five-year-old and never realized that that low, drone-like quality with no pitch differentiation was not your singing voice.

The sooner a child starts to experiment with voice inflection and fluctuation, the better. In our  $K-2^{nd}$  grade choir we do just that, and begin the long, wonderful road to good singing. That choir is called the Wonderful Wednesdays Choir and meets from 4:00-4:45 p.m. on Wednesday afternoons in the fellowship hall. I direct that choir in an atmosphere of fun and Christian fellowship. The first rehearsal is Wednesday, September  $21^{st}$ . Children in grades  $K-2^{nd}$  grade will be receiving reminder postcards.

The next step from the  $K-2^{nd}$  grade choir is the Sunrise Singers Choir which meets on Sunday mornings from 9:00-9:45 a.m. in the choir robe room. This choir involves boys and girls in grades 3-6. Being familiar now with the feel of the singing voice, these children begin to read music from the printed score and sing several times throughout the year in worship. They also take an active part in supporting the Christmas pageant and sing in a spring choral festival sponsored by Choristers Guild. Watch for postcards to arrive at the home of  $3^{rd}-6^{th}$  graders reminding them of the September  $18^{th}$  starting date for choir.

Our Sanctuary Choir will begin rehearsals on Sept. 8<sup>th</sup> at 8:00 p.m. What a great group of dedicated Christian friends! We enjoy working together to prepare the anthems we sing in every worship service. We realize that we are true worship leaders, even though our voices resound from the back of the Sanctuary. Many of our members have been singing in the choir for more years than they want me to print. They encourage more of you pew dwellers to join the ranks of choir singers this year. We have a wonderful time learning new music, singing the great music from the past and improving our vocal technique.

## ETH'S BLURB

Fall – It is a season of change. The leaves change colors, children change grades, and some of us change life status, empty-nesting now. The white pants get hung up in the back of the closet until next summer and the rake replaces the watering can by my door. It is always hard for me to say good-bye to the summer, for change is never easy for me. As I watch that first tree turn yellow, my initial

reaction is not to savor the beauty of the leaves, but instead to sigh with sadness at the end that it signifies. But I should take a lesson from the trees. They are so much better at "letting go" than I am. Joyce Rupp, in her book "Daily Bread" says it this way. "Trees readily allow autumn to have their summer leaves. . . . They allow the season to make it appear that all is lost, and that there is no green growth left. But they know better, for even

at their most barren moment, when one can look among the branches and see scars and knotholes the leaves once hid, the trees already show terminal buds with the secret of next spring's leafing in them."

We can learn a lot from the trees. We have to be willing to let go, to be open to change, in order that new growth can come. So maybe this fall, as I walk down the street and see the changing leaves, instead of grieving the loss, I can see the promise. Maybe, just maybe, I can let go of some of my own leaves to which I have been clinging, and trust God to bring about new growth in me.






## **Flower Sharers Needed**



We will together discern the "sacred purposes" God sets before us and, relying on God's grace, we will seek to serve God and one another with energy, intelligence, imagination, and love.





## ETH'S BLURB

Several months ago the Washington Post added a new type of puzzle - the Su Do Ku - a grid formed such that every vertical column, every horizontal column, and every 3x3 box contains the numbers 1 through 9. In my spare

time I would find myself doing these puzzles. Sometimes I would solve them fairly quickly. Other times it might take me several days. Whatever the case, I kept on doing the puzzles. Then I noticed the Post had added a new element to the puzzle. They began rating them by difficulty level varying from "very easy" to "hard". That explained the variations in my "solving time" and it added a new dimension to the puzzle. Now, as I open the paper and turn to the page with the Su Do Ku, I first look at the difficulty level. When the puzzle is listed as "very easy" or "easy", my decision is simple - I do the puzzle. When it is listed as "medium", I usually tackle it anyway. When the puzzle is "hard", however, I really have to think about it. Do I have the time and resources (brain power) to try to solve this particular puzzle?

Why is any of this relevant? I have found this is a good analogy for many of the problems we face each day. The easy ones we step up to and solve "easily." The "medium" ones might take more effort, but we solve them. It is those "hard", seemingly nearly impossible problems that we step back from, feeling like we don't have what it takes to solve them.

This, to me, is where problems such as homelessness and AIDS fall. I have to remind myself that before the Su Do Ku started labeling the puzzles, I finished every one. As Christians we cannot let the "difficult" label keep us from trying to solve problems. We must tackle them for indeed we know all things are possible with God. Like the Su Do Ku we can take it one square at a time and if we don't give up, or let the label intimidate us, we can get it done.

This month the young people will be taking a small step in the direction of solving the issue of homelessness in our area as they walk in the **Help the Homeless Walkathon** downtown on Nov. 19. They will be taking pledges and designating the money that they raise to go to Stepping Stones Shelter. The sponsors of the walk, the Fannie Mae Foundation, will donate \$1 for every walker in the Walkathon to organizations supporting Gulf Coast hurricane relief efforts.



## SPECIAL OPPORTUNITY FOR GIVING TO PPC— AND GET A 2005 TAX BREAK. Deadline is 12/31/2005

Congress and the President were concerned that Americans had given so generously to charities working to help tsunami and hurricane disaster victims that they would cut back on their contributions to other organizations. (Please note the article below on PPC's great generosity.)

The Katrina Emergency Tax Relief Act (KETRA), HR 3768, allows a 2005 tax deduction of the entire amount of charitable cash donations made directly to a public charity (like PPC) up to 100% of your "Adjusted Gross Income." On January 1, 2006 it reverts back to 50%. The charitable gift must be an outright gift and cannot be a charitable gift annuity or charitable remainder trust. Donors over age 59 1/2 may also make gifts out of their IRA or other retirement accounts directly to a public charity. There may be a slight federal tax on these gifts, and state tax laws also vary. Your donation could be for a one-time gift, or prepayment of your 2006 pledge.

As with any tax-related issue, you are advised to consult with your tax advisor. However, Kerry or I will be happy to discuss the many wonderful giving opportunities at PPC---Memorials, Endowments, Scholarships, One-time Anonymous Gifts.

## HURRICANES KATRINA AND RITA RESPONSE UPDATE

On behalf of the Mission Committee I want to personally thank all of you who have contributed so generously in response to the disastrous hurricanes Katrina and Rita. Your help will mean so much to so many who have lost everything they had to the storms and floods. The bulk of our contributions has been funneled through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) (<a href="http://pcusa.org/katrina/">http://pcusa.org/katrina/</a>) to work teams and disaster response teams. These teams have been working through Presbyterian churches in the affected areas to bring relief and aid directly to those affected by the storms. PPC has provided \$5,000 to two work teams, which included our own Jim Jochum and Fred Newton as participants. In addition, PPC has provided \$39,035 to PDA for relief to local congregations throughout the Gulf Coast. Finally, PPC has been working one-on-one with First Presbyterian Church in New Orleans and their Pastor, the Rev. Cliff Nunn, to help restore their badly damaged church. We provided \$5,000 to them for their refurbishing efforts and \$1,000 (from our minister's Discretionary Ministry to Children's Fund) to help replace their children's library which was totally destroyed in the floods.
