KERRY ON...

I am reading a new book by Eugene Peterson, <u>Christ Plays in Ten Thousand Places: a Conversation in Spiritual Theology</u>. He writes,

"Everything that Jesus does and says takes place within the limits and conditions of our humanity. No fireworks. No special effects. Yes, there are miracles, plenty of them. But because for the most part they are so much a part of the fabric of everyday life, very few notice. The miraculousness of miracle is obscured by the familiarity of the setting, the ordinariness of the people involved."

As the New Year begins let's look for miracles. Something like a long and steady faithfulness is a miracle as is unselfish caring for a loved one who is sick. Children give of themselves in spontaneous acts and the grandparent generation behaves in playful ways. A person gives up some advantage to share with their friend. We might leave a warm bed and take the Metro to provide breakfast for strangers who we call guests. We learn something new that we thought was impossible.

The Lord provides our daily bread and the miracle of life sustained happens. Any time there is healing of body or mind or spirit we should be astounded. Joy catches us by surprise and its source is beyond reason. Beauty is sometimes hidden and with a miracle is revealed. Even tears are often signs in the everyday fabric of life.

Most of all it is a miracle that love has found us in the One who came to earth as a baby. He became the One who healed the sick, called disciples and was a friend of sinners. Even death could not obliterate that love and he lives to open our eyes to the miraculous in the midst of our ordinary days. May Jesus be praised now and always.

I grew up in the South Bronx; and, except for Leonor, Gloria and the Binder sisters, virtually everyone I knew was Roman Catholic. I spent many hours sitting in the back pew of St. Jerome's church waiting for my friends to finish their confessions and penance. I would stare at the huge eye painted in the dome of the ceiling. Lourdes said it was the eye of God watching us. You can be sure that made quite an impression on me.

Sometimes I'd go to Mass with Elsie and Lourdes. Believe it or not, I'm old enough to remember the Latin mass. What I remember most was poking my friends in the ribs and asking, "What did he say?" Turns out they didn't know either. Every now and then, though, a snippet of Latin would float my way and I would know what the Priest was saying. The phrase that comes to mind today is *Anno Domini Nostri Iesu Christi* – "In the year of our Lord Jesus Christ." This term has fallen out of common use in favor of the more inclusive "CE," short for Common Era. *Anno Domini* is a way of understanding our years that is linked to the birth of Christ. Before this Christian calendar was conceived, dates were reckoned from the date of the founding of Rome.

The Liturgical calendar also reckons its days beginning with the Birth of the Savior. The first Sunday in Advent is the beginning of the Christian year. The calendar then moves through the seasons of the Christian life. It is a way of telling the story of God-with-us and naming that presence in cycles of time.

Beginning with the Incarnation cycle, our liturgical calendar celebrates four weeks of Advent and the twelve days of Christmas, culminating in the Epiphany of the Lord. There is a brief period of what is called "Ordinary Time" before we enter the Easter Cycle which includes the forty days of Lent, fifty days of Easter and the Day of Pentecost. "Ordinary Time" resumes the Monday after the Day of Pentecost and extends through the Saturday before the first Sunday in Advent.

Don't let the term "ordinary time" fool you. There is nothing "ordinary" about it. On the Sundays of Ordinary Time we again remember the death and resurrection of Christ. For Christians every Sunday is a "little Easter" in which we celebrate the unfolding of the new creation we are in Christ. Nothing ordinary about that!

Within the seasons we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord, the Transfiguration of the Lord, Ash Wednesday (which begins Lent), Passion/Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Saturday of Holy Week (the Triduum), The Ascension of the Lord, Trinity Sunday, All Saints' Day and Christ the King Sunday.

KERRY ON...

I recently read about a church bulletin announcement that included the following: "Next Sunday the congregations will celebrate the Lord's Supper." A person who was a new Christian called one of the members. "I have two questions," she said, "It's about this supper thing. Am I invited and how much will it cost?"

At first we might laugh and then upon further reflection consider how profound those questions really are. "Am I invited?" When I give the invitation to the Lord's Table I say,

This is the Lord's Table. Our Savior invites those who trust in

Him to share the feast which he has prepared.

We come not because we are worthy but because we are hungry, and not because we are faithful but to remember Christ's faithfulness on the cross. We gather at the Lord's invitation with all who trust in Him in every age and in ever land.

What about the question, "How much does it cost?" It is free because it cost Jesus his life on the cross. "We proclaim the Lord's death until he comes," the pastor says. We sing,

I come with joy to meet my Lord, forgiven, loved and free.

In awe and wonder to recall His life laid down for me.

The Supper is free. Discipleship is costly. When the feast is ended we go out to serve the One who gave his life for the world. We have been nourished and strengthened, if you will, for living as faithful disciples on the job and at school, in our homes and communities. In the closing prayer we hear the words,

Grant that we may go into the world in the strength of the Spirit, to give ourselves for others in the name of Jesus.

Amen

Faith. The nice thing about faith is that we have a bona fide scriptural definition: "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." The best news about faith, though, is that you don't need to have a lot of it. According to Matthew, if we have faith the size of a mustard seed, nothing is impossible for us.

This makes me think of little Susie in the movie, *Miracle On 34th Street*. Susie's Mom did not want her to be suckered by fantasy. Mom took great pains to raise a logical, rational child, and her first order of business was to be sure Susie knew there was no Santa Claus.

Susie's mother worked for Macy*s and was very involved in the selection of the store's Santas. Susie was, therefore, very aware that Macy*s Santas had pillow stomachs and fake beards. (And most of them drank a little too much.) One day, Macy*s hired a Santa who claimed to be the real thing -- Kris Kringle, himself. Susie was not about to be taken in by this; but, gosh, this Santa was VERY convincing.

Susie didn't wish to admit she wanted to ask Santa for a present. Mr. Kringle, however, was persistent and Susie asked for a house. Not a doll house - a real house in the suburbs. Maybe, just maybe this guy really was Santa.

Christmas was celebrated at Mr. Kringle's retirement home, but there was nothing under the tree about a house for Susie. Susie was politely appreciative of the gifts she received; but, she was utterly disappointed. On the drive home Susie sat in the car murmuring, "I believe... I believe." Susie was torn between her doubt and her faith – and she couldn't relinquish either one.

Truthfully, this is where I spend a surprising amount of time – caught somewhere between my doubt and my faith, unable to relinquish either one. The faith part of me knows that God is at work in the world. But, when I read of the world's turmoil in the newspaper, my heart hurts. My doubt surfaces and I don't always know what to do about that. But faith does.

Faith is not the antidote to doubt. Faith and doubt coexist quite uncomfortably together. But even when doubt rages, faith seems to maintain the upper hand. We don't need a lot of faith to outmaneuver a whole lot of doubt. Faith keeps hanging in there no matter what doubt tries to do. A preacher I know once said "the point of faith is not that you will be certain. The point of faith is that you will continue worshiping."

When we worship we bring all that we are, including our fears and doubts, and we lay it at the cross of Jesus Christ. Our doubts and fears are no longer the center of our attention; Jesus is. That is worship. As we worship we encounter the living Christ, the heavy burdens of our hearts are lifted and our hearts have more room to perceive God working in the world. In worship the 'eyes' of our hearts are lifted and our faith is renewed.

We are assaulted daily with news of a broken, hurting world. There are times when it is all we can do to get up, get dressed and come to worship. On those days we may find ourselves having to rely on the worshiping community around us to carry us during the service. It doesn't seem like much, but showing up is at least mustard size faith. It is enough, and it will be renewed.





KERRY ON...

"What wondrous love is this," is the first line of one of our beloved hymns and a profound theme to contemplate as we begin the season of Lent. As Jesus was forty days in the wilderness, we are invited to prepare ourselves for Good Friday and Easter for forty days. It is a time to step aside from what is reasonable and consider the love of God that is beyond reason.

One of America's greatest black preachers is Rev. Gardner C. Taylor and he wrote about being reasonable and the love of God.

The greatest things in life are not reasonable. The mind may make sensible comments about these greatest things in life, but they are not reasonable. The love of a mother for her child has reasons, but it is not reasonable. The love of a man for a woman, and the other way around, is surely not reasonable. Beauty, a sunset, the great plunging torrents of Niagara, the final tremendous thunders of the "Hallelujahs" in Handel's Messiah, the catch in the throat when the sun sets over the sea striking a line of gold on the calm waters touch us at a different level from logic and reason.

And the love of God for us is not reasonable.

I invite you to participate in the variety of Lenten opportunities here at PPC beginning with

ASH WEDNESDAY COMMUNION SERVICE Wednesday, March 1 at 7:30 p.m.

Burying Alleluia. I have to apologize to the "Steeple to People" elves. I'm a little late getting this reflection in. I've been gathering up my Alleluias and they seem to be all over the place.

It is a peculiar tradition of Lent that we do not say or sing the word *alleluia*, because *alleluia* is the most joyful word we have for praising God. *Alleluia* is the song of the angels. It's not that we don't praise God during Lent. It is that our praise takes other forms. Rather than speaking our gratitude and joy using the song of the angels, we express our gratitude and joy in obedience – intentional, thoughtful obedience to God's will.


Lent is a season of penance, reflection, and fasting. It is a period of individual and congregational reflection on the quality of our fidelity to our baptismal covenant. At some undefined point in my journey with Christ I began to take Lent very seriously. Now it is my Lenten practice to read our baptismal covenant every day. At the end of each day I ask myself: Did I sincerely resist all evil? When I sinned, did I catch it quickly, and did I take the time to ask God's forgiveness on the spot? Did I, today, proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ? (Did people experience the love of Christ today through what I did and said?) Did I seek and serve Christ in all persons? Did I love my neighbor as much as I love myself? (Was I open to the voice of the Holy Spirit that often comes to me through other people?) Have I given any of my time and energy to God's justice and peace among all people? Have I treated with respect and dignity everyone I have encountered today?

Now, I think I'm a pretty good person. I don't intentionally treat people badly. I'm fairly certain I can get through a day without breaking any of the major Commandments. But intentionality is the key to Lent. It is about being conscious of how I live my life before God in the community. When I'm paying attention, I realize I'm not as good as I think I am, and I need to more closely and honestly look at those Commandments. Suddenly I discover Lent truly is a season of penance, reflection and fasting.

A tradition that appeared as early as 4th century was bidding farewell to *Alleluia* on Transfiguration Sunday (the Sunday before Ash Wednesday). *Alleluia* was sung with great abandon on Transfiguration Sunday. Choir boys then processed out of the church carrying *alleluia* in a coffin. The coffin was buried, and *alleluia* was not heard again until it burst into glory with great surprise on Easter morn. That is when we greet each other with the words: "Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!" And then, with angels and archangels and the whole company of heaven, we will worship and adore God's glorious name with the praise song of the angels: *Alleluia! Alleluia!* Amen.

With spring quickly approaching, we look forward to the Lenten season and Easter. The Deacons are busy preparing for this season and beyond. As Lent approaches, we can all use this time to reflect on our faith. "...(T)his season engages us in the process of confronting who we are by nature, who we are by God's purpose and redeeming action, and what we can become by divine grace," (from Calendar: Christ's Time for the Church by Laurence Hull Stookey). This important season offers us a chance to reflect on the cycle of life, as well as God's redemption. To help us with this reflection, devotionals will be available for the congregation in the narthex. Please consider picking one up if you are interested. Also this year the Deacons are preparing a new Service of Song & Scripture to celebrate the season of Lent. This service will be held the evening of March 22nd and is designed to be a celebratory family evening. Also, your Deacons are preparing for another All Deacons Coffee Hour on Sunday, April 2nd. LIBRARY NEWS

Have you seen all the new books yet? They have been out on the book truck in the library for easy browsing. We have added several books on The Reformation to augment the adult studies. Many other books have been added also, three of which are noted here. The Worshiping Life (264.05/HIC) by Lisa

Hickman is a book of meditations on the order of worship. Each meditation on an element of worship reflects on how that particular element plays out not only in a service of worship, but also in everyday life. Belonging: Faith in the Neighborhood by Lucinda Mosher explores what it means to live and worship among many faiths. And I must mention Marilynne Robinson's book, The Death of Adam. KERRY ON... ... Once again we draw near to the day we call "good." On a particular Friday on a hill outside the city wall He took upon himself the depths of human sin and rebellion. We were there as the old spiritual suggests, when they nailed him to the tree, when they pierced him in the side, when they laid him in the tomb.

When human pride and injustice and violence prevails it is like that dark day on a hill outside the city.

That was Friday but Sunday is coming!

When our own sin and rebellion carries the day we see the long dark shadow of the cross on which the Prince of Glory died.

That was Friday but Sunday but Friday is coming.

Sunday is coming and we will sing, Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!

When I took Systematic Theology in seminary, our professor began the course by saying the three essential questions of the Christian life are:

Who is God? What has God done? How do I respond?

These are some pretty big questions – too big to ponder in one sitting. My problem with these questions is that they're so broad. They don't have any "pegs" on which to hang any of my thoughts, so I need a tool to help me focus my reflections. The tool I generally use to help me answer these questions is our Baptismal Covenant. I choose the Baptismal Covenant because it is in my baptism that I receive my Christian identity. In the Baptismal Covenant I have a guide to help me understand who I am as God's child and how I am to live out this Covenant with this God who loves and cares for me. I invite you to consider these three essential questions in light of the promises we make to God:

The Baptismal Covenant (Who is God? What has God done?)

- Do you believe in God the Father?
- Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?
- Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

(How do I respond?)

- Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers?
- Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?
- Will you proclaim by word and example the good news of God in Jesus Christ?
- Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself?
- Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?

DEACON'S CORNER

Once I see the bright yellow forsythia blooms and the pink buds on the red bud trees, I know Easter is just around the corner. During the Lenten Season I've been reading the devotional booklet by C.S. Lewis and praying each day as part of the Deacon prayer challenge. I've found it more meaningful to think that others in PPC might actually be praying a similar prayer at the same moment. (Strength or safety in numbers maybe?) Lent isn't a very comfortable time, but I think it's that discomfort which makes Easter so special once it's finally here. I find the Maundy Thursday service especially puts me in the right place spiritually, and Easter Sunday dawns brighter – even if it's cloudy out. I hope your Easter dawns bright!

Please come to the fellowship time after the service on April 23rd for the Deacon's Coffee Hour. It's an excellent opportunity to visit with your deacon and others in your Parish.

At this point, you may be confused because you don't have note names or a score in front of you. It is hard for you to envision the tune and setting. This is exactly where some of the magic occurred on that Sunday when this song was created. The children were SO excited about creating this song and wanted desperately not to forget it. They decided that they needed to put it all down in notation so that they would have a guide for the next time they wanted to sing and ring it.

They, not I, grabbed the markers and eraser board. Kayla appointed herself as scribe and began drawing the staff lines and clefs. The students themselves figured out the rhythmic structure and the note location for the tune and the chords. I helped them put the words with the appropriate notes on their musical staff. They would have done that, too, had the clock not indicated that it was time to move on to Sunday School. I have never seen five choristers more enthusiastic than Lia, Kayla, Sara, Katherine and Audrey as they left our creative rehearsal that morning. On occasion I have had senior moments, but on that wintry Sunday, I experienced a magic moment of creative discovery with five stimulating students. *Cindy Wright*

THE WRIGHT NOTE

A Magic Moment

If you were in worship on March 12th, you heard the Sunrise Singers Choir sing an anthem and a benediction response. Did you notice the composer credits for the response at the end of the service? The bulletin recorded it as JESUS IS MY FRIEND written by the Sunrise Singers Choir. Aren't you curious as to how this happened? Well, let me take you back to January 15, 2006.

It certainly didn't start out to be a four-star Sunday. I unlocked the church at 8:30 a.m. to prepare for our 9:00 a.m. Sunrise Singers rehearsal. It was an extremely cold, windy Martin Luther King holiday Sunday. No school on Monday. Choir attendance would no doubt be low today. It was.

By 9:05 the only five who were coming filed expectantly into the frigid choir room and begged to go across the hall to the warm loft to rehearse. So we grabbed our folders, my interval charts which I had so carefully prepared for today's lesson, the dry eraser board, markers, my Musical Alphabet Song chart and the case of choir chimes, and hurriedly set up shop in the loft.

I started with the Musical Alphabet Song, asking the five children to each pick two chimes from the case that would contribute to the melodic theme. Whoever had the first note would be the one to start ringing the song. At that point Lia raised her hand and asked, "Can't we first ring the chimes all at the same time, just to see how it sounds?" Always willing to let children experiment with sounds, I agreed. On cue, the children rang an emphatic ten-note tone cluster. Afterwards, I saw the grimaces and heard negative verbal responses to the dissonance. I mentioned that certain contemporary composers use clusters of sound as a deliberate technique for their compositions.

Then I asked them what would be the effect if we separated our cluster of sound into three sections? Still not knowing who held which notes in the A major scale, I pointed to Lia and Kayla and directed them to ring together (group 1). Then I cued Katherine and Audrey (group 2) to ring after them. We went back and forth in half notes for what seemed to be a developing pattern. Then I brought in Sara who still had not rung her two notes. Her notes (group 3) rounded out our pattern. With each group ringing half notes and the last group ringing a whole note, we rang this sequence:

1-2, 1-2, 1-2, 1-2, 1-2, 1-2, 3-2, 1-2, 3-2, 1.

As we rang our accompaniment pattern, I began chanting, "Jesus is my friend", using mostly E's and just two F sharps. The children joined in and began adding words. Soon our chant became, "Jesus is my friend. I'll love Him to the end. Amen. Amen."



TO PEOPLE

Potomac Presbyterian Church MAY 2006

Pastor and theologian Garret Keizer responds to a line we have all heard, "I'm very spiritual, but I'm not religious at all."

Religion is potluck suppers, for Christ's sake – disciplines and dogmas and, most trying of all, pews full of *other people*. Those who like spirituality without religion are modern Gnostics who claim to have special knowledge of the divine. Their ultimate goal in emancipation from the vile world of matter, and their deepest spiritual need is to be delivered from the body, including the body politic. (Harper's Magazine, February 2006)

The latest version of Gnosticism has made it to TV and the popular press with the publication of "The Gospel of Judas." One of the lines of this text which is a copy made around A.D. 300 has Jesus telling Judas, "Step away from the others and I shall tell you the mysteries of the kingdom."

The canonical Gospels are too earthy, too human, too concerned with the physical for this Judas version of the Jesus story. They too are full of mystery but not the kind that is revealed to certain insiders. Their mystery has to do with the astounding claim that Jesus is fully human and fully divine. It is never explained but simply presented and leaves us with many unanswered questions. Jesus of the Gospels in incredibly complex and intriguing. We are invited to follow where he leads into the world as we know it with its pain and sorrow, joy and gladness. We are called to find him in "the least of these", not in some realm of heavenly mystery.

The first question of the Baptismal Covenant is:

Do you believe in God the Father?

The first lines of our creeds say: "I believe in God the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth," (*The Apostles Creed*) and "We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.' (*The Nicene Creed*) We affirm in our Creeds that God is the maker of all creation. God is the source of all that is,

including things we may know nothing about and things we do not understand. Our affirmation that God is "almighty" says something about the "dynamic character of God's work as creator and ruler of all that is."

I like that. God is dynamic. "Characterized by continuous change, activity, or progress; Marked by intensity and vigor; forceful. (See synonyms at active.)² It helps me to remember that God is active in the world, even though it is difficult to see most days³. God's action is continuous; God is always working toward God's goal of "shalom." God's intent on shalom is charged with divine energy that is eternally vigilant. "He who keeps Israel will neither slumber nor sleep." (Ps. 121:4). God is "solid." The Psalmists often refer to God as a "rock." A rock provides protection and shelter and it is very solid. God's solidness is reliable: "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end" (Lam. 3:22).

But what does it mean to say that God is "the Father?" When God is called the Father, we do not mean God is the father of the world or the father of men and women. When we say God is the Father, we mean God is the Father of the Son – the Word who becomes flesh in Jesus Christ. It is through Christ that we receive the spirit of adoption by which we call God Father. (See Romans 8:15-17)

To say that God is the Father is to say God is in relationship with Jesus; and, by adoption, it is to say that God is in relationship with us in a very particular way. It is not a boss/slave relationship. It is a close, intimate, loving, compassionate relationship. "As a father has compassion for his children, so the LORD has compassion for those who fear him." (Psalm 103:13). (Cont'd on p.3)

The Property Committee will replace the present, rudimentary first aid kit, and a cadre of church members will be certified in cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and operation of automatic cardiac defibrillators (ACD), as well as standard first aid.

Four hours of training is required for certification, and two identical classes have been scheduled for Monday, May 1st, at 6:00 p.m. and Saturday, May 6th, at 8:30 a.m. Class size is limited, and trainees will be selected to maximize coverage. Medical professionals in the congregation, as first responders, are invited to audit to gauge the ability of the cadre. There will likely be a limited number of class slots for volunteers, and those members of the congregation wishing to volunteer should leave their names with Teresa Seldomridge in the church office. In addition, for planning purposes, those members already holding current certification are invited to list their availability with Teresa. Or it could have been Caleb. He didn't want to go to the prom with a grease monkey. Or Tiffany, she's up to no good. She probably didn't even know that she killed her.


Or Mr. Bardelucci.. He felt threatened by Alexis because she was smarter than him and was going to expose that he forged his degree. He just because he was a little too weird!

STEEPLE TO PEOPLE

Some call it an attack on Christianity and others a teaching moment. I'm referring to the movie "The Da Vinci Code." It is based on a book by the same title by Dan Brown that has now sold over 43 million copies. The story is a mixture of history and fiction, theology, church intrigue and murder. Theologian Rodney Clapp argues that it is based on a fundamentally Gnostic premise: that most of the church has been duped and that the *real* Christian belief is a secret that will now be divulged to the privileged reader. (*Christian Century*, May 16, 2006, p. 5)

The same issue of Christian Century included the following:

The early church adopted Matthew, Mark, Luke and John as the canonical Gospels because they omit earthly aspects of Jesus' life; the church rejected Gnostic gospels for the canon because those writings speak of Christ's ministry in very human terms. Actually, the opposite is more nearly the case. The Gospels present an at times scandalously human Jesus, whereas the Gnostic gospels assume a radical body-soul dualism and display an antagonism between God and all things material. (p.23)

On Sunday, June 25, I will preach a sermon on the Jesus of the canonical Gospels with some references to the later Gnostic versions. At 11:15 we will meet in the library for a discussion of "The Da Vinci Code," the book and/or movie. On Sunday, June 11, copies of a few articles will be available in the narthex and, of course, you may want to read the book or see the movie.

The second question of the Baptismal Covenant is:

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

Oh boy. There's a lot going on in this tiny little question.

Often you will hear people use the term, "Jesus the Christ." That's because "Christ" is not a surname for a man called Jesus of Nazareth. "Christ" is a title. It is the Greek translation of the Hebrew word, "messiah." "Messiah" means "anointed," and in ancient Israel, prophets, priests and kings were anointed with oil and consecrated (solemnly set apart) for the service to which they had been called. The use of the term "messiah" was quite restricted in ancient Hebrew texts. In the great majority of cases, the term "anointed" is connected with a royal figure.

When we apply the title "Christ" to Jesus, we affirm our conviction that Jesus is divinely appointed by God to work in a particular way on our behalf. Jesus is the Christ of God. The term "Christ" "received its content not through a previously fixed concept of messiahship but rather from the person and work of Jesus." (Freedman, D. N. (1996, c1992). The Anchor Bible Dictionary. New York: Doubleday.) The particular work of Jesus to which we refer is his death and resurrection. In the death and resurrection of Jesus, reconciliation with God becomes possible for us, and we are invited to participate in the intimate relationship between God and Jesus through our intimate relationship with Jesus. This is the essence of salvation. It is not a word we Presbyterians say aloud very often. The Apostle Peter is quite clear about this, though: "This Jesus is 'the stone that was rejected . . . [t]here is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among mortals by which we must be saved." (Acts 4:11-12)

Both Hebrew and Christian scriptures highlight the fact that, without divine assistance, the human relationship with the God of all creation is deplorably broken. Without the intervention of a "Christ," we are unable to achieve a life pleasing to God. Paul writes: "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." (Romans 3:23a). What is worse, Paul asserts in Romans 6:23a that "the wages of sin is death."

The good news (Gospel) is that Jesus <u>is the</u> Christ--the One whom God anointed to "proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, [and] to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." (Luke 4:18-19). Make no mistake about it; we who sin are the blind, the captive and the oppressed to whom and for whom God sent Jesus the Christ. The wages of sin may well be death, but the gift of God is forgiveness, reconciliation with God and eternal life, through and in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Romans 3:23b)

That's quite a lot, and it addresses only half the question. To be continued....

ETH'S BLURB

GODLY PLAY

The CE committee will be implementing a new Creative Enrichment curriculum in the fall called Godly Play for children age 3 – 2nd grade. Godly Play is a method of Christian education based on Montessori's approach to education and spiritual direction. The goal is to teach children the art of using religious language and to stimulate children's active participation in story and ritual. It is designed to awaken their creativity for the learning of parable, sacred story, silence, and liturgical action to help them become more fully aware of the mystery of God's presence around them and in their lives.

This curriculum uses wood and cloth manipulatives to illustrate the stories and allow the children to play out the stories themselves. Our hope is that this format will provide not just another educational opportunity for the children but that it would be a time of worship for them as well. As they leave the sanctuary on Sunday mornings, they would not be leaving worship but continuing worship as Godly Play.



"CURE AUTISM NOW" RACE A HUGE SUCCESS - On



Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God? In the Ancient Near East it was not unusual for the king to be called the "Son of God." Even in ancient Israel it was common to refer to the king in this way. "Son of God" was a title conferred upon kings, heavenly hosts, exalted angels and individuals perceived to be extremely righteous. In all these cases, to be called the "Son of God" meant also that you were God's servant – that divine sonship and service to God were inextricably linked. What's interesting is that for all the "Sons of God" who dwelt on earth in ancient days, not one of them called God "father." Well, not one of them called God "father," until Jesus.

In fact, Jesus called God "abba," a diminutive Aramaic term indicating the special familiarity and intimacy he shared with God. That the early church preserved this Aramaic term tells us just how important it is to our Christian understanding of who Jesus is and the uniqueness of his relationship with God – the relationship between the Father and the Son.

Kings and angels and righteous people became "Sons of God" during the course of their lifetimes. Their titles were conferred. However, in Jesus the eternal Son of God became a person. We affirm in the Nicene Creed that Jesus is the eternal Son of God, "of one Being with the Father." "It is not Jesus of Nazareth who becomes the Son of God; it is the Son of God who becomes Jesus of Nazareth." (Dictionary of Paul and his Letters) This is the very heart of the mystery of the Incarnation – God with us, assuming our humanity. In affirming Jesus as the Son of God, we profess that Jesus is God, participating in all God's attributes and roles, sharing in the Divine glory, and worthy to be worshiped and glorified.

The service Jesus rendered to God was his complete obedience. "He humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death-- even death on a cross." (*Phil. 2:8*) Through Jesus' death and resurrection we are reconciled with God "so that we might receive adoption as [God's] children. And because [we] are children, God has sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying, "Abba! Father!"" (*Gal. 4:5b-6*) Through Jesus we, too, may share a unique, intimate relationship with the Father.

In Matthew 16:16 the Apostle Peter confessed that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of this living God. This is the heart of the Christian faith. It is this confession that makes us Christian.





Grace and peace to you from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Savior! Greetings from Birmingham, Alabama, the site of the biennial General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) ("GA"). I brought everything I need to continue reflecting on our Baptismal vows, but so much is going on here I can't help wanting to share it with you. This is my fifth General Assembly. In 2001, I attended a class on GA Polity given by San Francisco Theological Seminary. I was hooked, and now I am a "GA Junkie." If there's a GA going on, I've just got to be there.

I arrived on Wednesday, June 14th, and immediately went to "Semper Reformanda," a forum sponsored by the Witherspoon Society – an advocacy group concerned with social justice issues. That evening I went to the Covenant Network Dinner and heard our own Susan Andrews (Head of Staff at Bradley Hills Presbyterian and 2003 Moderator of the General Assembly) speak about issues facing the assembly – most notably the report of the Theological Task Force for Peace, Unity and Purity of the Church. Covenant Network is an organization of churches that "envisions a church as generous and just as God's grace. [They] work to uphold and act on the Presbyterian Church's historic, progressive vision." Some would say they represent the liberal voice of the church.

On Wednesday, I attended the More Light Presbyterians' joyous National Celebration dinner. More Light Presbyterians statement reads: "Following the risen Christ, and seeking to make the Church a true community of hospitality, the mission of More Light Presbyterians is to work for the full participation of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people of faith in the life, ministry and witness of the Presbyterian Church (USA)." Needless to say, the primary issue of concern to the MLPs is ordination standards, and folks would say they represent the *very* liberal voice of the Presbyterian Church.

On Thursday, I went to the Women's Orientation Breakfast (they will know we are Christians 'cuz we eat!) sponsored by Women's Ministries the National Ministries Division. I always enjoy this breakfast (even if it is at 7 a.m.!!!). The Advisory Committee on Women's Concerns always does a great job of outlining the overtures across all committees that are of specific concern to women. I always walk away feeling really well informed.

Last Night was the Witherspoon Society Party and Dance – a not to be missed event if you're ever at an assembly.







In the Gospel according to John we read,

The Word became flesh and dwelt among us.

Theologians call this the incarnation. A frightened little boy was being comforted by his mother one night during a violent thunderstorm. As she prepared to leave his room she said, "Honey, God is with you." "I know," he said, "but I want someone with skin on."

The implications of incarnation are mysterious and downright practical. Take time for example. It is easy to remember extraordinary times. All of us know where we were and what we were doing when the planes flew into the twin towers on 9/11, just as the older ones among us remember the time and place when we heard the news that President Kennedy was shot, or the Japanese had bombed Pearl Harbor. Those moments take on a kind of sacred sense for their depth of pain and loss. Jesus walked this earth and knows what it feels like when tragedy strikes. He was, as Scripture says,

A man of sorrows and acquainted with grief.

Incarnation also means that Jesus knows the shape of ordinary time. He enjoyed the taste of food and drink, especially in the company of friends. He was a faithful son and a respected member of a trade. He practiced faith in the prescribed tradition of his community. He was sometimes disappointed by his friends and surprised by the welcome he received from strangers and outcasts. He marveled at the beauty of creation and demonstrated his love for children. He joined in a joyous wedding celebration and in fact provided the wine so that the festivities might continue. We make an affirmation of incarnation whenever we ask Jesus to be present for a simply meal or for the grand wedding celebration of a beloved daughter of son. "Come Lord Jesus be our guest."


ETH'S BLURB

Do you believe in God, the Holy Spirit? When our 7-year old grandson, Benjamin came to visit in July, he told me he had given his first sermon at a vespers service at his church. Needless to say, I was a little more than curious, so I asked Benjamin to tell me what the sermon was about. His sermon was about "God's Holy Spirit." Benjamin used Matthew 6:34 as his text ("So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today. NRSV), and he talked about how we don't have to worry because God's Holy Spirit will take care of us and help us get through each and every day. Benjamin told me it was God's Holy Spirit who made the disciples to speak a lot of different languages, even though they didn't know them (see

Acts 2:1-4). Then Benjamin said it also was God's Holy Spirit who helps us do things we don't think we can do.

Benjamin has managed to get his heart around one of the most elusive themes the bible and theology – the third person of the Trinity, the Holy Spirit. The Spirit is "the mysterious power or presence of God in nature or with individuals and communities, inspiring or empowering them with qualities they would not otherwise possess." The Spirit is not some ethereal wisp floating out in the ether. The Holy Spirit is real and active in our lives today.

We believe the Holy Spirit is God's *real* agent of creation. In Genesis 1 it was the Spirit of God who swept over the face of the formless void inspiring and initiating creation – "the Lord, the giver of life" "who continues to create and renew the church as the community in which men are reconciled to God and to one another." (C67, 9.20)

We believe the Holy Spirit is God's real presence in the covenantal community – the church. "From the beginning God created [us] for community and called a people into covenant.. The Holy Spirit calls, gathers, orders, and empowers the new community of the covenant. To each member, that Spirit gives gifts for building up the body of Christ and for equipping it for the work of ministry. A Christian's personal response to God is in community." (Directory for Worship, W-1.1005)

We believe the Holy Spirit is God's real source of inspiration and power. The Spirit spoke through the prophets, and it is the Holy Spirit who continues to speak to us today through scripture and proclamation, calling us continually to repentance and reconciliation with God and one another. What is really interesting is that the Spirit not only calls and inspires us, to be the people God calls us to be, but the Spirit also equips and empowers us to serve God in ways that often surprise us. God's Holy Spirit helps us do those things we don't think we can do.





"Share Abundantly" is our stewardship theme for 2007.

In Paul's Letter to the Corinthians he writes.

And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work.

II Corinthians 9:8

I would like to share two very different stories that illustrate abundant sharing. Dwayne Wade was the Most Valuable Player in this year's NBA finals. He has just completed his third year in the league and is already being compared to Michael Jordan. He tithes 10% of his 3.0 million income to his home church in Chicago.

Far away in upstate New York lives a lady named Rosa Murillo. She is often mistaken for a homeless person as people see her collecting cans all over the city of Troy. She is 89 years old and all the money she receives from the recycled cans goes to mission work at home and abroad. She came to the United States 40 years ago and worked for two families as a nanny. After retirement she set out on her "mission for the missions" as she calls it. Every year she gives about \$1,000. Her pastor says that every so often Rosa hands him a brown paper bag with a wad of cash in it. He distributes her donation to the needy in the community. And some is sent to missions in South America. She says, "I see collecting cans for mission as a way of showing gratitude to God for physical and mental health at my age."

Truly God has blessed us with abundance and invites us to share abundantly, and as the Apostle told the Corinthians,

God loves a cheerful giver.



ETH'S BLURB

When I hear the word "installed", I have visions of a new heating system or telephone lines being put in somewhere. I never really thought of myself as installed. But that is what I am now. Now I am not just called – but installed!

MISSION HAPPENINGS: SPOTLIGHT ON STEPPING STONES SHELTER



Have you ever wondered about the shelter which receives the items you donate to **The Big Yellow Box** in Fellowship Hall? It has an interesting history and provides wonderful services and hope to our area families in need.



Stepping Stones Shelter is the oldest shelter for homeless families in Montgomery County. It was founded in 1979 under the name of Gaithersburg Emergency House by citizens and

congregations who were concerned about the growing number of homeless families they were seeing in our area. It was started in a small townhouse, but the organizers soon realized that a larger structure was needed. In 1982 they purchased the Dawson family farmhouse in Rockville and renamed it the **Stepping Stones Shelter**. The farmhouse has six bedrooms, and six families of different sizes occupy the different sized rooms. At any time, the shelter houses 23-25 people of various ages.

The homeless men, women and children who reside at **Stepping Stones** are given the opportunity to regain their independence on a "step by step" basis. In addition to shelter, they are provided with food, clothing, case management and support services with special attention given to the needs of children of the participating families. The three broad goals of the shelter are: *Providing Hope for the Future, Strengthening Family Values*, and *Enabling Self-sufficiency*. These goals are accomplished through Adult Education Programs and Children's Support Services.

Residents must be willing to work to change their situation and be drug and alcohol free. Five paid staff and numerous volunteers provide 24 hour coverage. They work closely with families to help them get back on their feet and secure more permanent housing. Most families stay from three to four months except in exceptional circumstances.

Stepping Stones Shelter is privately owned and operated by Gaithersburg Emergency Housing, Inc., a non-profit coalition. It receives funding from state programs, the cities of Rockville and Gaithersburg, local community groups, synagogues, churches including our own, and individual community members.

When you donate to **The Big Yellow Box** throughout the year, know that you too will be helping homeless families as they struggle to get back on their feet. Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver.



Good News! A Window of Opportunity For Tax Free Withdrawal Of IRA Funds---Help PPC and Avoid Taxes!

Every year our **Finance Committee** wrestles with how to meet the budget during the Lean giving months when many of us are waiting to pay our pledge at the end of the year. It would be a great help if we



would pay all or part of our pledge "in advance." Now, thanks to a recently enacted tax law in 2006 and 2007 those of you over 70 ½ can give up to \$100,000 tax free directly from your IRA by your plan administrator to PPC to help make this happen. This means that individuals using a standard deduction can retain it and give a tax free deduction. It also provides a way to avoid future taxes on your IRA funds; and for those who want to defer withdrawing income from IRA's the gift applies to the "required minimum distribution." If you have questions, please contact your tax advisor.

KERRY ON...

I wonder if it would make a difference if we really began the New Year on the first Sunday of Advent rather than on January 1? It would be counter cultural to be sure. Christians could truly have a day and season of spiritual significance without any commercialization. The shift in tone would be dramatic as we begin the year waiting for the coming or arrival of Jesus. It is also a time to consider the coming of Christ again to reign as King of Kings and Lord of Lords. Reflection, longing and repentance would be the themes that mark the days until the celebration of the Incarnation. Each Sunday a candle is lighted until the Christ candle is aflame on Christmas day. We are moving toward "the true light that enlightens everyone." (John 1:9)

Beyond that day the year would unfold with light to the nations on Epiphany, and a second season (Lent) of reflection, longing and repentance leading to Easter. We know that a week called "holy" is coming and a day called "good." Then there is another time of waiting fifty days until the power of the Holy Spirit brings the church into being on Pentecost. The long season of Pentecost follows when we are called to remember that the power of that day enlivens our lives in today's world. This last season of the year is sometimes called "ordinary time." How appropriate for God has promised to meet us in the everyday, ordinary routine of life; in the small joys and sorrows, the small victories and defeats, the grace filled moments.

It might just make a real difference if we began the year with the story of Jesus rather than New Years Eve parties and non stop football on the first day of the year. What do you think?

The Baptismal Covenant (continued . . .)

In our Baptismal Covenant we profess there is one God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, *from* whom are all things and *for* whom we exist. We confess with the Saints that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God, *through* whom are all things and *through* whom we exist. We affirm that God's Holy Spirit calls, inspires, equips and empowers us to be the people God calls us to be.

Now what? Does this mean we can all say "amen," and go home to the Sunday New York Times? Ah! I think not. The Baptismal Covenant does not end with these three essential Christian affirmations. Now that we have affirmed our belief in all God has done and continues to do for us, it is our opportunity to respond to God in grateful obedience. How do we say 'thank you' to God? Well, here is what we have promised in our Baptismal Covenant:

Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread and in the prayers?

The apostles' teaching and fellowship... One of the tenets of the Reformed faith is our belief that God calls us to be the Church – the body of Christ living in covenant community "where people are reconciled to God and to one another." (Confession of 1967, 9.20, adapted) It is a community in which we come to know that God loves and accepts us in spite of what we are. In response, we accept ourselves and love others, knowing that no one has any ground on which to stand, except God's grace. (9.22, adapted)

We are called to live in a covenant community that affirms that "the one sufficient revelation of God is Jesus Christ, the Word of God incarnate, to whom the Holy Spirit bears unique and authoritative witness through the Holy Scriptures, which are received and obeyed as the word of God written. The Scriptures are not a witness among others, but the witness without parallel. The church has received the books of the Old and New Testaments as prophetic and apostolic testimony in which it hears the word of God and by which its faith and obedience are nourished and regulated." (9.27 adapted)

In the breaking of bread, and in the prayers... We are called to live in a covenant community that celebrates our "reconciliation with God and with one another by joyfully eating and drinking together at the table of our Savior. Jesus Christ gave us this remembrance of his dying for us sinners so that by participation in it we have communion with him and with all who shall be gathered to him. Partaking in him as we eat the bread and drink the wine in accordance with Christ's appointment, we receive from the risen and living Lord the benefits of his death and resurrection. We rejoice in the foretaste of the kingdom which he will bring to consummation at his promised coming, and we go out from the Lord's Table with courage and hope for the service to which we are called." (9.52, adapted) (continued on page 3)

It was, in many ways, love at first sight — church style! Three years ago, when I was called to be a deacon, I accepted the honor, in great part, because I wanted to be a part of what made this church so welcoming to members and newcomers, alike. As I've served, however, I have received ten-fold. It has been an amazing blessing! As I finish my term as deacon and return to "civilian" life, I carry with me the comfort in knowing that I am at home at PPC and that my children will grow and learn here. I pray that each of us continues to hold each other in our heart.




In Case of Inclement Weather
