

t's a do-over! Do you remember that phrase? When we were

kids playing games, if the dice fell off the board (and we didn't like the number that turned up), we would immediately shout, "it's a do-over!" Or, if our playing piece went out of bounds and was officially unplayable (as often happens when playing Skelly), we would immediately shout, "it's a do-over." We would then quickly grab the dice or playing piece and try again – before someone had a chance to stop us. Whether or not we got that second chance largely depended upon the rules of the game (that is, of course, assuming there were any), the whim of our opponents or whether or not there was time to play out the game before we had to go in for dinner.

It's a do-over! We've entered into that season of do-overs. Of course, now that we're grown-ups we call them New Year's resolutions. It is the season when the diet centers are full to overflowing and we have to wait for our favorite machine at the gym – even at six o'clock in the morning! It is the season when the "Anonymous" groups experience a spike in attendance, résumés are dusted off and beefed up and acupuncturists and smoking cessation clinics record a sudden surge in income. It is the season when financial planners and debt consultation services are required to extend their hours. Even if we don't do New Year's resolutions, the month of January cannot go by without at least thinking about the fact we haven't done any. It is the season when we try to change our lives – for the better.

It's a do-over. What parts of our lives are 'out of bounds' and need amending? What new habit(s) of improvement can we cultivate in the coming year? The joy of the Christian life is that we don't restrict our "do-overs" to a specific season of the year. For us, every day is a "do-over." Only we don't call our "do-overs" resolutions; we call them confessions. Every day we have the privilege of examining our lives in light of what God has done for us, and in light of what God requires: to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with our God (Micah 6:8). Every day we have an opportunity to tell God the truth about our lives – to share with God our failures as well as our successes. And, every day we have God's own assurance that if we confess our sins, our God who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness (1 John 1:9). And, through the power of the Holy Spirit we have been given everything needed for life and godliness (2 Peter 1:3). In other words,



STEEPLE TO PEOPLE

Potomac Presbyterian Church FEBRUARY 2008

KERRY ON... I began pastoral ministry in the 1970's and when preachers, that's what we were called in Tennessee, got together the conversation soon turned to questions about how many. How many did you have in Sunday School, Worship, Bible Study, Women of the Church Circles? Another question was, are you in a building program and how is the fund drive going or what is your budget this year? To me there was something not quite right about these questions as if growth and faithfulness could be measured by numbers alone.

The other popular option was to join a support group of pastors facilitated by a counselor and such questions and topics were not discussed. Rather we focused on issues of pastoral care, difficult relationships and conflict management. I found this approach more helpful especially for a young minister starting out but it was centered on the pastor as an individual practitioner and not the congregation as the locus of ministry and mission.

As the years have passed the conversation has shifted. Today when pastors get together we often talk about mission, the hands on dedicated involvement of our congregations in reaching out with the Good News in word and in deed. We talk about mission trips for high school and college students, as well as adults. The conversation comes alive as we tell about trips to New Orleans to rebuild houses, Habitat for Humanity projects, youth work camps. We tell about long and steady, often unnoticed serving in soup kitchens and homeless shelters. Stories are shared about doctors and engineers and business men and women being sent out by congregations to serve around the world. It's not the size of the congregation that matter most. It is the extent to which the congregation is giving itself away. This was exemplified for us by First Presbyterian Church in New Orleans, devastated in numbers and dollars after Katrina, but a shining beacon and facilitator of mission in their community.

Growing in mission is what I talk about with colleagues when they ask about Potomac Presbyterian Church. I believe we are moving along this journey called faithfulness. There is so much need and we have great potential to keep on growing. Thank you all for allowing me to talk with others about PPC with profound gratitude.

eems to me it was just Christmas, and here we are, preparing for Lent! Lent is early

this year – it's about as early as it will ever be. But, it probably never is too early to be in a season of prayer and reflection; a time of soul-searching and repentance. This is what Lent is for us.

When we approach Lent sincerely and honestly, we cannot escape our brokenness. We cannot ignore that all creation groans – awaiting the day when God's purposes are fulfilled and we live in full reconciliation with God, with one another and with all God has created. When we approach Lent sincerely and honestly, we cannot help but recognize we all need the healing touch of the Master's hand.

The Deacons Lenten service on February 27th will be a Service of Wholeness and Healing. It will be a time for us to reflect on our need for God's amazing grace that fills us and empowers us to grow in our relationship with God. A grace that deepens our commitment to a way of life rooted in our baptism. This service of Wholeness and Healing will center in on prayer – spoken and sung – and will include a service of anointing as well as the Lord's Supper.

This is not a new activity for the church. Healing services are an ancient and accepted practice that is experiencing revival in the church today. We recognize in our busy, oversubscribed lives that indeed, we all sin and come short of the God's glory. The healing we need is not always only physical. We often find ourselves approaching God's throne of grace emotionally spent and sometimes spiritually bruised. Where else can we go to find the balm that heals our sinsick souls?

Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. James 5:14

The laying on of hands and the anointing with oil show the power of touch, which plays a central role in the healings recorded in the New Testament. The Directory for Worship reminds us that "Healing was an integral part of the ministry of Jesus which the church has been called to continue as one dimension of its concern for the wholeness of people. Through services for wholeness, the church enacts in worship its ministry as a healing community. Anointing with oil is an act invoking the healing love of God. The oil points beyond itself to the action of the Holy Spirit and the presence of the healing Christ who is God's anointed one."

Deacon Kathy McPherson, Elder Dan Dowd and I attended a Service of Wholeness and Healing at Georgetown Presbyterian Church not too long ago. It was a moving experience that highlighted for us the realization that spiritual healing is God's work of offering persons balance, harmony and wholeness of body, mind, spirit and relationships through confession, forgiveness and reconciliation.

Our prayer is that you will be part of this movement of God that extends to us an opportunity to experience God's love in a new way.



Without a doubt, the consensus is that the team's inaugural mission was a tremendous success. Thanks be to Team PPC, and to all those who supported this endeavor!

On Sunday, January 13, the team members sported their "Rebuild New Orleans" hats and "PC-USA: Out of Chaos, Hope" T-shirts, and marched into church to tell their tales of destruction mitigated by hard work; despair tempered by acts of caring; and manual labor punctuated with Christian fellowship, sumptuous New Orleans cuisine, and legendary jazz outings. The Scripture readings that day sang praises for God's care (Psalm 147) and spoke eloquently of faith in action (James 2: 14-18). Kerry and team members Peter Russo and Janet Dunlop shared the team's story with the children and with the congregation through their poignant and heartfelt reflections of the New Orleans experience.

Peter spoke of his deeply ingrained family connection to the city of New Orleans, and of "...the generosity that this mission trip uncovered. Strangers, acquaintances, and close friends sent donations and well wishes when they couldn't send their bodies.... At the work site, the next door neighbor, a security guard at a local school, would smile at us on his way to work. I was astonished by the power of a warm smile from a passerby who took notice of us. His hope passed to me through that smile. In one motion, it showed grace and thanksgiving...

Why does New Orleans matter? Where else can individuals from all over the country come and form a bond sealed by joy and grief? Before this mission trip, I barely knew many of the people in the group. They were just faces at Coffee Hour... Now... I feel like I've made a friend in every member of the group. It's an unlikely union of college student and members of an older generation. And I have New Orleans to thank for bringing us together."

The Wright Note

A year ago I remember writing an article about a magic moment of creativity that turned a smaller than usual children's choir rehearsal into a memorable time of musical discovery and musical composition.

Well, it has happened again! This time it was on January 6th, the first rehearsal of the Sunrise Singers after the New Year. I decided to teach the children Helen Kemp's rhythmic setting of the seasons of the Christian year.

In a somewhat sing-song speech style in four-four time, we started chanting the season names: Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter alleluia and a Pentecost event.

Not only did I want to teach the name of the liturgical seasons, but I wanted the children to learn the rhythmic note values which formed a framework for this speech exercise.

When all was proceeding quite well, I decided that the children might like to compose a tune to further highlight the text. A simple third space C to middle C octave on half notes emerged for Advent and Christmas. Then the light bulb came on! Why not introduce the song with the word Gloria on a dotted quarter, eighth note, half note pattern? Then Noah Pereles started improvising a jazzy rhythm pattern following the Gloria and between each statement of a different season.

We began adjusting rhythms and pitches to work in a four-four structure. Our tune stayed fairly simple using mostly octaves and fifths. Hurray! The children were singing in clear, head-voice tones on the upper C's. We also added some inventive sound effects to climax the rest marking at the end of the Pentecost segment.

By 9:40 a.m., the three sleepy singers who had reluctantly crawled out of bed to come to a 9:00 a.m. choir rehearsal, were sitting on the floor (me, too), enthusiastically "jamming" an original interpretation of the liturgical year. As the children exited, I could hear Grace singing her way down the hall and saying to her brother, Noah, "This was really fun!"

Janet Dunlop spoke of how her perceptions had been challenged and altered during the trip. Where she had seen destruction and devastation, the locals saw revitalization and progress. Where she had seen a beautiful sanctuary devoid of members, "The members of First Presbyterian Church measured the church's revitalization by the number of children's voices hearing the children's message rather than in the number of pews that still remained empty." Where she had seen, by Potomac standards, a wreck of a home barely worth repairing, she saw Maria, a homeowner, whose entire family's hopes and dreams lay in that house. "When I met Maria, I knew immediately why we had been sent to New Orleans." Finally, Janet said,

I must admit that when I first heard about this trip I wondered whether the money that it would cost to send us to New Orleans couldn't be better spent by simply sending the money to the Presbyterian Disaster fund and allowing them to hire professionals to do the work. After all, I thought what could a team like ours really hope to accomplish in a week? And although many of the team members may have shared this concern in the beginning, I do not believe they share it now. In Matthew chapter 5 verses 13-14, we read, "You are the light of the world. A city on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before men, that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in heaven." Too often I think that we let fear, fear of inadequacy, fear of failure, keep us from using the talents that God has given us in his service to demonstrate the power of God's love to others in need. So we traveled to New Orleans and we reconstructed a porch roof, we pulled up a floor, we replaced rotten framing, we pulled thousands of nails, we reorganized a tool shed, we landscaped a church, we cut ceiling tiles, we spackled and we painted, but most importantly we served as a beacon of God's light to remind this devastated community that they were not alone and that they were not forgotten.

The next time we are called to do mission work, whether it be in New Orleans, Ecuador, Botswana, Bangladesh, or in Sophia House, Miriam's Kitchen, or anywhere else near or far, will you "come marching in" and "want to be in that number?"



The "Parlor" Adult Sunday School class (someday we need to come up with another name) has been studying the "Fruit of the Spirit": love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. (*Galatians 5:22-23*) Last Sunday we completed the lesson on kindness, and it occurred to me that the root of all the Fruit seems to be gratitude. At the root of the Fruit is living in thankfulness and appreciation for all God has done and for all God will do. I've got a sneaky suspicion that when I become more attentive to what God is doing, I will inevitably discover that

God has been doing a lot of stuff in and through other people that I just haven't noticed.

I know I should know better, and do better, but I just don't spend every waking moment thinking about the things I should be thankful for. What would happen if I spent more time in my day dwelling on the things that are true, honorable, just, pure, pleasing, commendable, excellent and worthy of praise? (See Philippians 4:8)

- Maybe I would actually notice the good in things that happen rather than complaining about the negative stuff. If noticing the good stuff became a habit, maybe I'd start *looking* for those good things that happen all around me. (Joy and Peace!)
- Maybe by searching for the positive aspects of *all* events I would start to learn lessons from those circumstances I perceive to be obstacles. (A little patience and self-control maybe?)
- Maybe by focusing on the wonderful things I have to be thankful for, I will be more kind and loving to the people I come in contact with each day. (Generosity, kindness, love, joy)
- Maybe, if I paid more attention to God's grace in my life, I'll be more likely to follow Christ's own teaching to "do to others as I would have them do to me." (Matthew 7:12) (Faithfulness, patience, kindness, gentleness?)

Maybe, maybe, maybe. I know this sounds a bit hokey, but cultivating an "attitude of gratitude" is easier said than done, and I need a little help. So, I've decided to take the "no complaint" challenge. Perhaps you've heard of it. Rev. Will Bowen, a pastor in Missouri, challenged his congregation to swear off complaining, criticizing, gossiping or using sarcasm for 21 days. People who joined in the challenge were given little purple bracelets saying, "A Complaint Free World," as a reminder of their pledge. If they caught themselves complaining, they were to take off the bracelet, switch it to the opposite wrist and start counting the days from scratch. Believe it or not, this has turned into an international movement.

I think the hardest part of this, at least for a while, will be catching myself. So, if <u>you</u> catch me being less than gracious in my dealings, would you please tap me on the shoulder and let me know? I'll need to move my bracelet and start counting all over again.

Thanks. P.S. If you'd like to join the "no complaint" challenge, I happen to have a supply of the bracelets in my study. Just let me know.

NEWS FROM YOUR CHURCH HEALTH TEAM

Your church health team has prepared this guide for our journey together at PPC. There have been many questions that you understandably have about passionate spirituality. And with prayer, and discussion, and contemplation, we offer these four tenets. None of these is a single "dose" item, but each offers a way for each of us to rethink how we interact with God and our fellow congregants. This isn't a quick fix, but a faith style enhancement, to be implemented and used daily! The bonus of all of this should be a new awareness in every aspect of our lives, as we develop new skills individually and together! This is an exciting time for us, as a committee, as Presbyterians, as members of PPC, and as believers.

"Spiritual Interconnectedness" As a congregation do we feel connected with one another? People really need to make a connection with other members in ways that offer opportunities to get to know one another outside the worship service. Participation in small church groups is one way to connect: Bible study, faith sharing, Sunday school or Godly Play, book club, chorus, bell choir, youth groups, or any of the committees, deacons and elders. The creation of new small groups and participation in mission projects are all examples of how each of us can connect outside of worship. Discussion of experiencing God in any aspect of life for example: at home with your family, at work with business acquaintances, at play with friends or social events. Do you sense God's work and word in your daily life? There are numerous testimonials each of us could share, of experiencing God, but do we? It's time to start.

"Enthusiasm for Church" Do the people around you even realize you are a Christian, let alone a Presbyterian and a member of PPC? Do you use your spiritual gifts in furthering the ministries of the church? Now look closer, within your relationships at church. Analyze what it means to be in this community of faith, and share it with others! Share the experience you had within a small group with someone who wasn't there. Invite them to join you next time! 

KERRY ON... Robin Givhan wrote in a March 9 Washington Post column,

"It would be tempting to explain our impatience by invoking the old saw that our lives have gotten so crowded that a million different things are competing for every second of our attention. Or that because we have developed a fast cut, post MTV attention span, we don't have patience for long, drawn out processes. Yet we are capable of spending hours futzing with our MySpace pages, downloading ringtones, posting our photos on line and text messaging our friends. Our attention is limited only when we are not the central focus."

I heard recently of something new to add to our prayer of confession; text-messaging during the worship service. Worship in a significant way runs counter to the regular pattern of most of our lives. It can be a deep experience of God if we are patient and purposefully attentive to the language of praise and prayer, scripture and sacrament, calling and dedication. It is intentionally a time apart and essential to living lives of wholeness.

The Apostle names the fruit of the Spirit in Galatians 5:22 and we usually hear this inspired list in individual terms and in relation to daily life. What if we heard them again as the language that shapes worship? What if we prepared ourselves to worship God and asked for this fruit to be evident in our community gathered to praise God and listen for God's Word? I believe our time together would take on deeper meaning in the midst of a busy, over committed, multitasking world.

The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self control.




Sigh.

DEACONS CORNER

As the deadline for this issue of "Steeple to People" was fast approaching, I was struggling with what to write about, and what would be an appropriate topic for this Lenten season. I was at a complete loss, until I found a brief devotional about Easter, that I would like to share with you.

From "Easter: The Deepest Mystery, the Highest Hope", by The Rev. Dr. Douglass Bailey.

In that wonderful Academy Award-winning film *Shakespeare in Love*, there is a funny and recurring line from one of the characters. He seems to be responsible for producing the play that Will Shakespeare is struggling to write. At numerous

points in the story, people demand of the producer how the play will unfold and end. His consistent reply, with a hilariously funny gesture, is, "I don't know. It's a mystery!"

Therein is a great line for Easter. And, it's a good line for the story of your life and mine. How will it unfold? How will it end? Will there be a new beginning? "I don't know. It's a mystery!"

Good Friday declares that Jesus died, brutally and lonely. The Gospel writers seem preoccupied with his crucifixion. Events surrounding Jesus' trial and execution constitute almost 60 percent of the Gospel story. The record is clear. We profess it in our creeds. Jesus died. And one day or night, so will we.

Then, in the words of that great African-American poem by James Weldon Johnson, "Then comes that great gittin' up mornin'." Then comes Easter. He is alive again. "Alleluia! He is risen!" Whereas the details of Christ's death are vivid and descriptive, the details of his Easter are shadowed, sketchy, limited. "It's a mystery." But, it's the deepest and most true of all mysteries.

On this we bet our lives: "Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again, within our life. In Christ, we are risen." Yes, it's a deep but glorious mystery. And, our highest hope! "Let us kept the Feast. Alleluia!" Dave Boyd


of musical presentation.



KERRY ON... At the end of worship some people may complain that they did not care for the hymns we sang. As someone said, "That's ok. We weren't singing to you."

(Craig Barnes, "Relevance," Presbyterian Outlook, March 17, p.23)

The observation about hymns reminds me of a story told by Bill Moyers, an ordained Baptist minister, who served in the Johnson administration. The President asked Mr. Moyers to pray at some meeting in the White House and at the conclusion of the prayer he said to Moyers, "You need to speak up Bill, I couldn't hear you." The reply, "Mr. President, I wasn't speaking to you."

In worship we may have our hearts "strangely warmed." Hymn writers often communicate this sense of awe and the mystery of God's grace, yet hymns are most often addressed to God. Music and word facilitates communication with the Divine. We join our voices with the faithful who have gone before us and those who are united with us around the world today.

We may be invited to think deep thoughts and wrestle with big questions. The Bible offers profound insight into the meaning of life and raises questions that continue to confound the intellect. It is not so much an answer book, but raises profound issues in the context of God's amazing grace. "What shall it profit a man if he gains the whole world and loses his soul?" What does the Lord require, "but to do justice and love mercy and walk humbly with your God?"

Before we leave we will hear some word of challenge. "Take Jesus with you" was the message we heard on Youth Sunday. Make a connection between faith professed in a worship service and taking an exam in a classroom, a project at work, a meeting at the community center, a ride in the car with your child. Like prayer, our everyday lives are intended by grace to be addressed to God.

Nothing in this composition is to be construed or interpreted as a complaint. These are my humble observations. Really.

Okay. I wasn't going to talk about complaining again, other than to say the last time I had to move my bracelet was April 4th. However, one of my colleagues turned me on to "Complaints Choirs" which have been popping up all over the world. So, in the time-honored tradition of theological research, I Googled and found that, indeed, the first official Complaints Choir was formed in Birmingham, England probably in the early 2000s. (No date was given.)

Complaints Choirs invite people in a town to submit their complaints. Some wildly creative and talented person sets the complaints to music and the song is performed to the encouragement and delight of town residents.¹ These choirs take the energy people put into complaining and transform it into more positive emotion. The complaining turns from grousing to a vehicle for community solidarity and mutual encouragement. Sort of like Psalms of Lament – those Psalms in which the people of God pour out their pain and grief and sorrow. A conservative estimate places the number of Psalms of Lament at fifty-seven (out of 150).² So it would seem the notion of Complaints Choirs isn't all that new.

Just like the complaint songs I heard, a Psalm of Lament doesn't beat around the bush. The Psalm, however, typically begins by addressing God and acknowledging God's sovereignty. Then the Psalmist immediately launchs into the complaint. Petition is made, and in case the message isn't clear, additional focus maybe is brought to bear.³

Some Psalms of Lament incorporate elements of praise and thanksgiving within the context of deep sorrow and pain. All Psalms of Lament express hope (sometimes implicitly) that God will, indeed, have mercy on us. That God will make obvious the steadfast love that is promised to see us through difficult circumstances.

When you think about it, we say Psalms of Lament every Sunday when we raise the Prayers of the People in worship. The thoughts expressed in these prayers are not grabbed from thin air. Not at all. During the week we try very hard to listen to your hearts and hear your hearts' desires. As pastors we listen to your concerns for our families, our community, our country and our world. We rejoice with great thanksgiving for the blessings you express. When we come together on Sunday, we gather all these expressions and lift them to God – joys and sorrows, thanksgivings and concerns – they all come together in prayer.

One of the ministers may be standing at the Communion table saying the words, but our prayer is that you experience your prayers rising to God in our words — and that the Prayers of the People provide a vehicle for community solidarity and mutual encouragement as we together seek God's face.


Introducing... Thursday Spirit



A number of you are already aware that your Property Committee has been working on improving the crawl space beneath the Sanctuary and Narthex to remediate persistent moisture problems. But what you may not be aware of is that in the midst of the project, we determined that a good portion of duct work had to be repaired or replaced in order to finish the project. As well, our project consultant had estimated that our system air loss was as high as 60%. This added project scope required additional capital improvement funds totaling \$18,000. This investment will allow our

church to take advantage of the much improved HVAC air flow, and will help in reducing our related utility expenses now and in the future.

PRESBYTERIAN DISASTER ASSISTANCE MYANMAR

PDA is responding in Myanmar as a member of and in partnership with Action by Churches Together (ACT) International and Church World Service. Both entities have local partners in Myanmar and will have representatives to help in the provision of relief items to cyclone survivors. Please support Myanmar and PDA's assistance efforts with your prayers and donations.

CHINA

An earthquake moved mountains and buildings.
They're hoping it also moves your heart.

The shocks and tremors of the devastating earthquake in southwest China affected more than 20 provinces and killed at least 55,000 people. An additional 25,000 are missing, and many are in relief camps without proper shelter, food or clean water.

WHAT IS BEING DONE

PDA is providing ongoing support to the Amity Foundation, our local and long-term mission partner in China. Amity, a fellow member of Action by Churches Together (ACT International, is taking the lead in the ACT response. \$50,000 from One Great Hour of Sharing funds has been sent to help with the distribution of 240,000 kilos of rice to 16,000 people and plastic sheeting and quilts to provide shelter and warmth to 8,000 families impacted by the disaster. Following the initial crisis phase, Amity will assist in rebuilding communities, including 600 homes, 10 schools and 5 clinics. Other rehabilitation assistance will target destroyed or severely damaged water and irrigation systems.



PRAY for all those whose lives have been affected directly and indirectly by the cyclone in Myanmar, and for those working with them toward recovery. Keep the people of China, their families and those assisting in the recovery process in your prayers.



I admit it. I am an unrepentant GA Junkie. I love meeting people from all across the country and learning about their hopes and dreams for the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). I love spending large portions of each day talking about and immersed in matters that concern us as Presbyterian disciples of Jesus Christ.

I wish everyone could experience an entire General Assembly – attending both Committee meetings and the Assembly plenary sessions. I wish everyone could feel the Holy Spirit moving in a room full of very diverse people who hold disparate opinions. But, regardless of what commissioners thought before they got there, almost everyone came to the assembly desiring to discern God's will for God's people.

I sat in on the Church Orders Committee – the Committee that dealt with some of the most controversial overtures that came before the Assembly. If you would have asked me on Monday whether they would vote the way they did, I would have said "no way." However, as the days progressed and as the Committee worshiped and prayed together, the presence of the Holy Spirit was palpable. I could feel a shift in the air as the Committee members' knowledge and understanding of the issues deepened. The Committee listened to overture advocates and opponents. It held open hearings to hear from anyone having an opinion on the subjects at hand. They consulted regularly with a representative from the Advisory Committee on the (PCUSA) Constitution. They heard from Robert A. J. Gagnon, Associate Professor of New Testament, Pittsburgh Theological Seminary and P. Mark Achtemeier, Associate Professor of Systematic Theology, University of Dubuque Seminary. It was all quite impressive.

The Assembly did a lot of good things. It took also some actions that might make some of us nervous. But, just because we are nervous doesn't mean it is not a good thing for us to think about and talk about those issues. There is no way for me to go into the many actions of the Assembly. 

INTERFAITH WORKS SERVING THE COMMUNITY FOR PPC AND FOR OUR NEIGHBORS IN NEED

For the last five years it has been my privilege to represent this congregation and to serve our community as a member of the Board of Directors of a faith-based coalition of local faith communities seeking humbly to worship our God by loving kindness and seeking justice in our local County. Through Community Ministry of Montgomery County, now operating with a new name as Interfaith Works, but with the same great mission, thousands of needy persons, men, women, and children--the working poor, the frail elderly with limited income or family assistance, the mentally or physically ill, those suffering from destructive addictions, or those afflicted by a lack of education, language or job skills, or simply those with too much hard, yet too little good, luck--have been helped. They have found food when hungry, housing when homeless, skills training when unschooled, and counseling when in despair. You have reached out to them in their hour of need through your support of the mission budget of PPC. Your financial support has enabled PPC to make generous annual donations to this ministry. Thank you.

Among just a few of the service programs of Interfaith Works are its housing initiatives such as the Community Based Shelter, which our congregation provisions one week each winter, and Sophia House, where we provide meals once a month. Interfaith Works also operates over 25 transitional/permanent subsidized, supported housing for needy families. Its Interfaith Clothing Centers enable those on limited budgets whose earnings often are used entirely for housing and food, to clothe themselves and their loved ones in decent attire. New infants receive baby layettes, and school supplies are distributed each fall to those in need. Do you remember how exciting as a child it was to get a new binder and pencils each new school year? Below is more information about the school "backpack" program. Perhaps you, your office or one of your church or social groups would like to participate and make a special donation to this effort.

Interfaith Works seeks to identify the stranger's need and to meet it as noted above. But another aspect to its mission is to learn more about why the poor stranger needs help; to educate our community about ways to improve that stranger's lot; and to engage our faith communities in redressing the identified causes. In pursuit of that goal, Interfaith Works has hosted conferences for area caregivers to share ideas and learn from each other's experiences, and has also sponsored panel discussions led by area clergy to speak from a faith perspective on timely topics-immigration policies, their effect on poverty, etc.

While my term as Chair of the Board of Directors comes to a close July 1 this year, I have one more year on the Board. So, my friends, stay tuned for more from me about this wonderful organization.



KERRY ON... What do we think of the place of creeds and confession in our Christian life if we think of them at all? Most likely we only think of them during a worship service when the Pastor asks the congregation to stand and affirm what we believe. The Presbyterian answer is that they are authentic and reliable expositions of what Scripture leads us to believe and do.

I recently read the fourth chapter of I Corinthians in Eugene Peterson's translation <u>The Message</u>. He is talking to the congregation about how he and other apostles are guides to the meaning of God's power and wonder and mystery. I think his expression can be transferred to the historic affirmations of faith.

Creeds and Confessions are guides into God's most sublime secrets not security guards posted to protect them. (I Cor. 4:1)

What an affirming image; we cherish an excellent guide when we are exploring the sublime secrets of the wilderness, or of the human genome. We trust our guides and learn more about believing and doing than we could possibly have done on our own. On the other hand, security guards sole purpose is to keep us out and keep whatever they are guarding from being touched and handled. Interaction with the mystery is not allowed and we are only permitted to observe.

The next time we stand to affirm our faith, think of the creed as a trusted and reliable, surprising and joyful guide to real life.

Our hotel in Aspen provides complimentary internet access using either hard-wired or wireless technology. It wasn't long after we arrived that I signed on, going the wireless route. Everything was fine . . . initially. There I was surfing through the worldwide web, checking email and making sure no one had cloned my MasterCard when all of a sudden things ground to a halt. The balloon at the bottom of the screen said: "low or no connectivity." That never is a good sign. In a couple of seconds things picked up again and I was surfing away, but before I knew it, I hit another one of those proverbial brick walls. There I was, stalled until the wireless genies woke up again to carry my information across the airwaves. This happened enough times that I finally plugged in and went on-line hard-wired.

This experience got me to thinking about spirituality and Christian life. It seems to me there are two kinds of Christians – wireless and hard-wired. I'm sure we all know people who like to say they are deeply spiritual, but not religious. As a matter of fact, I know *Christians* who would say this very thing. These Christians will say that attending worship is nice, but not essential to Christian life. Some might even think the term "spiritual disciplines" is the Christian equivalent of a four letter word. After all, we are "saved by grace," so there's nothing for us to work at. These Christians, I think, are wireless. They don't attach to anything about the Christian life that gives it shape and form. In my humble (but not to be dismissed) opinion, these folks may want to consider hard-wiring.

What are our hard wires? Well, reading and studying scripture would be one. Regularly and "deliberately focusing on God" using the words God gave us so that we might know who God is and what God does – that most definitely is a hard wire. "The Bible is . . . the inspired written witness. . . by which God discloses the divine being and purpose." If we want to know what God desires for us, regular reading and digesting the words in The Book is essential. (See, Michael L. Lindvall, *The Christian Life: A Geography of God.*)

Prayer would be another hard wire. Prayer is an expression of our relationship with God. As in all relationships, the health and vitality of our relationship to God depends on the "clarity and frequency of communication." If we have a relationship with God, we pray. It's a given. (See, Marjorie J. Thompson, Soul Feast: An Invitation to the Christian Spiritual Life.)

A third hard wire would be worship. Worship is the gathered community enacting Kingdom living. It is where everyone is welcome, accepted and encouraged and where everyone's attention is focused on the living God among us. It is where we come to openly love and adore 'the Lamb at the center of the throne who is our shepherd, and who guides us to springs of the water of life.' (See Revelation 7:17)

Sr. Joan Chittister of the Benedictine Sisters of Erie once said, "Spirituality . . . needs to attach to the best of the tradition. It cannot stand alone. If spirituality comes only from me, I have become my own God. The function of [religious practice] is to feed spirituality." In other words, the function of religious practice is to provide our much needed hard-wire.

I am writing this in Aspen. If I had the Christian Education brochure available, I would list for you the opportunities we have at PPC for children, youth <u>and</u> adults to be hard-wired Christians. Be sure to pick one up. Then, plug into one of those hard-wires!





KERRY ON...

Three Guides for the fall season. In my sermons for September I offered these words of encouragement and challenge; something to avoid, something to do and something to hope for. What we want to avoid are inaction regrets and in the words of the traditional confession, "the things we have left undone." When people look back at their lives as a whole, inaction regrets outnumber action regrets 84% to 16%.

In a poem by Ogden Nash he writes,

Because the suitable things you didn't do give you a lot more trouble than the things you did.

The moral is that it is probably better not to sin at all, but if some kind of sin you must be pursuing,

Well, remember to do it by doing, rather than by not doing.

What we want to do is forgive as we have been forgiven. "Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors," we have prayed countless times as we said the Lord's Prayer. What amazes us is the astounding forgiveness of our Lord and the call to be forgivers as a consequence of what the Lord has done for us. Martin Luther said,

Being able to forgive others is evidence that God's work of forgiveness is at work in us.

Physical and emotional scars are reminders of hurts that have been inflicted upon us, but scars are also signs of healing and grace.

We also sometimes simply have to make it through the day and hold on to some sign of hope for the future. The words of the old hymn have a very personal and powerful meaning for me and I hope for you as well.

Strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow, Great is Thy faithfulness. Morning by morning new mercies I see; All I have needed Thy hand hath provided; great is thy faithfulness

Lord unto me.


After coming to the States, Mark joined Covenant Presbyterian Church in Woodbridge, Virginia where he served as Elder for Evangelism and Mission. In June, 2000, Mark joined a small group of Ghanaians that had been traveling from Maryland to Woodbridge to worship at a Ghanaian Congregation. This group began worshiping at the Hilton Hotel in Silver Spring and it was the genesis of the Ghanaian Presbyterian congregation which now has more than 150 members. This congregation was accepted as a Fellowship of National Capital Presbytery in 2004. Mark served as Lay Leader in this congregation while he studied for his Master of Divinity at Louisville Seminary. This growing congregation worships on Sunday afternoons in the Sanctuary of Oaklands Presbyterian Church in Laurel, Maryland, although most of its membership lives in the 270/Silver Spring corridor.

It is my joy to be the National Capital Presbytery liaison to this congregation. For several years I have been working, joining in fellowship and worshiping with Mark, his wife, Juliana and the members and friends of this maturing, expanding congregation. If you ever want to experience the joy of the Lord Ghanaian style, let me know. I'd be more than pleased to accompany you to worship with these brothers and sisters.

Mark's passion is that all people would seek to celebrate our rich and beautiful diversity for the common good. Mark deeply believes that "joy and happiness are never fully enjoyed and appreciated until they are shared with others."

MISSION NEWS - Mission to Ecuador

For 27 years, Caritas Por Cristo has been involved in children's health care in Latin America, with a focus on Ecuador. Por Cristo, based in Boston, carries out this mission in four ways by supporting:

- A free-standing nutrition and health center for women and children in a very depressed area of Guayaquil, Ecuador.
- A community health / TB project in Jaime Roldas, Ecuador.



- Institution-strengthening through teaching medical expertise and technical assistance.
- Donations of medical equipment and supplies to clinics and hospitals.

The children's cardiac team will be making its 19TH trip to Ecuador, the 13TH to Quito, starting Friday, 24 October 2008. This 8-day mission will carry out the principal goal of Por Cristo: Teach the Ecuadorian health professionals how to do more and do it better with the available resources. Cardiac surgery, interventional cardiac catheterizations, echocardiograms, lectures and hours of bedside teaching will keep the team busy for the week.

Each year, many, many dollars worth of donated supplies and equipment are brought to the Children's Charity Hospital in Quito, the capital of Ecuador. These items allow the doctors and nurses to use updated equipment to care for their cardiac patients. Because of this, we have seen remarkable progress and improvements in many areas of pediatric cardiac care.

This year, the 14 medical volunteers come from 5 major pediatric centers in the United States. Over 200 different volunteers have made the trip – many have gone 10 or 15 times.

Funding for Caritas, Por Cristo is 100% from private sources. The Potomac Presbyterian Church has been an important donor for a decade. Por Cristo, the cardiac team, and especially the Ecuadorian children are most grateful for the generous support.



KERRY ON... Over the past few weeks I have been reflecting on the rich experience of mutual caring that marks the life of our congregation. A phone call comes in and I am off to the home of a family who has just lost a loved one. Additional visits follow and a memorial service is planned. I hear of calls and visits by our members. After the memorial service the Deacons prepare a reception for the family with loving care. Leslianne visits a member who is scheduled for surgery and follows up during rehabilitation. Tom visits with a member after coffee hour and offers wise counsel on a family issue and later in the week he visits at the hospital. I arrive at a nursing home and see the flowers from church and hear gratitude for a loving visit.

One evening I am in the home of a young couple talking about the Sacrament of Baptism for their child and later in the week meeting with a couple in the process of planning a wedding. On Saturday evening I am officiating at a wedding for a couple and the groom has been a member since early childhood. The phone rings and Leslianne talks with a Stephen Minister about their ministry with their care receiver. The next evening one of our Stephen Leaders is teaching a new class of Stephen Ministers. On the fourth Monday evening the Deacons are meeting and growing in the role of caring for the members of our congregation.

The prayers of the People are offered in Worship and loved ones are remembered. At the Wednesday morning Bible Study joys and concerns are shared and prayers are lifted up to the Lord. **Congregational Care** is the ministry of mutual caring that in our Lord's name allows us to weep with those who weep and rejoice with those who rejoice. The Pastors are called to share pastoral care and to train, encourage and honor lay pastoral care that strengthens our life together.

Financial support of the ministry of Potomac Presbyterian under girds this calling from the Lord that we all share. May the Lord be praised in our giving and in our caring for one another. In the next few weeks we will hear how the Lord is praised in our giving through Worship, Christian Education and Mission.

Parity. It is an interesting word meaning, "equality, as in amount, status, or character." It is a word Presbyterians hold dear because we believe that we all are members of the priesthood of believers. While some of us are given gifts to be "apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers," no one gift of the Spirit is greater than any other. We all are given gifts by God for the work of ministry, for building up the whole body of Christ.

Our Presbyterian government structure is built on this idea of parity. It is why our churches are represented by both Elders and Ministers at all governing body meetings. We take this idea of parity so seriously that we have a Committee on Representation insuring all working divisions, committees, teams and task forces of the Presbytery have balance between Ministers and Elders, as well as balance according to gender and ethnicity.

Why am I even thinking about this, you ask? Well, having served on Presbytery committees and teams, I am aware it is often difficult to recruit Elders to be part of the ministry of the wider church. I note that many people – clergy and laity alike – have very definite opinions about what the Presbytery does. However, it appears a lot of folk think of the Presbytery a lot like they think of the weather: they don't like it very much, but they think there's nothing anyone can do about it. This is not true. Everyone has an opportunity to be involved in the decision making processes of the Presbytery. Everyone has an opportunity to make a difference.

The Presbytery does some pretty cool stuff. Under National Capital Presbytery's new structure¹ the twelve-member Council will be the Presbytery's "visioning team." It will, among other things, review and evaluate every three years the Presbytery's mission and structure in the light of adopted priorities. The Council will oversee ecumenical and interfaith affairs and maintain our relationships with Synod and General Assembly.

The thirty-six member Committee on Preparation for Ministry works with inquirers and candidates who believe they are called to the Ministry of Word and Sacrament. Committee members help those in "the process" refine their calls to ministry. They also are the preliminary examining body before a candidate can be certified to seek a call. It is a Committee that needs a lot of wise, discerning compassionate members. (Emphasis on compassionate!)

The eighteen member Church Development Committee seeks to develop and execute strategies which lead to the strengthening and transformation of the congregations of the Presbytery to be missional, pastoral and prophetic. It works with new church developments and immigrant fellowships, and the Committee is always looking for concrete ways to encourage all congregations in their mission and ministry.

Parity doesn't work unless we *all* get involved in the life of the church. Perhaps there is a way you can use your God-given gifts for the work of ministry, for building up the whole body of Christ. There are many more committees and many ways to get involved. In doing so, you will Tikkun Olam – the mending of at least a small corner of the world.

Think about it.





ear: a drop of the saline, watery fluid continually secreted by the lacrimal glands between the surface of the eye and the eyelid, serving to moisten and lubricate these parts and keep them clear of foreign particles. This fluid often appears in or flows from the eye as the result of emotion, especially grief.



Dictionary-dot-com gives a wonderful, succinct definition of the word, tear, but I am so sorry they stopped with "especially grief." There are lots of reasons why peoples' eyes "well-up" that have nothing to do with mourning and grief. We experience lots of emotions that engender tears that are not sad.

Did you ever laugh so hard you cried? I hope so. It beats the run-of-the mill belly-laugh by a mile. My husband, who was born deep in the era of "men don't cry," will readily admit he shed tears of joy when his first child, Karen, was born. It is not unusual to see a parent's eyes water with pride when their child accomplishes something great. My eyes often overflow when I pray.

Saint Ignatius of Loyola said that tears are the consolation of the Holy Spirit. St. Ignatius' definition of 'consolation' is: that state of interior warmth 'by which the soul is inflamed with the love of its Creator and Lord'. This includes 'tears that move to the love of God, whether it be because of sorrow for sins, . . . or for any other reason that is immediately directed to the praise and service of God'. So, it would seem we can add tears of praise to the list of possible reasons to cry.

We usually associate tears with grief or pain; but, often tears can be expressions of our joy in and love for the Lord. When the choir from the Ghanaian Presbyterian Church sang the Twenty-third Psalm on World Communion Sunday, there were many moist eyes in the sanctuary. It was a great movement of the Holy Spirit in this place. We find that same movement of the Spirit during baptisms. It is not unusual to see grown folk's eyes tear up as the newest covenant member is told the story of God's love while he or she is introduced to the congregation. Tears are words from the heart that cannot be spoken.

The Bible tells us that when we don't know how to pray, the Holy Spirit intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words. The physical expression of the Holy Spirit's movement deep in our souls may very well be tears.

May the Spirit move deeply in all of us this Christmas season. Leslianne Braunstein

The Window of Opportunity For Tax Free Withdrawal Of IRA Funds Extended Through 2009---Help PPC and Avoid Taxes!

On October 3, the signing of the Economic Stimulus Bill of 2008 extends the provisions of the Pension Protection Act of 2006 through 2009; thus allowing those of you over 70½ to give up to \$100,000 tax free directly from your IRA by your plan administrator to PPC. This means that individuals using a standard deduction can retain it and give a tax free deduction. It also provides a way to avoid future taxes on your IRA funds; and for those who want to defer withdrawing income from IRA's, the gift applies to the "required minimum distribution."
