

As I considered a new call to ministry, this factor symbolized a community of faith that was vital and strong and willing to take risks. During those early years, we proceeded to break ground, worship at Har Shalom for five Sundays and complete a wonderful addition and renovation to our church facility.

In the New Year as PPC begins a new chapter, this same strength of lay leadership and hope for the future will mark the interim time and send an important signal to candidates for the position of Senior Pastor. This will not be easy but will be worth every ounce of energy, intelligence, imagination and love that will be called forth from our members. I believe we will be surprised by the contribution of new leaders, new ideas, thoughtful assessment and renewed reliance on the guidance of God's Spirit. This same Spirit guided the fifty charter members who went forward in faith back in 1963, meeting in the all purpose room of the Potomac Elementary School. This congregation was chartered just weeks after the assassination of President Kennedy. Our country had to go through a transition unlike anything we had experienced since the attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941.

As we look to the future, the challenges facing churches may seem daunting, but our God is able. The religious and cultural landscape has changed in major ways over the past twenty to thirty years. At the same time our nation and world is in the midst of severe financial pressures. Tough times have historically been times when the ministry of local congregations has risen to the challenge. In reliance upon the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, Potomac Presbyterian Church will continue to be a beacon of hope and a significant force for mission in a hurting world.

**DEACON'S CORNER** Reflections on the True Meaning of Christmas—The Christmas holiday season harkens in the three tenants of faith, hope and love. It also is a time to pause and review our own values, in reflecting on the great gift to mankind in the birth of a special baby long ago in Bethlehem. Just what is the meaning, and how do we apply the meaning to our own lives?

At PPC, we rang in the Advent season with the Williamsburg Breakfast, where we celebrated a festive time and a unique form of fellowship. We delighted in the beauty and best of the holiday season, and sang carols as a community of faith. We were reminded of the significance of Christmas in scripture readings. The one scripture that puts it all in proper perspective to me is Luke 2:14 (KJV): "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men."

When we strive to bring peace on earth and show good will to our fellow man, we honor Him. We can do so in our everyday lives, living out the tenants heralded in the holiday season. Authors Craig and Marc Kielburger point out in their bestselling book, Me to We, Finding Meaning in a Material World, the need to be involved in community. They essentially outline ways in which we can perpetuate the same message of goodwill to all men, by doing for others what we can as an act of kindness, generosity, and caring. There are many ways to go about living our faith, and following the message of goodwill to mankind (what the authors call living out the dynamics of Me to We communities).

As members of this congregation, we have a good many opportunities to be involved and make a difference in our communities, and on many different levels. We may choose to get involved at church in a way that is meaningful to us, serving our own community of faith by volunteering on a committee, or serving as an usher, or serving the congregation in the capacity of a Deacon or an Elder. We can choose other involvement throughout the year in ways that have even more direct impact on the communities around us, such as: serving meals to the homeless at the Rockville Community Based Shelter during our church's week of commitment in February (part of a collective effort by numerous churches to provide support throughout the year), or joining the church team for Habitat for Humanity, or supporting or joining our church's youth and adult sponsors on the annual Workcamp trip, to serve a community in need far from home (this year's trip is to Elmira, NY). Whatever the choice, an act of selfless service is a true act of Christian love.

I'm reminded at Christmas time of the reply given in 1897 by Francis P. Church, editor of *The New York Sun*, to the question of a little girl, Virginia O'Hanlon, when he made clear in his editorial, *Yes Virginia, There Is a Santa Claus*. As he so eloquently puts it, there is a Santa Claus as surely as love and joy and beauty exist. In this Christmas season we can all take time to rediscover him and share in the spirit of selfless love that Santa Claus embodies. There was even an article in "Ask Amy" of the Style section of *The Washington Post* this Christmas day, referring to the same 1897 editorial and stating that Santa lives within every generous heart. Let us all develop and keep a generous heart.

We should not allow the spirit of Christmas to die out, like embers smoldering in the fireplace at winter's end ... instead, let's keep <u>faith</u> alive, answering the <u>hopes</u> of others, in showing the best of God's <u>love</u>. Yes, let faith, hope and love continue throughout the year, and let it be like Christmas all year 'round. That would be the best possible state of affairs, continuing the true spirit of Christmas ... giving to others.



**KERRY ON...** When I returned from a sabbatical in 1997, I wrote an article entitled "Some Things I Learned About Church." As I prepare to retire as pastor at PPC, I believe that some of those thoughts are especially relevant to the time of transition that leads to the calling of a new Pastor.

The church belongs to God and not to us. We are really stewards of this community of faith, that for all its failings and triumphs is the primary expression of God's presence in the world.

The only hypocrite we have to worry about is our self. People say, "I don't belong to a church because the church is full of hypocrites." That may be true, but it is one of the reasons we need church. We need to be held accountable, to be challenged, to be guided and forgiven. The church is not a club for saints, but a hospital for sinners.

Church is where we learn the language of prayer. In a moment of crisis people cry out, "Oh my God!" or in the face of incredible beauty and wonder are likely to say, "Wow!" and mean "Praise God!" In the company of others we discover words to express the deepest human emotions. Our best words are often set to music and they express what is on our hearts and minds.

Church is where our ancestors in the faith have a say. They have a voice at the table. But not a veto. Scripture is really the story of God working with those who have gone before us. Our Reformed Tradition gives us roots. The people of this congregation who ventured in faith to begin a ministry back in 1963 shaped a vision for us. We continue to take up the challenge to share our faith with those who come after us. (Continued on next page)

Thank God! Thank God! Thank God!



#### Thank God!


Seems simple enough, we give thanks to God for his grace and blessings; but are we really thanking God when we say those two words? We generally use this statement as an exclamatory statement of relief, and God is only in our thoughts at a very superficial level. *Thank God*, that it wasn't my kid that broke the neighbor's window! Or, perhaps like me, you can't remember a time as bad as last year. *Thank God*, 2008 is over! *Thank God!* 

For you Redskins fans, consider my family's recent trip to our nation's birthplace to see the Liberty Bell and Independence Hall for the first time. Driving into town, we passed the Philadelphia Eagles stadium, and realized that the NFC wildcard playoff game between the Cowboys and the Eagles was about to start. We were only yards away from sharing the same space with Tony and Jessica, without tickets. As the game progressed, imagine our pain and anguish as the Eagles handed the Cowboys a real old-fashioned spanking. Oh the humanity! The Cowboys were defeated. *Thank God*, the beating is over! *Thank God!* 

The next day we were able to visit the Liberty Bell, Independence Hall, Ben Franklin's grave, Betsy Ross' house, Christ Church, and even a pet boutique. The opportunity to physically experience these historical sites had a profound effect on my existing appreciation for the bravery, perseverance, and sacrifice needed to secure our liberty. Thank God that those 56 men, were able to establish the American ideals that are embodied in the Declaration of Independence, which held as a "self evident" truth that "all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." Thank God that the patriots fought for freedom from tyranny and violence. Thank God, for those who made the ultimate sacrifice to obtain freedom. Thank God that our independence was won. For me, Thank God is an exclamatory statement of profound relief that my family and I live in the home of the "free and the brave"; but more importantly this is a prayer of thanks to God for His divine Providence throughout our war for independence. At Valley Forge, I wondered how the tattered Continental army was able to survive the harsh conditions when they arrived in December 1777. Thank God, they did survive. Thank God, they were able to transform themselves from rebels, into a mature army that was enthusiastic to engage and defeat the British. Thank God that our founding fathers had a deeply rooted faith in a higher power and recognized that God was working through them as they wrote the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution. Sometime after 4 p.m. on Thursday, January 15<sup>th</sup>, Chesley B. "Sully" Sullenberger, III safely piloted USAir flight #1549 into New York City's Hudson River. All 155 passengers aboard were brought to safety by a myriad of water vehicles that immediately streamed to the airplane once it settled in the water. The spectacular event is being touted as "the miracle on the Hudson." Indeed, for those who appeared to walk on water to safety, it must seem to be just that.

For those of us who believe in God's spectacular providence, we cannot help but see God's hand at work in this amazing story of rescue. No, we didn't see the fingers of God swoop down from on high to gently guide the plane into the water. There were no divine parachutes unfurling in the bitter winter air. Instead, God used the energy, skill, expertise, intelligence, imagination and love of a trained pilot to bring to a happy conclusion what might have been an unimaginable tragedy.

Chesley B. Sullenberger, III was an exceptionally trained pilot. He not only trained for the task; he trained for contingencies. Captain Sullenberger trained as a jet pilot in the Air Force. He retrained as a commercial pilot and has been flying aircraft for approximately 30 years. I read somewhere he also is a glider pilot. Captain Sullenberger's concern for air safety led him to serve on a board that investigated aircraft accidents with the NTSB. His concern for safety, particularly in commercial enterprise, led him to establish a company that uses "the ultra-safe world of commercial aviation" as a basis for safety consulting in other fields.

It is evident Captain Sullenberger's concern for safety includes his concern for people. On top of all the technical training, he had been studying the psychology of keeping airline crews functioning even in the face of crisis. Even after years and years of training and experience, he continued to perfect his leadership skills so that, in the event of a crisis, he could effectively guide those under his command.

Some might think training and knowledge is all that is needed to accomplish such an amazing feat. I believe the successful landing and rescue was more than the sum of its parts. When I think of the number of decisions that had to be made in less than five minutes – the number of levers that had to be pulled – how passengers were told to brace for impact (and apparently there was very little panic) – and how the plane actually skimmed into the water without breaking up, I have to believe that the Holy Spirit took everything Captain Sullenberger ever knew and brought it to mind in optimal order with calm and confidence. The result was that 155 shaken, but grateful passengers and crew survived this horrifying experience.

The point on which we might reflect is this: Captain Chesley B. "Sully" Sullenberger, III gave the Holy Spirit a lot to work with.

God will use us in any way God sees fit, I am sure. But it is more likely that the Holy Spirit will bring to mind something that is already there. The energy, intelligence, imagination and love with which we approach our faith, our work, our lives may very well determine how God will use us to be the exhibitions of God's kingdom in the world.

Makes me want to pay a little more attention to what I'm doing. Leslianne Braunstein



As I was thinking about that somewhat trite expression, I couldn't help but think that it had real theological significance and was reminded of a devotion I had read by Mark Duncan. Here are some excerpts from his devotion:

Today marked the day for one of the most highly anticipated annual neighborhood events, Large Item Pick-up. This is that wonderful time of year when people up and down the street throw all their junk on the side of the road in preparation for the day when the city crews come out and make it disappear. . . .

This year, without fail, the Junkhounds showed up on our street and began perusing as they always do. I remember thinking, and perhaps quoting to my wife once or twice, the overused expression "One man's trash is another man's treasure." How true it must be, I look at the refuse piles and I see junk, plain and simple junk. I would never attempt to fix that old rusty washing machine, or salvage the sprocket on that old bike, I am in agreement with the neighbor who put it by the curb, just get rid of it, it's junk! But these Junkhounds look at that trash with a different eye, they see potential in what the rest of us see as just something to be disposed of. Maybe there is money to be made in scrap metal, or maybe the guy just happens to be really handy and can actually save that washer, or maybe his wife has eccentric tastes in lawn decorations and he thinks she'd like to use that old toilet as a planter for her petunias. The important thing is that he sees the potential, he doesn't see just "junk".

Observing this unusual annual neighborhood ritual got me thinking about how I view my worth as a follower of Christ. When I take an honest look at myself, how sin has affected me, sometimes I just cannot see anything of value, I see junk...dirty, useless, broken junk. It is easy for me to just think, "it's junk", what can He do with this life? But that would be a gross error of thought, because the God of the universe does not look at me as others do, or even as I do. No, the Father doesn't see as man sees, He looks at the heart of me. He sees my "junk pile" of a life and begins to pick through it, finding treasures, He sees the potential.... After all, He used a few fishermen to usher in the start of His church. He picked a stuttering, lying murderer to lead His people out of captivity and to the Promised Land. He even took public enemy number one for Christians and so totally flipped his life upside down that he eventually wrote much of our New Testament. If He can do so much with these individuals, what more can He do with me and my "junk"?

For indeed, we are all broken, and in the eyes of the world we are trash, but in the eyes of the Father, we are his treasure!

# The Wright Note

I will be very honest with you. I have delayed submitting this

month's article because I can't seem to find new thoughts to share about our music program. I may blame that on the fact that I have finished my annual report in which I spelled out in detail the major contribution our musical choir members, handbell ringers, instrumentalists, soloists, youth ensembles and men's and women's choruses have made during this past year. I urge you to carefully read this report and appreciate, as I do, the commitment of all of our musical participants and the role music plays in the worship experience.

One aspect that I did not address in that report was the importance of regular rehearsals to adequately prepare our musical leaders for any worship service. We may work many weeks on a piece of music before we share it on a given Sunday. Each time we meet, that piece of music is approached with a new sense of appreciation for text and a growing familiarity with the melody and harmonic setting. Gradually the choirs practice challenging passages, and with patience and often a few laughs, we feel confident enough to share our anthem. As the notes become less threatening, we can then clarify our diction and add dynamics (changes in the degree of loudness and softness). This applies to handbell ringing, too. Yes, I ask our ringers to sing what we ring at times. In this creative process of rehearsing, all ages become better singers or ringers. We also grow in Christian fellowship and service.

My African violets that are blooming so beautifully right now remind me of the value of steady, productive, nourishing rehearsals. These blooms start at the base of the stem. They are hardly visible at first because they hide beneath the green leaves above and around them. As I continue to carefully water the plant and keep it in the right light, these baby flowers grow and push upward through the thick leaves. This process takes weeks! Suddenly, on a day when I least expect it, I see a set of vibrant purple blooms strongly resting on top of the velvety green leaves. It most often is a bleak mid-winter day when this surge of spring happens. And the blooms last for months!

What strength our choirs gain in rehearsal will hopefully produce blooms of meaningful musical expression in worship. That also means that the gardener must be on her toes to keep these choirs nourished, challenged and loved.



When we approach Lent sincerely and honestly, we cannot help but recognize we all need the healing touch of the Master's hand.

The Deacons Lenten service on March 25th will be a Service of Wholeness and Healing. We will take time to reflect on our need for God's amazing grace that fills us and empowers us to grow in our relationship with God. It is a grace that deepens our commitment to a way of life rooted in our baptism. This service of Wholeness and Healing will center in on prayer – spoken and sung – and will include a service of anointing as well as the Lord's Supper.

Anointing is not something new in the church. Healing services are an ancient and accepted practice that is experiencing revival in the church today. We recognize in our busy, oversubscribed lives that indeed, we all sin and come short of the God's glory. The healing we need is not only always physical. We often find ourselves approaching God's throne of grace emotionally spent and often spiritually bruised. Where else can we go to find the balm that heals our sin-sick souls?

Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. James 5:14

The laying on of hands and the anointing with oil show the power of touch, which plays a central role in the healings recorded in the New Testament. The Directory for Worship reminds us that "Healing was an integral part of the ministry of Jesus which the church has been called to continue as one dimension of its concern for the wholeness of people. Through services for wholeness, the church enacts in worship its ministry as a healing community. Anointing with oil is an act invoking the healing love of God. The oil points beyond itself to the action of the Holy Spirit and the presence of the healing Christ who is God's anointed one."

Last year Kathy McPherson, Elder Dan Dowd and I attended a Service of Wholeness and Healing at Georgetown Presbyterian Church. It was a moving experience that highlighted for us that spiritual healing is God's work offering persons balance, harmony and wholeness of body, mind, spirit and relationships through confession, forgiveness and reconciliation.

Particularly in this year of change and transition, this service of Wholeness and Healing provides an opportunity for us to reflect on our life together and to contemplate how God is calling us to be God's new creation – the exhibition of the Kingdom of God to the world.

Our prayer is that you will be part of this movement of God that extends to us an opportunity Leslianne Braunstein to experience God's love in a new way.



## **DEACON'S CORNER**

Many may assume that the Deacons' responsibility of coffee hour, staying in touch with parishes and organizing

functions like the Fall Tail Gate party doesn't involve a lot of spirituality. I didn't give it much thought, either, until after my first official Deacons meeting.

"The Presbyterian Deacon: An Essential Guide" reads, "The Office of Deacon as set forth in Scripture is one of sympathy, witness and service after the example of Jesus Christ....It is a ministry of caring, a ministry of love, a ministry of compassion, and a ministry of prayer (G-6.0402)."

While there is a good deal of administration that occurs during a Deacons meeting, there is a strong spiritual component woven into the evening as well. At the start of the meeting, Leslianne lights a candle, which symbolizes Jesus as the light of the world and His presence among us, and leads us in opening prayer. Deacons take turns preparing an opening devotional for each meeting. It can be as long or short as he/she chooses and is normally comprised of reading scripture, a canticle, and the group reciting a prayer together. Each program year, we read a book and discuss chapters at the meetings. Last vear we read. "Listening Hearts" and this year we began "Unbinding the Gospel." These books assist us in learning more about our own beliefs and how we can better serve the members of our parishes.

Pastor Kerry has asked that for the next several months I write a summary of Session activities for this newsletter. For the first installment, I thought it appropriate to prepare a short recap of the February 8th Congregational Meeting for members who were unable to attend. This meeting reported on and acted upon several Session-generated topics of great importance to the future of PPC.

By my count, 123 members attended this meeting, about a 50% increase over last year's attendance. As a result of feedback from last year's Congregational Meeting, the Session postponed budget approval until after this year's meeting so as to give the congregation a preview into the fiscal workings of our church. Additionally, also acting upon congregational feedback from last year, a balanced budget was presented by our Stewardship Committee (Elder Bill Hartzog), noting that cutbacks had been made in almost every category of operating funds.

The most difficult congregational decision made during the meeting, and one that will be hard to do justice to in a short column, was the decision to eliminate (effective August 8th) the position of Associate Pastor for Congregational Care, the position currently held by Pastor Leslianne. A number of sincere, emotional, and thoughtful presentations were made on each side of the issue, touching on the topics of PPC's needs for the future, aligning PPC resources to our near-term objectives, the need for continuity following Pastor Kerry's retirement, and Pastor Leslianne's contributions to our congregation. A copy of the prepared presentation on the reasoning behind the original Personnel Committee recommendation to the Session is available upon request from Karen Wise.

The 2009 calls for the Senior Pastor and the Associate Pastor were approved as recommended by the Session. Due to the reduction in personnel services budgeting, these calls included no cost-of-living increases over the 2008 calls.

Melanie Mason reported on the activities of the Interim Pastor Search Committee. In the first few days since their election by the Session, this group has made contact with other churches in the community, has met with National Capital Presbytery (NCP), and has prepared a draft job description for our interim pastor. Comments, questions, or feedback for this group can be made directly to the committee members or sent to PPCspeakup@gmail.com.

The congregation elected the at-large members of the 2009 Nominating Committee. In addition to a candidate slate of church officers to be elected later this year, this committee will also nominate the members of the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) who will search for a new senior pastor for PPC. Elected were:

Sherry Johnson, Marnel Williams, Paul Mamalian, Diane Chapin

Lastly, Del Smith alerted the congregation to the fiscal issues now attached to Camp Meadowkirk. More information on this topic is available from the NCP webpage, or ask your Elders/Deacons for copies of the editorial-style letters written to presbytery members.

### **News from the Interim Pastor Search Committee**

What is an interim pastor? An interim pastor is a minister invited by the session of a church without an installed pastor to preach the Word, administer the Sacraments, and fulfill pastoral duties for a specific period while the church is seeking a pastor. An interim pastor is someone from outside the congregation who works fulltime with a church and provides for spiritual growth and the ongoing mission and work of a church. He/she is NOT a place holder and is expected to work with the congregation to assess the future journey of the congregation and to assist in the transition to a new installed pastor. The interim pastor has specific training in these areas and should facilitate open sharing of information with the congregation. In addition, the interim pastor CANNOT be considered for the installed position his or her service precedes.

PPC's new Interim Pastor Search Committee has been formed with Bob Plumb and Beth Rudnic as co-chairs. Chris Dowd, Corey Eng, Melanie Mason, Jim Reichley and Carolyn Stump have also agreed to serve on the committee. We have already met and will continue to meet weekly until we find a suitable interim pastor. We have contacted numerous resources including National Capital Presbytery and other churches who have recently engaged in a similar search. We will keep the congregation updated regularly, as new information becomes available. ## UPDATE ON FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, NEW ORLEANS

In January, 2008, PPC's "New Orleans Saints" participated in a week-long post-Katrina rebuilding effort in New Orleans. We stayed at the **First Presbyterian Church**, a historic church which suffered significant flood damage (**www.fpcno.org**). Much has been said about the transformative experience this mission trip proved to be, not only for those being served but for those fifteen from PPC who participated. Last May, our congregation grieved with First Presbyterian when we learned of the sudden death of their beloved pastor, **Dr. Cliff Nunn**. Shortly thereafter, we learned that they would concentrate their efforts on re-growing their tiny, stunned, church community, and would abandon their work hosting volunteers who came to New Orleans to rebuild.

Despite being small, First Presbyterian Church has been resilient and steadfast in their desire to share the Good News, to minister to those in need, and to grow their own ministry. They have grave concerns about funding, membership, and maintenance of their programs. The economic downturn has decimated their endowment, which supported their pastor's salary. Their membership has diminished so much since Katrina that there are only about 40 active members now. Their children's program has floundered and they are just yearning to be able to provide something for the few children they do have. However, they are grateful for the following:

- their new Interim Pastor, the Rev. Jayne Ruiz;
- the volunteers and donations which made possible the nearly full physical restoration of their church buildings and related equipment;
- the ability to continue their **Homeless and Hungry Ministry**, which, since 2008, has been providing meals, housing, clothing, and spiritual nourishment to an average of 25-40 homeless clients per week;
- the ability to continue their post-Katrina, English as a Second Language Program, to serve the large number of Hispanic laborers who arrived to find jobs in the rebuilding.

In 2008 First Presbyterian established a **Transformation Committee**. With help from their Presbytery, this committee looked inward at their church, seeking input and ideas about their core beliefs and how to attract new members. The committee is hopeful that 2009 will bring some of their ideas to fruition. They would like to conduct neighborhood surveys, expand upon the programs identified above, and establish new programs. Their goal is to grow their ministry and ensure their continued ability to meet their financial obligations and continue to help those in need.

In a recent letter to our Mission Committee, First Presbyterian Church's Clerk of Session mentioned one more item on their gratitude list: "...First Presbyterian has been blessed with friends such as Potomac Presbyterian in its efforts to recover and help the city recover...We are so thankful for the connections we have made with congregations such as yours."

It has been a blessing to our Mission Committee to be able to serve.



**KERRY ON...** As we prepare to say our farewells, I think the words of Reinhold Neibuhr speak to our gratitude for the years we have journeyed together and to the promise of God for the future.

Nothing that is worth doing can be achieved in a lifetime and therefore must be saved by hope. Nothing which is true or beautiful or good makes complete sense in any immediate context of history, therefore we must be saved by faith. Nothing we do, however virtuous can be accomplished alone, therefore, we are saved by love.

I cherish our years together and remember ground breaking for our new fellowship hall and the joy of welcoming our organizing pastor, Dr. James Leitch, to the dedication in May of 1987. Congregation Based Shelter welcomed guests to our fellowship hall during the blizzard of 1996. The Sacrament of Baptism has been celebrated for hundreds of children and the congregation has joyfully sung the words, "You are God's child most dear." Our youth began years of life changing experiences when Work Camp began in the summer of 1999. Stephen Ministry has enriched our caring for one another since our first class of sixteen were commissioned in 2000. In January 2008, a team of volunteers traveled to New Orleans to help rebuild homes and continue to be thankful for an unforgettable experience.

Loved ones young and old have been remembered in memorial services and in sorrow and grief we affirmed our hope in the resurrection through our Lord Jesus Christ. ### **Getting Involved**

SAVE THE DATE! Saturday, June 6 – Komen Race for the Cure will be in Washington, DC. Olivia Mabeus will be recruiting a PPC team to participate in this event. Look for the registration table in the Fellowship Hall the last two Sundays in April.

March began with another Congregational Meeting (March 8<sup>th</sup>). For those of you that were unable to attend, the motions previewed in my letter to the congregation of February 27<sup>th</sup> were generally passed as proposed.

The Session was authorized to enter into a loan secured by the manse not to exceed \$325,000 to purchase Dr. Kerry Stoltzfus' equity interest in the manse, the equity purchase price to be based upon the appraised value of the manse less the amount of Dr. Stoltzfus' outstanding loan. A slight amendment to the original motion requires the Manse Committee to contact two additional lenders to assure that favorable mortgage terms have been researched.

The second motion, which also passed unanimously, was slightly modified from its original form so that we will now honor Pastor Kerry's retirement request effective April 30th, 2009; his employment for pension purposes will end on May 31st, 2009 with accrued vacation paid for the month of May.

A final motion was received from the floor as offered by charter member Bob Tietjen (and unanimously passed) to elect Pastor Kerry as Pastor Emeritus of Potomac Presbyterian Church effective as of the dissolution of his formal pastoral relationship with our church. I will be making the request to presbytery in early March so that they may formalize this request from our congregation. Cal Reid, 3/9/09

The object of the Stations is to help us make a spiritual pilgrimage of prayer, through meditating upon the chief scenes of Christ's sufferings and death. The Stations of the Cross are less often observed in Protestant communities, but there is a resurgence of interest among mainline Protestants in using these devotions to contemplate the magnitude of Christ's sacrifice for us, and to thank God for the grace and mercy extended to us.

abies and bath water. I've been thinking a lot

about babies and bath water this Lenten season. On Ash Wednesday, our service included the imposition of ashes for those who wished to have that concrete experience of what the day signifies. During the Deacons' service of Wholeness and healing, there was a time when those wishing to feel the healing balm of the Holy Spirit could come for anointing and/or prayer.

I, personally like these tactile expressions of faith. Come to my study and you will see a room with icons of our faith. I have icons of Saints – regular people who did great things for God – reminding me the Christian life is possible. I have icons of great Bible stories. Recently my dear friend, Kathryn Jackson, gave me an unusual icon of the 'Mystical Supper' that I will treasure always. My favorite, though, would have to be Rublev's icon of the Holy Trinity. The icon draws me in, reminding me I, too, am welcome at God's table. Icons have been called "Windows to Heaven." I have found them to be just that.

Tactile Christianity is one of the reasons I became an Oblate of Mount Saint Benedict's Monastery. I so appreciate the expressions of faith and modes of worship that invite all of me – all of my senses, all of who I am - to participate. It is not something with which we Protestants are particularly comfortable.

As an oblate, I am committed to seek God in community life and to respond to God in prayer and ministry. I support the Benedictine sisters of Erie, a community of women who are faithful to a life of prayer and work, committed to the Gospel and to the vision of life practiced by Saint Benedict and his sister, Saint Scholastica. They are dedicated to a special outreach to those on the margins of our society. These women have loved me and supported me and held me in prayer since, for nearly ten years. I am committed to upholding these values in my life.

This Easter, I will be at the Holy Week retreat at Mount Saint Benedict's Monastery, celebrating Easter with all my senses. We will gather on Wednesday for a great time of community. On Thursday we will join at Emmaus House, where we will help the Sisters prepare and serve a special meal to members of the Erie community who live challenged lives. It is a great privilege to sit and break bread with these brothers and sisters, to hear their stories and learn of their joys, as well as their sorrows. Thursday evening we share an Agape meal – celebrating Communion around our dinner tables. After dinner there is silence.

On Friday we participate in a contemporary Stations of the Cross. It is a seven mile walk that begins at Erie's Cathedral (where we pray for the church). I do not know where we will stop this year. In the past we have stopped at an Islamic Center and prayed for the safety of our Muslim brothers and sisters. We have stopped at the inner city art house, where there are programs for children, and prayed for our children. We stopped at a low-income housing project and prayed for families at risk. We've stopped at a topless bar and prayed for abused women. We stop. We pray. We sing. We walk in silence.

Silence breaks at lunchtime on Saturday. At first I thought this was strange. I didn't understand why silence ended before Saturday evening's Easter Vigil. But these Sisters are unable to contain themselves any longer. The Sisters are soooooo excited! It is Easter! Preparations are

underway. There is dusting and vacuuming and decorating and rehearsing to be done! People are

# The Wright Note In Matthew 18:20 we read, "For where

two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them." Since Christmas, we have had two or three, and sometimes one, in the Sunrise

Singers. But numbers have not kept us from continuing to sing God's praises and to even create some original music. Let me share with you what has been developing in our rehearsals during Lent.

We always start our rehearsals by warming up our voices with vocal exercises. One of our favorites is one that uses the steps of the scale. Based on one to eight, we gradually sing our way up to the top of the octave and back down. These progressive notes are set in an intricate rhythmic pattern which we sing at different speeds and in canon with one another. We always end up giggling afterwards because it really is fun.

Bryan Eng suggested that we put words to this vocal warm-up. I was skeptical because the exercise is not particularly tuneful. Lauren Eng agreed with her brother that words would be a good idea. She began experimenting with word combinations based on discussions we had been having concerning the liturgical season of Lent. I began scribbling notes on our floor chart. Phrases about God, Jesus Christ and love evolved. We progressed to Jesus dying on the cross for our sins. That brought us to Easter. Our text was beginning to take shape, but we had difficulty with the climactic phrase leading up to the eighth scale tone. We decided that phrase needed to include Pentecost. We waited until the next week to work on the Pentecost section. On the following Sunday the children developed a final phrase which amazingly put that joyful season in perfect perspective. The entire text is as follows: I, I love God.

I love Jesus Christ.

God is always in my heart.

Jesus died to save us from our sins.

Lent reminds us when our Lord was crucified.

On the third day Jesus rose to bring us Easter Day...

Then on Pentecost the spirit helped us form the Christian church.

The children also developed an accompanying ostinato chant which incorporates an equation that they insisted we needed. That equation is love + Christ + believe = church. The ostinato uses these words in a catchy repeated rhythm: People who believe in Christ equals church. This is sung at the same time as the above vocal warm-up. The approved title is yet to come. One suggestion under consideration is: "What is church?"

humming and bustling about – all in anticipation of the Great Easter Vigil and the resurrection of the Lord.

The Great Easter Vigil is an experience not to be missed. (Be prepared, though. It can last several hours.) In the service, the story of God's salvation history is told – beginning with creation, through the stories of the patriarchs until we hear of Jesus' life, death and resurrection. The Benedictine Sisters of Erie are most creative presenters of the Biblical story. I have seen the Creation story danced. It is a sight to behold.

After Mass on Sunday, the Paschal Candle will be brought into the refectory and the whole congregation will dance for joy. My computer desktop screen is a picture of just such a joyful dance. I will think of you all this Holy Week as I hear, taste, see, touch, and smell (don't forget the incense!) the joy of Easter with my fellow Oblates and the Benedictine Sisters of Erie.

The Reformers brought us many insights into faith. Because of the Reformers, we have the Bible in our own language, and it is accessible to all. Because of the Reformers, knowing and studying scripture became a hallmark of our faith. But, the Reformers seemed to think than many of the sensual expressions of faith were, in fact, impediments to true faith. And perhaps, in some sense and in their day and time, they were correct. However, in the past forty years, many of our Protestant denominations have revisited many of the ancient practices of our faith. The conclusion is that, perhaps, the Reformers threw the baby out with the bathwater in their zeal to promote pure faith and worship. The conclusion is that many of the more tactile practices of faith are ways for us to experience the love and grace of God differently than if we just think about it. This is why our Book of Common Worship has a service for Ash Wednesday with the imposition of ashes. It is why there is a Service of Wholeness and Healing with anointing. It is why there is a service of Easter Vigil.

My prayer is that we will not be afraid or uncomfortable with the movement of the Holy Spirit that calls us to taste and see (and hear and touch and smell) that the Lord, indeed, is good. And God's mercies wash over us for a lifetime.



Susan Boyle is a 47 year old unemployed Scots woman from a small village. Ms. Boyle, who has never been married, spent years taking care of her mother who recently died. Susan Boyle has been described as a shy, solitary person; a quiet soul. Susan Boyle also is decidedly frumpy and very ordinary looking. In fact, if you look up the word "ordinary" in a British dictionary, until April 11<sup>th</sup>, you might have seen Ms. Boyle's name listed among the definitions.

As she spoke with the judges, they and the audience snickered and rolled their eyes. Even though I was watching a video, I could feel the disdain in the room. To be honest, the first time I saw the video, I laughed. Ms. Boyle said she always has aspired to sing before a large audience. Looking at her, you couldn't help but think, 'oh, really'?

Then Susan Boyle opened her mouth to sing, and the rest will be recorded in the annals of dream-maker history. In seconds the audience was on its feet cheering and clapping while the judges were busy picking their chins up from the floor. Susan Boyle is an amazing singer. This very ordinary and ordinary looking, woman who has been singing in her church choir for years has the most extraordinary voice. It is truly a gift from God that has already blessed millions of people who have viewed the video.

Ordinary people can do extremely extraordinary things. Sometimes the accomplishments are recognized on a global scale. Sometimes the effect isn't as noticeable, but the influence ripples through time and generations.

Twenty-four years ago a young pastor and his wife came to Potomac Presbyterian Church. I'm sure the excitement the church experienced at their coming was palpable, but I don't know if anyone consciously thought something extraordinary was about to happen. No. I think Kerry and Ruthanne came to Potomac, they settled in and over these past 24 years a lot of ordinary things happened. For one thing, the church's vision for missions expanded and the folks of PPC took on many wonderful and worthwhile ministries – worthwhile for the members of the church, as well as those being ministered to.

In twenty-four years both Kerry and Ruthanne have touched hundreds, if not thousands, of lives. By extension they have touched the lives of many more — children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. They have touched family members and friends in the Potomac Community and beyond. Perhaps "extraordinary" was not a conscious thought twenty-four years ago, but in a quiet, ordinary way extraordinary things have happened here at Potomac Presbyterian Church. 





### GOOD NEWS FROM THE INTERIM PASTOR SEARCH COMMITTEE

In January 2009, the Session formed the Interim Pastor Search Committee (IPSC) charged with identifying a candidate to serve as interim pastor for PPC. The committee members include Chris Dowd, Corey Eng, Melanie Mason, Bob Plumb, Jim Reichley, Beth Rudnic and Carolyn Stump. The IPSC spent some time determining desired characteristics and qualifications. These requirements include a strong pulpit presence, strong spiritual presence, experience as a change agent/influencer, theological compatibility with PPC, engaged listener and articulate communicator, contemporary, inspirational and visionary, self confidence and humility, effective leadership and administrative skills, sincere interest in serving PPC and positive references.

A job description was developed and advertised in a variety of national online and print postings. In addition, we contacted local interim pastors to learn their availability. The IPSC received almost 100 applications for this position. Twelve candidates underwent extensive telephone interviews, of which four were brought to PPC for personal interviews and social interaction. One of the candidates took a position elsewhere and another candidate clearly not only satisfied but exceeded our expectations. On May 28, the Session voted unanimously to approve the IPSCs recommendation to call Larry Duncan as PPC's interim pastor.

Larry will join us from Westminster Presbyterian Church in Greensboro, NC where he is finishing up his role there as interim pastor. He is scheduled to begin with us on July 27 and will preach on Sunday, August 2.

PPC is Reverend Duncan's fourth interim assignment. Before becoming an intentional interim pastor in 2004, Larry served in senior pastor positions going back to the 1980's.



### **DEACON'S CORNER**

My paternal grandparents lived on a dairy farm, a short walk from a lake, in central Minnesota. These grandparents never gave me a birthday gift or a Christmas gift, only a card and a letter on those

occasions. But the two weeks I spent on their farm every summer of my youth was the best gift any kid could ever have. Grandpa had a boat and he would take us out on the lake to fish or to have a picnic on the island. Grandpa let us chase the cows in from the pasture to the barn at the end of the day. Grandma taught us how to milk the cows. Sometimes Grandma and I would take the fresh milk to the separator and then transfer the cream to the hand crank ice cream maker. Then Grandpa would make ice cream while Grandma and I would harvest fresh strawberries from her garden.

But my favorite part of the visit to the grandparents was Grandma's Cookie Jar. It was always full of the most wonderful homemade cookies of all different kinds. I'm sure I was impressed by this because there were no homemade cookies at the home I lived in. My mother thought ovens were for meatloaf and tuna casserole. My mother didn't like cookies, pies or cakes so she didn't make them. But my Grandma's kitchen was a treasure trove of baked goods. I loved her cookies and I knew she filled the Cookie Jar just for me.

I continued to visit my grandparents for one week every year throughout my young adulthood. My grandpa died two weeks before he and Grandma were to move into a senior citizen apartment. Maybe it was just too hard for him to leave his farm.


I visited my grandmother in the apartment a few months after Grandpa died. I was thrilled to see that the Cookie Jar had made the move. But when I opened the lid, *the* cookies?"

"I made cookies for your grandpa," she replied. "They were always your grandpa's cookies. Your grandpa's not here to eat the cookies anymore." So there we sat, looking at each other, missing Grandpa for a thousand different reasons.

Here at PPC, I think some of us feel like the cookie jar is empty. Maybe we feel this way because we miss Kerry. Maybe we feel this way because we miss Leslianne. Or maybe we just miss each other when the summer church attendance is so sparse. But years later Grandma gave me the recipes for all of "Grandpa's" cookies. And I'm trusting God to give PPC the recipe to guide us into the future. The future will be different for PPC in the same way that the cookies I make don't ever taste quite like Grandma's. But the life of any church moves on and I will be happy to be here with you, sharing in the growth and changes as we move with the help of the Holy Spirit to a little bit different PPC.

# The Wright Note

Summer time is the long-awaited vacation period to relax, enjoy and, in my case, file all my materials from the previous choir season and then research and plan the fall program. During this time, I also try to attend a Presbyterian sponsored music and worship seminar so that I can be current with innovative worship ideas and repertoire suggestions. My favorite conference at Westminster College in New Wilmington, PA, was abruptly cancelled due to economic constraints. I am hoping to attend a similar conference at Massanetta Springs, VA, in August.

Selecting repertoire, planning music to enhance worship, organizing and conducting rehearsals, playing for and conducting choirs in worship – these are the joys of my job as Director of Music. Finding compatible rehearsal times for various choirs and keeping regular attendance are high on my list of challenges. But practice is necessary.

As long as I am Director of Music, I am going to present music that is worthy in text and musical construction. This type of quality music requires practice. But that doesn't mean it cannot be an enjoyable experience. In the practice atmosphere, participants (whether children or adults) learn to appreciate the theology of the text and the musicality of the tune and musical setting. When the music is shared in worship, the choirs sing or ring with confidence, understanding and sensitivity. If the piece has a catchy rhythm, you will hear the enthusiasm in the voices or in the bell technique.

Now is the time to help me determine an effective rehearsal schedule for our choirs. Please keep in mind that I am directing and accompanying all of these groups myself and need to look at my availability as well as the other church activities that are regularly scheduled. Currently the Wonderful Wednesdays Choir for grades K-2 meets on Wednesdays at 4:00 p.m. The Sunrise Singers Choir for grades 3-6 meets before Sunday School at 9:00 a.m. on Sunday mornings. The Handbell Choir meets at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday nights. The Sanctuary Choir follows the Handbell Choir at 8:00 p.m. on Thursday nights. Please share with me any creative scheduling ideas that you may have.

I hope that you will start planning now, as I am, for the fall. Give your church involvement an early time slot in your family calendar. I want you and your family to have the option to participate in our meaningful program. *Cindy Wright*

## Meet the People in the Pew

First in a continuing series introducing PPC members

A job change brought **Bill and Bobbe Hartzog** to Potomac in 2002, and shortly afterward, following a search of various local churches, they were "engaged lovingly" by Potomac Presbyterian.

Bill now serves as an elder in charge of the finance committee and Bobbe rings bells and volunteers at Vacation Bible School.

Both are a long way from their beginnings: Bill's in Wilmington, North Carolina and Bobbe's in Detroit, Michigan. Bill attended The Citadel where he earned his military commission; Bobbe trained as a teacher at Central Michigan University and Michigan State. It was the U.S. Army that brought them together in the 1970s. That's when Bobbe, who was teaching third grade at the Post school, encountered the young officer who was a tactics instructor at West Point, the U.S. Military Academy. "We courted and married, and typical of a military family, began a succession of 20 moves that took our family to posts across the U.S. and Latin America," Bill said.

Bill took on increasingly important assignments. Early in his career, he had two tours of duty in Vietnam, the last as an advisor to the Vietnamese government. Later, he served three tours in Latin America and ultimately headed the U.S. Army South Command and was responsible for the capture of Manuel Noriega, the Panamanian dictator, who was subsequently tried and imprisoned in the United States. In 1993, he became the Deputy Commander and Chief of the Atlantic Command and ran the operation that invaded Haiti at the direction of President Bill Clinton.

Following a final assignment at Fort Monroe, VA, Bill retired in 1999 as a four star general and says of his 35 years of army service: "I had an absolutely wonderful career – I'd do it all over again if I could." Initially, he and Bobbe settled in Fairfax, VA, where he was a member of Fairfax Presbyterian. But three years later, opportunity came knocking once again, and Bill became CEO of Burdeshaw Associates Limited in Bethesda. Burdeshaw is an organization of 700 retired generals and admirals who consult with government and defense contractors. It is a five-day a week job that Bill has no intention of retiring from any time soon.

Bobbe continues to volunteer at various area organizations, including serving on the Board of Knollwood, a military retirement home. They also enjoy their two children: Tom, an architect now working in an exchange program in Edinburgh, Scotland, and Robin, a ninth grade math teacher in Edenton, NC, and granddaughter, Charlotte, who is seven.





### **DEACON'S CORNER**

It never ceases to amaze me where and when I'll get reminders about faith. Not long ago, I was in a remote corner of the Arabian Peninsula and found myself in an extended conversation with a taxi driver, Abdullah.

He was 25 and by all outward appearances, very Western—he spoke perfect English, talked about cars, motorcycles, and loved Lebanese pop music. Like many folks in his country, he was an extremely devout Muslim and culturally, very traditional. Abdullah told me the story of how he recently became married, which as it turned out, was a major controversy in his family. He told me that he fell in love with his sister's friend who, because of her veil, he had never actually seen. Also, because of strict, conservative cultural norms, he had never had a private conversation with her. But one look at her eyes, and he knew she was the one. Being a Westerner—and personally a skeptic—I quizzed him on how he could be so sure he was in love with someone he really didn't know and how he was so certain he wanted to spend the rest of his life with her. His response was simple: he said he had been praying for several years that God would find his soul mate for him and he trusted—completely—that God would answer his prayer. His comments were sobering. Some—myself included—would consider him naïve, but I still felt somewhat embarrassed. After all, I'm a Christian (although hardly an exemplar!), have attended a church for most of my life, and I should know about faith. But could I have had as much blind faith as Abdullah? It's somewhat ironic since it's during the biggest decisions and events in life that I should have the most faith, yet I overly rely on my own analysis on what to do in many cases rather than trust in God. Any naïveté on Abdullah's part was irrelevant to me. His story made me think about my own level of faith. Obviously, some self-reflection was in order and I could learn from Abdullah's witness.

As for the controversy, the tradition was for Abdullah's mother to arrange a marriage; he wasn't supposed to find himself a wife. His mother had already picked someone for him to marry and was extremely upset when he told her he had found his future wife. The conversation ended there and they barely spoke for months. Likewise, other family members were not permitted to discuss Abdullah's marriage prospects at all. When I asked him what happened next, he said he had faith that God would take care of that also, and God did. Eventually Abdullah got through to his mom and it turns out his mother had picked his sister's friend too...everyone was happy.

Guess I should've seen that coming.


