

When Lent Comes Early

Although it seems that we have just put away the Advent and Christmas decorations, Lent is now only a couple of weeks away. This year, Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 13th. That feels very early to those of us who just exhaled after a busy and eventful Advent season. Nevertheless, Lent begins in nearly two weeks, as we will soon be called to journey with Jesus toward the cross at Calvary.

When Lent is early on the calendar, as it is this year, the season seems to creep up on us and take us by surprise. We don't feel ready; yet the words of Scripture, the music, and the traditions of our worship call us to reflect, and to rededicate ourselves to walking the lonesome valley with Jesus Christ. The strains of "O Little Town of Bethlehem" still echo in our hearts; yet we will soon be called to sing the haunting words of "Were You There?" The advent wreath has only recently been put away for another year, and soon we will gather to receive ashes and gather around the table as Jesus' first disciples did.

When Lent is early on the calendar, I am reminded of the story of Peter, James, and John, who go up the mountain with Jesus, only to witness Jesus transfigured before them. The disciples want to stay on the top of the mountain with Jesus forever, but it is then that Jesus tells them that they must go down the mountain, for the Son of Man will soon suffer and die. It was a startling revelation to those disciples who wanted to bask in the glow of Jesus and stay on top of the mountain forever. That year, for the disciples, Lent came early as well, shocking them into a new understanding of Jesus and a new understanding of their call as his disciples.

This year, my hope is that we are startled by Lent, and that we, like the first disciples, are willing to go down the mountain with Jesus, to walk slowly with him, as he journeys to the cross.

LENTEN JOURNEY

The symbols in the sanctuary are a reminder of our Lord's journey to the cross. The *aloe plant* represents the time Jesus spent in the desert and His power of healing; the *purple cloth* symbolizes the royal robes the people used to mock Jesus; the *crown of thorns* reminds us of the painful cruelty and what was placed on Jesus' head at the crucifixion; the large *cross* represents Christ's physical

death and the *primitive cup and plate* on the communion table calls to mind Jesus' last supper with his friends, "Do this in remembrance of me...". The small stones are something to carry with you throughout the season as a reminder of Jesus' resolution to take his path to the cross. In Luke 9:51, the Scriptures say that Jesus "resolutely set his face", so we use a small stone to remind us of Jesus' resolution in his journey to the cross.

On Wednesday, February 13th, we begin the Forty Day Season of Lent. This day is marked with worship, prayer and the placing of ashes on the forehead as a reminder that from dust we came and to dust we shall return. It is a time of committing ourselves to various spiritual disciplines to prepare ourselves for Easter. For forty days we walk with Jesus through the wilderness toward the cross.

Lent is a time of inward reflection, repentance, forgiveness, and spiritual preparation. During Lent we think more deeply about what it means to be disciples of Jesus Christ, to be changed into his likeness, and to follow him step by step. Together we will observe Lent in the following ways:

Ash Wednesday Worship, Wednesday, February 13, 7:30 p.m.

This day is marked with worship, prayer and the placing of ashes on the forehead Wednesday as a reminder that from dust we came and to dust we shall return. It is a time of Service committing ourselves to various spiritual disciplines to prepare ourselves for Easter. Our worship will include silence, singing, scripture, and the imposition of ashes and communion by intinction. Living into Lent is a choice. Before you get to Ash Wednesday, you may need to slow down a bit and listen to your inner spirit. Be encouraged to make Lent a part of your daily lives.

HOLY WEEK WORSHIP SCHEDULE

Palm/Passion Sunday Worship, Sunday, March 24, 11:00 a.m.

On Sunday, March 24, we will celebrate Palm Sunday. Traditional palms will be SUNDAY available in a basket in the Narthex. **Palm Sunday** commemorates Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem (Matthew 21:1-11, Mark 11:1-11, Luke 19:28-44, John 12:12-

19). This service remembers the stories of the last week of Jesus' life. The branches remind us that there are both triumphs and defeats in our lives but that if we maintain our friendship with God, we will ultimately triumph.



DEACON'S CORNER

A Retreat Worth Remembering

On a foggy Saturday in January, the PPC Deacons and Elders met for a retreat, led by Pastor Sean and inspired by the words of a book written by Joan Gray, which used the images of rowboats and sailboats to help us ponder and plan the course for the coming year at PPC. With all new and continuing officers in attendance, we

started the day with coffee, donuts and prayer. Gray's book suggests that the unseen force of the wind that powers the sailboat, rather the effort needed to man the oars of a rowboat, is a metaphor for the unseen power of God that propels us forward and supports us on our life journey, both as individuals and as a church body....and that with God all things are possible. "God...empowers us to do more than we ever have dreamed."

During the morning we met together as a large group and discussed the metaphysical meaning of the book and generated ideas on specific undertakings that can be applied in the day to day operations of our church. For the afternoon session we separated into two groups...Elders and Deacons....with Pastor Sean dividing his time between the two. The Deacons, led by Gloria Leber, looked back on the year that was, and looked forward to the year to come. We discussed how the Deacons charge of service, both fellowship and congregational care, will be implemented. Our new Deacons, Jonathan Davies, Kay Norvell, Sally O'Neal, and Sonia Russo, will be wonderful additions to the group, as we enter our 50th anniversary year. 

Maundy Thursday Worship And Communion, Thursday, March 28, 7:30 p.m.


On March 28th we will have a special Maundy Thursday Service. Christians meet on Thursday evening of Holy Week to remember Christ's gathering his disciples in an upper room for a special meal before moving toward the events culminating in his crucifixion. It was upon this occasion that Jesus took bread and wine and identified

Good Friday Tenebrae Worhsip, Friday, March 29, 7:30 p.m.

Good This moving service culminates extinguishing of the lights at Tenebrae. During this time of worship, we will hear readings from the gospels which describe the time between the Last Supper and the Passion of Christ. These readings will include the last seven sayings of Jesus, assembled from the various gospel accounts. Following each passage, the reader will extinguish a candle to represent the flight of the disciples and the approach of the dark hate of Jesus' enemies. When the last passage has been read the church will be completely dark to recall the days when Jesus was in the tomb.



For our worship on Easter, March 31st, the paraments will be switched to white, the symbols that have been in the sanctuary during our Lenten journey will be gone, and in their place will be Easter Lilies and beautiful flowers symbolizing our new life and forgiveness in Jesus Christ! The Easter Lily symbolizes the Glory of the Risen Lord and the joy of the faithful who believe in God's promise of new life.

Choirs are a vital part of a worship service. They help lead the congregation's song – sometimes by singing a hymn; sometimes by singing an anthem, or through a response. Through music, our choirs help shed light on God's Word. It's a form of ministry, I believe. We could use your help.

Before you know it, Lent will be here. Do you know why we "give something up" during Lent? I used to think it was for suffering, or denial of a pleasure; but now I have come to understand that we "give something up" in order to "take something else on" — to make time for increased study, meditation, prayer, or for another form of devotion.

Why not "take on" singing in the choir for Lent? If you can carve out an hour and twenty minutes on Thursday nights, we'd love to have you join us. (Even if you don't…there might be a way around that. You never know.) You'd be taking on something meaningful… and something enjoyable.

If you've got any questions about it... I'd be glad to try and answer them.

Have you heard adults and youth talking about the great time that was had by all last summer in Oak Hill, West Virginia? Now is your chance to spend a week in service while getting to know other youth and adults in the congregation. The friendships last forever.

All members of PPC (youth currently in grade 8 and above *AND* adults) are invited to participate in a week of service, Saturday, June 15-Saturday, June 22, 2013, in Hazard Kentucky. We will be serving with the <u>Housing Development Alliance</u> of Hazard, Kentucky. Volunteers work on various phases of construction, including site preparation, shingling, digging footer drains, framing floors and walls, painting, and landscaping. Construction experience is not required. A carpenter will always be onsite to guide us through each project.

We will be staying at <u>First Presbyterian Church of Hazard</u> in various Sunday school and fellowship rooms where we will cook our own meals. We will shower at the nearby <u>Hazard Pavilion</u>, which has a heated 25-meter pool, two tennis courts, three racquetball/handball courts, a 1/12 mile long track, a weight room, a sauna, and an aerobics room that are available to us free of charge.

Trip participants are asked to contribute \$300 toward the cost of the trip. Scholarships are available. Please speak with Pastor Sean or Pastor Kendra privately if a full or partial scholarship is needed. Participants are also expected to be involved actively in various fundraising efforts throughout the year.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In the slight lull in the liturgical calendar that comes between Christmas and Lent, I've been blessed with a bit of time to reflect on recent life events. In particular, I've been thinking back to the blessings of my ordination in November and reflecting on how my faith journey led to that moment. And I've found it striking how true John Westerhoff's premise that "faith is 'caught,' not 'taught'" has been even in my own life (Westerhoff is a leading scholar in the field of Christian Education).

While I certainly have experienced many hours of Christian education myself and believe that it is vitally important, I know that my love for God and for the church was nurtured most meaningfully by the

model my parents and grandparents set.

Interestingly, my first memory of church is of the day that my parents joined First Presbyterian Church in Hastings, Nebraska, shortly after we moved to town. I was 3 years old. I remember sitting in church and my parents explaining that they had to go up front for a bit. My brother (age 6) and I were to sit quietly—no fighting! I remember watching in awe as they answered "special" questions and the congregation applauded them. I remember learning that day that church was a special place where people welcomed you before they even knew you.


No one taught me that lesson; I caught on all by myself (and probably with a little help from the Holy Spirit), Similarly, I came to understand and believe that God forgives us by hearing it every Sunday in worship following the prayer of confession. I came to understand and believe that giving was an important way to show your love for God by seeing my mother writing the offering check each week, handing it to my father to put in his coat pocket, and asking if I could drop it in the plate when it was passed down the pew. I learned to worship, by worshipping (and by asking my parents, Sunday School teachers, and pastors—but mainly my parents—questions when I had them).

As I reflect on the busy, high pressured lives that so many people live, especially in this region of the country, it strikes me that we would all do well to remember that Christian faith is more readily "caught" than "taught." The example we set and the habits we model for our children and youth (both those in our own families and those in our family of faith whom we promised to nurture at their baptisms) are critically important.

So, my challenge to us all this upcoming Lenten season is to be more intentional about how we are modeling faith to our children and youth. Are we showing them they are welcome through our words and actions? Are we demonstrating our love for God through active participation in worship? in Fellowship? in study? in mission? Are we inviting them to come along and do these things with us? Are we living our faith so that it can be "caught" by others? It is my hope and my prayer that we would all endeavor to do so.

The first Steeples to People were published soon after the congregation was officially chartered, in early 1964. The early editions are a window not only into the life and times of PUPC (the church was called Potomac United Presbyterian Church at that time), but also into the village of Potomac itself.

In those early days, the Steeple to People was the sole means (besides Sunday bulletins) of communication to church members. Today, we have a wide array of communication tools available to us, from the PPC Facebook pages, to the website, and the Thursday Spirit. These are the primary ways in which we can communicate the most up to date information about upcoming events at PPC. And, our Deacons are actively involved in keeping those members who do not use email informed through their Deacon Groups.

The Steeple to People remains an essential means to communicate to the members and friends of PPC, as it was in the early years of the congregation. With our other ecommunication tools available to us, we now have the opportunity to use the Steeple to People to not only communicate about events and programs, but also to provide a more in depth look at the people of PPC and issues of faith and life that matter to all of us.

For example, this issue begins a 50th anniversary series highlighting some of our

longtime members, re-introducing you to them, and hearing a bit about why PPC has been a vital part of their family for so many years. In the future, articles from the staff will focus on larger issues of faith and life and their impact on ministry here at PPC. And, I encourage all PPC members who submit articles for the Steeple to People to focus not only on monthly events that can be described in the Thursday Spirit and on the website, but rather to highlight relevant issues or topics that are of concern to our members and to your specific area of ministry.

Finally, it would not be an article about the Steeple to People without one big thank you, to Miriam Conley, who takes on the task every month of making sure the Steeple to People gets folded, sorted, and mailed at the Post Office. Miriam does a big job with grace and ease. Thank you, Miriam!

For almost 50 years, the Steeple to People has been a vital connection between the church and its people. May the tradition continue for many years to come!

Notes from the Session

The Session met for its regular monthly meeting on February 18th. A large portion of the meeting was devoted to the first reading of our draft Safe Church Policy, which has been under development for almost a year under the leadership of Reverend Grams. The policy provides administrative provisions to ensure the safety of children, youth, and vulnerable adults and includes several provisions related to emergency preparedness for our church.

Other topics considered during this meeting included:

- Initial discussion of the options related to refinancing the mortgage on the manse and the relationship of manse debt to the fundraising campaign envisioned as part of our 50th Anniversary year.
- A decision to continue funding for the Reformed Institute of Metropolitan Washington for the next five-year period.
- A report from the Glory to God Hymnal Committee, which has been chaired by Elder Bob Stow. More information will be provided to the congregation on this subject, but the committee has recommended that, for now, PPC continue to worship with our current hymnals.
- Review of the Annual Meeting of February 10th. Feedback from the congregation has been positive, expressing general satisfaction with the format of the meeting.

50th Anniversary Celebration News

Jim Dart – Staying True to the Vision of the Founders

Jim Dart moved to Potomac when he was 9 years old. His parents, Rachel and Jack, quickly met other families who were interested in organizing a new church, and Jim attended the first worship service at Potomac Elementary School in January 1963. Shirley Tietjen was his first Sunday School teacher in the congregation that was to become Potomac Presbyterian Church. Alyce Tamzarian, another long time member of our church, was a fifth grade teacher at the elementary school at the time.

The property for our church was donated by Arther Hyde, who formerly lived in the big white house across River Road from Congressional Country Club and adjacent to the Norwood School. Since Jim lived on Gary Road, he saw the church grow from the ground up. He remembers watching the swampy, woodsy area - across the street from a cornfield - slowly be transformed into our lovely church. In the early days, Jim remembers that the organ was housed in a pit at the back of the sanctuary. That was before the choir balcony or our current Fellowship Hall was built. When worshippers left the sanctuary, they turned left in the narthex and headed upstairs for fellowship in what is now our library and parlor area.

In those days, Jim's father, Jack, and his sister, Janis, played on the PPC bowling league at the River Bowl Lanes in Bethesda. Jack served as clerk of session and as an elder, and Jim's mother, Rachel, was active in the women's group. The manse was located on Marseille Drive off of Falls Rd, and Jim remembers Sunday afternoon youth group gatherings there. Jim has a strong memory of our "Preacher Snuffer" sounding board – the correct name is

'tester' – being stored behind the stage in the Potomac Elementary School all purpose room in anticipation of its eventual use in our future sanctuary.



As an adult, Jim served on the Board of Deacons and on the Session, and has served for many years on the Property Committee. He has always tried to stay true to the original vision of our founders. We look at the octagonal sanctuary, the octagonal sounding board, and the octagonal baptismal font and think that our founders had a vision of the physical architecture and furnishings of our church and also a vision for the family of faith that we would become.

PPC has meant a lot to Jim and his wife Beth. Rachel Dart's memorial service was held at PPC in 1990, and Jack's in 2005. Jim and Beth's daughter, Jennifer, was baptized, confirmed, and married at PPC.

Jim has taken great joy, over the years, in watching PPC children grow up – progressing from sitting on the floor during the "Children's Time", to "coloring in the pews" during the service, to offering their "Youth Sermon" in their senior year of high school. His hope for the future is that PPC will continue to grow and attract new families to help carry on the vision of our founders.

Given our culture of "more-more-more" and the abundance which

surrounds us, it can be very difficult to truly appreciate the extent of our privilege. Yet, as Christians we are called not only to appreciate our privilege and give thanks for all our blessings, but also to understand the inequality (and yes, injustice) that exists when we have so much and others have so little and to work for an end of such injustices. It is daunting call, to right injustice, particularly when we are the beneficiaries, but it is our call as Christians. For, as the prophet Isaiah proclaimed on behalf of God, "Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice" (Isaiah 58:6).

Accordingly, this Lent during the Time for Young Disciples each Sunday, the children and I have been trying to think a little more intentionally about injustice and how we can help. We have been and will continue each Sunday to think about one thing (food, electricity, schooling, etc.) that we often take for granted. We have been trying not only to say thanks to God for these things, but to "loose the bonds of injustice" by giving back toward solutions through the One Great Hour of Sharing (see

www.presbyterianmission.org/ministries/special offerings/one-great-hour-sharing-offering

for more information). For example, on the first Sunday in Lent, we talked about all the things we have to eat, and the children were challenged to pick a day, keep track of all the different types of things they eat that day, and then give a coin or dollar for each different item as we seek to make sure all people have proper

nutrition. Simple acts such as these not only build awareness and appreciation of our privilege, but provide a direct connection with solutions for the injustices that are linked to our privilege.

So, this is an open invitation, to spend some time as we continue the Lenten journey considering how you can seek, or maybe already are seeking, to "loose the bonds of injustice" in some way, large or small. May God bless you on the Lenten road as together we strive for clean hearts and right spirits (Psalm 51:10).

From the Music Director

Not Only a Day, but a Season

Easter — can be referred to in many ways: The Day of the Resurrection of Our Lord; The Eighth Day of Creation; Passover, or "The New Passover". All these names point to the same thing, namely - the central belief of Christianity—the day that Christ overcame death.

According to Scripture, Jesus rose from the dead on the first Sunday following Passover. (See Matthew 28:1, Mark 16:1-3, Luke 23:56-24:3, and John 20:1). For this reason, ancient Christlans celebrated Easter (which they called Passover) on the first Sunday after the Jewish Passover, which is 14 Nisan on the Jewish calendar, and which is tied to celebrating the spring harvest. The only exceptions were in Syria and Mesopotamia, where ancient Christlans celebrated Easter on 14 Nisan, no matter which day of the week it happened to be.

No one in ancient times denied that the Resurrection took place on a Sunday. (Which became "The First Day" of the week — a change from the Hebrew Sabbath.) There was huge disagreement on which Sunday to hold the celebration. Why? Several reasons — the "moveable" date of the Passover, the switch from the Jewish Calendar to the Julian (Roman) calendar, which allowed both for 2 Passovers in a 12 month period, and the celebration of a spring harvest before spring actually happened.

Confused? So was everyone. So in 325, the Council of Nicea was convened to deal with Arianism and to standardize the date of Easter. The Council of Nicea, noting that Syria and Mesopotamia represented a small minority, required them to conform to the practice of the majority. The bishops from Syria and Mesopotamia readily agreed to this ruling and

their churches complied with it. The Council of Nicea also ruled that all churches must celebrate Easter on the same day. This clearly implies that they instituted a standard method for calculating the date of the full moon after the spring equinox, but the documentary evidence for it has not survived. Some ancient writers, notably Ambrose, felt that the Council of Nicea prescribed the mathematical formula that we presently use to fix the date of Easter, but we can no longer prove it.

The Western Church applies the Nicene formula to the calendar as reformed by Pope Gregory in 1582. (This calendar reform resulted in the <u>Gregorian calendar</u> that we use today for secular purposes.) The Eastern Church applies the Nicene formula to the old <u>Julian Calendar</u>, which was instituted by Julius Caesar and served as the civil calendar of the Roman Empire before the birth of Christ. The Eastern Church also applies the formula in such a way that Easter always falls after the Jewish Passover.

I once took a course in which the Professor made the statement, "Every Sunday is a little Easter- and every Easter should be one <u>big</u> Sunday." So on the Day of Resurrection, we celebrate in a big way – special music, flowers, shouts of "Alleluia" to the God who, through the Son, triumphed over death.

The Easter Season lasts 50 days, from Easter Sunday to Pentecost, and includes the celebration of the Ascension of Christ. It is often called "The Great Fifty Days".



The Eloquent President: A Portrait of Lincoln Through His Words by Ronald White shows how Lincoln's major speeches developed. It is an outstanding book that will inspire and fascinate you.

Religion and the American Civil War is edited by Randall Miller and others. The authors of these essays show that in victory or defeat those on both sides of this war looked to God for meaning. It fills a gap in Civil War scholarship and American religious history.

Ronald C. White, Jr. wrote *Lincoln's Greatest Speech: The Second Inaugural* which was a New York Times Notable Book. In this speech, Lincoln called the whole country guilty and pleaded for unity and reconciliation.

Each one of these books is as fascinating as the other.

MEMORIAL GARDEN EXPANSION UPDATE

In June, all PPC members received a brochure describing the plans to expand our Potomac Presbyterian Church Memorial Garden. Since then, we have made much progress and are pleased to present an update. We have received our building permit from Montgomery County and have received bids from construction companies.

As we are ready to move ahead with construction, niches are now available to be purchased by congregation members. Through December 31, 2013, niches are priced at \$4,500 per niche. After January 1, 2014, a niche will cost \$5,000. Each niche holds four urns.

If you are planning to purchase a niche, we encourage you to do it now. If we have enough niches purchased by the end of September, we will be able to proceed with construction in October and November of this year. While there are no available niches remaining in the existing memorial garden, the planned expansion will provide 55 more niches which will be allocated on a first-come basis.

If you are interested in selecting and purchasing a niche, please contact Rev. Sean Miller, Sigrid McCutcheon or Mary Margaret Smith. The Garden Expansion plans with numbered niches are in the church office for your viewing.

PARKING TASK FORCE SELECTS DESIGN CONTRACTOR

As we reported last fall, the Task Force has been exploring potential approaches to PPC parking lot extension as our church grows in membership and the construction of a new Potomac Elementary School is in the planning stages. As we stated in our prior report, the impact of construction at Potomac Elementary School may seem to be a distant issue. However, the sooner PPC has a sound plan for parking and completes the parking lot construction, the better we will be able to accommodate church growth and be prepared for any parking restrictions that we may experience at the School. As we have already seen, our use of the school parking lot on Sundays often competes with other groups that rent the school facilities at the same time. This competing parking situation would likely continue after school renovation. If we don't have our own expanded parking facilities, the school parking capacity will remain similarly constrained as it is now.

In the past months, we have developed a Scope of Work/Request for Proposal for a plan to expand our parking while keeping closely apprised of the progress of the school construction at Potomac Elementary. Our Scope of Work/Request for Proposal for the design phase was sent to qualified contractors in the area.

Five contractors responded to our Scope of Work and four were responsive to our requirements. The Task Force examined each of the four remaining proposals in depth, interviewed the bidders, and checked their references for previous work done that was relevant to our parking lot requirements. After careful consideration, we selected the contractor who offered the best skills, experience, and value to complete the work required. Site Solution Incorporated (SSI) of Germantown, Maryland was selected to

complete the first two phases of our parking lot work. It is our plan to initiate the contract in July with SSI and have a completed design plan by the end of the first quarter of 2014.

With that design plan in hand, we will have a detailed understanding of the parking lot construction requirements, environmental needs, and all state and local government design approvals obtained. We will then be well prepared to explore construction options in late 2014 or early 2015. Potomac Elementary School plans would be in place with school renovation expected to begin in mid-2016. Thus we could have our parking expansion completed before school renovation begins.

The Task Force will continue to make progress reports to the congregation as the process unfolds. In the meantime, please contact any member of the Task Force if you have questions or comments. See us in person or contact us by e-mail. (parkingtaskforce@potomacpresbyterian.org)

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

LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

"There Is Life In Him Yet!"

During my sermon on September 22, I mentioned a few examples of how the PC(USA) is inspiring new life and new engagement with the church for youth and young adults today. One of many examples of this new, creative, and inspiring work in the denomination is NEXT Church. Here is the NEXT Church mission statement:

The mission of NEXT Church is to foster relationships among God's people:
sparking imaginations;
connecting congregations;
offering a distinctively Presbyterian witness to Jesus Christ.

Trusting in God's sovereignty and grace, NEXT Church will engage the church that is becoming by cultivating vital connections, celebrating emerging leadership and innovation, and working with congregations and leaders to form and reform faith communities.

NEXT Church empowers church leadership within the PC(USA) to foster growth and innovation, both of which are desperately needed in a critical time for the church and its relationship to culture and society. The director of NEXT Church, the Rev. Jessica Tate, recently led an engaging workshop with PPC parents of youth and sparked some important conversation about how to raise our children against the grain of our over-programmed and hyper-busy culture. I hope you will visit nextchurch.net to read more about what important ministry is happening through NEXT Church.

Another important initiative is called. "1001 Worshipping Communities." In June 2012, the 220th General Assembly declared a commitment to a church-wide movement to create 1,001 worshiping communities in the next 10 years. These communities are being formed all over the country, and as one of the movement's core values proclaims, "There is nothing more transformative than the people of God gathered together to worship the risen Christ and sent out to serve the world in Christ's name. God's Spirit is moving throughout the church, whispering the same things and inspiring new models, fresh vision, and an awareness that is bringing God's people to understand and embrace again the truth that 'It's all about congregations."

We often hear statistics about the church in "decline," comparing the numbers of those who are actively attending church to similar statistics a generation or two ago. I am confident, however, that when you take a look at these and other inspiring movements in the life of the PC(USA), you will find not a church in decline, but a church in Reformation. The church is raising up new leaders who are committed to providing the next generation of youth and young adults with the opportunities to connect and engage with the church in new ways

I hope you take a few moments (or more!) to read online about these new and creative initiatives that are happening in the church today, as together, we give thanks for God who is always at work in the church to bring new life and hope. Or, as our ancestors in faith would have said, "The church is to be reformed, and always being reformed." Glory be to God!

NOTES FROM THE SESSION

After a short break for the month of July, the Session met for their regular August and September meetings. During October, the Session will meet jointly with the Board of Deacons.

In August the Session heard from Mary Margaret Smith on the progress toward an expansion of the PPC Memorial Garden. The building permit has been obtained from the county, and proposals from two construction companies have been obtained. Since the original intention of the Memorial Garden Committee and the Session was to expand these facilities using Memorial Garden funds alone, there will be some reliance on advance niche purchases to support construction. The committee will be updating the congregation on progress toward construction, anticipated to begin either this fall or next spring.

The Session also received two reports from Elder Dan Drumheller on the progress of the Acoustic Committee. This committee has set aggressive objectives that will likely be implemented over a period of years, but, as Reverend Miller noted during the August meeting, a number of their findings can be implemented in the nearer terms.

In September the Session approved a job description for a staff position providing administrative support to Reverend Grams and our Family/Youth Ministry program. The position will allow Reverend Grams to devote more of her time to volunteer and lay leader development. It is anticipated that the position will be filled during 2014.

congregational meeting following the worship service for election of officers.





Cardiac Team to Ecuador

The Por Cristo Cardiac Team will travel to Quito Ecuador on October 11. This will be our 24th annual trip to Ecuador. We anticipate a busy week of teaching the Ecuadorians how to improve their care of children with heart disease.

All aspects of cardiac care are involved, including open-heart surgery, intensive care, echocardiography and cardiac catheterization. The Ecuadorian doctors and nurses have made enormous advances in their ability to provide quality cardiac care which is reflected in excellent surgical results.

We work in a large public children's hospital in Quito. It has 273 beds and is always full. The clinics are bursting with children, waiting in long lines to be seen. Some cardiac patients travel long distances by bus to be seen by our team.

The joy and happiness seen in the faces of the parents whose children are helped makes our small effort so very worthwhile.

The Mission Committee and others at PPC have been steadfast supporters of Por Cristo and the cardiac team for many, many years. The generosity of PPC has provided much relief to numerous little cardiac patients in Quito.

The gratitude of those children is forwarded to PPC each day.



Care Packages for College Students

The preparation of care packages for our college students has, over the years, been one of the PPC Deacons' favorite projects. It was my privilege this year to oversee that

venture. Our goal was simple: we wanted our college students and young adults to know PPC loves them, is thinking of them, and continues to pray for them, wherever they are. For me, it's been a few years, but how well I remember that phone call that started with the words, "Hey Mom, you won't believe what I got in the mail today!"

In 2013, however, Moms, Dads, and Deacons face some challenges. With so much techie wizardry at their 24/7 access, what will thrill or even generate a response from our college students? With physical mail almost as obsolete as the Pony Express, who at college will bother to check their old-fashioned mailbox? When you can get anything you want at lightning speed off the Internet, what is unique and worthy of these mailings? In 140 characters or less, and maybe thinking "out of the box" a little bit—what would YOU put into the boxes if you were a PPC Deacon?

My highly qualified intergenerational consultants, offering their services pro bono for a charitable cause, assured me that the answer is simple and still rudimentary: CHOCOLATE. And...homemade goodies, popcorn, granola bars, power bars, dried

fruit snacks, or anything else yummy put together by loving hands. (That was exactly 140 characters.) And so, on October 6, a bevy of loving Deacon hands assembled the aforementioned goodies and more, plus a nice letter from Pastors Sean and Kendra and a devotional booklet into 27 boxes, for our young adults who are studying in places as close as College Park and as far as South Africa, and the following day they were mailed.

In Worship, we have lately been hearing about mustard seed faith and mustard seed ministry, as taught by Jesus (Luke 17:6). Perhaps, caring for our college students falls into that esteemed description of faith. And, we have also recently focused on two young New Testament youths. First, on young Eutychus, who couldn't stay awake while Paul talked on and on, and fell down several flights from his window sill seat as a result (Acts 20: 7-12). And secondly, we thought of Timothy, Paul's protégé, who talked about "fighting the good fight of faith" (1 Tim 6:12). Granted, if I were sending a care package to Eutychus, it would include some No Doz or a small portable stadium chair, and for Timothy, I might send some stationery for his letters or some nice soft boxing gloves, but whatever the commodity and whichever the century, we Deacons would pray that the overwhelming message transported would be love.

Our young people have all the excitement, hard work, and temptations of being on their own as they pursue their academic goals and learn who they are as independent human beings. We want them to remember, above all else, that each and every one of them is God's child, most dear, and always loved--by their nuclear family as well as their church family. May God bless all the youth of PPC, of all ages.

50 Years Ago...

As we celebrate PPC's 50th anniversary, we take a look back at what life was like in 1963. That was the year The Beatles recorded their first album, Martin Luther King, Jr. delivered his "I Have a Dream" speech, and President John F. Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas. It was also the year that Potomac Presbyterian Church was formed.



Other facts from 1963:

- Mickey Mantle signed a one-year \$100,000 contract with the Yankees.
- The U.S. Postmaster General inaugurated the use of zip codes.
- Video instant replay was used for the first time in a sports telecast.
- Life expectancy was 69.7 years. It is now 78.7.
- A new house cost \$12,650 and the average annual income was \$5,807.
- Gasoline cost 29 cents per gallon.
- Petticoat Junction, My Favorite Martian, and Bonanza were popular TV shows.
- The Washington Beltway was still under construction, and construction on the metro system had not yet begun.

Our earliest church members describe the Potomac Village of 1963 as a sleepy crossroads in the middle of horse country. A great deal has happened in our town and in our church since that time. What has not changed

is our commitment to be, as our mission statement says, "An active Christian community devoted to worship that stirs the soul, education that engages the mind, and service that sends us out into the world."

Our congregation, which first gathered in 1963 in the all-purpose room of Potomac Elementary School, was originally known as Potomac United Presbyterian Church. It was officially organized and recognized as the 68th church in the Presbytery of Washington City. There were 51 charter members. Our first budget (in 1964) was for a total of \$12,936.40.

In the early years, our hymns were sung from *The Hymnbook*, published in 1955. These red hymnals were replaced later by the blue hymnals we have now, *The Presbyterian Hymnal*, published in 1990. Our earliest church services might have included the singing of "Onward Christian Soldiers," "Rise Up, Oh Men of God," and "Tell Me the Stories of Jesus" from the old red hymnbook. The 'new' blue hymnal includes 'new' additions such as "Let Us Talents and Tongues Employ," "Here I am Lord," and "How Great Thou Art."

Cal Reid, Clerk of Session, records the details of the life of our church in two red, hefty, leather-bound books. These books, our official Church Registers, note every marriage, baptism, and death performed over the years. Here are some numbers from the stories those books tell:

PPC by the Numbers

- 392 active members as of publication
- 584 infant baptisms performed since the church began (there were also 68 adult baptisms)
- 319 marriages listed on the Church Register

ADVENT NEWS

Did you know?...

The Evergreen Wreathes and Garlands:

Evergreens have long been considered symbols of eternity, a sign of God's everlasting nature, and an indication that the faithful will experience eternal life in communion with God in Jesus Christ. The evergreens we use to decorate our sanctuary will remind us of God's abiding love in Jesus Christ, and of our eternal fellowship with Him.

The Advent Wreath:

The Advent Wreath is a simple circle of evergreen branches. Since the branches come from nature in its winter's sleep, the evergreens testify to the continuation of life. Bending the



branches so that the ends touch to form a circle further symbolizes life without end. Four candles encircle a central, Christ candle. The candles signify God's Son as the light of the world. Customarily, there are

four candles for the four weeks in Advent. They are lit throughout Advent, but the Christ candle is not lit until Christmas Eve. The Advent Wreath sets the mood of waiting in the dark for the day when Christ was born.

The Poinsettia:

The most popular flower of the Advent-Christmas season is the bright red poinsettia. Actually, the red petals are not the blossoms of the plant. The



blossoms are the small yellow cluster found at the center. This attractive flower was discovered growing wild in Mexico, by Dr. Joel Roberts Poinsett, and he brought some of the plants to America. The poinsettia speaks to us symbolically, in several ways. First of all, the star-shaped formation of red leaves calls to mind the star which shone at that first Christmas. The color of the flower symbolizes the fact that the babe of Bethlehem became the Savior of the world, as he shed his blood upon the cross of Calvary.

The Christmas Tree:

The Christmas tree is a wonderful sign of God's love and faithfulness. Never losing its green color, the Christmas tree reminds us of God's steadfast love, which endures forever. It is said that Martin Luther was the first person to decorate his home with a Christmas tree. That was over four centuries ago! From this first Christmas tree in the Luther household, the custom spread. Now Christmas trees are used in homes, in churches and in communities-wherever the birth of Christ is celebrated and the love of Christ is shared.

The Chrismons:

The use of Chrismons on the tree began in the Lutheran Church of the Ascension, in Danville, Virginia. Chrismons, or "Christ's Monograms", are handmade designs forming the familiar symbols of the Christian faith. These symbols



speak to Christians of the deep meaning of the Gospel. The fish is the most ancient symbol for our Lord, and was used as an easily recognized secret sign by early Christians. The first letters of the Greek words for "Jesus Christ, God's Son, Savior" form the Greek word for "fish". There are many designs for the symbol of the cross. The Anchor Cross was called the cross of hope by first-century Christians; it reminds us that Jesus is the Hope of the world. The Chi Rho Cross combines the first two letters of "Christ" in Greek-the "chi" shaped "x" reminds us of the manger of Jesus, and the "rho" is shaped like a shepherd's crook, and reminds us of the first visitors to the manger.

The Lights:

The symbol of light is central in the Christian message that Jesus is the Light of the World. As Isaiah 9:2 promises: "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light. Those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shined." Advent is a time to remember that Jesus brought this powerful light into the world, and no amount of fear, darkness, or misery can put that light out. Christmas lights and candles also remind us of the glorious light of the Christmas angels as they spoke to the shepherds, and of the steady light of the star that led the Magi to Bethlehem. Sometimes the light of Jesus is most evident in difficult times, just as the stars can only be seen in the dark of night. Candles placed in the windows serve as a guide to all who pass by in the darkness, and as an invitation to all those looking for shelter. iust as Mary and Joseph sought shelter on the first Christmas Eve.

PPC at Sophia House

The Wilkins Avenue Women's Assessment Center, (part of Interfaith Works and commonly known as



Sophia House), provides emergency shelter, meals, and social services aimed at establishing self-sufficiency for single adult women who have been living on the street or at other unsuitable places.

Sophia House relies on volunteers to prepare food 365 days a year. As part of the coalition of congregations, PPC provides a dinner and

breakfast for 30 women on the first Sunday of each month. Sophia House is located on Wilkins Avenue in Rockville.

Dinner is served by volunteers at 6:30pm. Volunteers arrive between 6:00 and 6:15pm to set up and prepare. They serve dinner, converse with the women, and usually leave between 7:15-7:30pm. Dinners generally consist of a main dish, a couple sides, dessert, and beverages. Meals must be warm and ready to serve – there is only a microwave in the kitchen area. There is room for about 2-4 people comfortably to serve the women. We leave the breakfast items, (for example, cereal, fruit, hard-boiled eggs, bagels/muffins), for the next morning.

Some people may hesitate to volunteer because they find it daunting to cook for 30 people, but we provide suggested menus and recipes of items to bring based on what other people have done. PPC volunteers consist of any combination of families, individuals, and groups. It's fun to put together groups of people to cook and serve, and gives good meaning to "many hands make light work". It's very nice for families with younger kids to get involved—it provides the opportunity for them to interact with those that are less fortunate than us, and to find out that, in many ways, they are not so different than any of us either.
