



#### **Deacon Defined Book of Order G2.02**

The ministry of deacon as set forth in Scripture is one of compassion, witness, and service, sharing in the redeeming love of Jesus Christ for the poor, the hungry, the sick, the lost, the friendless, the oppressed, those burdened by unjust policies or structures, or anyone in distress. Persons of spiritual character, honest repute, exemplary lives, brotherly and sisterly love, sincere compassion, and sound judgment should be chosen for this ministry.\*

### Ruling Elder Defined Book of Order G2.03

Congregations should elect persons of wisdom and maturity of faith, having demonstrated skills in leadership and being compassionate in spirit. Ruling elders are so named not because they "lord it over" the congregation (Matt.20:25), but because they are chosen by the congregation to discern and measure its fidelity to the Word of God, and to strengthen and nurture its faith and life. Ruling elders, together with ministers of the Word and Sacrament, exercise leadership, government, spiritual discernment, and discipline and have responsibilities for the life of a congregation as well as the whole church, including ecumenical relationships. When elected by the congregation, they shall serve faithfully as members of the session. When elected as commissioners to higher councils, ruling elders participate and vote with the same authority as ministers of the Word and Sacrament, and they are eligible for any office.\*

# Director of Music and Organist Search Committee Update

#### Dear PPC,

Your Director of Music & Organist Search Committee has been hard at work this Summer to select the person God is preparing to lead our community musically. So far, we have met with six candidates for the position on Zoom. All applicants for the position have sent online links for committee members to review before the Zoom interview of their piano, organ, bells, & conducting expertise. We invited three of the six candidates to the church for an in-person audition. The audition consists of:

- A church tour
- A 30-minute choir rehearsal
- Playing piano 15 minutes
- Playing organ 15 minutes
- A candid conversation with committee members

One of the three finalists pulled out at the last minute due to the realization that the DMV was not the location of choice for this person. After meeting the other two in person, the committee realized neither was the right fit.

We are prayerful that we will find the creative musician that will lead us forward for this season of ministry but have not yet gotten there. In the meantime we have one more Zoom interview scheduled. We ask that you share the position description with musicians you think may be right for our church.

Going forward musically in September, Arianna McFeaters who so ably led our Vacation Bible School music has agreed to lead the children's choir until we find the right person. Guest pianist Sean Cavanaugh has agreed to be with us through the month of September. Feelers are out among the Handbell Musicians of America community to see if a bell conductor is looking for a position in Potomac, MD. Please continue to pray for the Music Search Committee. Feel free to reach out to any of us with questions, comments, and thoughts you may have on the subject.

#### **Earth Care Pledge**

Peace and justice is God's plan for all creation. The earth and all creation are God's. God calls us to be careful, humble stewards of this earth, and to protect and restore it for its own sake, and for the future use and enjoyment of the human family. As God offers all people the special gift of peace through Jesus Christ, and through Christ reconciles all to God, we are called to deal justly with one another and the earth.

- Our worship and discipleship will celebrate God's grace and glory in creation and declare that God calls us to cherish, protect and restore this earth.
- In education, we will seek learning and teaching opportunities to know and understand the threats to God's creation and the damage already inflicted. We will encourage and support each other in finding ways of keeping and healing the creation in response to God's call to earth-keeping, justice and community.
- Our facilities will be managed, maintained and upgraded in a manner that respects and cherishes all creation, human and non-human, while meeting equitably the needs of all people. In our buildings and on our grounds we will use energy efficiently, conserve resources, and share what we have in abundance so that God's holy creation will be sustainable for all life and future generations.
- Our outreach will encourage public policy and community involvement that protects and restores the vulnerable and degraded earth as well as oppressed and neglected people. We will be mindful that our personal and collective actions can positively or negatively affect our neighborhood, region, nation and world. We will seek to achieve environmental justice through coalitions and ecumenical partnerships.



#### Small Steps We Can Take To Help The Planet: Reducing Waste

According to the EPA, the most effective way to reduce waste is to not create it in the first place. Save money, conserve natural resources, and reduce greenhouse gas emissions by practicing the three R's: reduce, reuse, and recycle.

- Reduce your food waste by shopping smart, buying only what you need, eating leftovers, composting food scraps, and donating unused food to food banks or shelters. Food is the single largest category of material placed in municipal landfills, where it emits methane, a powerful greenhouse gas.
- Think green before you shop. Reduce associated greenhouse gas emissions by thinking about the environmental impact of products. For example, consider a product's durability, sustainability, and ease of recycling when making a purchase.
- Reuse or repurpose items such as old clothing, cloth grocery bags, and containers to cut down on the amount of waste you create in the first place. Find out more ways to reduce your impact.
- Buy used items to reduce waste as well as the emissions created by producing new materials or disposing of them in landfills. Donate your old items to make sure others can reuse them, too!
- Buy products made with recycled content. Check labels to see if a product or its packaging is made from recycled content.
- Know before you throw. Know what items your local recycling program collects and encourage your household to recycle right and recycle more.

#### Other Tips

- 1. **Eat less meat and dairy**. You might be surprised to discover that farming animals is one of the biggest contributors to climate change. Meat and dairy production causes 14.5% of planet-warming gases. Consider meatless meals in your menu planning and when you eat out.
- 2. Reduce plastic pollution. It's impossible to go for a walk without finding plastic waste. Take steps to reduce your plastic consumption. Avoid buying plastic water bottles or food packaged in plastic containers, wrap food in wax paper or store in reusable containers.
- 3. **Be mindful of travel.** On a personal level, pick the lowest-carbon mode of transportation whenever possible. Air travel packs a big climate punch. If you can, take fewer flights and fly direct. Check out the travel website Kayak for filters that highlight lower-carbon flights.

The Potomac Presbyterian Church Session signed the Earth Care Pledge at the December 2022 Session meeting. Our application to become an Earth Care congregation was approved by the PC(USA) in January 2023.
